

MSU Athlete Goes to Indians

Luplow Signs Contract for \$25,000

Al Luplow, centerfielder and leading hitter on the MSU baseball team, signed a bonus contract with the Cleveland Indians Thursday. He was also a halfback on the Spartan football team.

He was signed by Walter "Hoot" Evers, Cleveland farm director, at his home in Saginaw. The bonus is reported to be more than \$25,000.

Luplow was hitting .108 with 20 hits in 49 times at bat for the Spartans before signing. He hit four home runs, including a key blow in the ninth inning which helped defeat Notre Dame, 5-1, Wednesday. Three of the four homers came in Big 10 competition.

He was second on the team in runs-batted-in with 19. Only Dean Look's 21 RBIs exceeded Luplow's total.

The 20-year-old sophomore still had two years of eligibility remaining in both football and baseball, and was slated to be in the gridgers' starting backfield next fall.

Luplow had been sought by several major league clubs, including the Detroit Tigers. He went to his home in Saginaw immediately after the MSU-Notre Dame game Wednesday.

Evers said Luplow would be sent to North Platte, Neb., for a 10-day Indian Rookie school and a decision would then be reached as to what classification of professional baseball he would be started in.

On the MSU campus, there were ill feelings in both the baseball and football offices in Jenison.

"It just shows how inconsiderate those birds can be," fumed baseball Coach John Kobs. "Next week we finish our Big 10 season. You'd think they would at least let him finish out the season with us. We've been trying to get the pros to see the light, but it's the same old story all the time."

"Some people have recommended cutting out baseball entirely as a college sport because of what the pros do to us," said Kobs. "They keep raiding us all the time. This certainly doesn't help matters."

Kobs is a past President of the American Assn. of College Baseball Coaches, Chairman of the NCAA baseball rules committee and recently was named head coach of the Pan-American baseball team.

He has been arguing for years for some kind of an agreement with the pro baseball powers similar to the pro football rule on signing collegiate talent.

In the football office on the other side of Jenison, football Coach Duffy Daugherty had similar convictions.

"Luplow's signing comes as no surprise to me," Duffy said. "But the fact that he has signed at this time is a surprise."

"At least they could have waited until the season was over to sign him," Duffy continued. "He was on the verge of signing for a small bonus last fall but we talked him into playing for us. Actually we weren't counting on him to play next fall because we expected him to sign during the summer."

The loss of Luplow eliminates another candidate for the left halfback spot on the football team. Daugherty now must rely on senior Bob Berch or junior John Marx who have been running one-two at that spot, or sophomore Bob Suel.

Kobs has seen more than 70 of his baseball players lured away by the professional teams in the past 12 years.

Only two of them—Philadelphia Phillies pitcher Robin Roberts and New York Giant catcher Hobie Landrith—ever made the major leagues.

The last two MSU players to sign pro contracts during the season were Bob Byrd and Frank Franchi. They inked contracts during the 1956 season.

"The pitiful thing is that most of those who sign away their education for a few thousand dollars never come back to complete college," Kobs said.

"They drift around on the fringes of big time baseball for awhile and then have to go out and scratch for a living."

MSU Vice President Hamilton Resigns

Old Timers Football 1959 Varsity Meet Alumni

Old Timers football will bow out in grand style Saturday when Duffy Daugherty sends his 1959 Spartan varsity against an all-star group of alumni in the third annual Old Timers game in Spartan Stadium.

Following spring drills, the State team will be putting its new offensive weapon, the double wing "T," through a tough first test, coached by former Detroit Lion star Dornie Diddle, the alumni team includes many past all-Americans and presents professional players as well as pro draftees from last fall's varsity.

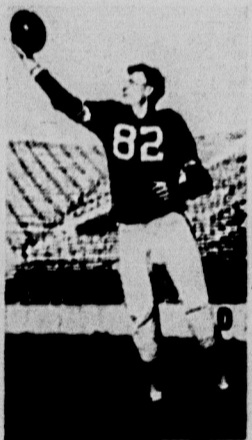
In addition to the Old Timers, presentation of awards to trainer Heppinstall and the top players of the game, and performances by bands and the gymnastic team will add to spectator interest. The third game in the series promises to be the best. The Old Timers hold the edge for the first two years with a victory and a tie.

Diddle, who plans to utilize an open type pro offense, will play the game with assistant mentors Jim Ninowski of the Cleveland Browns, and Dan Currie and Ed Bagdon, a former Cleveland Browns and a Masters of the Green Bay Packers.

Members of the Old Timers played a decade ago. Former all-Americans Lynn Chandross, a back, and Ed Bagdon, a halfback, played in 1949.

Other former Spartans who speckle the roster. Among the stars are Vic Zucco, Clark Peaks and Tom Sajdok played in 1956; Bob Jewett, Walt Kowalczyk, 1957; LeBorden, Ellis Duckett and Zagers, 1954; Larry Fowl-Bill Quinlan and Evan Morris, 1953; Gary Lowe and Morrill, 1955; Bob Carey, and Sam Williams, 1958.

Coached by Daugherty to carry over the double wing "T" plays from last year, the Spartans are fullback Blanche Marshallbacks Herb Adderley, Bob Berch and quarterback Tom Wilson in the back-

starting line has center John Wilks, guards Don Wright and Roy Walker, tackles Palmer Pyle and Jim Chastain, and ends Arbanas and Dave Northcross. "You can blame Martin if he is a little wary of Saturday's game. It was in last spring's contest that he injured his knee that kept him out of action last fall.

Admission for adults is \$1 and for students with I.D.'s 50 cents. About 14,000 fans are expected.

Credit Union Funds Available to Members in Cash Crisis

Due to the current state cash crisis prevents the university from meeting its monthly payroll, the resources of the MSU Credit Union will be available to its members, said Edward Luker, credit union president.

Members then may apply for special loans, he said, limited to the amount the member normally would receive as take-home pay.

These loans would carry a less-than-normal interest charge, Luker said, to help defray the additional operating costs.

The interest rate has been set at one-half of one percent a month, or 50 cents per 100 dollars a month.

It is fairly easy to become a member, said Luker. The credit union requires the payment of a 25 cent enrollment fee, the purchase of at least one \$5 share, and the approval of the board of directors on the request for membership.

"We have not yet set up any definite procedures," said Luker. The credit union will wait until it receives word that there will be no payroll before announcing any plans.

University's Problems Discussed

A small group of concerned students showed Thursday night it is possible for students and faculty to get together and intelligently discuss the university's future.

In an open meeting held by the Committee of the Future of the University, the faculty members heard student criticism on such current administration policies as compulsory ROTC, housing regulations, and curriculum requirements.

Reinhard Schumann, Army ROTC cadet commander, defended the compulsory requirements of the program by stating that it is necessary for the country's defense.

He added that about 80 percent of the army's officers are commissioned from the ROTC.

Challenging Schumann's arguments, Duane Chapman quoted a report that stated that the voluntary program produced the same number and quality of officers for the armed forces.

MSU is not the ideal place for those desiring an education in the liberal arts, said Phil Ballback, president of off-campus students. The present graduate system has serious drawbacks, he said.

There should be more encouragement in courses for individual study, but the problem, according to Ballback, is to identify these students.

"Give the student a break," said Ed Scott. The enrollment officer system at present in power, the College of Science and Arts is the most poorly run in the university, and the quarter system limits the worth of offered courses.

The committee will hold another open meeting at 7:30 Thursday, 513 Education Bldg.

To Accept New York Presidency

Hannah Laud Service at MSU

Dr. Thomas Hamilton, vice-president for academic affairs, has resigned to become the new president of the State University of New York. He was announced Thursday. The appointment is effective August 1.

In reporting the selection of the 47-year-old teacher and administrator who has gained a national reputation as a leader in education activities, the State University of New York trustees expressed pleasure at having the benefit of Hamilton's services.

A native of Marion, Ind., Hamilton was educated at DePaul University, Greencastle, Ind., and the University of Chicago.

In 1952, Hamilton came to MSU. From 1954 to 1958 he served as dean of the Basic College and Director of Summer sessions in February 1958 he was appointed vice-president for academic affairs.

President John A. Hamilton hoped the following statement upon receiving Hamilton's resignation.

"It is with greatest reluctance that MSU has accepted the resignation of Dr. Thomas Hamilton that he be permitted to relinquish his responsibilities as vice-president for academic affairs in order to accept the presidency of the State University of New York.

"At the same time as friends and admirers of his we are happy for the opportunity that has come to him. We are confident that he will make a real contribution to higher education in New York that will be of benefit to the cause of higher education everywhere.

"No one without an intimate knowledge of his work as dean of the Basic College and as vice-president can begin to appreciate the tremendous value of his services to this university.

"Having not only the respect but the admiration and confidence of the faculty as well, he has been able to give strong, imaginative leadership."

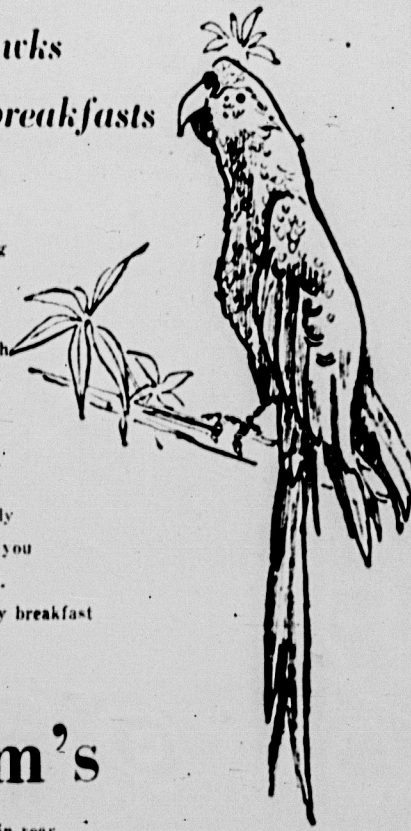

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Two Spartans Eye Record Wins
Thinclads Close With Irish

Michigan State's thinclads will embark today for South Bend, Ind., for their final dual meet of the outdoor season, against Notre Dame.

Two Spartan runners will be eyeing new MSU varsity records. Capt. Fordy Kennedy will be out to lower the two-mile mark of 9:08.4 and miler Bob Lake will set his sights on a time of 4:08.8.

Last week against Penn State, Kennedy placed second with a time of 9:06 and Lake also placed second as he covered the mile distance in 4:04.9, but since neither man won his event, these times could not set new records.

Top distance runner for the Irish is Ron Gregory, who was a double winner against Army two weeks ago. Gregory won the mile in 4:11.3 and took the two-mile event with 9:17.2.

Kennedy and Lake will run both distance events. Jim Horan will go in the two-mile while Tony Smith will complete the entries for the mile. For the 880, Coach Fran Dittrich will select three from a combination of Brian Castle, Bob Hughes, Jim Carr and Smith.

In the sprints, John Sharp and Bob Elliott go in the 100-yard dash and Max Weissengruber joins Sharp and Elliott in the 220. Don Marsh will run with Carr and Weissengruber in the 440.

Notre Dame's outstanding sprint man is Gerry Fitzgarrick, winner of the 100 (09.7) and 220 (21.6) against Army. In the hurdles the Irish have Capt. Steve Dornbich, who took place honors in both the 110-highs and 220-lows in the meet.

Coach Dittrich sends Kleinhans, Jason Hartman and Bill Bredenbeck against the Irish in the high hurdles. Kleinhans and Hartman are low hurdle entries.

The mile relay team of Weissengruber, Hughes and Elliott will complete the meet in the track events.

In the field events it will be Kleinhans and Frank Mehl in the pole vault while Mehl will team with Keith Galt and Al Neumann in the long jump. In the latter event, Notre Dame Mike Morando made an excellent loss of 220-8.7 against Army.

Neumann and Galt are discus entries and Neumann also goes in the shot put. He will compete in both the discus and broad jump as well. Mehl will enter the high jump and Elliott and Mehl will compete in the broad jump entries.

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Only One of Season Spartan Netters Travel For Quadrangular Meet

The only quadrangular meet of the season features this weekend tennis action as MSU's net team gets back into the thick of Big 10 competition at Madison, Wis.

The Spartans are in Wisconsin today, having left at noon Thursday, and will engage in at least two meets, and possibly three. The number of meets to be played by each team will be decided by the host school, Wisconsin.

Pitted against each other will be the Hawkeyes of Iowa and the Minnesota Gophers, in addition to the Badgers and MSU.

On the basis of seasons records, Wisconsin is probably the weakest team of the three. Beaten by most teams in the Big 10, the Badgers were not able to rack up a victory in the regular season until they defeated Lawrence College in the first week in May.

Iowa has a genuine No. 1 player in Art Andrews. Andrews won the Big 10 championship in 1958 and was runner-up to Michigan's Barry MacKay, a Davis Cupper, in 1957.

In the National Collegiate singles championship last year, he was beaten by Alex Olmeda of USC, the eventual winner. The Iowa City native has a dual meet record of 17 wins and one defeat going into this season.

The Gophers enter the meet fresh from a 5-4 conquest of Ohio State. The Spartans edged Ohio State by the same margin in their first meet of the regular season, indicating somewhat the evenness of the two teams.

Indiana will close the Spartans' regular season on Tuesday when the Hoosiers invade East Lansing. Then comes the Big 10 championships next Thursday through Saturday, also on the local courts.

Golfers Take to Road

Hoping to close out the regular season with its best record ever, Michigan State's golf squad, sporting an 8-1 season mark, invades University Golf Course in Ann Arbor Saturday for a quadrangular match against Michigan, Wisconsin and Detroit.

Coach Ben Van Alstyne's Spartans will be meeting the Wolverines for the first time this season. Michigan has compiled a 5-4 record against Big 10 competition this season, including a 21 1/2-20 1/2 upset win over defending conference champion Purdue.

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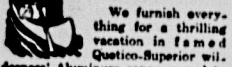
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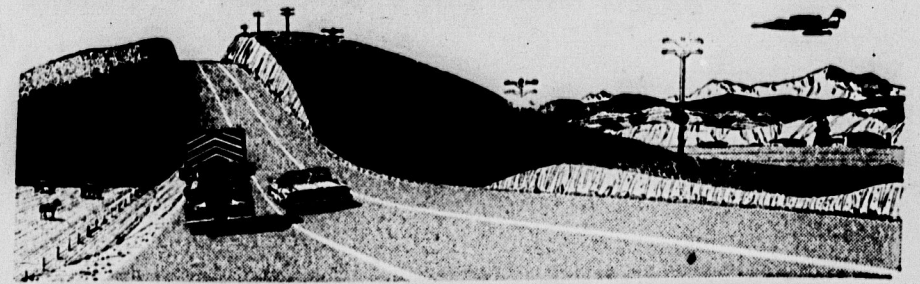
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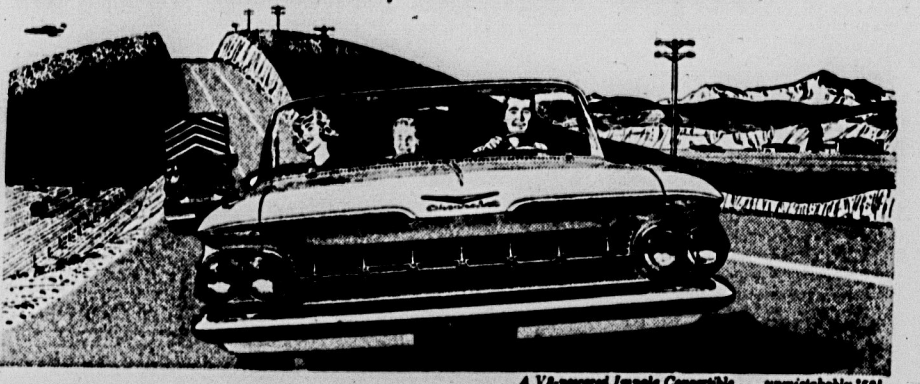
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
