2,200 to Get Degrees Sunday

MSU Set To Honor 5 Alumni

MSU will present Distinguished Alumni Awards to five former students at annual commencement exercises Sunday.

Three of the group are engineers who have carved out executive careers in industry, one is a retired professor of botany and one a retired advertising executive.

Nominated as outstanding alumni of 1959 by the Alumni Advisory Council are:

Louis Carapella, Manhattan, Long Island, class of 1937, engineer and now vice-president of Sylvania-Corning Nuclear Corp.

Bernard Coggan Jr., La Jolla, Calif., class of 1939, engineer, vice-president-general manager of Convair Division, General Dynamics Corp.

Don Francisco, Amagansett, Long Island, class of 1916, retired vice-president and director of J. Walter Thompson advertising company.

Arthur Vinson, Scarsdale, N.Y., class of 1929, engineer and now group vice-president of General Electric Co.

Truman Yunker, Greencastle, Ind., class of 1914, professor emeritus of botany of DePauw University.

Carapella, a pioneer in the atomic energy field, is presently concerned with all commercial production activities of a corporation which is a foremost producer of nuclear fuel elements both in this country and abroad.

While plant manager of the Atomic Power Division of Westinghouse Corp., he was commended for his efforts in the production of the nuclear power plant which propelled Nautilus, the first atomic submarine.

Coggan was assigned to General Dynamics in 1954 to accelerate the Atlas missile program, taking responsibility for the complete Atlas team. Before joining Convair in 1952 he had been with General Motors Corp. since 1939 when he started with Fisher Body Division. While with GM he directed missile and aircraft projects also.

Francisco, now retired, was 49 years in advertising and public relations. Early in his career with the California Fruit Growers Exchange his efforts helped make "Sunlight" a household word. He was with Lord and Thomas Agency more than 20 years, serving as president before resigning.

Vinson is one of the five top executives of General Electric, a firm he has been with since 1931. Holder of a master of arts degree from Harvard, he received a Centennial Award in 1955 and is vice-chairman of the MSU Development Fund board of trustees.

The five will be the first to receive the university's Distinguished Alumni Awards. Similar awards from the Alumni club of Washington, D.C., had been given annually since 1946.

Businessmen Do Slow Sizzle

'Discomfort Index' Attacked

NEW YORK (AP)—It's neither the heat nor the humidity that has some New York businessmen hot under the collar.

It's the weather bureau's new way of talking about the heat and the humidity.

This week the bureau and others in such cities as Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington and Richmond, Va., started putting out what is called a "Discomfort Index."

It's a complicated kind of computation in which a scale is set up for the relationship between temperature and humidity.

A figure of 70, for instance, is supposed to mean that about 10 percent of the people are made uncomfortable by the weather

'Route U. S. 76' Retells History At Water Carny Opening Night

History was told as it was never told before Thursday evening as the senior class presented the opening performance of Water Carnival 1959.

Thirty-five floats moved down the Red Cedar as the living units reworked the history of the United States in "U. S. Route 76."

A capacity crowd lined the banks of the river and showed great enthusiasm to hear the story of the country, told from the days the Liberty Bell crack-

led to Michigan's financial collapse.

Judy Assif, well-remembered by many as Sabrina, the ovate vamp of "Port Au Call," returned to add sparkle to the evening as Bernice, "typical 'bimbo' Sally." Even Sabrina paid a surprise visit to the performance as she took time out from her world travels.

Bernice was accompanied by Dave Heiber and Tom Josephson who alternated roles as an elderly and somewhat naive professor and various other announcing personalities. Satirical jokes and comments on campus life and incidents gained laughs and applause throughout the program.

The Beta Theta Pi fraternity will hold a "Session by The Cedar" starting at 3 p.m. Sunday. Top jazz musicians will be present including Frank Cochran of Toronto, who studied under George Shearing.

Discoverer's Missing Mice Thought Dead

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—Discoverer III's four black mice apparently are dead.

The air force Thursday said all available data indicates the satellite-tracked reentered the atmosphere several thousand miles from the pad where it was launched here Wednesday and was destroyed by air friction.

They had hoped to put it into orbit for 24 hours, eject the mouse capsule near Hawaii and catch its parachute, making the rodents the first creatures to return alive from orbit.

Roy Johnson, director of the advanced research projects agency, said none of the possibilities under investigation is that the injection angle of the vehicle was improper.

Johnson's announcement came 22 1/2 hours after what appeared a perfect launching of the two-stage rocket at 1:09 p.m. (PDT) Wednesday. Thirteen minutes later the second stage, containing the mice in its nose cone, passed beyond range of a tracking ship 1,200 miles south of here.

That was the last signal heard from Discoverer III.

MSU Receives Partial Payment

MSU received a partial payment of \$2,509,000 from the state legislature Wednesday, which covered the March installment and \$109,000 that was due for the April installment.

The legislature still owes \$2,109,583 for the May installment, and \$2,109,587 for the month of June, according to Philip May, MSU treasurer.

A total of \$4,328,733 is owed for the rest of the year, and this is expected to be received by the end of the school year without any trouble, said May.

Diefenbaker Heads Party For Canada

Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, who will speak at commencement and receive an honorary doctor of laws degree Sunday, has been active in Canadian politics since his youth.

He was provincial leader of the Progressive Conservative party from 1936-49. He was elected to the Canadian House of Commons in 1946 where he was a candidate for the national leadership of the party.

Unsuccessful in 1948, he was chosen leader on the first ballot in 1956. One year later he took office as the first Conservative Prime Minister in 22 years.

Diefenbaker has served as a member of the Canadian delegation to the United Nations in 1952, member of Canadian delegation to NATO, and various parliamentary associations.

Sunday's degree marks the third honorary title given to the Ontario native who received most of his early education from his father.

Ex-Student Murphy Killed in Car Crash

William Murphy, 22, a former student from Lexington, Mass., was killed instantly at 1:35 a.m. Thursday when the sports car in which he was riding ran off the road and hit a tree on Lake drive north of Carlton street in Haslett.

The driver, MSU senior Hugo Krave, was injured and taken to Sparrow hospital where his condition is listed as fair after undergoing surgery Thursday morning. He received head injuries and a broken arm.

State police said Thursday that they are still investigating Krave's Michigan traffic record which showed 14 moving violations since August, 1956.

His driver's license was suspended for a month last year and again last winter. Police are checking to see if the license was ever returned to him.

A police official said Krave admitted that he and Murphy, and their dates had visited two bars earlier in the evening.

Two Haslett girls said that they saw a car speed past them minutes before the accident.

The MG convertible failed to negotiate a curve and left the roadway 25 feet before it struck a large tree and was demolished, police said.

Murphy is survived by his mother, Mrs. C. H. Murphy, of Lexington, Mass., and a brother, C. H. Murphy, of Roseville, Calif.

The body was removed to the Estes-Leasley funeral home pending arrangements.

Furgol Chooses Littler in U. S. Open

NEW YORK (AP)—Ex-champion Ed Furgol Thursday joined the giant guessing game of who will win the 59th U. S. open golf championship next week — his private pick is Gene Littler.

"In relating the course to the men, I would name five I think have an outstanding chance," the lame-armed professional said. "They are Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, Mike Souchak, Art Wall Jr., and Gene Littler. I like Littler best."

Furgol won the 1954 championship at Baltusrol in Springfield, N.J., with a left arm withered since childhood—one of the miracles of sport. Littler, a freshman pro at the time, missed an 8-foot putt on the final green which would have given him a tie.

Furgol has just taken over a new job as teaching pro at the Montauk Downs course on the eastern tip of Long Island. Of

his own chances in the open, he says, "I have as much chance as the mice they're trying to shoot to the Moon."

Littler, after being proclaimed the brightest prospect in golf and probable successor to Hogan, hit a slump shortly after his prosperous 1954-55 seasons. Only recently has he returned to his old form, winning the Phoenix, Tucson and Hot Springs tournaments this year.

"Hogan can still place the ball off the tee better than any golfer alive," Furgol said. "Snead

and Souchak also are wonderful drivers and so is Littler.

"Wall is riding a wave of putting confidence. He feels he can sink from anywhere on the green—and he does. That's a terrific advantage in going into the Open. But Littler can both drive and putt—and I think he is ripe.

"Winged Foot next week will be just a woman dressed up for her first formal—and she'll scare the boys to death," was Furgol's final comment.

Owens Likes New Pan-Am Games Track

CHICAGO (AP)—Jesse Owens, Olympic star, donned his running shoes Thursday and tested the new track just completed for the Pan American games.

"It's springy and breaks clean," Owens said. "By the time it's rolled a couple of times and gets rain during the summer, it'll be like lightning next August."

Owens starred in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, running the 100 meters in 10.3 and setting a new Olympic record at that time of 20.7 for 200 meters.

"It has nice bounce to it," Owens said of the track. "It reminds me of the track in Berlin."

The 400-meter field track for the Pan American games in Soldiers Field required six weeks to complete by the Chicago park district.

A special cinder and clay mix imported from England was used to surface the strip. It was installed by the En-Tout-Cas Co. of London, England, whose tracks around the world were first to bring the 4-minute mile.

Ward Heads List In 100-Mile Race

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Roger Ward, who won the Indianapolis 500-mile race in a car owned by Bob Wilke of Milwaukee, heads the entry list in the 10th annual Rex Mays 100-mile national championship big car race at State Fair Park Sunday.

Thirteen of the first 15 finishers and 14 of the first 15 cars at the Indianapolis Speedway will compete here.

Ward's car, especially designed by A. J. Watson of Glendale, Calif., for the 500-mile classic, is rated by Marchese as only one of several capable of bettering the 100-mile race record of 1:37-244 (98.96 miles per hour), set in 1956 by Pat Flaherty.

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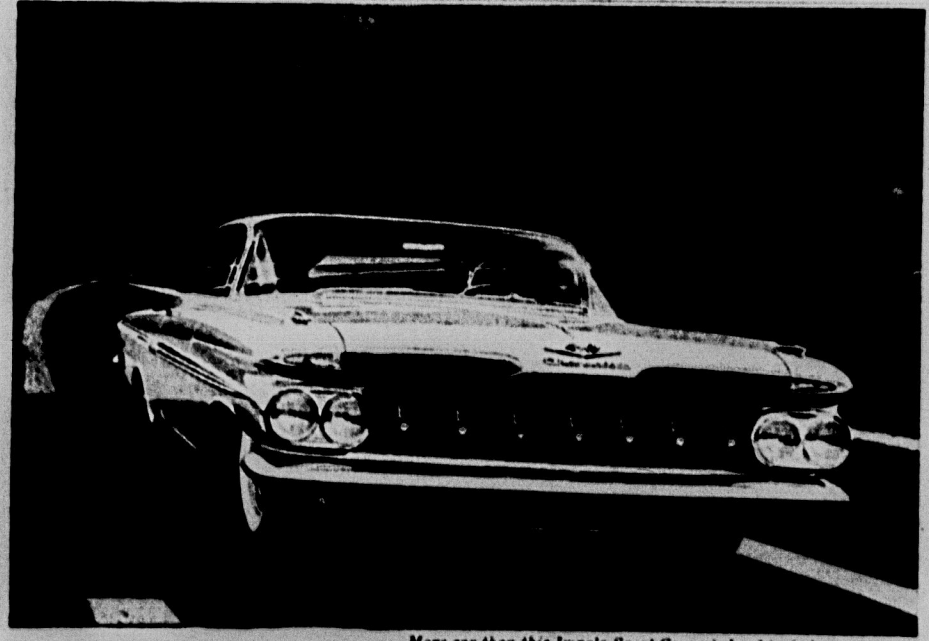
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
