According to Prof. L. C. Emmons, disregard of this request will be considered a breach of discipline and will be subject to administrative action.

Poulson and Granum Win Wolverine Positions in Closely Contested Race

Successful in Race for Yearbook Management

Chamberlain, Clark, Sandstrom Receive Presidencies

Isabelle Poulson, Elected to Managing Editor of Year Book. Is First Co-ed to Ever Hold Major Job on Campus; Contest Is Highlight of College Election.

FINAL ELECTIONS held yesterday in the Union to select the editor and business manager of the Wolverine, an athletic representative to the Student Council, cheerleader, and the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer of next year's senior, junior, and sophomore classes resulted in a fairly heavy vote in the all-college elections, heavy votes in the junior and sophomore class, and a comparatively light vote in the freshman class.

The amendment to the constitution that would allow junior representatives to the Student Council to serve two years, backed by a small margin the necessary two-thirds majority vote to put it in force. The vote was 105, 112, 0, 266. This same amendment lost by a similar percentage in the election last spring.

Isabelle Poulson, a liberal arts student from Grand Rapids, has the honor of holding the first co-ed ever to hold the position of managing editor of the Wolverine. Miss Poulson received 309 votes to 259 for John Jennings, a Lansing business administration student.

In the race for business manager, James Granum, East Lansing, received second honor and defeated Howard Conrad, Lanark, by 520 votes to 235.

Frank Chamberlain drew 590 ballots to defeat Edward Wiley, with 216, for athletic representative to the Student Council. Leslie Fincke was unopposed for cheerleader, but mischance came when cast for Harold Dean, Bony Vale, Jerry McCaffin, Edna Kirtley, and others.

In the junior class, Clark Chamberlain, Lanark, maintained the lead that he held in the eliminations and defeated Don Warren, St. Joseph, for the presidency. Chamberlain polled 162 votes to 99 for Warren.

The vice-presidency afforded one of the most closely contested races on the entire ballot. Maxine Sturgeson, Davison, scored out Charles Mackinnon, Bay City, by 133 to 126.

Maxine Curtis, Ionia, with 143 votes defeated Katherine Beaudier, East Lansing, with 119 for secretary. Earle Steuble, Benton Harbor, had an easy victory over Bob Fahrman when he received 164 votes to Fahrman's 77.

One of the biggest surprises came in the sophomore class when Jack Clark, East Lansing, who was a poor second in the eliminations, came through with a large lead over Don Pisk, Detroit. Clark polled 188 to Pisk's 104 for the minor presidency.

Fern Furman, Toledo, defeated Dorothy Emmons, East Lansing, for the vice-presidency. The winning candidate drew 105 to 125 for the lower. Natalia Osterberg, East Lansing, won over Betty Lee, Lansing, by 163 votes to 129.

Emery Foster, Cadillac, will be the junior treasurer by virtue of receiving 106 votes to 124 for Walter Weidner, Silesburg.

The freshman class vote was light in comparison with the number of records in similar elections. By a vote of 107 to 94 they elected Harry Sandstrom, South Haven, over Wallace Bryant, LaGrange, Ill. for president.

Bruce Aldrich, Hart, was elected vice-president in a close contest by Josephine Chapman, Detroit. The winner received 110 votes to 90 for the runner-up, Virginia Shaw, East Lansing, who was successful in her race for secretary, drawing 109 votes to 89 for Dorothy Wilbers, Charlevoix.

After being a fair second in the eliminations, Frank Emerick, Detroit, came first for treasurer over Jack Tiekner, Battle Creek. One hundred and five votes were cast for Emerick to 88 for Tiekner.

SPARTAN NINE RETURNS FROM CHICAGO AFTER LOSING GAMES TO MAROONS AND WILDCATS

Kobmen Run Into a Lot of Grief on Jaunt This Week; Lose to Chicago, 10 to 9, Drop Northwestern Game, 5 to 4; Griffin to Start Notre Dame Game.

MICHIGAN STATE'S varsity baseball nine will engage the diamond aggregation of Notre Dame university, South Bend, tomorrow afternoon on the Spartan diamond in the final game of a strenuous week for the Kobmen. University of Indiana will play the Spartans Monday and Tuesday of next week under an arrangement that has just been completed. The Hoosiers were to have appeared for one game only, on Monday, but now have accepted an invitation for a two-day stand. Coming right on the heels of games with Chicago, North-western and Notre Dame, the two games with Indiana mean that the Spartans will have played five contests in eight days.

Coach John Kohn's varsity nine ran into a lot of grief this week on their Chicago jaunt. Tuesday they lost a heart-breaker to the Maroons, 10 to 9, and Wednesday they again lost by a run when they bowed to Northwestern's nine, 5 to 4. The Spartan mentor used his entire mound staff in the two engagements, but the opposing batsmen would not be denied.

The Spartans played great ball against the Maroons on Tuesday afternoon and lost only after the Chicago team had staged a great ninth inning rally netting two runs. The university team made it their ninth consecutive win and are leading the Western Conference together with Illinois.

State collected three hits off of Urban Maroon hurler in the fourth inning and these coupled with a pair of Chicago bobbles brought in five runs. The Kobmen collected four more runs in the fifth to make the score 9 to 4. The Maroons collected three runs in their frame of the fifth and one in the seventh to make the score 9 to 3 at the beginning of the ninth. A Chicago pinch hitter started the scoring that brought the deciding runs in the ninth and a Maroon victory.

All four men have combined this year to score the best share of leading points in nearly every event in which they participated. In the Ohio Relay at Columbus they formed a shuttle hurdle team which pushed Ohio State to a new world's record. Yarger holds the present varsity record of 15.2 in his event, while the low hurdle mark is jointly maintained by Liberty and Russell at 24.5.

It is upon the two-mile race that the attention of track followers in the middle west is focused. When Chamberlain takes his marks in the Eastern classic he will have behind him the knowledge that he has run the fastest mile and two mile races in America this year. Last week at Milwaukee he came within a fraction of a second of a 19-year-old American college record in the two-mile when he ran away from the field in 9:47. This record made by T. S. Berna of Cornell is the oldest one on the books. If the Jim Spartan makes this record as he is almost certain to do it he will stamp himself as the outstanding distance runner of the decade and a number for ignominy on the United States 1932 Olympic team.

His chief competition will come from Joseph Pierre McKinsey, Ferrilham's are generally recognized as the cream of the Eastern distance men. Chamberlain has met him in two races, 27-10, and they are even between them. When Clark trumped away with the national cross-country title at Van Cortlandt park last fall McKinsey was a bad seventh having broken near the finish of the race as he was pushing the Spartan runner hard for honors. During the indoor winter season the Freshman Club finished second in the senior National A. A. U. two miles, Madison Square Garden, a race in which Chamberlain was third.

Another runner to be considered is Rauline of Cornell, who has the best two-mile time in the East for this season. Pennsylvania and Penn State, as well as New York City college, will also have some crack distance men entered. It is a competition of this sort, however, that will bring out the best possible time that he is in.

The squad is being accompanied by the three coaches, Ralph H. Young, Mike Carter and Morton F. Mason, the latter having deviated from his post at the point at which he is now arrived in the track world.
