Hard Luck Program

Vanguard Satellite Launching Ends In Double Setback

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—The hard luck Vanguard program suffered another setback Monday when a second stage misfire ended a flight that might have put three satellites into orbit around the earth.

It was the seventh failure for Vanguard since the program began in December 1957. Two shots have been rated successes.

However, the day was not a total loss for the United States space program. On the West Coast, the Air Force successfully put into a polar orbit the second in a series of Discoverer satellites.

Discoverer II, launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California, carries an instrument-filled capsule in its nose cone. Air Force planes, equipped with special gear, may be used to recover that capsule in mid-air.

The 12-foot Vanguard rocket thundered skyward at 9:50 p.m., casting a long plume of flame. The firing was delayed for a time because of unfavorable weather conditions over the Pacific.

The first stage went off all right. But nearly half an hour after blastoff, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced here and in Washington that the second stage had failed.

Cause of the trouble was not known immediately.

NASA, which took over the Vanguard program from the Navy, said:

"The second stage of the Vanguard III satellite launching vehicle . . . failed to operate properly following the first stage burnout. The remaining portions of the vehicle continued upward for a short period of time before falling into the Atlantic Ocean."

On the basis of the observed trajectory during the first stage firing, scientists estimated that the Vanguard never reached more than 150 to 200 miles altitude and no more than 500 miles distance.

The air force said it would decide whether to try to recover the capsule after learning whether the satellite orbits.

An orbit announcement was expected two hours after launch.

Here is how the recovery would work:

Eight C-119 transports of the 6002 RD test squadron on Hawaii form up in the recovery area. Each is equipped with two telescoping 10-foot poles, trailing down and slightly outward from each side of the fuselage. Between the pole tips—distance 30 feet—is a nylon harness.

To recover a plane swoops over the descending "chute and tries to snag it with the harness. Presumably, the planes make passes in succession. They have about 10 minutes to catch it before it falls into the sea. If they fall, two destroyers go after the capsule, which floats.

He is author of a number of articles for professional journals and his books include: "The Presidency in the Courts," published in 1957 and a forthcoming work "A Quantitative Analysis of Judicial Behavior."

Dr. Schubert holds the PhD degree from Syracuse University and has taught at Syracuse, the University of California, Howard University, Rutgers and the University of Minnesota.

Ike Delays Decision on Dulles

Secretary's Resignation Anticipated

Doctors to Try New Treatment

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower Monday delayed a decision on John Foster Dulles' future as secretary of state.

Most administration leaders were gloomy about the prospects Dulles could withstand. They expected he would resign shortly, perhaps within a couple of days.

Dulles' condition will now affect an effort to check Dulles' cancer by new medical treatment.

Dulles' condition seemed to indicate cancer in Congress about who will represent the United States at the Foreign Ministers' meeting in Geneva May 11.

Rep. George Allen (R-Va.) said last night Dulles is able to receive full-time care in good hands. He would expect to make a decision.

Allen took the number one position in the Senate Select Committee on Small Business.

Allen was saying in effect that an acting secretary can stand in an equal position to General with the Mississippian Dulles and the soon-to-be-out-of-the-united states Dulles.

Allen was quoted as saying, "I am acting secretary and stand in an equal position to General with the Mississippi Dulles and the soon-to-be-out-of-the-united states Dulles."

The House delegation, however, has not yet decided on a replacement for Dulles.

During his Florida visit, Dulles apparently failed to regain the strength he had when he was a full-time senator and champion of administration foreign policy, a post he has filled for six years.

The White House announced after Eisenhauer's visit to the hospital that Dulles would remain there for some days for additional medical observation and new treatment.

In yesterday's sudden announcement about Dulles' return nothing was said about his need to undergo new treatment.

The two American panelists, Lawrence Dennis, vice-president for Academic Affairs at Penn State University, and Donald Lowe, head of the College of Arts and Sciences at Oberlin College, believe that the cure is the responsibility of all the people in the universities to bring about a fusion of scientific and liberal thinking.

7:30 p.m. in the Music Auditorium will be presented.


