GENEVA OP - Western diplomats said Sunday night they may have to negotiate a separate stopgap Berlin settlement with Russia af ter full debate of rival East West German peace plans.

Word of the new Western po-sition came after an American delegation spokesman called for thorough-going discussion in the hig rour foreign ministers meet-ing of the West's backage plan. This envisaged a phased pro-gram toward settlement of the future of Berlin and Germany and the buildup of a European security backers.

LAST THURSDAY an MSU football and baseball at) lete, Al Luplow, signed a major league baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians for a sum reportedly to be more than \$25,000.

Luplow was hitting .408 when he signed, and was the leading batter on MSU's baseball team.

We do not feel that it is ethical for a college athlete to leave his team in midseason, especially when he's the most valuable player, but we do sympathize with those who do sign contracts during their college careers, and condonthose who scream when they do

It's easy to understand and sympathize with MSU base-ball coach John Kobs in his fury over the Chycland In-dians' snatching of his star outfielder, Al Luplow, That is, it's easy if you're a college baseball coach.

BUT IF YOU'RE the man on the outside who has learned how hard it is to accumulate \$25,000, you're more likely to take the point of view of the boy who grabbed that money when it was made available.

Comments such as those which came from Kobs last Thursday are vague and meaningless: "The pitiful thing is that most of those who sign away their education for a few thousand dollars never come back to complete college." Kobs said, "They drift around on the fringes of big time baseball for awhile and then have to go out and scratch for a living."




