Human Perfection Education's Goal

(EDITOR'S NOTE. Dr. Joseph Druse is an assistant professor of humanities and came to Michigan State in 1954. He teaches honors sections in the department and heads the university's Great Books course, a general public service offered by the fibrary. Dr. Druse received his PhD from the University of Chicago, his Ma from Marquette and a bachelor of education from William State. His article is the sixth in a State News series.

EDUCATION EXISTS for the perfection of the human personality, Public education exists for the perfection of the civic personality of man, which may be expressed essentially in two ways: the unobtrusive conformation with the social machine, or the creative and disturbing irruption

in the community's affairs.

The essential function of public institutions is order; the innate tendency of public education is toward the con-formity which so often is taken for order.

The chief problem facing American public education is to resist its own tendency, and to encourage the divisive, the individual, the creative. But the paradox of such an effort lies in the fact that to accomplish it, the roots of education in general must be resought; the preoccupation with public (with its concern for society) must be abandoned; the concern for the total growth of the individual-body, mind, soul—as individual must be reestablished.

.THE PROGRAM of such education must at all levelselementary, collegiate, graduate - recognize the natural priority of the roles that men play. Men are always, first of all, beings who enjoy, who satisfy curiosity, who rejoice in goodness, beauty, and truth. They are next members of society who love, respect and aid their fellows. They are last of all workers who for a minimum span of years earn their bread by one or the other technique.

Any inversion of this order results in the deformation of education itself, of the society in which it occurs, and of the destinies of countless millions subjected to it. That education which stressed social adjustment has an affinity for education which stresses the technical is no accident; in both the concept of the machine is paramount.

The ultimate success of American public education lies not in the number of scientists, engineers, experts that it can turn out, but rather in the number of whole men it does foster-men who know themselves, for good and evil; men who know their places in the world, for love and iso-lation; men who know techniques, for application and discard. Against men of this sort no machine nor system nor imperium can triumph ultimately

THE STUDENT entering college today can do nothing more profitable to himself than to draw up a complete reaponse to that ancient Ionian exhortation which lies at the basis of all western civilization, all philosophy, all science, all history, all literature—Know Thyself.

Until he has done so, all his memory work, his social encounters, his activities, his discussions will be as so much dust in the wind. Until he has established himself, until he knows the stuff of which he is wrought, "educawill in all truth be only something which "brushes off" on him and from him.

But when he has discovered himself, then, paradoxically

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




