In a few cases, at the request of the department concerned, the final examination has been scheduled by the single hour lecture section and in some instances students may encounter conflicts. In that event, the examination scheduled by the class meeting two hours each week will take precedence over the examination scheduled by the single hour lecture. The examination will be arranged between the student and the department requesting or scheduling of its examination.

All instructors having examinations from 8:10 a.m. and from 1:30-3:30 p.m. are requested to terminate their examinations promptly so that rooms and buildings may be cleared for the examination periods which follow.

British Historian To Lecture Here In Spring Term

D. W. Brogan, world-famous British political scientist and historian, will be MSU's Distinguished Visiting Professor in history during Spring Term 1961.

Professor Brogan's book "The American Character" has been a text in MSU classes for several years. He is tentatively scheduled to teach History 499, a survey of national character,

Including consideration of American, British and French modern civilizations.

His 17 books, mostly dealing with the United States, have included biographies of Franklin D. Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln. His controversial re-evaluation of the U.S. Civil War appeared recently in Harper's magazine.

Of Irish descent and Scottish birth, Brogan has earned degrees from Glasgow, Balliol, Oxford, and Harvard. He is now professor of political science and fellow at Peterhouse, Cambridge University.

Political Science Faculty Members Publish Booklets

The Bureau of Social and Political Research last week published two booklets by members of the political science department to aid Michigan citizens in understanding the state's political processes.

"A Guide to Michigan Politics" by Dr. Joseph LaPalombara, department head, describes the processes. His work was supported by the Citizenship Clearing House, a national civic improvement organization.

Professor Herbert Garfinkel and L. J. Fein, assistant instructor, Bureau of Social and Political Research, collaborated on "Fair Representation," a summary of arguments surrounding the current issue of legislative reapportionment.

Timely Hitting Gives Spartans 6-5 Triumph in Season's Finale

A double by Pat Sartorius in the bottom of the ninth inning drove in the winning run as MSU closed its baseball season with a 6-5 win over Western Michigan Saturday.

Sartorius' hit, his third of the game, scored winning pitcher Mickey Sinks from first base. Sinks had reached first when he was hit by a pitched ball.

The Spartans finished with a season record of 17 wins and 13 losses. They had a conference mark of 4-7, good enough for eighth place.

Bob Ross shared the hitting honors for the game with a home run and a single in four at bats.

run in the third inning. Bronco pitcher Gene Cooley walked and went to third when Western's hitting star of the day, Bill Randall, pushed a bunt past first baseman Bill Schudlich for a single. Cooley then scored on Frank Quille's grounder to second.

The Spartans roared right back in the bottom of the third with three runs. Jerry Lumianski singled to left to start the inning and went to second on Sinks' sacrifice. Sartorius then slammed a 370-foot double off the left field fence, scoring Lumianski. Sartorius also scored when Golden cracked a double to the opposite field. After Schudlich grounded out, Golden crossed the plate on Ross' single with the third run of the inning.

Western tied the score in the fifth. A single, an error and a sacrifice put a man on third. Randall then hit a slow bouncer to shortstop Golden who fired to the plate. But catcher Jim Collins missed the tag.

The second run scored later in the inning with a man on first and third and one out. A grounder ball was hit to third baseman Lumianski who fired to second to force the first base runner. The relay to first was too late to double the batter! Schudlich fired to the plate attempting to cut down the run but his throw was short and Collins' lunging tag was not in time.

In the same inning, Ross' blast into the river gave Slate the lead.

The Broncos fought back to tie the score in the seventh as Randall's circuit clout over the right field fence with a man on base. This set the stage for Sartorius' deciding blow in the last of the ninth.

Golden closed out his college career with a perfect day after and at the plate. He had a double, a single, two sacrifices and an RBI for his day's work.

Ross' hitting in the past three games gave the Spartans hope for a bit more hitting punch next season. He closed the season with seven hits and a .389 batting average to lead the team.

The other top batters for the season with 10 or more at bats: Bob Monczka (.283); Don Sackett (.278); Sartorius (.258); Schudlich (.259); Golden (.238); John Hendee (.236).

Tigers Split With Indians

CLEVELAND (AP)—Bobby Locke, acquired by Cleveland three days ago, pitched a six-hit shutout in his first start of the season Sunday, as the Cleveland Indians trounced Detroit, 9-0, in the second game of a doubleheader.

The Tigers won the opener, 7-2, on the six-hit pitching of Jim Bunning, coupled with homers by Rocky Colavito and Steve Bilko.

Locke, 26, recalled Thursday from Indianapolis, limited Detroit to six hits and allowed only two runners to reach third base. He walked two and struck out four.

Jim Piersall hit his seventh home run of the season. Hank Foiles—also acquired last week—got his first for the Tribe.

In the first game, 28-year-old Jim Bunning went the distance, scattering six hits and striking out four batters. The victory was his second against three losses.

Colavito, a former Indian, accounted for three of Detroit's seven runs in the opener. He contributed his seventh four-bagger of the season along with a double and a single in four times at bat.

Bilko also homered in the Tigers' 12-hit assault against three Cleveland pitchers.

Lyman Frimodig Retires July 1 From Spartan Athletic Scene After 41 Years; MSU Legend

Retiring July 1 after over 41 years with the athletic department is the business manager of athletics, Lyman Frimodig.

Frimodig, a living legend of the vast Michigan State University sports scene, leaves behind a distinguished record of both participating in and managing Spartan athletics.

A 1917 graduate of Michigan Agricultural College, a forerunner of MSU, Frimodig earned 10

athletic letters—four in basketball, four in baseball and two in football.

As a basketball player, he once scored 30 points in a single game, a record which stood for more than 25 years.

In 1919, Frimodig returned to MSU as a freshman football, basketball and baseball coach. He later was promoted to a professor of health, physical education and recreation.

Frimodig was appointed busi-

ness manager of athletics in 1922, where he has remained. In this capacity, he has accumulated 175,000 miles in plane, train and bus by accompanying the football team on road trips.

An era has ended—one where Frimodig has seen a small college grow into a giant university, where sports remains both a tradition and an attraction.

The recent Varsity-Old Timers

football game was dedicated to Frimodig. He was honored as Michigan State's sportsman for 42 years by Athletic Director

"Biggie" Munn at the game. Frimodig looks back upon his long association with MSU as a "very satisfying experience."

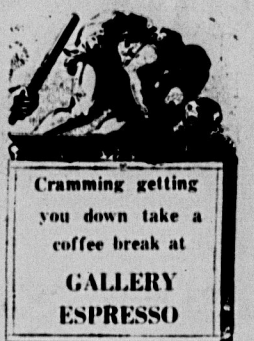

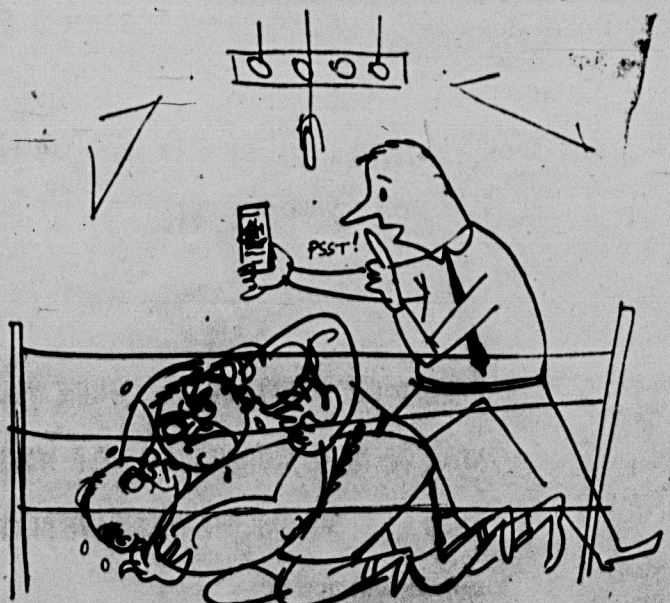

Had William Wyler decided that all those 1,250,000 feet of film he expended in the making of his colossal \$15,000,000 production of General Lee, Wallace's novel "Ben-Hur" were available, the resulting product would run continually for nine and one-half days and nights.

It took nine months, but Wyler finally got his project down to three and one-half hours running time with a six and one-half minute overture and a fifteen minute intermission, all told, the viewer is in the theater for four hours.

In addition to this, "Ben-Hur" boasts 450 speaking roles, 10,000 extras, the unprecedented amount of 100,000 costumes, and 300 sets, one of which is purportedly the most expensive ever used in a film.

There are plenty more staggering statistics, but after poring over them all, one might be inclined to question as to whether or not it was really worth all this and eleven Academy Awards. Most who have seen it have decided that it was.

The story commences with the reunion of a peaceful Judean, Ben-Hur and his boyhood friend, Messala, who has become an insatiable Roman tribune, sent back to Jerusalem by the emperor Tiberius to govern the military installation situated there.

When Messala cannot convince Ben-Hur of Roman supremacy, the two part as enemies, and shortly afterward, a Roman governor is accidentally injured while riding the Ben-Hur estate. Seizing an opportunity to make matters of the wealthy family, Messala tosses the mother and sister into a dungeon and sentences Ben-Hur to life imprisonment as a galley slave on a Roman warship.

Three years later, he is adopted by Quintus Arrius, the Roman commander whose life he has saved during a sea battle. He returns to Rome with Arrius for a while but can think only

of gaining revenge on Messala and finding his mother and sister who he later discovers have contracted leprosy and have been banished to the Valley of the Lepers.

He is persuaded by the Arab Sheik Ilderim to race against Messala in the chariot games staged in the Roman arena at Jerusalem. This, he is assured by the Sheik, is the one way he can have vengeance on Messala

without affronting his God. "Accidents are very common in the arena!"

The race ends in victory for Ben-Hur.

He finds his mother and sister, and their leprosy miraculously erased as he unaccountably tries to prevent the crucifixion of Christ. As the film closes, Ben-Hur and his love Esther look forward to a new era.

As a maker of spectacles, William Wyler stands very well in the late Cecil B. DeMille's stead. In fact, with "Ben-Hur," he has bested anything DeMille did. For excitement, there is the chariot race which is probably the most thrilling eleven minutes on film, or pathos, there is the crucifixion sequence for humor, there is the humane Shiek creatively played by Hugh

Gaffin; otherwise historically, there is Charlton Heston who outdoes himself to such an extent that this may prove to be the highlight of his career. Stephen Boyd who has never been so well cast and directed, Jack Hawkins as Quintus Arrius, Martha Scott as Ben-Hur's mother, Cathy O'Donnell as his sister, the late George Beigh as Tiberius, and Frank Thring as Pon-

tius, Pilate. For film making flair, there is the gorgeous color photography (on a 65 millimeter print) of Robert Surtees with a sharpness and clarity such as I have never seen before; a six channel stereophonic sound track; a musical score aptly suited to the film but scarcely worth having around for listening pleasure.

In short, "Ben-Hur" has just

about everything. One reviewing organ summed it up exactly in saying that "Ben-Hur" is "A motion picture phenomenon even the capricious must see."

At present this feature is still playing on a reserved-seat basis as specially equipped theaters in Michigan, the United Artists Theatre, Detroit.
