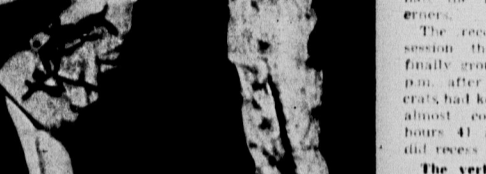

Democrats Set Record In Oratory

Defeat Predicted In Closure Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate finally quit its nonstop talking about civil rights Tuesday night and set for Thursday morning a vote on whether to halt the filibuster by Southern Democrats. The record-breaking oratorical session that started Feb. 29 finally ground to a halt at 8:10 p.m. after 19 Southern Democrats had kept the words flowing almost continuously for 137 hours 41 minutes. The Senate did recess over Sunday. The verbal marathon by the civil rights opponents for outlasted the previous champion filibuster, the 1954 filibuster against an atomic energy bill. That took 85 hours 21 minutes. The recess until 1:30 A.M. (EST) today was agreed to by the Democratic and Republican leaders after a day of parliamentary maneuvering in which civil rights advocates succeeded in forcing a vote on closure—ending the debate—on Thursday morning. Leaders of both parties predicted defeat of the petition, Vice President Richard Nixon reportedly took himself out of the squabble. The closure move will fail unless it gets the backing of two-thirds of the senators present. But until the Thursday vote, at least, senators will be able to get some sleep at night. Nixon's position was reported by Republican leader Everett Dirksen of Illinois and Sen. Jacob Javits (R-NY) after they huddled with the vice president for 20 minutes in the rear of the Senate chamber. Dirksen also told newsmen he hopes the Senate will vote directly on a northern coalition's proposal to allow court action to halt any alleged violation of an individual's civil rights. Javits is one of the proposal's most fervent supporters. Dirksen opposes it. So does Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader. Javits, with agreement from Dirksen, said he is convinced Nixon is "absolutely for" the administration package now before the Senate. This provides for court-appointed referees to assure voting rights, but also would strengthen court desegregation rulings, crack down on hate bombings and give authority of law to a commission Nixon now heads to eliminate discrimination among workers on government contracts. Javits said he was unable to enlist Nixon's support for the move to shut off debate. Nixon Monday encouraged Republicans to sample the temper of GOP senators toward closure, or winding up the oratory. Dirksen reported that the necessary two-thirds seemed to be lacking. Johnson has no concluded all goal. Nixon, Javits said, now "feels every man is on his own." Actually the civil rights tussle could go on for weeks to come yet. What ended tonight were the round-the-clock sessions which have gone on since a week ago Monday, with only Sunday off.

Athletics, Discrimination, ROTC Leaders Cover Local Topics

Discussions of the proposed ban on post-season athletics by the Western Conference, racial discrimination in housing, NAACP's picketing of local stores and the ROTC controversy, highlighted Tuesday's Spartan Round Table meeting at Cowles house.

President John A. Hannah said the conference has an important academic function as well as its better-known sports reputation.

"Big 10 schools have a prominent leadership role among American universities," he said, "although our athletic ties provide us with some fine hearty rivals—one of the reasons MSU made a real effort to join the group."

Hannah again declined to state a position on compulsory ROTC, in answer to a question by Veterans Assn. President Bob Renbarger.

"The defense department now thinks it is necessary," he replied. "It will probably modify or change its views in months or years to come, but I won't call them wrong now."

Hannah said the Eisenhower administration will probably avoid the question of the necessity of current U.S. defense policy, but that the following one will probably.

"Civil defense in the United States today is nonsense," he said. "Its workers have good intentions, but it couldn't stand up under actual warfare."

Round Table also discussed the proposed Michigan State medical school and heard a report on Hannah's South America trip.

U.S. Rescues Russians Adrift on Pacific Ocean

HONOLULU (AP)—Four Russian soldiers, safe on a U.S. aircraft carrier after drifting 49 days in the Pacific, told their rescuers Tuesday they got so hungry they ate shoe leather.

The men, picked up about 11 p.m. EST Sunday by the aircraft carrier Kearsarge, appeared to be recovering as the carrier steamed toward San Francisco. Each lost 35 to 40 pounds.

The skipper of the Kearsarge, Capt. Robert Townsend of Harlingen, Texas, messaged their story to Pacific Fleet Headquarters at Pearl Harbor.

The men said they were on training exercises in a 50-foot landing craft off Hokkaido Island in the Kuriles, north of the Japanese Hokkaido Island. A severe storm swept them to the southwest.

They drifted about 1,000 miles. They lost control of the boat and were swept out to sea. Townsend reported. "They had only vodka, three cans of jerky beef and one loaf of bread." The navy said their only water was gathered from rainfall.

The Russians asked Tuesday where they were being sent and expressed a strong desire to return to their homeland. They

Red China to Explode Small Atomic Bomb

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Communist China plans to join the nuclear club this month by exploding a small atomic bomb with Soviet help, a member of Parliament said Tuesday.

Dr. Raghuvira, who claims to have wide contacts in China, said the date for the test is March 28.

He told Parliament the explosion would be set off near Urunchi, the capital of Communist China's far western province of Sinkiang. Western scientists have reported that atomic research is under way in that area, and an atomic explosion would come as no great surprise to them.

Raghuvira said he believed Red China is making more rapid progress in nuclear work than France. He added that he was sure China "already has some kinds of atomic weapons."

"The Chinese are just learners," Raghuvira told a newsman

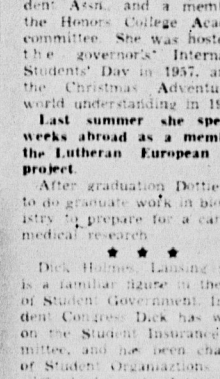

The purposes of these classes are to help alleviate fear through increased understanding and awareness, help parents plan for their expected new arrival, and assist mother and father becoming more aware of, and understanding, what to expect during a normal pregnancy and postpartum period.

Classes are presently being held at Red Cedar School every Tuesday from 7:30-9 p.m., Feb. 22 through April 5, and at Sparrow Hospital every Monday from 7:30-9 p.m., Feb. 22 through April 4.

NEW YORK (AP)—Carol Heiss, 20, is not going to turn professional. She expects to quit competitive skating before 1964. Miss Heiss stepped off a jet plane from Los Angeles and received a rousing welcome at the airport from more than 100 friends, relatives and fans, including her father and brother and sister.

She will receive a ticker tape parade up Broadway today. "I would like it definitely understood," she said, "I am not turning professional and I am not engaged. Those two questions have been asked for the past seven weeks and these are my definite answers."

The 20-year-old New York University student added she was not considering a professional career because: "I am tired after having lived out of a suitcase for the last seven weeks. I don't think I could stand living out of a suitcase 42 weeks."

"I like to live a normal life and I don't think that's a normal life," Pierre Brunet, her coach, said he had received offers from all of the major ice shows and also from Hollywood motion picture studios for Carol's services but all were rejected.

Miss Heiss said she expected to be a spectator at the 1964 Olympics. She explained she would hang up her skates before that time, because a skater "begins at the age of six and reaches her peak between the ages of 18 to 21 years."

Happiest among the welcomers was her father, Edward, who was flanked by his son, Bruce, 16, and another daughter, Nancy, also a skater.

Heiss, a slim baker, said he hasn't seen Carol since she left Jan. 20 to take part in the Olympic Games.

"I watched it all on television," he added. "To tell the truth, I am as happy as a father can feel. We are an ordinary, modest family. To achieve such a tremendous welcome is a great honor."

"I never had any doubt that she would win in the Olympics. But in that competition you never know what is going to happen."

"There is so much pressure on all the athletes, anything can happen."

Bearcats No. 1 In AP Polling

Robertson Leads Team To Top Basketball Slot

Cincinnati's slick Bearcats were the nation's No. 1 college basketball team for 1959-60.

The Associated Press' final poll of the season Tuesday had the Oscar Robertson-led Bearcats perched in the top seat—just where they've been since the first poll was taken in December.

Now it's up to the Ohio five to prove its merit in the NCAA Championships against a talented field that includes California's defending champs, the No. 2 team in the poll.

Since the AP Basketball Poll began in 1949, six of the 11 quintets chosen for the No. 1 rating crowned their campaigns with NCAA titles.

A year ago, however, Kansas State was named the top team and then was upset in the early NCAA eliminations. California, ranked 11th, beat Cincinnati in the semifinals and then edged West Virginia for the title.

Another meeting between Cincinnati and California would set up the game of the year for the hardwood sport.

Overall team balance and experience, sparked by the top-flight individual performances of Terry Moroney and Jib Atack, powered the MSU varsity hockey team to a 10-1 conquest over a fine freshman team at the Ice Arena Tuesday afternoon.

Moroney scored four times and Atack three to supply the bulk of the varsity's goal production; and sophomore Jim Wherley closed the door on freshman forwards in the varsity nets to settle the issue.

The only man to beat Wherley was Art Thomas on a short shot from out front early in the second period.

Although the final score was quite decisive, State fans can look forward to next season with some well-founded anticipation. Freshman defenseman Marty Quirk gave a fine display of stick-handling and body-checking, certain to bolster the Spartans next year, and wingman Bobby Doyle proved himself a smart and accurate man with a stick around the opponent's nets.

Of the top 20, 17 qualified for either the NCAA or National Invitation Tournaments. Nine of the top ten made the post-season classic. Seventh-ranked Indiana led the Western Conference title by one game to Ohio State and is through for the season. Wake Forest was beaten in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tourney by Duke and Auburn on NCAA probation, is ineligible for post-season competition.

No AFL Rookies Will Play In September All-Star Game

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Joe Foss, American Football League commissioner, Tuesday said AFL rookies will not be permitted to play in the September All-Star game in Chicago.

The annual game matches the best of the previous season's seniors and the champion of the National Football League of which the new AFL now is a rival.

"It is definite that our players will not play in the all-star game," Milt Woodard, Assistant Commissioner, said, speaking for Foss.

"We are starting this season. We have no basic team (from previous years). Each team will have 60 players at camp and we have to see how each performs," said Woodard.

Woodard said the AFL schedule will be in its exhibition schedule at the time of the All-Star game. He said the teams simply could not lose the services of the top rookies.

The AFL teams will be made up largely of last year's college seniors.

The 60 players on the AFL will be cut to 33 later in the season.

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NYU, W. Virginia Win Openers; Will Meet in Regionals Friday

 In the opening game of the NCAA Eastern Regional finals at Madison Square Garden today night New York University whipped the University of Connecticut 78-59, on the rebounding of Russ Cunningham.

The second game saw fifth-ranked West Virginia defeat a heavy Navy, 94-86. All-American star Jerry West's scoring, rebounding and play making were the main contributing factors in this win. West scored 34

points for the Mountaineers. The victory sent the Mountaineers, runner up in last year's NCAA championships, into the NCAA semi-finals at Charlotte, N.C. Friday night against streaking New York U.

NYU, playing in the NCAA tournament for the first time in 14 years, looked as if the shock was too much for it until little Cunningham, a 160-pounder, took command with the Violets 10 points behind.

Russ, the team's playmaker, hit seven of 10 shots in the first

half after the Uconn champions of the Yankee Conference for the 10th straight year, had zipped into a 19-9 lead. He added two free throws for a 16 point burst as the 12th ranked Violets outscored Connecticut 31-12 in the 11 minutes and trotted off with a 40-31 halftime lead.

Cunningham was back in his usual playmaker roll in the second half but NYU needed only six minutes to build up a 15 point lead and was never threatened.

At Berden, getting 16 in the second half, led NYU with 23 points. Cunningham had 18. Tom Sanders, leading West Virginia with a 22 point average, had only 11 but was strong on defense and the top rebounder with 15.

Jack Rose, 5-11 Uconn backcourt man, had 15 points while John Pinczynski, Connecticut's leading scorer was held to 10.

The Mountaineers' West's playing was by far his best in New York. He hit 12 of 21 field goals, 10 of 15 free throws, and grabbed 15 rebounds. He also had five assists.

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Many Factors to Blame For Matmen's Showing

Michigan State's wrestling squad did not look good in the Western Conference championships at Ann Arbor this past weekend.

Yet the Spartans should have given a credible performance, at least so say the statisticians.

The question was put to coach Hendley Collins why State did not better than finish third when they had entered as the tournament favorite.

Collins replied this way: "A number of factors entered into it. Ohio State's Dave Canale, normally a 137 pounder, came down to 123 pounds and set out our George Hobbs. Had Canale stayed at 130, he would have probably lost to Spade's Norman Young."

"We counted on Young winning the 130 pound championship," he continued, "instead he lost to Michigan's Ambrose Wilbanks. This was an unexpected blow."

"We also hoped Bob Moser would be better at 157, but we weren't expecting Purdue to go their big man, Bob Marshall, down to that weight class from his normal 167."

Moser, after winning his opening preliminary match, was stopped by the Boilermaker grappler on his second outing.

Summing up Collins said: "We just didn't have it that day. We performed about like we did against Pittsburgh earlier in the season (the Spartans won that one, 15-11). It just shows that way in athletics sometimes."

After Michigan State pulled off a surprising 14-11 win against Michigan one weekend before their journey to Ann Arbor opened, MSU was cast into the championships as the favorite.

"It didn't come about. The favorites, combining rousing spirit and fine team balance, pushed the Spartans out of the bracket along with all others and faced a relatively easy Western Conference title.

"In capturing the crown, Michigan won four of the eight individual weight championships, including the upset of Young in the 130 pound bracket.

"When asked to explain how State was able to defeat their Ann Arbor rival in the season's final meet before the national championships began, Collins explained it this way: "We must have caught Michigan when it was down," he said, "or on the other hand maybe we were wrestling over our heads at the time."

Asked also to comment on the

reason for Michigan's superiority over the rest of the league in the championships, the Spartan mentor said:

"I've never seen a team so aroused as they were. They seemingly could do no wrong. However, they definitely got more than their share of the breaks Michigan shouldn't have done as well as they did."

Young's loss to Wilbanks is an example of the breaks which the Wolverines turned into a means of gaining their victory.

The Spartan wrestler held a 2-1 lead and was on top of the Michigan grappler with but ten seconds remaining in the match.

Then Young made a move to gain a better position, but was caught for a reverse and nearly pinned by the alert Wilbanks and the match was lost.

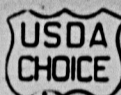


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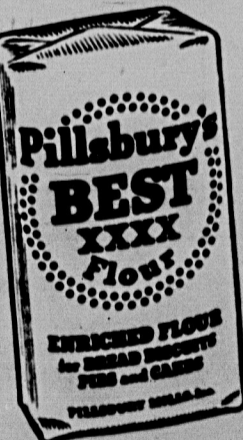
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
