2,000 High School Students to Be Guests of College.

2000 Michigan high school students will be the guests of Michigan State University next Friday and Saturday when they will compete in the finals of the annual music contests. The contests will be conducted in the new economics building, in the church, plans are almost ready for the care, housing, and general of the musicians. Hill of the National Association of Music Schools, John Moore of Chicago, Ill., Max Leone of the University of Illinois, and Gay Hoover and Neil Edwards of the University of Michigan. Other judges include Frederick A. Vysant of the University of Michigan, Central State Director M. Pleasants, and H. H. Hight, Western State, and Kalamazoo.

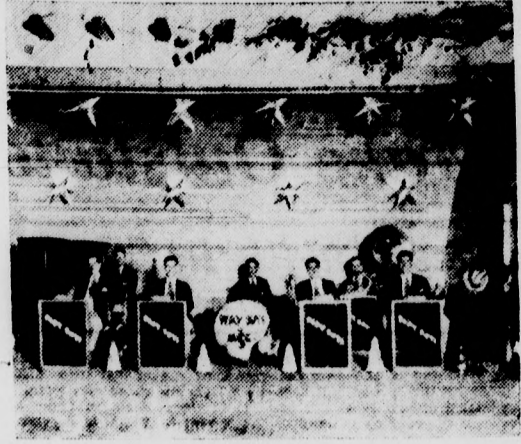

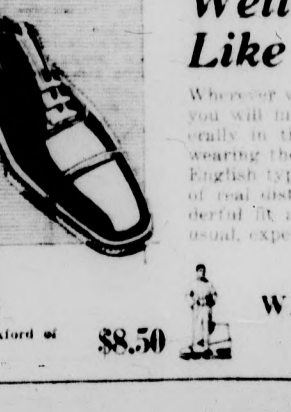

Griffin Hurts Spartans to 2-1 Win Over Teacher

KOBSMEN PLAY TWO TILTS THIS WEEK; IOWA TEACHERS DUE HERE FRIDAY; PLAY C. S. T. C. SATURDAY

Western Team Was One of Two to Beat State on Home Diamond Last Season; Play Mt. Pleasant Saturday; Spartans Score in Sixth on Two Hits, and Error.

TWO GAMES are scheduled for the Spartan baseball team this week. Friday Coach John H. Kobs will send his team against Iowa State Teachers' college on the home field at 4:10 o'clock and Saturday the Michigan State line will journey to Mt. Pleasant for a return game with Central State Teachers' college. The Iowa Teachers will be remembered as one of the two teams to defeat State on the home diamond last season and the Spartans will be seeking revenge. With Charley Griffin making his first start of the home season, State beats the Mt. Pleasant Teachers, 6 to 0, here two weeks ago and will be favored to repeat in the foreign tilt.

Griffin should be regarded as the ace of the Western State hurling staff, in a southpaw pitcher's duel here Saturday afternoon and State won, 2 to 1. It was the fifth consecutive triumph for the Spartans and the fourth of the home season. "Chip" allowed only four scattered hits against the Teachers from Kalamazoo while his mates gathered five safeties off the delivery of Nienegendf. Griffin struck out seven men and allowed one base on balls, while Nienegendf fanned five and issued four passes to first base. Two singles and an error and a passed ball let State score the winning two runs in the sixth inning. Western State scored her only run in the eighth on a single and an error and threatened seriously to tie the score in the ninth, but a fast double play nipped this rally. Two extra base hits were included in State's total of five safeties, but did not figure in the scoring, as in each case the batters were left stranded on the sacks.

Threaten in First
