

NY Supreme Court Demands Signup In 15 Days for Basilio Crown Match

NEW YORK (A)—In a precedent-setting decision preme Court Justice Saul Streit Wednesday directed Ray Robinson to agree within 15 days to defend his m weight championship against Carmen Basilio or fac-

of the title.

The court, in a 12-page decision, upheld the power of the state athletic commission to vacate a title. The judge also said the commission could choose the challenger for a championship fight and could fix the date for such a fight.

But Judge Streit ruled the commission did not, according to its own rules, have the authority to pick the site. of the title.
