

## In Winter Concert Band Performance Slated for Sunday

One of the highlights of the band's annual winter concert Sunday at 4 p.m. in the And, will be the premiere performance of "Symphony for Band." The composition was written for and dedicated to the band by Dr. James Niblock.

In addition to Niblock's composition the band will play "La Vie Du Veau," by Louis Wagener; "Prelude and Love Dances," from "Tristan and Isolde," Suite No. 1, from Bizet's opera "Carmen," and Harry Kras's "Stars and Stripes Forever."

The Stars and Stripes Ballet was transcribed specifically for the MSU band. Originally Kras' suite was commissioned by the New York City Ballet to adapt this John Philip Sousa composition into a ballet.

Bizet's "Carmen" is on the lighter side. It consists entirely of the instrumental movements from the opera.

Niblock, assistant professor of music, will be guest conductor. He was born in Portland, Ore., attended University of Pennsylvania and State University of Washington where he received his BA degree in music.

He received his MA degree at Colorado College and his PhD at the University of Iowa.

Niblock has written many compositions in music. He has written for string quartet, solo instruments, woodwind ensembles, vocal ensembles and orchestral compositions.

It was not until he came to MSU that he began writing for concert bands.

Niblock became seriously interested in composition while in the service.

"I couldn't find adequate facilities for practicing the violin, my major instrument, so I kept up with music through composition," he said.

Niblock will be on a sabbatical leave next fall term. He intends to go to Europe to study composition and do research in music.

Niblock has a high regard for the MSU band.

"The MSU Band is one of the better university bands in the country. I enjoy writing for them, because they are a well-trained and disciplined musical organization. They accurately project the composer," he said.

When the program is completed written exams are given by the FAA to test cadets on plane parts and all FAA regulations, Fitzpatrick said.

## Civil Rights Backers Squabble

### Split Over Issue Of Ike's Program

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Civil rights senators split on a squabbling factions Thursday night. Some Republicans called the Eisenhower administration program too harsh and some Northern Democrats demanded it for two weeks.

Some senators on both sides said that unless there was time to work out a deal they would refuse to vote for a bill to end off the Southern legislature. Southern and Northern senators were split over the issue of civil rights bills.

The Southerners continued their talk without any sign of a breakthrough.

Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) was one of those demanding a stronger bill.

What started out as an effort to wear down the South seems to have turned into an attempt to wear out the North.

Douglas spoke at a news conference called by eight Northern Democrats after a closed-door session with about a dozen other senators.

Douglas said that "we want an effective program to combat segregation that we can live with."

Williams, who started a Democratic campaign in Michigan two days ago and has had trouble getting northern senators to back his civil rights bills, said he had no objection where the bill ends.

On his return, however, many party leaders urged their own champion legislation to try for a seventh term, he said.

After productive consider-

ation he concluded, Democrats could win without him.

The Democratic party in Michigan had the advantage of

indefining that point of view to the South, Douglas said.

If a bill is going to be passed as unsatisfactory as to debate the point, it would be better to have no bill at all.

The Democrats met after Senate Republicans leaders said they saw no chance of any attempt this week to shut off debate in the civil rights bills.

Douglas said he and other Democratic liberals would insist on a civil rights measure containing these points:

1. An effective voting rights provision, "not a sham." He called the administration measure which provides for court-appointed voting referees, highly unsatisfactory.

2. An effective system of educational and financial aid to groups and facilities wishing to desegregate, in this respect he called the administration proposal "unsatisfactory in that it would require consent of state educational authorities.

3. Power for the attorney general to intervene through the courts to protect constitutional rights in the same way that the 1957 Civil Rights Act empowered him to seek injunctions to guarantee voting rights under the 15th (equal rights) Amendment.

## Students Gain Critical Thinking After Spending Year at College

After one year at a university, students become better critical thinkers, says a new study.

Continuing study provides one and other significant disadvantages than those of MUS students and probably college students in general.

Shows that critical thinking skills and values also change according to content knowledge.

Effect some grades higher between students who complete their freshman year and those who drop out.

We think our findings can help schools, said the study director, Dr. Paul Dorell, head of institutional research. Educators need to know how different groups of students vary and how they change and can be changed at the university.

The study, conducted by EPA, will be grants from the U.S. Office of Education, started with 1000 students in Michigan in the fall of 1968.

That reported the survey with the same students in the spring of 1969. Other surveys will be made at intervals until the class graduates in 1985.

Their results show critical thinking ability improves during the freshman year. This was measured by analyzing writing assignments for reasoning rather than previous knowledge.

Attitudes changed in the first year in that the students became

less "ideological." They were less apt to make snap judgments or to form opinions with no basis. In fact,

The freshman year also saw

the typical student's sense of values becoming less traditional. He became less certain that it is desirable or possible to conform to some commonly held ideals.

These indications, however, did not appear in the atmosphere of the Earth's sister planet.

## Balloon Flight Studies Conditions on Planet Venus

If there are six pressures on the planet Venus they'd need to be ones capable of living comfortably in a super-heated furnace bath, a group of scientists indicated.

The researchers, reporting on a Venus-endeavor balloon flight sponsored by the U.S. Navy and Johns Hopkins University, said they had found the first definite

evidence of the presence of life in the atmosphere of the Earth's sister planet.

And, while they said that water is one of the things necessary to support life as we know it on earth, they added this.

Presumptive evidence gleaned by other researchers concerning the steam-like temperature on

the surface of Venus would appear to make the existence of life very unlikely.

The surface temperature roughly around 400 degrees Fahrenheit, easily more than could melt the ball water.

The researchers told about it

at a formal meeting at Johns Hopkins called to give details of the scientific results gleaned from

atmosphere contains water vapor.

They reported they had not only plowed this down definitely but also had estimated the amount present in the area studied. The atmosphere above the clouds which shroud Venus since 110,000 feet or so above the planet's surface.

## With 6 Seniors Departing Saturday

**Fordy to Fight for .500 Average Against Indiana**

For the first time in Coach Fordy Anderson's six years at State, MSU's basketball team will be fighting for a .500 season when Indiana moves into Jenison Fieldhouse Saturday night at 8:30. The season finale

MSU's current overall record is 10-10. No loss to the high-flying Hoosiers would give the crimson and white their first losing season since 1951. Pete Newell's last year as a Spartan coach, that year MSU had a 9-13 record.

Indiana, riding on the crest of an 11-game winning streak, 10 of them Big 10 games, has seven more sewed up. The Hoosiers will move into town boasting the only conference victory over Ohio State, Big 10 champs.

State, last year's champs, has lost four games in a row and carries a 5-6 league record into the season finale. The Spartans, tied for seventh place with Iowa and one game behind Purdue,

needs a win to earn them into sixth place.

Indiana will be led by #10 Jim "Hoover" Wall Holliday who is the Big 10's sixth leading scorer with a 22.5 average. In Monday night's win over Ohio State Holliday played 31 and one-half minutes less than the Bucks' highly touted Jerry Lucas but scored only three less points and grabbed one less rebound than Lucas.

The other Co-captain, Lance Olson, is the eighth leading scorer with an 18.8 average. Dave Fahn is State's third man in double figures with a 12.0 average.

Six seniors, including three starters will be closing out their college careers at State with Saturday's game. Starters Walker, Olson and John Young will bow out, along with reserves Dave Scott, Larry Fanning and Bill Golis. These players and team manager Jack Ullmer will be honored before the game Saturday night.

**Fencers Off To 'Western' Meet at Iowa**

Six swordsmen carry the MSU hopes to the Big 10 fencing championships Saturday at State University of Iowa.

Traveling to Iowa City will be Chuck Schmittner, Jr. and Art Dowd, senior; Dick Lawless and Bill McNamara, sophomore; Steve Arnest and Don Johnson, freshmen.

Schmittner, a junior, was high man again with a 10-3 open record and 10-5 in foil. He earned the third place medal in epee dueling and eighth spot in the NCAA tourney last year.

Arnest, who finished with a 13-14 mark, placed fourth in the conference and 15th in the NCAA a year ago.

Dowd, Birmingham senior, broke even with 13-13 for the season. Johnson was 12-17.

Bill McNamara, a first year man with a 12-18 total, and Dick Lawless, 15-15, found out the team.

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
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
