Dirksen, Carey in Row Over Medical Proposal In Senate Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—"Stinking... shameful... insane." In those terms, Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen of Illinois blazed Wednesday at a union chieftain's charge that the Eisenhower Administration shamefully surrendered to Medical and Insurance interests and betrayed the health needs of the aged.

The AFL-CIO's James Carey lashed back at Dirksen: "I know your lack of concern with the needs of the aged in this connection."

As the row waxed hotter before a Senate Subcommittee, the Illinois Clark (D-Pa) came Carey's defense and decried Dirksen's conduct as "undignified" and "uncalled for."

Dirksen, the GOP leader — who had earlier called "stinking" at another labor official's testimony on Monday — stepped from the hearing room.

A bystander to all this was Secretary of Welfare Arthur Flemming who testified he expects within two weeks to be introducing a specific proposal for a program of government-subsidized medical care for the aged.

In general, this would be a voluntary plan based on privately written medical insurance, with federal-state subsidies earmarked to help retired persons meet the cost of their policies.

Pushed closely by Democratic members of the subcommittee studying problems of the elderly, Flemming acknowledged that in more than seven years, the Eisenhower Administration never had come up with a specific recommendation in this field. And he told Clark he was unable to say for certain whether he could get a health care program to Congress before it adjourns probably in early July.

Fund for Polaris Speedup Urged By White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, as expected, Wednesday formally approved shifting defense funds to speed production of Polaris submarines, increase the size of six Atlas intercontinental missile squadrons and improve the ballistic missile warning system.

Eisenhower also stamped his approval on a program not previously announced — revised defense department plans to order substantially more nuclear reactors for Polaris submarines that will be asked for later.

The president's action was announced by Secretary of Defense Thomas Gates Jr. and Deputy Secretary James Douglas after they met at the White House with Eisenhower.

From the day's developments emerged one major new detail of the Air Force's plans to strengthen its Atlas squadrons — to be in place by the end of 1962 — which would have a total of 13 missiles, three more than present plans. It had thought earlier that the squadrons might get as many as 15 missiles and pads.

The Air Force announced on March 25 that it planned to shift 500 million dollars from the not very successful Bomarc B anti-aircraft missiles to the Atlas, to the ballistic missile early warning system and speeding up work on the Midas satellite.

Operation Marathon

ALGIERS (AP)—French Army units have launched a new offensive to smash rebel installations near the Tunisian frontier, headquarters for Algeria said today.

The Army said "Operation Marathon" was begun several weeks ago between two electrical barriers separating Algeria from Tunisia.

Small aircraft and artillery have been bombarding French posts from the border area almost daily.

South Africa Revives Pass System

JOHANNESBURG (AP)—Despite rising appeals for moderation, the government announced Wednesday it will revive South Africa's pass system for non-whites. And police vowed to crush Negroes trying to prolong the dying work boycott against white supremacy rule.

The pass system touched off the current outbreak of racial turmoil. Negroes demonstrated against it on March 21 and police fired into their ranks, killing 72. The pass laws were then suspended.

The violence abated at least temporarily. An annual holiday kept people off the streets, but police and troops staged a strong show of force around native townships.

Justice Minister F. C. Erasmus said in a statement that the police again will be ordered to demand that all Negroes show their passes any time of the day or night.

He did not say when the system will go back into force. He added that the government might look into the possibility of applying the pass laws "in such a way as to put more stress upon the advantage they hold for Negroes."

Erasmus explained that without a pass a Negro could not work in the city or in any other area reserved for whites.

After the passes were suspended, many Negroes jubilantly burned their passes—a hated symbol of their second-class status in jobs, housing, education and civil rights.

Erasmus said the police will help Negroes without passes to obtain temporary documents until they can receive duplicates.

The police pressed their campaign against the boycott, which crippled much of the nation's industry for a time. They charged the movement had been taken over by hoodlums.

"No stone will be left unturned to bring these gangster elements to book," said Col. C. D. Van Wyk, Deputy Commissioner of National Police at Pretoria. He charged they are bent upon "to-appeal leaders of the native political organizations."

Van Wyk called on citizens to help the police by asking anyone suspected of intimidating Negroes into staying away from work.

"These lawless elements have all of a sudden taken the role of freedom fighters," he said. "Most of them have not the faintest idea what this anti-pass campaign is all about. They do not even know they pass in it because it offers them the usual opportunity to rob and steal."

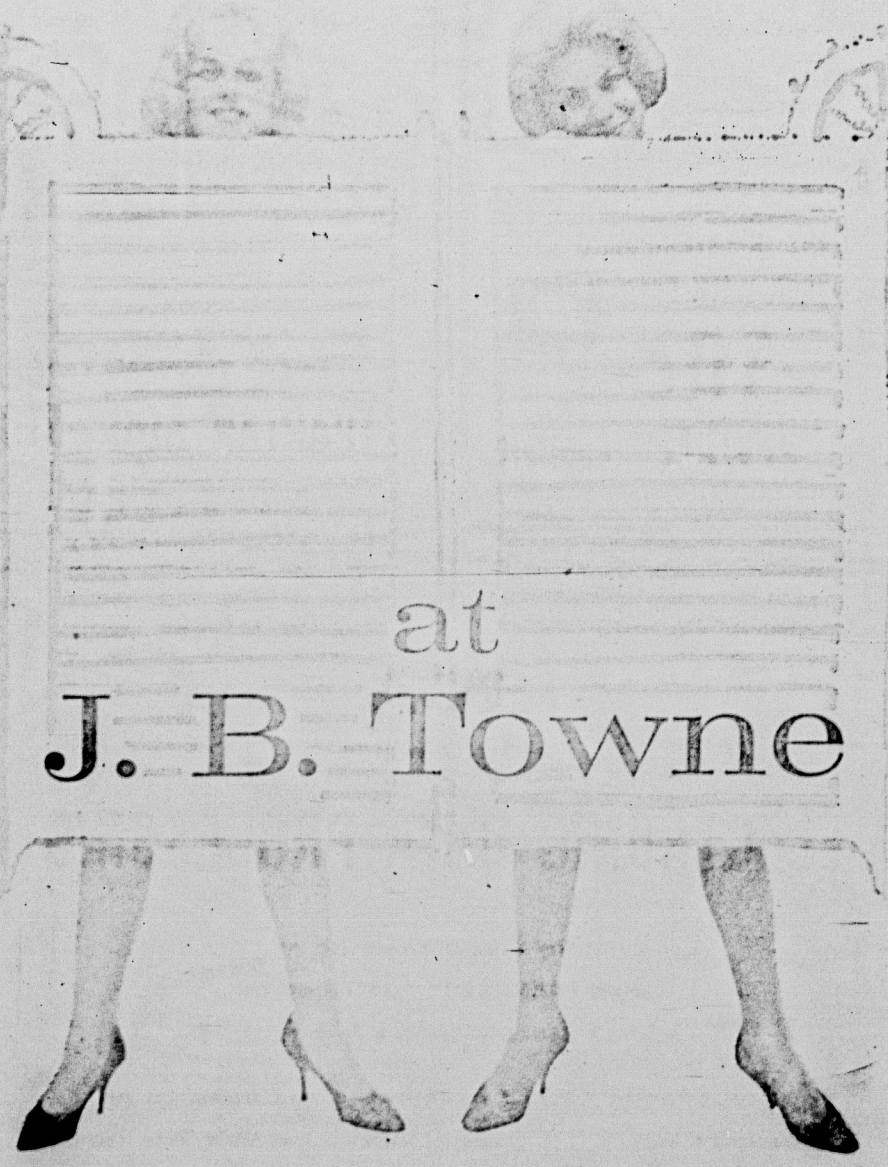

"A very romantic notion," said a French Embassy spokesman, "but that suit would hardly do today. Since then the President has put on 30 pounds."

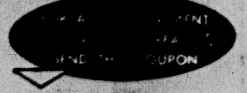

Politicians Don't Like Real Fights

WASHINGTON (AP) — Politicians always claim they like nothing so much as a good fight, but they don't mean it. Like the rest of us, what they yearn for is the sure thing, the can't-miss proposition.

Yet if the Wisconsin primaries proved anything, which may be doubtful, they do point to this: even a sure thing has its hazards.

For Vice President Richard Nixon, who has the Republican presidential nomination securely locked up, ran third and last in Wisconsin Tuesday.

This can be easily explained, and explainers rushed in with their explanations so quickly they obviously had had them ready long before the voting was done.

Republicans who crossed over to vote Democratic—for a varie-

ty of reasons, some of them devils—will come home when it counts in November . . . 361,463 votes are splendid for a man running without opposition . . . history shows a man can do poorly when running unopposed in a primary and yet win convincingly in the election.

But one stark fact remains: Sen. John Kennedy (D-Mass), who ran first, and Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn), who ran second, collectively wound up with over a half million more votes than Nixon got.

If a fight does nothing else, it at least puts to flight a politician's relentless foe: voter apathy.

Yet the feeling persists if we can settle all this among ourselves, we will save ourselves all kinds of messy embarrassment.

Look at this quote, calling for harmony and gentleness and sweetness among Democratic contenders:

"If we split the party before the convention, then Nixon will walk in."

And who issued this warning? A man who often has been to politics what gasoline is to a fire. Harry Truman.

'Cure' Test By Fungus Attempted

A common type of fungus known to many people as "water mold" could replace mice as a means of testing potential cancer cures.

The two MSU scientists who developed the technique report it has worked in eight out of eight tests.

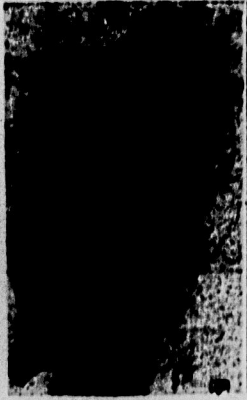
In each test a different tumor inhibitor supplied by the National Institutes of Health was detected in six hours, say Dr. Everett Bencke, professor of botany and plant pathology, and Dr. Yamuna Lingappa, research associate.

Using mice it takes seven days to tell whether or not a substance has tumor-inhibiting properties.

The fungus method is now being tested further. NIH sends unnamed substances to Michigan State. Dr. Lingappa must tell with the fungus assay which ones are tumor inhibitors.

If it proves effective the technique could be used to screen the thousands of compounds sent to NIH and pharmaceutical companies every year for testing.

The usual method is to test unknown substances on mice with tumors. In addition to taking seven days for results, this technique involves costs of rais-

ing and infecting large numbers of a particular strain of mice.

The reason the fungus makes a good test, Dr. Lingappa explained, may be because its growth is similar in some respects to the wild rapid growth of a tumor.

The project is supported by a grant to MSU from the American Cancer Society.

Methodists Plan Apr. 10 Dedication

For the 3,800 Methodist-preference students attending MSU, the largest concentration of Methodist college students in the state, Palm Sunday, April 10, will have more than usual significance.

A cornerstone will be laid at 3 p.m. for the \$225,000 Wesley Foundation building which in September will become the center of Methodist activity here.

Bishop Marshall Reed of Detroit, head of Michigan Methodism, will address students, university officials, townpeople, outstate Methodists, and the general public at South Harrison and Sever Drive where actual construction is already underway.

A small copper box will be filled by Wesley Foundation student officers with what they consider will be "interesting to find there a hundred years or so from now." The box will be sealed in a marble cornerstone.

Dr. Harold Riley, associate professor of agricultural economics and chairman of the Wesley Foundation board of directors, and the Rev. George Jordan, minister-director of the Foundation, will participate in the ceremonies.

An "open house" at Wesley house, 343 Park Lane, will follow.

Financed largely by Michigan Methodists, the structure will

provide a chapel, an assembly and stage, library, classrooms, fellowship hall, lounge, office and counseling rooms, recreational facilities, a nursery, and eating facilities.

Since 1937, Wesley Foundation has had only the physical facilities of Wesley House in East Lansing and what other rooms could be reserved from time to time in campus and near-campus buildings. Prior to the establishment of Wesley Foundation, Methodist students were served, as were most other Protestant students, through College House of Interdenominational Peoples Church of East Lansing.

Japanese Volcano Erupts Three Times

TOKYO (AP) — Mt. Minami, most active of three volcanoes on Sakurajima island, Kagoshima, Southern Japan, erupted three times Monday, spewing black smoke and rocks to a height of 6,000 feet. Japan's Central Meteorological Observatory said the first two eruptions were minor but the third rocked nearby villages. There were no reports of casualties or damage.

Geologists Launch New Attack On Michigan Oil Exploration

Summer Mapping To Provide Clues

Plans for a long-range research program that promises to provide valuable clues in future exploration of Michigan's untapped oil deposits were announced Wednesday.

A strong geophysical program with this aim in mind has been laid out by Dr. William J. Hinze, assistant professor of geology, with the aid of other geologists and graduate students in his department. Active field work will start this summer.

The state's untapped oil deposits are "substantial," Dr. Hinze said.

"This seems to be the general opinion of many geologists who have made extensive studies of what is referred to geologically as the Michigan basin," he added.

Michigan is prevented from realizing its full potential as a producer of oil by obstacles that hinder the petroleum explorer in locating oil fields. Chiefly responsible are the types of subsurface structures, the great depths of producing horizons, and the glacial drift covering the basin in depths of up to 1,000 feet.

Among the several important steps of the proposed program is a field study leading to a complete magnetic map of Michigan and adjoining areas. Preliminary studies indicate that this information will be valuable both for petroleum and mineral exploration when tied to other geophysical and geological data. A part of the study will be carried out this summer when a graduate student and wife, Mr. and Mrs. George Secor, East Lansing, will make magnetic and gravity measurements in three counties at the west end of the upper peninsula, Gogebic, Ontonagon and Iron.

Among other aspects of the extensive research program is a physical property study of the rocks of the Michigan basin. Of special significance will be densities of outcropping layers of rocks, densities of well cuttings, and the effects of geological structures on rock densities.

Knowledge of preglacial drainage patterns studied by geophysical techniques also will be used as a possible aid in locating significant structures in the basin that may indicate oil deposits. These preglacial drainage patterns also will be helpful in the search for ground water reservoirs, it was explained.

Still another phase of the research program will involve an investigation of the possible relationship between bedrock seismic velocities and fracture zones that are known to act as petroleum reservoirs.

"Not only will this program be highly valuable as training and experience for our geology graduate students, but we expect to make valuable contributions to the already existing knowledge in the petroleum exploration field," Dr. Hinze explained.

"We hope to increase the effectiveness of currently applied geophysical methods of exploration and in particular develop

new methods specially adapted to the Michigan basin.

"New methods of exploration may come from the application of entirely new methods, revision in present methods, and new correlations between geological features and the occurrence of petroleum."

Lack of some essential equipment is the big obstacle confronting the geology department at present. Several oil companies have donated some expensive

units, but others not available through departmental budgets will be needed before the project can go far.

Dr. Hinze said that the aim of the department is to develop its geophysical section to a facility that will be a rich training ground for prospective petroleum geologists and geophysicists and at the same time make substantial contributions to the development of Michigan as an oil state.

The course will carry three hours of credit and will be telecast by WMSB (TV), Channel 16, Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday throughout spring term, 6 to 6:30 p.m., April 13 through June 9.

Shakespeare has been a discursive topic among literate people for more than two centuries with the result that many of his phrases and illustrations have become ordinary parts of our speech, the situations in his plots a part of our folklore, and his characters known to most people almost independent of the plays in which they appear.

This television course is designed to offer a broader understanding and appreciation of Shakespeare to viewers in this area.

A distinguished scholar, Weisinger came to MSU in 1942, being named a full professor in 1954. He was a member of the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, 1948-49; Senior Research Fellow, Warburg Institute, London, 1950-52; and accepted a Howard Fellowship for 1953-56. He was unable to accept either of two offers for Fulbright Fellowships to Israel.

Art Session Scheduled In Summer

The university's 1960 summer session will include a fine arts festival of workshops and seminars in the fields of music, art, dance, theater and landscape architecture.

Participating in various summer school seminars and workshops as well as festival activities will be music conductor Robert Shaw, artist Morris Kantor, dancer Mary Anthony, motion picture critic Richard Griffith, landscape architect Garrett Eckbo and others.

Scheduled to open July 18, the Fine Arts Festival will continue through July 21, thus being available to students who attend either the five-week or ten-week summer sessions. The ten-week session and the first five-week session will begin June 21.

Robert Shaw is known by his many best-selling recordings and annual concert tours as director of The Boston Symphony. He is also associate conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra and has appeared as guest conductor with the Boston Symphony and other leading orchestras. He has been director of choral music at the Berkshire Music Center and also at the Juillard School of Music. Professional painter Morris Kantor has exhibited in national shows in the U. S. since 1929 and has had numerous one-man shows. He is represented in permanent collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Modern Museum of Art, Art Institute of Chicago and other galleries and museums.

Mary Anthony, a leading exponent of the modern school of interpretative dancing, has been active as dancer and choreographer in concert, television and musical comedy. She has ap-

peared in London and was in the vanguard of those American choreographers who introduced Italian audiences to modern dance through the medium of musical comedy.

Modern picture critic and author Richard Griffith has been curator of the Museum of Modern Art Film Library in New York City since 1951. Author of "The Film - Till Now," "The World of Robert Flaherty" and other books, Griffith has been New York film correspondent for the Los Angeles Times since 1949.

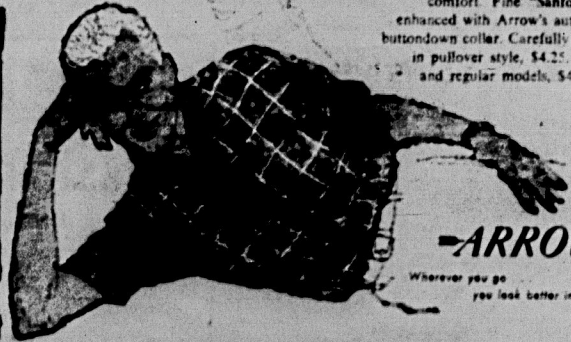

Archaeological excavations of a Mayan City, banana plantations, fishing villages, and the picturesque market of Chichicastenango are among the fascinating Central American sites that will be presented by Soule in his film.

Senate Rejects Two Rights Bill Amendments

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Wednesday quickly rejected two southern-sponsored amendments to narrow the scope of the voting rights provisions of the house-passed Civil Rights bill.

It failed and thus killed, 72-18, an amendment of Sen. Sam Ervin Jr. (D-NC) to limit to Congressional elections the authority for Federal Court registration of Negroes and others found to have been denied voting rights because of racial discrimination.

Then, by a vote of 68-18 it similarly killed an amendment of Sen. Olin Johnson (D-SC) to exempt racial and primary elections from a requirement for preservation of voting records for 22 months after an election.

Johnson's amendment, tabled as ordered by Republican Leader Everett Dirksen of Illinois, was directed at a part of the bill requiring that voting records be kept and made available to the U.S. Attorney General for inspection on demand.

The other amendment was made by Sen. Thomas Kuchel of California
