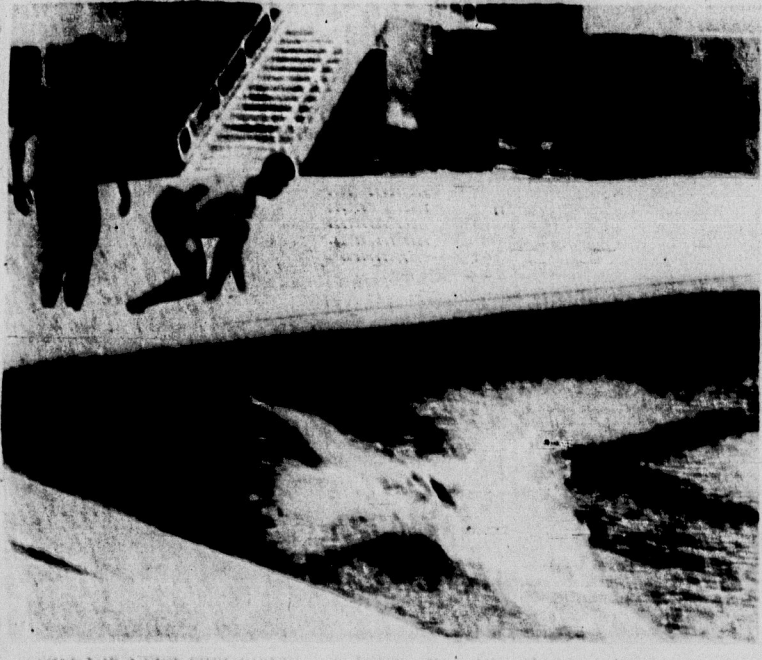

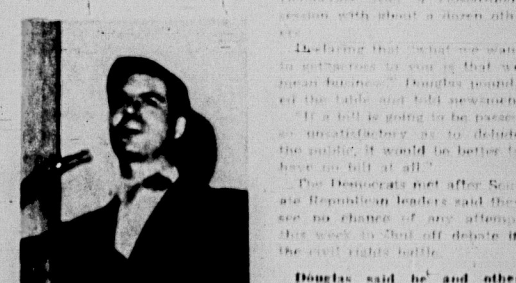
Civil Rights Backers Squabble

Split Over Issue Of Ike's Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pro-civil rights senators split on the squabbling factions Thursday night. Some Republicans called the Eisenhower administration program too harsh and some Democrats called it too weak.

Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.), one of those demanding a stronger bill, said: "What started out as an effort to wear down the South seems to have turned into an attempt to wear out the North."

Douglas spoke at a news conference called by eight Northern Democrats after a closed-door session with about a dozen allies.

Students Gain Critical Thinking After Spending Year at College

After one year at a university, students become better critical thinkers, they also change in their attitudes and modes of values.

A continuing study provides about 2,000 M.I.T. students and probable college students in general.

The study, conducted by the U.S. Office of Education, started with a survey of incoming freshmen in the fall of 1955.

They reported the survey with the same students in the spring of 1956. Other surveys will be made at intervals until the class graduates in 1959.

The results show critical thinking ability improves during the freshman year. This was measured by questions asking how willing to examine rather than previous knowledge.

Attitudes changed in the first year in that the students became

less "stereotyped." They were less apt to make snap judgments, or to form opinions with no basis in fact.

The freshman year also saw

the typical student's sense of values become less "traditional." He became less certain that it is desirable or possible to conform to some commonly held ideals.

the surface of Venus would appear to make the existence of life very unlikely.

The surface temperature, though, would be about 400 degrees Fahrenheit, vastly more than could be tolerated by any known life form.

The researchers told about it at a special seminar at Johns Hopkins called to give details of the scientific results gleaned from

a manned 15-mile high balloon flight made Nov. 29, 1959 by a Navy scientist and a civilian meteorologist.

Shortly after the balloon had come down from its 30-hour flight, project scientists reported they were pretty sure their instruments had indeed affirmatively the long-debated question whether the Venusian

atmosphere contains water vapor.

They reported they had not only pinned this down definitely but also had estimated the amount present in the area studied, the atmosphere about the clouds which shroud Venus some 110,000 feet or so above the planet's surface.

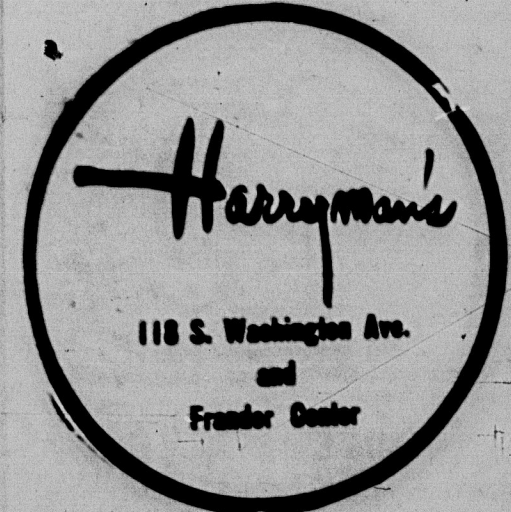

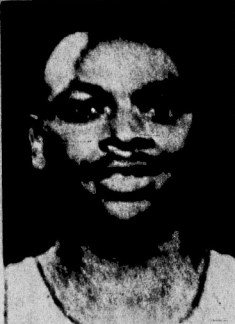

With 6 Seniors Departing Saturday

Forddy to Fight for .500 Average Against Indiana

 The first time in Coach Forddy Anderson's six years at State, MSU's basketball team will be playing for a .500 season when Indiana moves into Jantzen Fieldhouse Saturday night at 8 for the season finale.

State's current overall record is 10-10. No loss to the high-dying Hoosiers would give the Green and White its first losing season since 1934. (Note: Newell's last year as a Spartan coach, that year MSU had a 9-13 record.)

Indiana, riding on the crest of an 11-game winning streak, 10 of them Big 10 games, has won and placed second in the Big 10's sixth leading scorer with a 22.5 average. In Monday night's win over Ohio State, Hoosiers played 31 and one-half minutes less than the Buckeye highly touted Jerry Lucas but scored only three less points and grabbed one less rebound than Lucas.

Six seniors, including three starters will be closing out their college careers at State with Saturday's game. Starters Walker, Olson and John Young will have out, along with reserves Dave Scott, Larry Fanning and Bill Golin. These players and team manager Jack Ulmer will be honored before the game Saturday night.

MSU Wrestlers Rate Top Chance To Take Crown

The Western Conference wrestling tournament opens today and will run through Saturday at Ann Arbor. Michigan State's eight-man unit is rated as the most favorite.

The Spartan matmen achieved the role as the team to beat by knocking off all the top Big 10 teams during the regular season.

Rated as the teams most likely to battle coach Fredley Collins' Spartans right down to the wire are Michigan, Iowa and Northwestern.

MSU has defeated all three of these squads, but in each case it was considered as an upset, state goes into the Ann Arbor championships as the only unbeaten team in the league.

Michigan State's hopes for winning its first conference title rest in four divisions which are considered by Spartan sources as "musts."

State must have top performances from George Hobbs, 123 pounds, Norman Young, 130 pounds, Bob Moser, 137 pounds, and John Baum in the heavyweight division if they are to remain in the running.

Hobbs, a sophomore, has been one of the standouts and a big factor behind MSU's success all season. He is unbeaten in Big 10 action and his season record stands at 8-1-1.

Also undefeated is the biggest man on the team, Baum. Although rated as a temperamental wrestler, Baum has come away the winner seven times this year, and only twice have his opponents been able to contain him. On both occasions the match ended in a draw.

A Big 10 champion in the 130-pound class a year ago, Young switched to 137 this winter and competed in that weight class in all but his final two matches when he returned to his former weight. Young's record for the year is 7-1-1.

The fourth division in which MSU will be at their strongest is at the 157-pound level. Representing the Spartans is Moser, who was shelved by a late season shoulder injury last season. Moser's season comeback mark stands at 7-1-0.

Head mentor Collins pointed out that besides counting on the big four, his other four competing grapplers and a good deal of luck in general would be necessary if his squad is to come home with the title.

"Second and third places will play a very important part in a meet like this," he said, then quickly adding, "there's a great deal of luck involved, too."

Last year Minnesota won the championships with a team score of 30 points. Iowa finished in the runner-up spot with 48. Michigan State placed third with 65, and Michigan was fourth with 62 points.

A total of a meager eight points separated the first four teams. Collins said he expects this year's meet to be just as close.

The Spartans starting lineup will be as follows: Hobbs—123 pounds, Young—130, David James—137, Duane Wohlfert—147, Moser—157, Roger Tavenner—167, Mike Seitzig—177, and Baum—197.

The meet starts today at 7 p.m. with preliminary rounds and will continue through evening sessions at 7:30 p.m. The final championship rounds will be staged at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Wrap-up 'Poorest' In Decade Spartan Leers, Gophers Here

Michigan State's two game series with Minnesota this weekend will bring to a close the 1959-60 Spartan hockey season, State's worst in 10 years.

The games, scheduled for the MSU Ice Arena Friday night at 8 and Saturday afternoon at 2, mean nothing at all in the league standings. But they should be a couple of interesting contests to watch.

Minnesota, 9-15-2 on the season and 7-14-1 in the WCHA, is led by one of the league's leading scorers and playmakers. Coach center Jerry McIntosh has banged in 13 goals and picked up 19 assists in conference action for 32 points and sixth place in WCHA individual scoring. He trails North Dakota's Ray Morell by only one point.

Gopher wingman Dave Reick, who will skate with Mel Orshuk on the first line, is also tough around the nets, notching 22 points on 13 goals and 10 assists.

Michigan State, having scored only six goals in its last five games, could snap out of a scoring slump against the Gophers. Minnesota netminder Mike Doyle has allowed 49 tallies in nine games for an average of 5.4.

The Spartans' leading scorers all make up the starting forward combination. Terry Moroney and Jack Roberts, both with 13 points, will be at the wings with 14-pointman Andre Lacoste at center ice.

State's defensive unit, Ed Orshuk and Mel Christofferson leading the conference in penalty minutes and total penalties, will remain the same.

Guarding the cage for Michigan State will be Eldon Van-Spybroek, who tops the WCHA in total saves with 725.

Six seniors will be making their final appearance in a Michigan State uniform. Captain Roberts, Moroney, and Tom Boucher graduate from the forward line, and Norman, Christofferson, and Van-Spybroek depart from the defensive unit.

Thinclads Must Hurdle Illinois, Michigan for 1st

Michigan State's track team hopes to finish considerably higher than its last year indoor finish of seventh place in the Western Conference indoor championships meet. With a vastly improved squad, the Spartans hope to hit as high as third in the meet this weekend.

The preliminaries for the Big 10 indoor championships are being held today at Columbus, Ohio, in preparation for Saturday's finals to be held starting at 4 p.m.

Illinois is rated the top opponent for the defending champion Wolverines from Michigan. Illinois is the defending outdoor champion of the Big 10.

Several of the Illini have come through with top notch performances this winter. George Kerr turned in a sparkling 47.9 second time in the quarter mile and Dave Bowers ran an excellent 4.10 mile. Del Coleman has posted 6.2 seconds in the 60-yard dash, a mark which tied the heat time turned in by Michigan's Tom Robinson this season in the Big 10.

Paul Foreman of the Illini has cleared 24' in the broad jump this season.

Michigan exhibited its power this past weekend with a strong victory over a good Michigan State squad. Tom Robinson gave top performances in both the 300 and the 60-yard dashes. Tony Seth smashed the Michigan varsity record in the 600-yard run with a 1:07 time.

Other Wolverines who have turned in impressive performances this season are Bennie McEae in the hurdles, Dick Swartz who came close to beating Bob Lake of the Spartans in the two-mile last week, and the shutout duo of Terry Treva then and Bob Locke, who have exceeded 51 feet.

The Spartans are pinning their hopes on the sophomores to bolster the attempts of the veteran trackmen. Sonny Akpata, who last week upset indoor champ Les Bird of Michigan, will have to be at his best to stay up with Bird and Foreman of the Illini, both of whom have jumped more than 24 feet. Akpata's best so far is 23'7".

Mike Gerhart, who tied with Michigan's Steve Williams last week with a leap of 6'3" in the high jump, must prove that he can be consistent at this height to be tabbed as one of the favorites.

Other sophomore performers that hope to give the Spartans additional strength are Gerald Dehenan, pole vault; Zach Ford 60-yard dash and the 300-yard dash, and Gerald Young in the two-mile.

The core of Spartan veterans that comprise the basic strength of the team consists of Captain Bob Lake, undefeated this season in the two-mile run, Willie Atterberry, holder of the varsity record in the 1,000-yard run of 2:12.2; Brian Castle, who has turned in an excellent 1:03.5 time in the 600-yard run; and Mike Kleinhans, who has twice reached the 14-foot mark in the pole vault.

The Spartans fine mile relay team, composed of Max Weisengruber, Jim Carr, Atterberry and Castle, have turned in a sizzling 3:14.4 time in that event, although they were edged out by Michigan's quartet.

Top-Seeded Spartan Gymnasts In Conference Prelims Today

Illinois gymnastics coach Charles Pond is having his anxious moments today, and it is doubtful that the arrival of MSU's Big 10 title-hungry squad in Minneapolis Thursday did anything to ease his tensions.

With 10 consecutive conference gym titles to his credit, Pond is aware that this year has been tabbed by followers of the sport as the one in which Illinois' reign will end. And the Spartans, he knows, are probably the Illini's biggest threat, along with Iowa.

Preliminaries for the leap championships begin at 2 this afternoon in University of Minnesota's Coak Hall gymnasium, with finals to get underway 24 hours later.

The Spartans have designs on five of the eight individual titles up for grabs. Leading candidate for honors is horizontal bar man Stan Tarchis, twice Big 10 and once NCAA champ in the event.

John Daniels, with a second in tumbling and third in free exercise as a sophomore last year, is again a top contender in both categories. Sophomore Steve Johnson (trampoline) and Capt. Angle Peels (still rings) are State's other best chances.

Peels will also work the all-around event, along with teammates Gani Brown and Hal Shorr. All-around scores are obtained by totaling a performer's point awards in free ex, side bars, horizontal bar, parallel bars, long horse and still rings preliminaries.
