Know the Score **Before You Gamble**

IT WAS LATE in the game last Saturday and a time out was called. The public address announced took the opportunity to relay some final scores of other collegiate football

Immediately the man in the next row reached into his

pocket, pulled out a colored card and studied it.

All this adds up to the time of year when the football spot card gambling syndicates sponsor the "football pools."

The man, after placing his bet, has checked to see if he

Cards are distributed each week by the syndicate to persons on the various college campuses across the nation. These persons in turn distribute them to the football fans.

THESE FOOTBALL spot cards are used for gambling purposes by purchasers who select from four to ten of the nation's top games. The buyer picks a team, either giving or receiving a number of points—the spot—and collects at a rate generally around 9-1 if all ris selections are correct.

Although illegal, this activity has grown at an alarming rate. The "football pools" have become big institutions on

the college campuses.

When caught, the offenders find a stiff penalty. And the ones caught are usually those who distribute the football spot cards on the various campuses. For this the syndicate usually "hires" college students.

While the men in the syndicate rarely get into hot water with the authorities, the college students who sell the spot eards are the ones who suffer the consequences when

Last year a gambling scandal hit the University of Michigan campus, with the Wolverines' fullback Tony Rio and basketball captain Jack Lewis among those who were

arrested. Similar incidents have occurred over the years at other universities

It's bad enough to suffer the penalty for such an action, and it's worse for the university represented.

There have been rumors of such activities on the MSU this year. Before jumping the chance to make a few bucks by unloading such spot cards, students should remember the maximum penalty of 90 days in jail and a \$100 fine upon conviction.

The pact, originally known as the "northern tier" arrangement by which Dulles completed partial encirclement of the Communist sphere from Bangkok to the western border of India, was partly designed as a lure by which it was hoped the Arab States would be led into the free world defense camp.

Pool Construction Goes Up 65%

Construction of new public and semi-public swimming pools in Michigan was up 65 percent in the first half of this year over the same period of 1958, the Michigan Department of Health reported.

During the first six months of this year, the state health department approved plans for 38 pools, compared with 23 in the first half of 1958.

This year's approvals were for pools at 11 resorts, 9 motels, 6 schools, 5 apartment developments, 5 subdivisions, 1 country club, and 1 swimming club.

According to the state administrative code, plans for all public and semi-public swimming pools must be approved by the state health department prior to construction.
