Auto Fires Arsonist's

Handiwork By KIT ERICKSON

Two car fires in the Brody parking lot early Friday morn of an arsonist, Lt. Earle Rober the department of public safety said Sunday.

The two cars, that burned within minutes of each other, were termed total losses by their owners, Andre Lovas, Howell junior, and William Hessel, Detroit junior.

A third car parked nearby

The fire was believed to have been the result of an accelerant, such as phosperous, with some type of timing device, said Rob-This would explain the sudden and rapid burning, he said.

Lovas said that his ear, a 1953 Ford, was unlocked at the time and the fire seemed to have started inside.

"Well, at least I have insur-ance," he commented.

The Ford began burning first and as East Lansing firemen turned their hoses on the flames, Hessel's car, a 1950 Dodge road-ster parked six cars away, burst into dames.

The department of public safety was still investigating several leads. A report from the labora-tory on the cause of the fire is expected later thin week,

April 16 a car owned by Jack Benson, Kalamazoo sophomore, burned on a Brody sidewalk under similar circumstances. Police reported the apprehension of the youths who put the car on the sidewalk but a polygraph test indicated that it was done as a prank and had nothing to do with the fire.

We think it is time to take a rood, hard look at the whole controversy over compulsory versus voluntary training at Michi-

Much has been said both for and against. compulsory training at various campus meetings and particularly in letters to the editor of the State News

We feel that the whole situation is tak-Ing on an unhealthy atmosphere of vitri-olic hysteria on both sides of the issue. The argument over ROTC has degenerated into a series of narrow-minded statements. rebuttals and retaliations that have shoved aside the basic question of what is best for

AS THE STUDENT, new spaper, we are responsible for much of the dissension over the ROTC program. But we feel the situa-

We still feel that if the majority of the student body honestly thinks voluntary ROTC would be better for the university. the nation, and the students, then the Board of Trustees should seriously consider changing the program.

But we are sick and tired of various groups of professional and semi-professional agitators jumping on the bandwagon to incite emotional, illogical and irresponsible feelings over ROTC.

If this problem of military training is going to turn into an unhealthy, un-American propaganda battle, then we would rather see the entire issue dropped than be

nobody is going to hold our coat while we fight. If any groups or individuals wish to fight ROTC on such grounds, they will have to do it without our support.

There are certain factions on this campus, as spring up periodically on all college campuses, that attach themselves to any controversy purely for the sake of agitaland spreading dissension among stu-

We feel that ROTC should be placed on a voluntary basis if this serves the best in-terests of the university and the students.

A student would not evade his military obligation by dropping ROTC, He would still face the draft or some other choice after graduation. He could still become an officer through Officer Candidate School or any of the other officer training pro-

AS WE SEE IT, the choice of fulfilling a military obligation, which is the duty of every American youth, should, as-far as sible, be left to the youth concerned.

But if the controversy over compulsory ROTC cannot be kept on a mature, responsible and purely academic level, then we would rather drop it completely than see it infiltrated and taken over by a pack of radical agitators and hate-mongers.

If we eliminate compulsory ROTC let's for sound reasons, with full awareness of the ramifications of such a change, and without haste and hysteria.
