State Second In Michigan Intercollegiate Events

SPARTAN THINCLADS PLACE SIX POINTS BEHIND WINNING YPSI NORMAL SQUAD IN CLOSE MEET

Clark Chamberlain Sets New Varsity Record for Mile Run in Torrid Race by Nosing Out Swartz of Western State With Great Sprint.

IN SPITE of a brilliant mile run by Clark Chamberlain and other performances that exceeded the hopes of even the optimistic Spartan track followers, a strong, well-balanced team of track and field men from Michigan Normal shaded Michigan State by six points in the State Intercollegiate meet at the stadium Saturday. Competition was keen all the way, shown by the fact that seven meet records fell. The Ypsi team, riding up lead after lead during the afternoon, only to see it wiped out by sterling Spartan performances, were forced to win the final event, the mile relay, in order to definitely cinch the crown.

In taking their place at the top of the State track heap for the first time since 1926, the Hurons chalked up 41 1/2 points. Michigan State garnered 38 1/2, Detroit City 31, W. S. N., who won the title in 1930, took 29, University of Detroit picked up 11, and Adrian and Hillsdale each accounted for four apiece.

Few people who saw the mile race between Clark Chamberlain of State and Ray Swartz of Western State will ever forget it. The first event on the program, it was easily the high spot of the meet, packed with more than the usual amount of punch because of the fact that it was just a year ago that Swartz outraced the field in the same meet to chalk up the third fastest mile in America last year, incidentally beating Chamberlain. Swartz, on his toes Saturday to keep his record clean, bounced out in the lead as the gun cracked and set a terrific mile pace for the first quarter, and Chamberlain was content to stay behind. Clark took the lead at the 440 mark, and the two necked by the half-mile in 2:04 a clip that would have resulted in a new world record had they kept it up. The third quarter was nearly a fast Swartz hanging doggedly on the flying Spartan's heels. On the run lap as the two raced down the straightaway on the far side of the track, the Western State ace put on a

Spartans' Biggest Thrills in Sport

Arthur Haga, Basketball Star, Recalls High Spots in Fourteen Years of Court Play

IT'S a long way from the basketball hoop on the family garage to Michigan State's splendid court in Demonstration Hall but that is the road that Art Haga has traveled to achieve the distinction of being one of State's greatest guards. In fourteen years, the blonde-haired Michigan player has been playing basketball. In fact Art Haga practically discarded his nursing bottle for a basketball.

Western Michigan is noted for its high class basketball squads and naturally it was fitting that a performer like Haga should get his start there. Art played with Michigan high school, but then Grand Haven high school plays good basketball too. The latter won the class A championship. Haga had to copy three great buttons first, popped off Grand Haven in case you haven't realized it is his home town.

The first court team Art Haga ever played on was the Red Tigers, a Michigan Y outfit. When not practicing in the Y gym he and Carl Felt, a former Spartan, started to practice boosting the ball through the hoop in Haga's back yard. He was one of the outstanding stars on Michigan Y teams for several years.

After playing in Muskegon high school he saw more action on the Y court and in various teams throughout the state. I asked Art if he remembered any outstanding games while wearing the Y uniform. He didn't. Then I asked him if he didn't remember any Y court games when he was really hot. Then he told me of a game at a little town called Heppena. In that game he really was hot. In fact every player was hot that evening, and when one of them ran into the line that was on the playing floor he was more than hot, he was scorched.

Art Haga was captain of the varsity court team his first year in school and saw action in every game. In three years of varsity competition he has never failed to play at least a few minutes in every game. That to my mind is quite a record.

It was in 1928 that Haga played his first game on the varsity against the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. The game ended with a Spartan victory. In that game Haga played against Art MacDonald, a boy who had played with him on the Muskegon Y team. The blonde-haired Spartan was a highly important tool in State's court machine for but the Spartans were forced to accept a bitter and more or less close 36 to 35 defeat.

Ample revenge for the Marston defeat was secured the past season however, when State's guards journeyed east and completely outclassed the Marston on successive nights. The first game ended with a 41 to 31 State victory and the second Colgate exhibition resulted in a score of 50 to 30 in favor of the Spartans.

In four years of college basketball Art Haga has experienced many court thrills. The first and last game of any athlete invariably leaves the biggest impression. The Michigan game in 1928 proved highly enjoyable to State's veteran guard because it was his first experience on the varsity and then to be was playing against an old "buddy" from Muskegon. The Marquette game which was Haga's last college appearance, furnished him with the experience he remembers most vividly.

The Spartans had flown to Milwaukee to engage Marquette University. In the season's finale on the Hilltoppers floor, Coach Van Alstyne's men had defeated them by a score of 19 to 16 earlier in the season and the Milwaukee team was all set to avenge the loss. State held the lead until the final minutes of play when Marquette forged ahead. With only a few seconds to play the Spartans tied the score at 16 all. Before the ball was in action before the final gun barked and an overtime period was ordered. Marquette, with their hearts set on a win, again took the lead and the bottom fell out of Spartan stock. Michigan State's careers were not the kind to be discouraged and the two Spartan guards accounted for three baskets in rapid succession before the game ended. Michigan State 24 Marquette 21. Art Haga was the high scorer of the evening and had made one of the decisive baskets in the overtime period but the biggest thrill came when the other Spartan whipped two perfect shots through the meshes to clinch a victory. The other State player was Wayne Scott. Haga's team played for four years.

KOBSMEN IDLE DURING EARLY PART OF WEEK

First of Three Tilts With Maize and Blue Scheduled for Old College Field. WORK HARD FOR GAME

This is rather a slim week for Spartan sports competition, but the Michigan State University of Michigan baseball game here Saturday will more than make up for the lack of competition during the remainder of the week. The first Saturday is the first of a three-game series with the Wolverine club and the State players will be out to score a victory over their most bitter rivals as the Kobsmen are defending the collegiate diamond championship of Michigan against last year and must score triumph in two of their games with Maize and Blue to have a clean claim to the title this year.

Coach John H. Kobs only watched his team take two drubbing from the Hoes university team champions of Japan last week. The Spartans have no reason to feel ashamed about losing to the Japanese as they presented a speedy class team here. Good pitching was in a measure responsible for the Spartans' defeat as the two Hoes hurlers to work showed well high perfect control and gave the State sluggers very few good balls to hit. Just as though this wasn't enough, the Red Japs fielders robbed the Spartans of many slouts into the outfield that would certainly have been hits against any other team that has appeared here in recent years.

But Coach Kobs had a splendid opportunity to take heart when his proteges jumped on three Central State Teachers college in pounding out a 16 to 5 victory. The Spartans did some heavy hitting gathering 17 safeties. Of these seven were for extra bases. Art Haga, who recently established himself as a slugging first baseman when he drove out three triples. Chum, Curt Peterson, connected for two dinks, and Charles Griffin and Al Fisher also drove out two-base hits. If the Spartans keep their hitting eyes after trouncing the Central Teachers at M. Pleasant last week they should have a good chance to beat Michigan Saturday.

Coach Kobs is drilling his charges hard this week in preparation for what seems to be one of the most important games of the season.

PREP TRACK MEN MEET THIS WEEK

Nearly 900 High School Thin-clads to Appear in State Stadium.

Michigan State college will be hosts to nearly 900 high school track men Friday and Saturday, May 22 and 23 when the prep school athletes of the state compete in the State Intercollegiate championships at the stadium. Four classes, A, B, C, and D will be represented.

For the first time since the inception of these championships, Detroit schools will not be present in the metropolitan area having failed to continue their athletic endeavors inside the city. Preliminary will be held Friday at 4 p. m. on all events except the high jump, pole vault, 440 yard distance runs and the relay. The finals will begin at 10 Saturday morning.

These high school contestants representing the cream of the state's younger athletic talent will be quartered at fraternities, hotels and private homes during their brief stay in East Lansing.

Frosh Net Team Displays Class Against Normal

Michigan State this year is represented by one of the classiest freshman tennis teams in history and they had far to go through their entire schedule without a single defeat. Last Saturday afternoon they completely outclassed Western State freshmen by a score of 5 to 1. Horticultural Men Back From Upper Peninsula Work

Prof. H. Hudson and W. J. Phillips returned Saturday from the upper peninsula where they spent a week working on the control of the cherry case beetle, an insect affecting cherry trees. They reported that the work they had done previously is showing good results.

This insect is said to be the ruin of the cherry business near Grand Bay, Wis., and three years ago it was found in the upper peninsula. Horticultural men there used various methods, then used to cure the trees. Prof. Hudson has been developing new sprays with which he hopes to control this orchard pest.

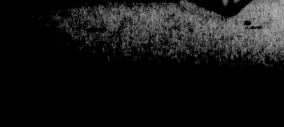
