Why Mail Grades To 'Authorities'?

abondoned temporarily its report card mailing policy and sent all reports to home addresses instead of holding them several days extra for sorting according to student age and

policy of mailing cards as follows: 1) reports of students under 21 go automatically to home addresses (i.e., parents or guardians), unless the student is married; 2) reports of students 21 or over go either to home addresses or local ddresses as the student indicates on registration card

Sending report cards home to the folks is a policy which dates back nearly 40 years. Registrar Kermit Smith said his office follows the principle because it keeps appearing in the catalog each year.

WE QUESTION ITS validity and urge whatever faculty or administrative groups responsible for the rule as it stands to take a critical look at it.

Report cards, it seems to us, are token measurements of how well students perform in class. As such, they are primarily the business of the student who performed, and

hould be sent to that student.

Parents bear the financial burdens of most students; as next of kin they are generally very interested in what kind of performances their children are giving in school, But to assume that the student's performance is primarily for the benefit of his parents is both an insult to the student and parents and an indication of faulty educational prin

WE CANNOT HELP but see a distrust of the student in a policy which places grade reports in the hands of higher authorities (parents). And we see no reason why students cannot be trusted to notify other persons concerned with their education, unless we think education is something to which the student must be subjected against his will and at the direction of his parents.

If this is so, only teachers and parents would exercisechoice, and only teachers and parents would get an educa-

If we wish to educate the student, we must assume he can choose, for education involves the ability to make dis-tinctions. And if we grant the student a will which can be trusted we logically should grant him such a piddly thing as receiving his own report card.

CERTAINLY GRADES are not the end result of a term's work. Education is, But when a university makes grades most important — by evaluating students according to grades, by basing honors programs on grades, by graduatng students according to a checklist of grades (the measure of quality) and credits (the measure of quantity) -- Lama graduate (1985) of MSU






