

23 Students Reprimanded By University

gainst 23 MSU students who were involved in disturbances on the campus June 11, 12 and 13 was announced the Dean of Students office.

One student was found innocent and decisions involving

Of the 23 students, three were
suspended, 14 were placed on
strict disciplinary probation,

The parents of all 23 students
were notified of the actions and,
for an indefinite period, these
cannot represent the university
in any capacity, the privilege of
possessing or operating an automobile at the university is withdrawn, and they must take actions themselves to restore their

Nnamdi Azikiwe, Premier of the Eastern Region of Nigeria, will deliver an address and receive an honorary de-gree in colorful ceremonies at 11 a.m. Friday in the Aud, The Premier's name is pronounced Nom-dee Ah-ZEEK-

Music will be provided by the 140-piece youth music concert band, made up of outstanding high school musicians on campus

high school musicians on campus this summer.

"This will be a rare opportu-nity for students and fowns-people to bear an outstanding statesman who is one of the leading exponents of independ-ence for West Africa," said Dr. Clair Taylor, director of the MSU summer school.

Following the playing of the British National Anthem (Ni-geria is a British territorial colony) and the National An-them of the United States, the invecation will be given by the Rev. Warren Emerson Brown of Mt. Hope Methodist Church.

Welcoming remarks will be made by Dr. Taylor. Dr. Azi-kiwe will be introduced by Pre-sident John A. Hannah. Dr. Aziluwe's address will be followed by the conferring of the honorary Doctor of Laws

Rare Event Seen in Skies Last Tuesday

An astronomical event so rare that there was no record of anyone previously observing such an occurrence took place last Tuesday at 9:15 a.m.

The planet Venus passed in front of the bright star Regulus, explained Dr. James Stokley, professor of journalism at MSU. This was called an occultation, and is similar to a solar eclipse.

and is similar to a solar eclipse, which happens when the moon moves in front of the sun. Dr. Stokley explained.

Dr. Stokley, a former director of the Fels Planetarium in Phiadelphia, now teaches science writing in the school of journalism at MSU. He said that the event was visible from eastern parts of the United States and

Michigan residents were not able to observe it, although they were able to watch Venus ap-proaching Regulus, then draw-ing away from it.

"At least twice each year there is an eclipse of the sun, visible somewhere on the earth," Dr. Stokley said. "The moon often tars," generally faint occults stars, generally faint ones, Occultations by the moon of bright stars are much less

Summer Staff of Speech Clinicians 2015 9, 1959 Serve in Therapy for 50 Children

The clinic for speech therapy, a service of the speech department, is being continued during the first five week session this summer.

session this summer.

Over 50 children are being worked with by nine student and two faculty clinicians. During the other three terms, there are many more students helping, but no faculty members.

Speech correction majors are required to spend a certain amount of time in the clinic in connection with their studies. They work with the children by 11 teaching them to hear their speech error, then 21 teaching them to make the correct sound, and then 33 teaching them to use that sound in their everyday language.

Charles Pedrey, head of the speech clinic, interviews the parents of each child before the

Speech faults may range from statters, lisps, and an unpleasant voice, to something of a more complex nature like eleftipalate. The therapy is designed to the individual case.

Most of the children that come the clinic range in age from

four to seven and come from the Lansing area, but these are not essential qualifications. The children come to the clinic

The children come to the clinic woor three times a week (an hour each time) and use one of the six available clinic rooms for their appointment with the clinican. 
