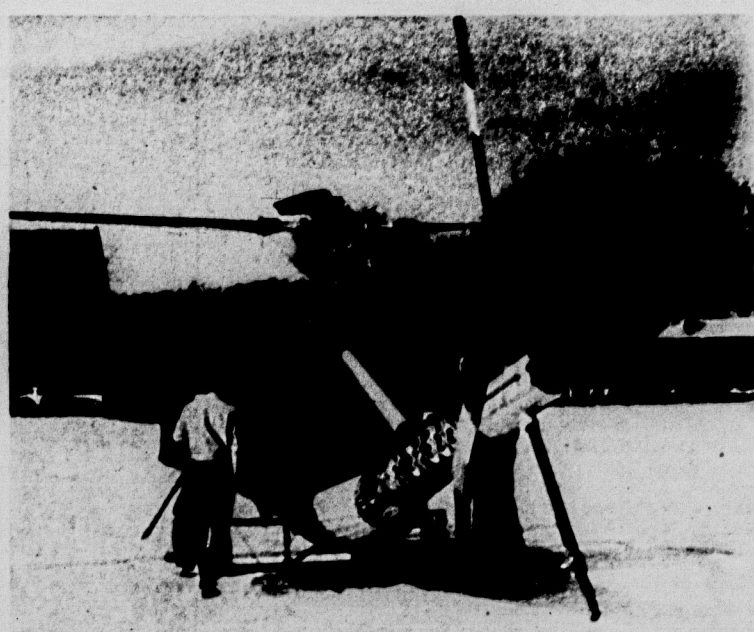
Profs Urge Heavy Turnout at Senate

The American Assn. of University Professors' MSU chapter Thursday circulated a letter asking careful examination of all facts involved in the compulsory vs. elective ROTC controversy before Monday's showdown vote, which may guide the future of reserve officer training on campus.

The 400-member organization, on record as favoring the replacement of State's six-term required basic ROTC course with a one-term compulsory orientation course, urged in its letter that all senate members be present at the meeting in order that the vote be a clear expression of the majority of the faculty.

Senate will decide Monday whether or not the report of its committee on compulsory ROTC will be approved and sent to the Board of Trustees for final consideration.

AAUP's letter came on the heels of three "fact sheets" distributed by the committee for

Revised Course

Students Okay Comm Skills

A questionnaire submitted to communication skills 111 students at the end of fall term indicated general satisfaction with the course.

Edward Blackman, department head, said three-fourths of the students said they needed all the class activities. Only 17 percent said the course was of little value to them.

The course was revised fall term to concentrate on reading

and writing. Previously speaking and writing were also taught. "We feel that the basic responsibility of communication skills is to teach the student to read and write," Blackman said.

Seventy percent of the students indicated they needed more writing, reading, analysis and background material. The course studies American literature, including documents, political and scientific essays. Students are asked to write on "issues" given in the readings.

Fifty-six percent said the course would have been more valuable if there had been more instruction in reading for main ideas.

"This is a striking fact," Blackman said. "It is probably one of our greatest problems in college today. Students cannot find the significance of what they read."

Few reading selections were duplicated in high school although 44 percent had read the Declaration of Independence before.

About one third indicated a lack of interest in subject matter, which ranged from Franklin and Paine to Thoreau and Emerson.

"We feel interested" will pick up as we approach modern times and problems and students are familiar with," Blackman said.

Generally, 111 covers colonial American through Thoreau and Whitman. Selected term goes from the Civil War era to Wilson's administration. This term includes contemporary works.

The faculty regards the results as encouraging, but the survey only covered one third of the curriculum, Blackman said.

Reds Might Seek New Relations

Propaganda Effort Suspected by U.S.

HAVANA (AP)—Analyzes Mikoyan, Soviet deputy premier, trade expert and traveling man, arrived Thursday for a close-up look at revolutionary Cuba. Prime Minister Fidel Castro was on hand to greet him.

The two brought the highest Soviet dignitary ever to visit Cuba here in a move of extreme importance in Cuba's relations with the Soviet Union. A small, but excited crowd gave the Russian leader an almost ecstatic reception.

The announced purpose of the week-long visit is for Mikoyan to open a Soviet scientific, technical and cultural exchange with Cuba.

But U.S. officials in Washington expect a strong propaganda effort by the Soviet delegation. They also said Mikoyan may have brought with him various proposals for Russian-Cuban trade. Castro has indicated in the past he will deal with Moscow.

Another breakdown of the U.S. officials was that Mikoyan may seek to restore diplomatic relations between the Soviet Union and Cuba. They were broken off in 1962 after the Cuban missile crisis. Mikoyan was expected to discuss bringing in diplomatic relations with propaganda material.

Mikoyan's plane, a big Ilyushin Il-14, landed at the airport here at 4:15 p.m. EST. Mikoyan appeared at a news door 18 minutes later. A crowd gathered on the airport terrace cheered. Mikoyan responded with a smile and a wave.

About a half hour before the plane landed buses loaded mostly with workers began pulling up at the airport terminal. Several hundred people flocked to the terminal terrace.

Visible in the crowd were several small signs. One read "Welcome to our country" and the other said "International Mikoyan Welcome."

Castro, wearing a familiar striped uniform, was one of the latest arrivals at the airport. Accompanied by his entourage, he greeted Mikoyan's plane pulled up to the ramp.

When Mikoyan emerged from the plane a band played the Cuban national anthem followed by the Russian anthem.

Castro was walking at the bottom of the ramp and greeted Mikoyan with a handshake.

"I like to attend the meetings mainly to try and get some feeding ideas and look at the progress that has been made in new machinery," said Carlton Woodhens of Kalamazoo.

"I guess I've been here about a dozen times or so. I've been coming since high school," said Woodhens.

"We like to see what's new in farming, and we get a chance to see the manufacturer's machinery when it's all here together," said Oscar Kalkiele of Middlewell.

Farm wives benefited from the big mid-winter show too.

"I come down to see what is new in the way of household appliances," said Mrs. Jerold Topf of Eaton Rapids.

"I enjoy coming to see the new ideas in kitchens and things for the home, and the style show," said Mrs. Leo Baumer of Eaton Rapids.

For some Farmers' Week is a new thing.

"We haven't been here before, but we are having a good time," said Mr. and Mrs. Charles Finney of Byron.

"I came to see the new things in the dairy show. Both my wife and I are interested in it," said Finney.

"We came down to see if there

is any new machinery and to see the livestock," said Mr. and Mrs. Jupp of Brown City.

"I've been here before, but this is the first time that I've brought the family down," said Jupp.

Senator Hart Misses Feast For Farmers

Sen. Phillip Hart (D-Mich.) was unable to attend the farm management banquet Thursday night at Kellogg Center. However, those present at the banquet were shown a film of the senator giving his remarks.

The film was made Thursday afternoon in Washington, flown by jet to Detroit and then up to MSU in time for the dinner.

Hart, who is a member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, said he was not proposing a new farm program, but certain points should be kept in mind when any future program is in the making.

The most important point to keep in mind, Hart said, is to insure that the program is the solution to the problem and does not make more difficult a long range solution. A proposed farm program should put farmers on a level with other people on the economy wage scale, he said.

A farm program, he said, should reconcile conflicting claims, contribute to the growth of farm production, provide adequate food supply now and in the future and supply family commercial farms with credit, management and technical sources.

The cost of the program should be reasonable and distributed fairly, he said. "Slogans, and catch words are not the solution to a good farm program," he concluded.

ROTC Soap Box

In cooperation with the faculty groups favoring and opposing revision of Michigan State's ROTC program from its present form to a basically elective one, the State News Monday will publish letters of equal length presenting viewpoints on the issue, pro and con. Writing on behalf of the proposal to drop the present compulsory basic program will be a representative of the American Assn. of University Professors. A writer for the committee for required ROTC will express views which the committee feels warrant killing the proposal.

Required ROTC, by A. F. Brandt, head of police administration and public safety at MSU.

Ray Denny, president of the professors' group and a member of the psychology faculty, said the AAUP campaign was intended primarily to incite senate members to vote and to list sources of information pertinent to the ROTC question.

He added that AAUP's campaign was the first organized one by a faculty association advocating passage of the proposal before senate. The committee for required ROTC began recruiting support for its beliefs two weeks ago and numbered 80 members in a recent count.

"We are concerned by the pressure being brought to bear by certain off-campus groups on what is basically a curriculum matter and thus properly the concern of the faculty," the AAUP letter said.

Four members of Michigan's House of Representatives Wednesday introduced a resolution condemning the academic senate proposal as "a gross waste of resources of a military bulwark in emergency and betrayal of public trust."

Revision Planned In ROTC Program

'Will Reduce Class Time 50 Percent,' Says Goudreau

The current ROTC program is now being revised by the Army. The details of the new program will be released in a few weeks, according to Capt. Paul Simon. Among other things, the program will cut down on mechanical training aspects, such as weapons familiarization.

The new program will reduce by 50 percent the amount of time in military classes," Lt. Col. Albert Goudreau said. He added that under the new program one-half of the ROTC requirements will be taken care of in such courses as speech, math, science and psychology.

This new proposed program will drastically change the current program and eliminate many criticisms by faculty and students," Goudreau said. "It has been proven that schools that have recently changed to the voluntary program have suffered a 60 percent drop in officer production," he said. He named three schools — MIT, Utah State and Providence College — where freshman enrollment in ROTC dropped considerably when it was put on a voluntary basis.

Goudreau stated that Secretary of the Army Wilbur Brucker has come out positively for compulsory ROTC. Brucker also feels that if several large schools change to a voluntary basis, it will affect the program at other schools.

"Whatever we do, MSU will probably set a precedent for other schools such as Oregon and Wisconsin," said Simon. "According to last year's survey of advanced junior and senior cadets, approximately 61 percent of these students would not have taken ROTC had it been optional," said Goudreau. "Yet greater than 50 percent of the students in their second year of ROTC make application for advanced training."

Senators Make Plans For Primary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John Kennedy of Massachusetts and Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota Thursday settled on West Virginia for a new clash in their campaigns for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Kennedy announced he will go into the May 10 West Virginia presidential primary, and also the one in Indiana on May 3. He challenged Humphrey and all other Democratic presidential aspirants to meet him in Indiana and elsewhere.

Humphrey, through an aide he sent to Charleston, put up the \$1,000 fee for filing in West Virginia. The primary outcome will not be binding on the state's delegates, who will have 25 votes in the national nominating convention at Los Angeles in July.

Indiana will have 34 votes in the national convention.

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Revamped Grapplers to Face Indiana

 The second straight night wrestling coach, Kenley Collins, will send a revamped Spartan line into the mat, action that today when the spars square off against Indiana at Bloomington, Ind. Monday night.

Collins said he was gambling in making the change, but the move didn't hurt the Spartans, in fact they produced their second highest point total of the season, in pasting the Hoosiers, 24-6. Their previous high had been a 26-6 win over Ohio State.

In the meet at Bloomington, Collins plans to rest his regular 157 pound mainstay, Bob Moser, and substitute sophomore Bob Schluter.

Schluter started the season as a 157 pounder and Moser was in the next weight class, 167 pounds. Following the first meet of the season, the quadrangular tournament in Evansville, Ill., the men switched weight classes.

The shift, as was explained by Collins, was to strengthen the 157 pound division with the more experienced Moser who has two varsity letters.

Collins explained his reason for resting his regulars whenever he can to be sure his squad isn't run down by the time the Big 10 championships roll around.

7-7 Saturday afternoon for a boogging party. Catholic Student Organization has planned a dance entitled "Fire and Ice" from 9-12 Saturday evening.

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
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
