### Benson Says Program Not Aimed at Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson Sunday rejected a suggestion that the Eisenhower administration's less rigid approach to farm legislation is geared to the election year.

Benson said President Eisenhower's farm message to Congress last week "is a document based on sound economic principles, representing our best judgment and recommendations. It is not, he asserted, a political document for an election year."

Benson's message dealt principally with the critical wheat surplus problem that he said is costing the government \$1 million dollars a day in storage costs. Eisenhower offered as he has in the past, a plan for removing production controls from the wheat farmer. At the same time he challenged Congress to come up with a better plan.

Relaxing his insistence on the administration's program, Benson said "I will approve any constructive solution."

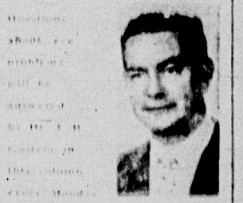

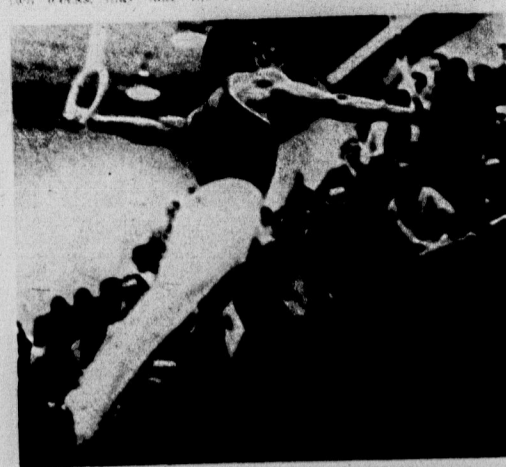

# S' Relays Filled With Surprises; Martin Breaks Pole Vault Mark

Western Michigan, with two firsts, a second and a fourth, topped up with some of the surprise performances in Saturday's seventh running of the MSU Relays at Jenison Fieldhouse. D. Martin, of Oklahoma, gave one of the most outstanding individual performances in the meet's history in the pole vault.

Martin became the first pole vaulter to clear 15 feet in the Michigan Relays. In the previous year, the old Relays pole vault record of 14 feet 6 inches was set by John G. Martin of Michigan State in 1957. This year, Martin broke the record by clearing 15 feet 6 inches. He had a good start, cleared the bar on the first try, and landed safely. He was the only vaulter to clear the bar on the first try.

Martin's two-mile relay team established a new Relays mark of 8:17.4, erasing a record established by the University of Michigan at 8:21.2.

Michigan State's two-mile relay team, coached by Brian Castle, also pushed Western to a new meet record, but Lake State's anchor for the Spartans, Mike Lake, took the lead.

Western also edged the Spartans in the distance medley as they received an outstanding performance by Dick Pond. Mike Atterberry, Ed Graydon and Mike Lake made up the Spartan team.

Atterberry pulled the big points of the meet by setting a 75-yard dash with a time of 7.5 seconds. Charles Johnson, a 100-yard dash specialist, placed third behind Kansas teammate, Paul Brown, who favored to win the race with a time of 13.8 seconds. Mike Akmeta placed fourth in 14.2 seconds.

MSU's Zach Ford placed second in the 300-yard dash, won by Dave Myers of Central Michigan in 2:10 seconds.

Mike Lindsay, of Oklahoma, gave the best hoop of his career in the shot put. Lindsay's shot of 107-4/8 was five feet ahead of the second place distance.

Close to the meet's closest races was the two-mile race in which Duane Houston of Kansas State barely edged out Tom O'Riordan of Michigan State.

Lovola University's mile relay quartet established a new meet record in the college mile relay with a 3:41 time.

Notre Dame came within 3 of a second of tying the fieldhouse and Relays record in the 400-yard medley relay. They recorded a time of 2:26.9, that event.

**RELAY HIGHLIGHTS**  
Paul Williams, Kansas, who last year won the broad jump, didn't even qualify for the finals this year.

Due to the fact that no one had ever exceeded 15 feet to be exceeded in the pole vault at MSU, the pole vault standards committee had to be alerted before the standards to raise the bar height to 15'6" for Martin's attempt.

In the distance medley, MSU's Tom Lake anchored with a 4:11.5 mile, but could not overtake Dick Pond of Western who finished in a 4:09 time.

Joel Johnson, Western Michigan's 75 yard dash champion, pulled the (Olimpella) side of the meet. Previously, the Kalamazoo soph was of unknown potential due to pulled muscles, or some other injury that kept him from competing. In high school, he ran but two races, and didn't win either of them.

MSU's Mike Kleinbans cleared 14 feet in the pole vault Saturday for the first time in his college career.

Mike Lindsay had little trouble getting distance on his put, but had a bit of trouble with his accuracy. Once the sixteen pound ball slipped off the edge of his hand and went off to the side. One of the two almost disqualified a Central Michigan shot-putter who skittered ducked in time.

**Fencers Top Wisconsin**  
The Spartan fencing team sailed one-third of a triangular week-end at Madison, Wis., as they defeated Wisconsin, 10-2, but lost to Iowa, 10-6. According to Coach Charles Schmitter, "We can't seem to get in business for two whole weeks. Against Wisconsin, they won 6-3, 6-3, 6-4, and 6-4. Against Iowa, they won 10-6, 10-6, 10-6, and 10-6. They team has gone bad in our meet," said Schmitter. This week it was the sabre. Steve Arnett were each against the Badgers, but Arnett was the only man to win a win over the Iowa sabre fencer.

## Break Record In L.A. Games

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Austrian Bill At Lawrence broke his own world record for the two-mile relay night in one of several outstanding performances at the Los Angeles Times games.

Lawrence, 27, covered the distance in 8:46 flat. This was one-tenth of a second under his old record. He crossed the finish line 30 yards ahead of second place Max Dines of the Air Force.

Little Ronnie Cook of Oregon tied the world indoor record for the 60-yard dash with his six seconds flat. It was Cook's first race on a board track.

In the pole vault, Don Bragg of the U.S. Army cleared 15 feet to win easily.

## Wrestlers' Win Streak Ended

Before his wrestling squad left for their meet with Iowa Teachers on Friday, coach Fenley Collins said he feared a possible letdown by his forces against the non-league Panthers.

Collins' fears were realized as the determined Panthers bottled up the Spartans' offensive and managed to a 15-13 tie. The 14 starters, State's consecutive win streak which had reached five straight.

Tonight Michigan State will try to get back on the winning track again when they tangle with Pittsburgh.

Pittsburgh is known around wrestling circles as boasting a powerful team every year. This year is not expected to be an exception according to Spartan sources. Although Pittsburgh has been beaten this year by Michigan, the State coach admitted, "we expect to be in for a tough meet."

Against Iowa Teachers, a fall by MSU's heavyweight John Brown was all that saved Collins' squad from suffering their first loss of the season.

State moved into the final match of the meet trailing by a 15-10 score. A chance for a victory was gone and slim chance for a tie was left. A pin was the only thing that could give the Spartans a tie.

It took the tired up Spartan heavyweight Baum exactly 2:39 seconds to gain a takedown and pin the bewildered Don Dunham.

"I think what made Baum go mad was when his teammate Mike Senzig got pinned in the 177 pound class just before Baum was to meet his opponent," said Collins.

When Iowa Teachers' Jack Smith pinned Senzig it was the first time this season that a State wrestler has lost a match by a fall.

Along with Baum, the only other Spartan to continue with a steady performance was 135 pounder Norman Young. Young won his third straight match in a row by dumping Iowa Teachers' Jerry Lane, 7-0.

No opponent has scored a single point against Young since Minnesota's Charles Coffey just to the Spartan, 8-5, on Jan. 30.

MSU's third match win against the Panthers came in the 157 pound division as Bob Moser defeated Dick Maher, 7-5.

Coach Collins made two substitutions in his regular lineup and each change resulted in a loss. He rested regular 110 pounder Ed Smith in the 110 pound class and Duane "Whizzer" Johnson in the 117 pound class.

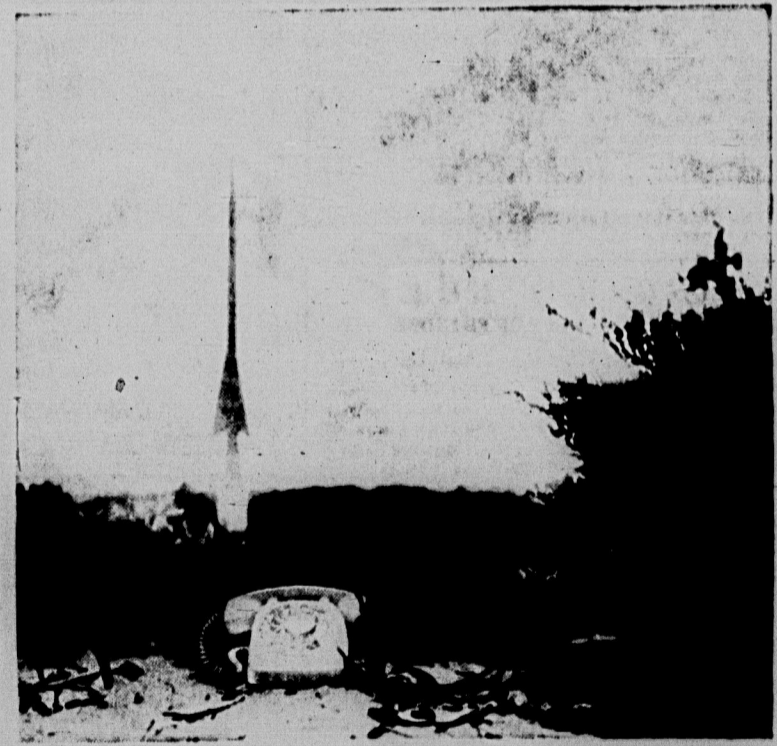

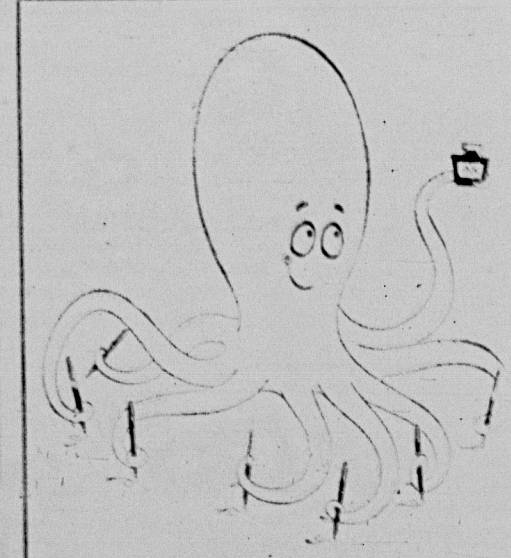
