Academic Senate Report Featured

The Academic Council has set a special meeting to consider suggestions for MSU ROTC policy. Centered around the compulsory vs. voluntary controversy, the meeting will be held Tuesday, Dec. 15, from 2-8 p.m. The council, a faculty group composed of representatives of each college and ex-officio members appointed by the administration, will hear a summary of a report made by a committee of the Academic Council.

The group will also hear summaries of reports made by a committee of the Committee on the Future of the University of the Student Congress, and a group composed of all faculty members with tenure, headed by the LaPalombara committee to study the ROTC program.

Second Rush Convocation Slated For Jan. 7

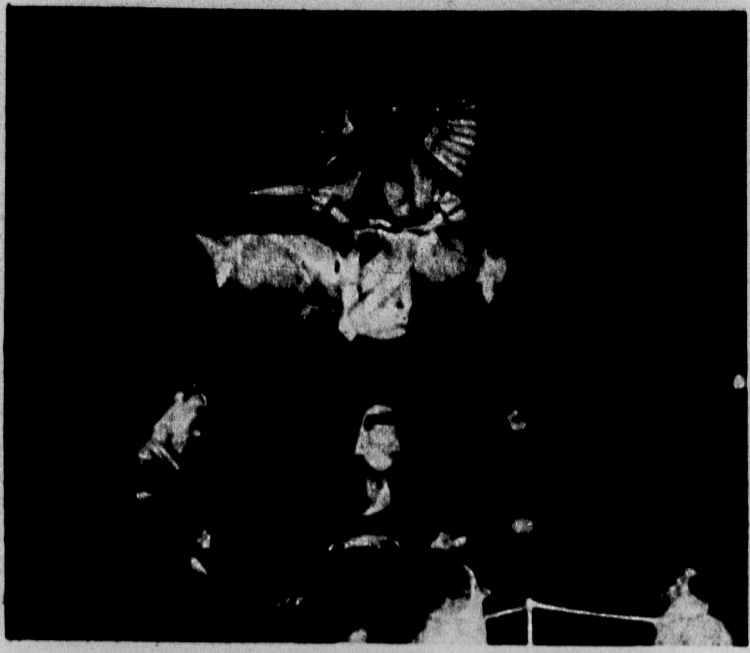

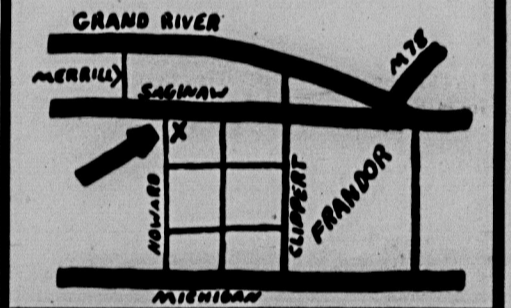

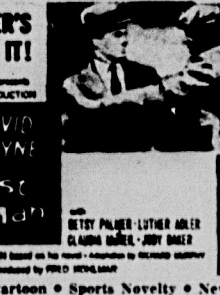

Tedesco Creates Cartoon Music; Composed Hymns in Greek

Music is almost a "necessary evil" in Hollywood, said Dr. Maria Castelnovo Tedesco, distinguished visiting professor in the music department.

A free lancer for three years in Hollywood during the early fifties, Tedesco composed music for an average of 200 movie scenes a year.

Artistic achievements are thought of in the movie capital. Music is composed to satisfy the taste of the producers leaving little opportunity for self-expression, Tedesco explained.

To modern picture production music is the last concern. To illustrate this, he told of the time he composed a ballet for the MGM picture "Down to Earth."

In this picture Rita Hayworth, playing as a Greek goddess, descends from Mt. Olympus to Broadway to change the modern taste in music. Instead, she becomes a jazz enthusiast.

The ballet scene, depicting Miss Hayworth's descent from Mt. Olympus had already been filmed. The dance was performed to the music of three famous composers, but this music was not in the movie.

Tedesco's task was to create an original musical piece for the ballet without changing any of the scenes.

In this same picture, Tedesco added a chorus. With a chorus, however, words were needed and the producer brought Tedesco a book of hymns in Greek and English.

Delighted to find that Tedesco had had a little Greek in his childhood school days, the producer decided to make this the

first Hollywood picture with hymns sung in Greek.

Tedesco described the hymns they sang as sounding "more like Chinese than Greek."

While working in Hollywood, Tedesco said he enjoyed creating music for cartoons most of all.

"Cartoons are easier to adapt to music than scenes with actual human beings," he explained. "and I could do what I liked."

Among the various forms of music Tedesco has written are three operas. His "The Merchant of Venice" won the International La Scala contest in 1953.

Before leaving Italy in 1939, he had accompanied many of the great European singers which, he said, gave him an incentive to write music for them to perform.

After completing his duties on campus this week, Tedesco will return to Beverly Hills, Calif.

"It has been a pleasant experience, even more than I expected," Tedesco commented on this his first time teaching in a university.

Yet, according to Tedesco, teaching in a large university for one short term is too condensed and takes too much concentration. To do it right, he said, he would need a year to "spread out."

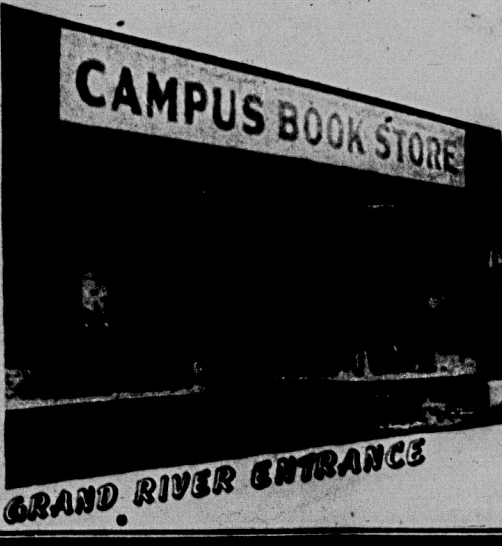

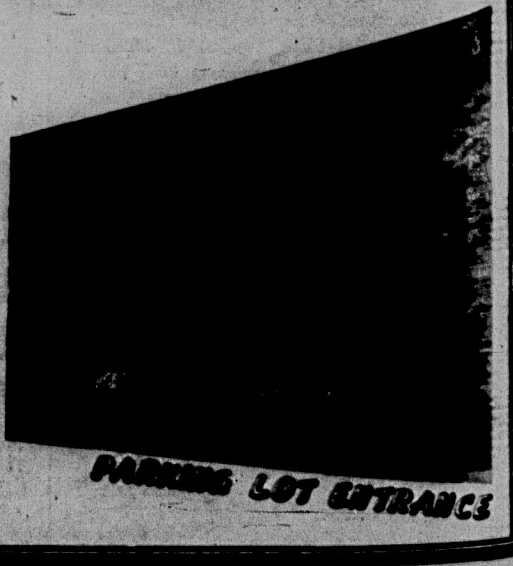
