Hannah Asks for \$4.7 Million Budget

Salary Increase Needed

59 Resignations Up 50 Percent

A plea for a \$4,700,000 budget increase for 1959-60 was issued by MSU officials at a hearing with Senate Finance Committee Wednesday.

Although the usual time for the hearing with the senate committee is February or March, the invitation for a hearing came late Tuesday afternoon.

President John Hannah said the extra money, mostly for faculty salary increases and new staff, is needed to overcome damage from the 1958-59 budget-cut and to support continued MSU progress.

Hannah said the increase was based on an on-campus enrollment next fall of 20,000 — up about 1,100 from September 1958, according to Associated Press.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams had a hearing with MSU officials May 18 which covered the same information, as was presented Wednesday to the Senate committee.

Emphasis was on the need for funds for a good salary adjustment at the hearing, said Philip Max, vice-president in charge of business and finance.

Charts which had been presented to show that MSU has problems created by the fact that this year's retirements had to be made from last year's cut in appropriations.

Some of all employed persons from 1939-59 increased 61.4 percent while MSU faculty income is up only 16.3 percent.

Hannah said last year his budget cut of \$1,001,000 forced the university to eliminate 90 positions, cut equipment expenses by 50 percent and reduce service and supply activities.

Hannah and Max stressed that most other Big 10 universities had improved their positions at all these areas while MSU and U of M were sliding downhill. Faculty resignations are up 50 percent this year.

Private School Plan Passed In Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) —

The Florida Senate Wednesday whipped through three bills designed to throw up more barriers in the path of school integration.

The House passed and sent to the governor a bill setting up a private school accrediting board. The bill is aimed at assuring quality private education if integration forces parents to turn to private schools.

One Senate bill would ban advocacy of integration by teachers in the classroom. It was endorsed, 34-3, after Sen. J. Emory Cross charged that some elementary teachers are trying to "soften up" Florida youngsters to accept integration by using schoolroom time to extol the virtues of Negroes. The bill went to the House.

AUSG to Investigate Compulsory ROTC

A resolution to investigate the present ROTC program at MSU was passed last night by Student Congress after a two and a half hour debate.

The analysis of the investigation will result in Student Congress going on record as being in, against, or as having recommendations concerning compulsory ROTC.

The resolution instructed the Committee on Academic Affairs to make the investigation and make recommendations to congress not later than the third week of fall term.

The reason for the delay in making recommendations was to give the committee enough time to make a comprehensive study. If the recommendations were given to Congress, passed and forwarded to the Committee on the Future and acted upon by the Board of Agriculture this term, nothing could be changed for a year anyway.

A bill to continue the student insurance for the next year was passed on the grounds that the terms of the contract were lived up to and were satisfactory to both the Student Congress and the insurance company involved. It was also decided to continue the 25 cents student government tax collected from the summer students as it has been for the last two years.

Chem. Prof Gets Grant Of \$50,000

Dr. Harold Hart, professor of chemistry, is one of three American chemists to receive grants of \$50,000 each from the Petroleum Research fund this year.

The awards, administered by the American Chemical Society, are to support research by outstanding scientists selected by accomplishments in basic research in the petroleum field.

The money can be used for any purpose during a period of six years to aid in the pursuit of research in any field of science which may afford a basis for the research connected with the petroleum field.

known for his work on the mechanisms of organic reactions, said the fund will be used to buy equipment and support graduate students in a continuation of his past research.

This work has led to a better understanding of natural forces that produce changes in matter, he said.

Handicapped Children Plan At EL Polls

Eligible students and faculty members will accompany other East Lansing voters to the polls June 4 for the annual school election, where they will decide the fate of a special education proposal for handicapped children in their city.

Robert Mayberry, chairman of the East Lansing citizens' committee for special education said he hopes the plan will be adopted by all Ingham county school districts in their school elections, June 8 and July 13.

Almost 500 children in East Lansing will be affected by the proposal, said Mayberry, who is also an assistant professor of physical education on campus.

Classified as needing special education services, said Mayberry, are emotionally and socially maladjusted, mentally retarded, physically disabled and children with speech and hearing difficulties.

It is estimated that 235 children in the city are receiving no help. Only 176 children were helped in East Lansing during the current school year. Of this number, 123 were speech correction cases, according to the survey.

If the proposal is accepted by East Lansing voters, special education service will be available to children of married students and faculty members, he said.

If accepted by voters, the bill would impose a levy upon property owners, not to exceed 34 mill (75 cents per \$1,000 of equalized valuation of property), Mayberry explained.

John Dulles Interred At Arlington

WASHINGTON (AP)—John Foster Dulles was buried on a sun-drenched hillside Wednesday with military honors as old as the nation and a formal farewell from renowned statesmen of many lands.

The man who had dedicated much of his life to a quest for world peace found it for himself at last in Arlington National Cemetery.

President Eisenhower looked on at the impressive military services. Compressing his lips in a thin line, he appeared close to tears.

Another chief of state, 83-year-old Konrad Adenauer, chancellor of West Germany, was among the mourners. For-

sign ministers representing much of the Western world were on hand, too, along with Andrei Gromyko of Russia.

The statesmen had flown the Atlantic and Pacific to attend last rites for the former secretary of state, who died Sunday at the age of 71, a victim of cancer.

Gromyko arrived here offering up an exceptional measure of praise for his old diplomatic foe. Acknowledging they had many differences, he termed Dulles "an outstanding statesman, outstanding diplomat."

Funeral services were held in mid-afternoon in the great Gothic-cathed Washington Cathedral. The burial services with military rites followed at Arlington, resting place of the nation's war dead. Dulles was a major in World War I.

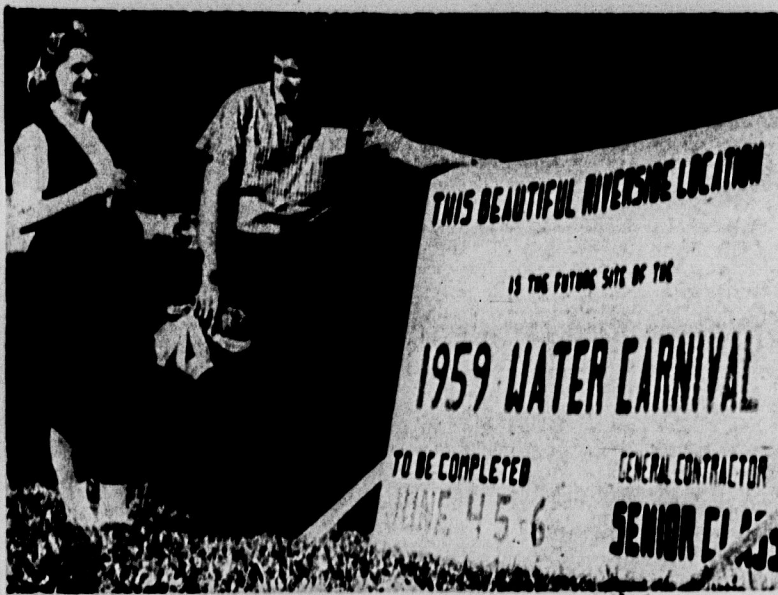

Adlai Stevenson On TV Tonight

Adlai Stevenson, former presidential candidate, will discuss journalistic "inhibitions" and "ideological restraints" that lead to inadequate reporting tonight on WMSB-TV's "Special Report."

This lack of adequate reporting caused the national surprise over the advances in Soviet education, the launching of Sputnik and Lamik, and economic advances in underdeveloped countries, he said.

Jousting, Tug-of-War Set For '76 Carney Intermission

Preliminary trials for water sports events to be held during intermission of "Route 76," June 4-6, are scheduled today, Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 2-5 p.m. at the canoe shelter.

In order to participate, contestants may obtain entry blanks at the Union desk. If these forms have not been filled out, students may go to the water site during the trials and still be eligible.

Fifteen inch trophies will be awarded to the winners in canoe gunwaling, jousting, canoe exchange, in and out race, tug of war and Apache race.

In the canoe gunwaling race, one contestant stands on the gunwales in the stern of the canoe. He must propel the boat by bouncing on the gunwales and will be disqualified if one foot steps into the canoe. It is also forbidden to fall into the water or hold on to the canoe.

In the jousting event, each team consists of two men, one to paddle the canoe while the other jousts in the bow. Contestants will be disqualified for hitting below the waist or throwing the poll.

Jousting falls will be called for hitting the canoe with the hands, falling into the water or slipping off the jousting platform. The team with the best of two out of three falls wins the event.

The canoe exchange requires four men in two canoes. One man paddles while the other man stands in the bow. At the starting gun the two canoes start racing toward a given point. During the event a whistle will be blown and the bow men must exchange canoes and continue racing.

At the sound of a second whistle, the bow men will again change canoes, with the first team across the finish line winning.

The in and out contest is a distance race with two men to a canoe. At the sound of the whistle, the paddlers must jump out of the canoes and into the water.

George Bernard Shaw wrote that all the evils of modern society "are the result of an educational system which, instead of guiding the natural change from childhood to adolescence and maturity, arrests juvenile development at its most mischievous stage, and forces the experienced statesman to treat the country as an orphanage in which the age limit is 14, and the orphans as its mentally defective inmates."

Philosopher Bertrand Russell penned the following: "Educa-

tion, outside Russia, is still so conducted as to further the interests of the rich. The result is that education has become part of the struggle for power between religions, classes, and nations. The pupil is not considered for his own sake, but as a recruit."

What is the purpose of education? For what does a university exist?

Moderates Triumph In Little Rock Vote

LITTLE ROCK VOTERS dealt Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus a sharp blow this week when they voted to recall three pro-segregation members of the city school board.

They also voted to retain three other school board members who are considered moderates in the Little Rock school integration struggle which has led the closed schools, following outbreaks of violence which had to be suppressed by federal troops.

The citizens of Little Rock have shown that given the opportunity to express themselves in a free and secret ballot the forces of extreme racism and bigotry cannot stand up.

The recall, however, is not necessarily a victory for integration. The moderates are not integrationists, but are opposed to the sort of violence and mobbing which made it necessary for federal intervention in Little Rock.

THE MODERATES are willing to rely on peaceful means of resolving the racial issue in Little Rock, and prefer order to violence and chaos.

The majority of people in Little Rock seem to have been appalled by the situation which developed there, necessitating intervention and resulting in closure of the schools. They want their children to go to school, even with Negroes as classmates, if necessary.

This is the only sensible position they can take in the Arkansas crisis. It is their children who will suffer from the lack of education. It seems obvious that an integrated school is certainly better than no school at all.

It is too easy to become optimistic about the action of the Little Rock voters, however. While the recall of the three militant segregationists dispenses a victory for the moderates who oppose violence and disruption of the school system to maintain segregation, it is doubtful that the schools will reopen this fall.

GOV. FAUBUS may be able to find new means of maintaining segregation by September. He still warns of mob violence in the event the schools are opened on an integrated basis.

The recall certainly has restored something of a sense of balance and should serve to create a new climate in which the schools can be reopened.

Boxing Group Still Debating On Title Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—The battle of the State Athletic Commission against Sugar Ray Robinson dragged on another day Wednesday.

Phillies Prez Buys N. J. Site

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Bob Carpenter, president of the Philadelphia Phillies, Wednesday bought the 65 acres in New Jersey which not long ago were reported to be the future slumping ground of the ball club.

But Carpenter insisted, after making the announcement, that he obtained the land primarily as a personal investment, although it would be available as a site for a sports stadium.

The land lies across the Delaware River in Delaware Township, Camden County, on a route adjoining the Garden State Park race track.

Carpenter said in a statement that he bought the property "at the suggestion of my financial advisors to hold for future commercial or industrial development."

"If the Camden County Stadium issue is revived," he continued, "this land, while not purchased as a stadium site, will be made available for such use."

However, the site will not be held indefinitely for that purpose since there are a number of other tracts equally suitable for a stadium.

This ended months of speculation whether Carpenter would buy the land, and what he'd do with it, if he got it.

Earlier in the year much steam was generated over the proposal to take the Phillies over the river. The suggestion was that an eight million dollar stadium be built in Delaware Township, eight miles from the heart of Philadelphia, to give the club the seating and parking space it sorely lacks at Connie Mack Stadium.

The scheme floundered, however, when township officers about faced, deciding the project wouldn't pay off well enough for the township. For the time being, then, it is considered a dead issue.

In Philadelphia Mayor Richardson Dilworth has conferred with groups determined not to lose the Phillies. He asked for cost estimates for possible stadium sites. So far, nothing has moved beyond the survey, or maybe stage.

What Carpenter paid for the acreage was not disclosed. The figure mentioned at the time the options were taken was \$250,000.

Carpenter already owned 12.4 adjoining acres, bought in January for \$75,000.

Bobsled Race For Olympics Voted Down

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—The International Olympic Committee Wednesday rejected a move to hold the 1960 Olympic bobsled races at Lake Placid, N.Y.

By a vote of 35 to 21, the IOC voted down a Swiss proposal to restore the bobsled competition to the 1960 program. The 1960 winter games will be held at Squaw Valley, Calif.

So far the first time since 1928, bobsledding will not be on the Olympic program. The International Bobsled Federation then announced it has shifted the 1960 world bobsled championships from Lake Placid to Cortina, Italy.

The IBF had awarded the championships to the New York resort, site of the 1932 winter games, only on condition the events had Olympic status.

In other action Wednesday, the IOC ordered South Africa to bar racial discrimination in picking its Olympic teams, and turned down a proposal to collect a three-per cent tax on Olympic tickets to help finance international sports federations.

Big 10 educators generally have a high regard for Stanford scholastically.

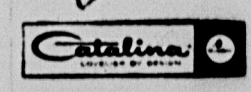

"If the Camden County Stadium issue is revived," he continued, "this land, while not purchased as a stadium site, will be made available for such use."

"However, the site will not be held indefinitely for that purpose since there are a number of other tracts equally suitable for a stadium."

Thus ended months of speculation whether Carpenter would buy the land, and what he'd do with it, if he got it.

Earlier in the year much steam was generated over the proposal to take the Phillies over the river. The suggestion was that an eight million dollar stadium be built in Delaware Township, eight miles from the heart of Philadelphia, to give the club the seating and parking space it sorely lacks at Connie Mack Stadium.

The scheme foundered, however, when township officers about faced, deciding the project wouldn't pay off well enough for the township. For the time being, then, it is considered a dead issue.

In Philadelphia Mayor Richardson Dilworth has conferred with groups determined not to lose the Phillies. He asked for cost estimates for possible stadium sites. So far, nothing has moved beyond the survey, or maybe stage.

What Carpenter paid for the acreage was not disclosed. The figure mentioned at the time the options were taken was \$250,000.

If Stanford Joins Assn.

Big 10 'Might Reconsider' Bowl

ANN ARBOR (AP)—Michigan's Big 10 faculty representative said Wednesday the conference might reconsider its termination of the Rose Bowl football contract if Stanford joins the new Assn. of Western Universities.

"It would be remarkable," said Dr. Marcus Plant in an interview, "if there were a change. But if Stanford comes in, there could be."

There was no indication at the recent Western Conference (Big 10) meeting there would be a change of mind on anyone's part. And in fact, it appeared to the contrary.

Plant said there had been some discussion that the Air Force academy, although east of the Rocky Mountains in Colorado Springs, might join the new association which is replacing the dissolving Pacific Coast Conference.

Big 10 'Might Reconsider' Bowl

California, Southern California, UCLA and Washington now make up the new sports league.

Last week, for the first time in 13 years, Big 10 representatives by a 5-5 tie vote refused to renew the Rose Bowl contract with the Pacific Coast Conference. But at the same time, by the same 5-5 vote, the Big 10 refused to strike out of its regulations a section permitting members to participate in post-season games.

This left the door open for possible Rose Bowl participation by individual Big 10 members. A Big 10 committee was named, however, to devise regulations for any participant, including how its share of the gate will be split with other members.

Michigan voted to renew the Bowl pact and against striking out permission for post-season competition.

Says Fire Chief False Alarms Greatest Peril

More serious accidents occur enroute to false alarms than in answering regular fire calls, according to Murlie Crov, East Lansing fire chief.

"I know whereof I speak. He's been with the department since 1924 and chief since 1932.

He is one of the city's original three firemen. The present city station is on Abbott Rd. at the city hall.

In a recent interview, he talked about the department, its relation to the university, false alarms and fire hazards in general. Some of the information was startling.

For instance, don't feel safe just because you live in a brick building.

"Anything will burn," he said. "When a room gets hot enough, heat explosions spread the fire rapidly. Paint burns."

In one respect, brick buildings can be more dangerous than wooden ones, he said. They tend to obscure the critical areas of the fire as it spreads within the structure.

"This sometimes hinders the firemen's chances to locate and extinguish the fire before personal injuries occur," he said.

About half the department's 26 men are stationed at the MSU station at Harrison road and Shaw lane. Either or both stations can answer alarms on campus.

Crov, who said the department always is happy to work with university personnel, mentioned fire drills.

"These drills should stress that persons should think for the other fellow as well as himself. I remember one drill where almost everyone got outside doors. Only, no one remembered."

During Summer School

1 Year of Language in 1 Term

Parlez-vous francais? Habla usted espanol? Sprechen sie Deutsch?

You would, if you took one of the languages being offered at summer school this year.

The first and second years of French, Spanish and German will be offered in 10 week sessions in which a year's work will be covered, according to Dr. Stanley Howell, acting head of the department of foreign languages.

Language students will have a final every three and a half weeks. The terms end July 20, Aug. 12 and Sept. 4.

The first year classes will meet 15 times a week for 15 credits. Students taking these concentrated study courses will not be allowed to have additional work at summer school.

The second year classes will meet nine hours a week for the same number of credits.

These courses feature conventional language study, Howell said, except second year German which will be a scientific course. Conversation courses will not be offered.

In addition to the complete

series in the three languages, the regular first term course in each will be given. The course meets five times a week for five credits.

Enrollment will determine the number of sections offered.

Registration is June 24 and 25. Three institutes in French, German and Spanish for teachers or graduate students who intend to teach will be given for five weeks starting June 24.

Eight credits which can be applied to a master's of art or a master's of art in teaching degree will be given.

Dr. Georges Joyaux has been named director of the program.

Including two hours which are to be arranged, each class will meet 16 hours a week. Enrollment is opened to approximately 60 persons.

"We are offering the institutes because of the demand from high schools which have increased their language instruction," Dr. Howell said.

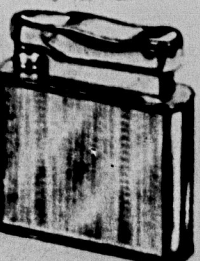
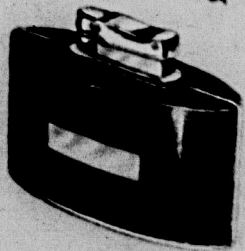

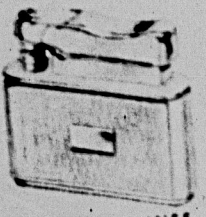
