EACH SATURDAY'S BLOCK S performance has been deplorably lacking — especially in the upper right hand corner. Something has been wrong—namely, that a very oticeable portion of Block S seats were either empty or filled by non-Block members who refused to participate in

Just under 1,100 freshmen are signed up for the section. The card tricks are designed for 1,008 persons. Still the block has lacked 150-200 members each game.

The freshmen who have been praised as the most intelligent class to enter MSU are, if this is any indication, proving themselves pretty spiritless.

Saturday's Purdue game was no exception to the rule until the Block was rescued by a display of helpfulness and spirit which is seldom considered a part of football tradition anymore.

The men of Reyan Hall, banded in the end zone to form their own rooting section, marched to the more publicized block late in the second period when the traditionally vacant right hand corner was empty again.







After a month in the Bohemian life—complete with beards, berets and jazzy poetry sessions—the detectives struck as part of a city wide crackdown over the weekend.

Ninety-five persons were ar-rested in raids that reached into Brooklyn and Harlem as well as The Village.

Inspector Edward F. Carey put the value of confiscated heroin, cocaine and marijuana at a million dollars in the illegal

The masquerading detectives spent virtually all of their wak-ing hours in Beatnik haunts to gain the confidence of suspect-ed adicts and pushers.
