

Floyd Meets A Live One

IT IS HARD TO BELIEVE, but it appears certain now that Floyd Patterson is going to defend his title against a worthwhile opponent,

The bout, scheduled for New York June 25, is being ballyhooed as the greatest international fight for the world heavyweight title ever, Ingemar Johansson of Sweden is the challenger and boy promoter Bill Resensohn is expecting a million-dollar gate.

To claim that this will be the greatest international heavyweight championship fight is quite a claim at that, After all, the match between Argentina's Luis Firpo and Jack Dempsey has been considered the greatest fight of And the second fight between Joe Louis and Germany's Max Schmeling was Louis' greatest performance Nevertheless, Johansson is a promoter's dream. He

knocked out the No. 1 American challenger, Eddie Machen, in one round. He belted out Henry Cooper, who later conquered Brian London, in six rounds. He is a handsome, in-telligent businessman with a good-looking girl friend, all of which establishes Ingemar as a favorite with the public, He moves fast and packs a stiff right—and many boxing experts give him a good chance to defeat Floyd. This itself is unprecedented

And there is no great public sentiment favoring Patter-He has fought infrequently, and his manager, Cus D'Amato, has wearied the public with his battles against the International Boxing Club and Madison Square Garden, In short, the public would like another national idol such as Dempsey, Louis and Rocky Marciano, Ingemar Johans

BUT VICTORY for the Swede is far from assured, De-pite the time it took Patterson to finish off London May 1, Floyd looked sharp in the encounter. He laid back too much, and he missed at times, but his flurries were sharp and bewilderingly fast, Perhaps he has never really been tested, but all the same he is a talented champion and

Although it is never known beforehand how good a fight will be, this one has arounsed more interest than any heavyweight bout since Marciano fought Archie Ringside seats are selling for \$100, and this could be the first million-dollar gate since the second Louis-Conn match in 1946. (Marciano's million-dollar "gate" included television and motion picture receipts,

The prediction here is that Floyd will-win, but not until after his toughest fight, and that he will earn new respect as heavyweight champion. But whatever the outcome, the interest in it will benefit all boxing. "As the heavyweight title goes, so goes boxing," is the off-repeated quote accredited to Nat Fleischer, Ring Magazine editor.

It is a shock, though, to find Patterson meeting a worthy contender. Next thing you know, Sugar Ray Robinson might get into the same ring with Carmen Basilio,





Congress Pays Little Attention

WASHINGTON (4) - In an urgent special message President Eisenhower Wedinto action on housing loans, higher gas taxes, and most emphatically -- the great wheat surplus.

Esenhower called for legisla-tion to head off "an impending disaster in wheat". He declared, too, that home and highway building face damaging interss Congress moves with dis-

Congress received the message

The federal housing admin-latration is about to exhaust its mortgage insurance authoriza-tion, Eisenhower said, and needs a six billion dollar increase to prevent lapse of the program at the height of a thriving home-building season.

He declared the increase in the federal motor fuels tax from 3 to 412 cents a gallon which he esked in January should be enof the huge pay-as-you, build

highway program.
Unless Congress acts, he said, the government cannot this year apportion funds so that the states can let road contracts.

He simed his sharpest shafts at the inaction of Congress on what he has called corrective wheat legislation. Wheat is "the most registation. Wheat is "the most dramatic failure," he said, in the record of "mounting fail-ures and staggering excesses of the mandatory farm price sup-port and production control pro-gram."

The law requires that Secre-tary of Agriculture Ezra Tait Benson announce by Friday con-tinuation of "this thoroughly discredited program," Eisenhower noted, unless some action is

forthcoming.

from May 13 to June 1 the time
for amouncing wheat marketing
quotas for the 1960 crop.

"Having chosen this course, (of delay)." Eisenhower said, "the Congress should use this added time to enact realistic and constructive legislation that will effectively avert the impending disaster to wheat."
