Khrushchev Boasts Of Red Submarine

CAIRO (AP)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev was quoted as saying the Soviet Union has atomic submarine as fast as those of the United States. He was told this to President Eisenhower on his visit to the United States.

This is the first time any Russian has said the Soviet Union has an atomic submarine. There has been speculation in Western naval quarters, however, that the Russians were building and possibly had completed atomic-powered underwater craft.

There was no immediate comment in Washington on the report.

An interview granted Maj. Salah Salem, President Nasser's former Minister of National Guidance, who heads a Cairo publishing house, filled three pages in Tuesday's Al-Gumhuriya.

Salem quoted Khrushchev as saying: "On my brief visit to the United States, I had seen with Eisenhower a movie of the latest American submarines. I told him: 'Your submarines are not so bad, but the speed of our atomic submarines is double yours.'"

The interview covered a wide range of subjects. At one point the Soviet Premier compared the West to an old man that is bitter because he has lost his youth to women and alcohol.

"The West has a strong desire to follow a policy of force, but the West does not have the strength to do it because the West has grown old."

An East-West summit conference, he told Salem, would be only a formal exchange of views and the actual settlement of issues would only be made in the United Nations.

Army Announces Success In Launching Transmitter

WALLOPS ISLAND, Va. (AP)—A five-stage rocket roared more than a thousand miles into the sky Tuesday to let a tiny transmitter count the density of electrons at that extreme height. The Army's Ballistic Research Laboratory, which supervised the shoot, gleefully reported that the project, called "Strong-arm," went off exactly as planned.

All five stages fired correctly and the transmitter operated satisfactorily throughout the ride. The nose cone landed in the Atlantic 800 miles off shore about 28 minutes after firing. The radio, sending back data on 37 and 148 megacycles, was designed to measure the amount of electronic activity at a height of 800 miles and above. This hadn't been done before.

After the information is decoded, it will be shared with the 66 nations participating in the International Geophysical Year Program.

The data also will be valuable to the Army. It now can determine—rather than guess—the type of space that intercontinental ballistic missiles and anti-ICBMs will be shooting through.

U. S. Needs Foreign Languages

America is suffering crucial reverses on the cold war front because of a lack of emphasis on foreign languages in the schools.

This oversight, declared a panel of educators at an MSI conference, gives well-trained Russians a vital advantage in the struggle for allegiances.

The group discussion took place at the annual conference of the Michigan Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development Nov. 5-6.

The panel pointed out that American ambassadors, unable to speak the language of the country they are serving, appear aloof and rather arrogant. On the other hand, they said, the country is flattered when the ambassador converses fluently with them in their own tongue.

American servicemen able to speak only English, are an isolated group and natural targets for ill-feeling the panel stated.

The educators strongly maintained that the best answer to the communication problem is the teaching of foreign languages in the elementary grades. Studies show, they said, that

this instruction should begin about the third grade, with students 8-10 years old. At that stage, it was noted, children are highly imitative and most receptive to learning.

Furthermore, they added, children have a physical advantage. Since their vocal equipment is more flexible and better able to reproduce foreign sounds than adults.

The teaching of foreign languages in elementary grades has been started in Michigan, but panelists agreed the program should be greatly expanded.

Biggie Munn Not Mum

Often through the hustle-bustle of a sports season, the man behind the scenes, the school's athletic director, is forgotten by the press and fans alike.

But the State News was interested in the impressions of Michigan State's athletic director, Biggie Munn, on the current grid season which sees the Spartans climb out of the Big 10 cellar.

In answering a question about the rumor of his football coach, Duffy Daugherty, leaving the school to take charge of a professional football team, he said that he did not take much stock in the rumor. "Besides, Duffy has the best coaching job in the country today," Biggie beamed.

Talk swung around to football scheduling. It was brought out that MSU had only six conference games compared to seven for some other conference schools, such as Northwestern and Wisconsin, giving them an edge in the Big 10 conference race in attaining more victories.

Munn pointed out that the Big 10 laws require a minimum of six conference games for each member. He said, "Since State has been in the conference I have strongly advocated a schedule so each team has an equal amount of conference games."

Those who do not agree with Munn point out that the Big 10 does not offer an official championship thus the number of games need not be uniform.

But the conference is taking steps toward uniformity, and eventually a round-robin schedule with a 10 game season slate.

The process will start in 1965 after the current schedules up to 1964 run out. In 1965-66 a seven league game minimum is set, a game minimum for '67 and '68 and finally nine after that.

The former Spartan coach pointed to the school's most successful scheduling achievement—getting a home and home series with Michigan.

Previous to the upper-deck addition to the Spartan Stadium, the Ann Arbor school dictated to State where the games were going to be played with Michigan Stadium being the site nine times of 10.

We asked Biggie to make some comparisons of teams of old and now. He refrained to name an all-MSU squad saying that State has had too many greats.

He did say that he believed that a modern football club would defeat a club of 20 or 30 years ago, but only because the moderns have the benefit of improved coaching, equipment and techniques.

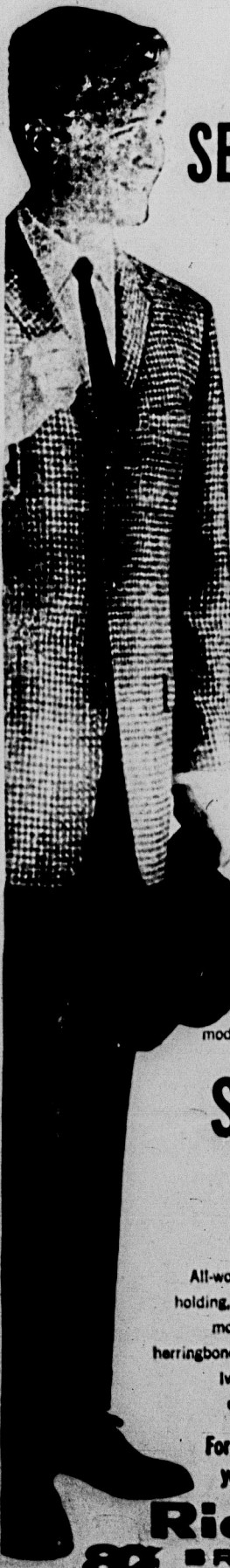

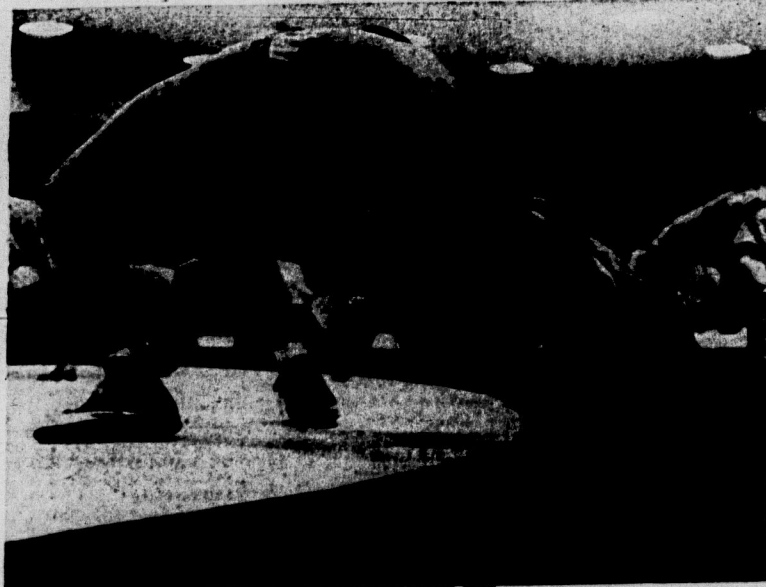

In Cross Country Meets Lake, Reynolds Battle for 2nd Place

Battling for second place behind Capt. Frank Kennedy on the cross country team are two adept runners, senior Bob Lake and junior Bill Reynolds.

The two take turns running in the second-year slot. Reynolds was second in the Penn State meet and Lake, senior Reynolds, in the Notre Dame meet.

Fran Dittrich, Spartan coach, attributes their placing to the course. In some respects, he said that Reynolds was the better hill runner and likewise, Lake usually comes in ahead of Reynolds on a flat course.

This statement holds true in the last two meets. The Penn State meet was on MSU's Forest Acres Golf Course, which is relatively hilly. The Notre Dame

meet was on a flat course in South Bend.

The runners verify this also. Lake said that Reynolds will run away from him on a flat course anytime, but that it's more even on a hilly course.

Bob, a physical education senior, hopes to lead his coach, track in high school after graduation. Since a coach is termed professional and therefore, can't run in amateur competition, he plans to compete for a couple years before leaving.

Bill, a junior, plans on continuing competition along with a career in accounting after he graduates. He says his interest in cross country probably stems from the fact that his father was a marathon runner for Canada and even competed in the 1928 Olympics and 1929 British Empire Games.

Lake was 14th in last year's nationals and fifth in the IC4A. Reynolds was sixth in the nationals and sixth in the IC4A.

Cross country isn't the only thing Reynolds excels in; for his grades are near the top too. His all-college average is 3.86. One of Lake's accomplishments is being captain for the track squad.

Reynolds, from Gall, Ont., has been running since he was 11 years old. He was the Canadian junior champion and two-time champion last year.

Lake's start in cross country came in high school when he played on the Kalamazoo basketball team. He did some running with the cross country squad and discovered he could run as fast as anybody else.

Dittrich calls both men capable of being right with Forman.

Lake, he says, is showing great potential this year in cross country and appears to be on his way to that "miraculous four-minute mile" in track.

Lake's fastest time to date in the mile is 4:04.9, which he made as a junior. He was Big Ten indoor and outdoor mile champion last year, and he made a new record in the mile in the outdoor running.

Reynolds' strong fort in cross country, according to Dittrich, but the coach is hoping to convert him into a good track runner as well.

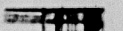

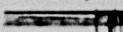

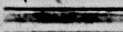
