WASHINGTON (AP)—Neil McElroy, the first space age secretary of defense, resigned Tuesday and Philadelphia banker Thomas Gates Jr. was promoted to the top Pentagon post.

12 Countries Pledge Peace For Antarctic

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Antarctic Pact—a pledge to keep the great frozen continent at peace—was signed Tuesday, and greeted as a sign of thaw in international relations.

Twelve nations, including the United States and Russia, signed the treaty that bans war bases, nuclear explosions and missile sites forever from a vast south polar region covering five million square miles.

It indicates Antarctica, where Russia and the United States have been the most active explorers, to peaceful uses.

President Eisenhower called the 2,500-word document "an inspiring example of what can be accomplished by international cooperation in the field of science and in the pursuit of peace."

For the Soviet, Deputy Foreign Minister Vasili Kuznetsov said it reflected "a definite improvement in international situations."

It is "additional evidence of the fact that states, if they are ready to cooperate, can successfully achieve through negotiations mutually acceptable solutions of internal problems in the interest of international peace and progress," the Russian representative added.

Australia's Ambassador Howard Beale saw the treaty as a possible model for other international agreements—not only relating to earth but "perhaps to the outer reaches of space itself."

One of the pact's most significant aspects, U.S. officials said, is its provision for a revolutionary system of international inspection in Antarctica.

It gives each of the 12 nations the right, on mere advance notice, to check the other's installations, equipment, ships and planes in the Antarctic at any time.

Ike to Blast Union, Management

WASHINGTON 7—Government officials passed the word Tuesday that President Eisenhower is getting ready to blast both union and management for not settling their steel industry dispute.

Speech Dept. To Read Part Of 'Crucible'

A reading recital featuring excerpts from Arthur Miller's "The Crucible" and Edward Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac" will be presented by the Department of Speech tonight at 7:30 in the Music Aud.

Bruce Loganbill, a doctoral candidate in Theater and Oral Interpretation, will present a one-hour adaptation of "The Crucible." The play deals with the tragic outcome of hysterical accusations of witchcraft made by some mischievous Puritan girls in 17th Century Salem, Mass. It dramatically illustrates what religious hysteria, ignorance and persecution can accomplish.

John Hesk, in the second part of the program, will present a cutting from "Cyrano de Bergerac," one of the world's great romantic dramas. Hesk, a doctoral candidate in Theater and Oral Interpretation, will orally recreate the poet of the long nose, his swashbuckling romanticism and his hopeless love for Roxanne.

There is no admission charge and the performance is open to the public.

Eisenhower was said to be choosing stronger words that he has used before, in his radio-television speech to the nation Thursday night.

This was reported as new bargaining sessions called by the government got off here Tuesday afternoon on a sour note.

The steelworkers union president, David McDonald, accused the industry of entering the talks in bad faith.

He objected to a pamphlet mailed by U.S. Steel Corp. to employees entitled "last offer for strike settlement." McDonald said other steel companies are similarly circulating their workers.

The half million steel workers, back to work now under a Taft-Hartley law injunction after a 116-day strike, will be free to walk out again on Jan. 26 when the injunction expires.

Before that, however, they will be policed by the government on their employer's last settlement offer.

McDonald said union negotiators came Tuesday in good faith seeking to negotiate a fair settlement only to discover that the steel companies are telling the workers that a Nov. 15 settlement offer is the last the companies intend to make.

Instructors to Meet At Music Meeting

Walter Hodgson, head of the music department, and Roy Underwood, director of the division of fine arts, will represent MSU at the 33th annual meeting of the National Association of Schools of Music in Detroit Friday and Saturday.

The executive and administrative heads of music departments of leading U.S. universities, colleges and conservatories will discuss current problems facing music educators on the college level.

A third exhibit in the spacious galleries is 30 pieces of ceramics representing various ceramic-producing provinces in Japan.

Humanities Instructor Author Of Book 'Dickens on Education'

"Dickens on Education," a forthcoming book by Dr. John Manning of the Humanities department, is currently being advertised in Canada, the United States and Great Britain. A brief description of the book has appeared in the current issue of Scholarly Books in America. Manning himself does not, as yet, have a printed copy. The literary supplement of the (London) Times, however, for Nov. 6, refers to the book as "an account of Charles Dickens' interest in and comment on education which covers his life and times, his personal views on education and letters."

The "documentary" consists of reports by inspectors, government commissions on education and statistical societies to added reference from diaries, biographies, Hansard.

This book is being published in Canada and the United States by the University Press, and in Great Britain by the Clarendon Press, throughout the British Isles by Oxford Press.
