# Old Timers Game to Honor Trainer Heppinstall at Half

The oldest among Spartan Old Timers, Jack Heppinstall, will be honored at half-time of the third annual Old Timers game which will be played Saturday in Spartan Stadium.

Nearly 45 years as a trainer for Spartan-Aggie athletic teams playing under the banners of Michigan Agricultural College, Michigan State College and Michigan State University, will receive just praise, both at the game and at a dinner afterwards.

Officially retiring July 1, the English-born U.S. citizen was the first head trainer State hired. A fixture on campus since 1914, he started work in other jobs after coming from England where he starred as a soccer player and track man.

John Macklin, athletic director at that time, heard of Jack and hired him as a trainer and groundskeeper. Since then over 10,000 athletes have received physical attention from him.

The general public is invited to the dinner honoring Jack. Tickets for the dinner cost \$5 and can be obtained from Lyman Frimodig, business manager of athletics.

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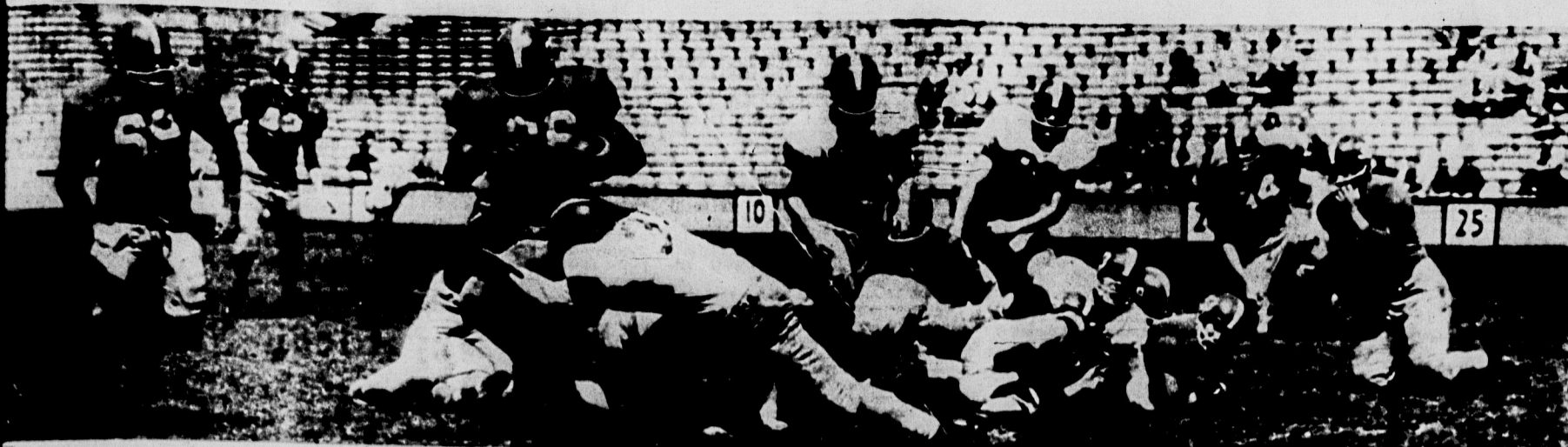
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**Adlerley Carries In Old Timers Prep**

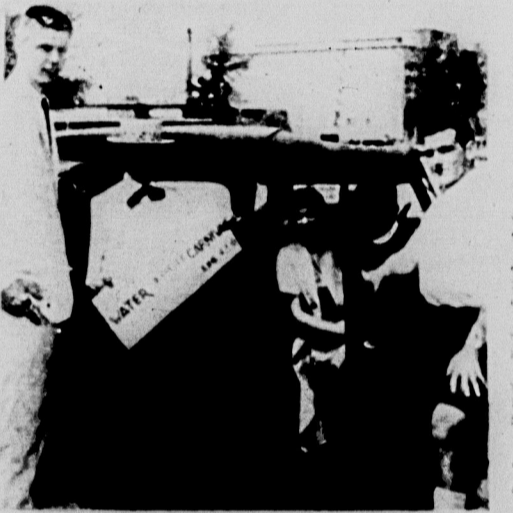

WASHINGTON, P. — King Baudouin of Belgium got a warm welcome Monday from President Eisenhower, who greeted him the American people will be happy to see him.

The 23-year-old bachelor King and Eisenhower, both with big smiles, met at the airport in a colorful setting of waving flags and military array.

The dark blond, blue-eyed young king showed little of the lively over-seriousness, some have called it, with which he has reigned since his father's abdication in 1947.

In good command of his English, he thanked Eisenhower and at the same time, praised the United States.

On his arrival to the capital, the heart of the free world, I should like to leave with you a special message of friendship from the people of Belgium," he said.

We are indebted to the United States for their assistance in the hours of grave peril, when our very existence was at stake.

But we owe them so much more, our faith in justice and peace.

The king on his current trip will include Detroit, Chicago, Dallas, Fort Worth, Los Angeles, San Francisco and New York.

## State Physicist Plans Intense Study Abroad

A MSU scientist has received two fellowships for study abroad. Dr. Donald Montgomery, professor of physics, will lecture and conduct research at the University of Grenoble, France, for nine months under a Fulbright fellowship and then do research for an additional three months under a Guggenheim grant.

Montgomery and his family will go to France in September. He will lecture in French at the University of Grenoble and pursue his studies in solid state physics.

A member of the staff since 1953, Montgomery has been primarily concerned with basic studies of static electrification and fundamental research aimed at understanding the atom by exploring differences in the isotopes of lithium.

The physicist received the B.S. and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Cincinnati in 1943 and 1945. He has authored numerous papers for scientific journals.
