

## Administrative Visit **Could Incite Profs**

THE FACT that many students feel a need for voluntary attendance of classes indicates that there is something lacking on the part of some instructors at MSU.

The university might do well to copy some practices at other universities to attain better quality of teaching by professors. A system of encouraging visits by administrators and colleagues is presently being tried at some schools

Johns Hopkins University has an open-door policy, as do the military academies. These are not unlike the graduate training schools of some corporations.

If the practice is so common in elementary and secondary schools, why not in college? Instructors might learn from observing others and be more worthwhile when they know they're being observed.

A few schools have a regular system whereby administrators visit classes. The president of Harvard has done this, as have the deans of Purdue, Columbia and Minnesota.

THE FACULTY of Colorado College recognized the gap between administrative ideals and actuality, and asked the dean, by unanimous resolution, to visit classes regularly. Ideas and techniques may be gained from this system.

Paul Davis, a former educational administrator, in an article in the booklet, "Liberal Education," quoted a dean of a school he visited as saying that, though he doesn't visit classes, "When I hire a new man, unless he is a full professor, I assign him for a semester to assist one of our best teachers. That way he has a half year of seeing and hearing good teaching."

MSU DOES HAVE one policy, listed in the handbook "Faculty Facts," which could have value if it were followed more strictly. A regulation adopted by the faculty in 1949 provides that all new staff members use the student opinionnaire or the teacher evaluation sheet in at least one course every term for at least one year.

The regulation further provides that faculty members who have been with the institution longer than one year will use either the student opinionnaire or the teacher evaluation sheet in at least one course each year.

These evaluation reports are not in any way made for comparative studies, but for the instructor's individual growth. The results are the personal property of all staff members, except graduate assistants, who confer with the department head concerning the rating scale results.

These rating scales should be adhered to, and extended for longer periods of time. We are not in favor of compulsory attendance of classes. as we have stated before, but if more instructors could give lectures worth attending, there would be no need to

THE TROUBLE with the hazing game is that it can so easily be carried to extremes which can inflict serious injury, as in the case here last year when one contingent of pledges thought it great fun to turn their house into a

The happy-go-lucky lads playfully locked the actives in the dormer upstairs and proceeded to strew straw hither and you about the house, over rugs, chairs, tables, lamps and other odds and ends. This was all done in a fun-loving spirit, but who would

have laughed had a lamp or a stove set fire to the straw with the brothers trapped on the second floor of the house? doubt the ZET incident began in this same spirit.

Just to have a little "fun" with a couple of obstreperous pledges. But being stranded in the countryside in 20-degree reather is not my idea of fun. Nor is it conducive to the health of those involved

LUCKILY, the abandoned pledges were picked up quickand suffered no serious ill effects from the experience, But it was largely a matter of luck.

This sort of thing is just the reason hazing activities were banned at MSU and are being banned in colleges and

universities across the country.

Hazing, while it thrived, was fun. So were firecrackers. But a lot of people got hurt. Some even died. In such circumstances it seems better all around to forfeit such types

Let's face it, it happened. Suspension is not the end of ZBT. They can be reinstated at any time. All they have to do is demonstrate that they should be reinstated.
