Yanks' Stengel Fired, Retired?

Houk May Be New Manager

NEW YORK (AP)—Grizzled 70-year-old Casey Stengel, who seemed like a New York Yankee institution after 12 years as manager of the Bronx Bombers, is out of a job.

Casey said Tuesday he was fired by the Yankees. Dan Topping, millionaire co-owner of the Yankees, used a softer word—retired.

It was only last Thursday in Pittsburgh that the Pirates won the seventh game of the World Series and the world championship from the proud Yankee club. Ever since, there had been reports Stengel was on his way out.

"I was told that my services no longer were required," the gravel-voiced baseball veteran told a news conference in a Fifth avenue hotel suite. Stengel said that Topping, and Del Webb, the other co-owner, gave him his age as the reason.

IN 12 YEARS, Stengel's Yankees won 10 American League pennants, and 7 World Series.

Topping suggested baseball Hall of Fame rules should be changed at once, so Stengel could be voted in right away. He praised the shuffling about over Stengel—known to millions on the field and over television screens—as a great manager. Topping said that under the club profit sharing and retirement program, Stengel would receive \$160,000 Oct. 31. He is under contract until Nov. 1.

STENDEL, obviously bitter, said "I was not offered a new contract," adding, "that if I had been, I would have wanted certain changes made. I never was a yes man, and I don't intend to be one now."

He said his plans were not definite.

"At the present time I don't know what I would do if I had an offer to manage another club."

Observers believed that Ralph Houk, Yankee first base coach, would be offered the manager job. That may be cleared up Thursday at another Yankee news conference.

Nixon To Bypass Area In State Tour

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the Republican presidential candidate, will whistle-stop through six Michigan cities Thursday, Oct. 27.

TENTATIVELY included on the itinerary are Ann Arbor, Jackson, Battle Creek, Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids and Muskegon. Monroe may be included. Lansing is not included in the Vice President's plans.

Nixon's tentative schedule was announced Tuesday by Lawrence E. Lindemer, chairman of the Republican State Central committee, after weekend meetings of state Republican leaders.

THE VICE President will speak in each of the cities along the campaign route.

Paul D. Bagwell, Republican candidate for governor, and Rep. Alvin Bentley, Republican candidate for the United States Senate, will accompany Nixon through the state. At stops along the line, local leaders and congressional candidates will board the campaign train.

Thursday Set For WMSB Open House

A dining room and kitchen transformed into a television studio? This may sound as if it's an impossible task, but in the latter part of 1955 the university did this.

Today the station, located at the corner of Kalamazoo and Harrison, is one of the leading educational television stations in the country.

STUDENTS WILL be able to watch the broadcasting Thursday night from 7:30 to 10, when WMSB holds an open house.

Visitors will view a live TV program in rehearsal in one of the three studios, and also see a television class in action. The operation of the cameras, boom mikes and props will be seen by viewers.

THE NEWS ROOM is another center at WMSB. The station is served by the Associated Press and United Press International. Another department is the film center, which is equipped to do still and motion picture work.

Mantovanti In 2nd L-C Event Friday Night

Included in Mantovanti's program are such selections as "Some Enchanted Evening," "Gigi," "Play, Gypsy, Play," "Autumn Leaves" and "Sweetheart Walks."

VENICE - BORN Mantovanti was reared and educated in England, where he first earned his fame. He is the son of an Italian violinist.

He began recording in 1940, but it was not until 1951 that he adopted "Charmaine" and the smooth, dreamy music that soon made him famous.

MANTOVANTI'S "New Music" has sold more than three million recordings in the United States.

He was presented the Ivor Novello Award (British radio's Oscar) as "Musician of the Year" in 1957. He was invited to appear at a Royal Command Performance before Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip in 1958.

Leak Floods Aud Bridge

A broken water main kept harassed university maintenance men working until the wee small hours of this morning.

The main, which supplies water to the Education building, broke sometime Tuesday night. The break was first discovered when Charles P. Adams III, Tuskegee, Ala. junior, noticed water bubbling up through the ground.

The water was coming up through the soft ground at the southeast end of the Farm Lane bridge. Adams notified Donald McMillan, manager of Shaw Hall.

McMillan notified authorities. Maintenance men arrived at the scene shortly after 8:30 p.m. to find the Farm Lane bridge flooded. Farm Lane was blocked off from Aud.

Shaw Lane and the men began digging for the leak. Digging operations were hampered by the lack of an air compressor to blast up the pavement.

The campus police reported that the road was closed as a safety precaution against a possible collapse in the pavement from seepage undermining the road.

Disarmament Issue First in U.N. Debate

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U.N. Assembly's main political committee agreed Tuesday to give disarmament top billing on its list of hot east-west issues for debate.

Both the United States and the Soviet Union agreed to that course—but actual prospects remained dim for any immediate break in the long standing deadlock on actual disarmament negotiations.

AFTER LONG procedural wrangling the committee gave second spot to President Eisenhower's African aid program and third to the question of independence for Algeria.

Agreement to put disarmament ahead of everything else in the 99-nation committee came after a surprise proposal from newly independent Algeria that the Eisenhower program be given the No. 1 spot.

But after the United States, the Soviet Union and a number of other nations stressed the de-

sire to see disarmament taken up first, the Nigerian delegate, Jaja Wachuku, said he would be satisfied to have issues related to Africa dropped to second place.

U.S. AMBASSADOR James J. Wadsworth expressed hope that Eisenhower's proposal be placed as high as possible on the committee's work schedule. But he said the United States had already made clear in assembly debate it gave disarmament top priority.

Eisenhower proposed in his assembly speech on Sept. 22 that the United Nations consider a broad program for the independence and development of the newly independent African nations.

Wadsworth said the United States would present a preliminary outline of ideas that might be included in such a program. He indicated other members of the committee, especially the African representatives, would have to be consulted before definite plans could be presented.

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Lodge Foresees New Cabinet

Negro Would Be Appointed If Nixon Elected President

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—Henry Cabot Lodge predicted today Tuesday that a negro would be appointed to the cabinet if Vice President Richard M. Nixon were elected president.

Lodge, Republican candidate for vice president, accused Sen. John F. Kennedy, the Democratic presidential candidate, of "pussfooting and dodging" the controversial issue, in which Lodge has been embroiled for a week.

"Let him declare where he stands. If he's against it, let him say so," Lodge asserted to newsmen at Albany Airport.

In Ohio Monday, Kennedy said he was not going to promise a cabinet of any other color to any race or ethnic group. He said that was "racism in reverse and it's worse."

When Lodge arrived here for a two-hour sojourn through the district, he was asked to comment on charges that he was "reneging" on repeated pledges that a negro would be appointed to the cabinet should the GOP ticket win the November 8 election.

He said there ought to be a negro in the cabinet because it would do "enormous good" for United States foreign relations

and also fulfill the national purpose.

"I will make this prediction," he said, "if Richard Nixon is elected, there will be a qualified negro in the cabinet."

In his denial, Lodge repeated the word "prediction" and pointed out, as he had at other times, that it was the president's job to make cabinet appointments.

Nixon has said he would appoint the best man for the job without regard to race or creed. He said again today in Florida:

"I have made no commitments, and I don't think any should be made. But I will say if elected, I will appoint the best man."

Commented Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Lodge's Democratic opponent:

"Will we have Mr. Lodge passing out cabinet posts and Mr. Nixon turning them down?" Johnson, speaking in Williamsport, Pa., took the position that no federal cabinet post should be earmarked for a negro just because of his race. He also told about 300 persons in front of a courthouse:

"Personally, I don't think a man's race, religion or section of birth should bar him from any post for which he is qualified."

Exhibit in Library Tells Story of Useful Atom

A special U.S. Atomic Energy Commission exhibit, "The Useful Atom," is on display this week and next week in the main lobby of the library.

"The Useful Atom" is a compact but informative display presenting the principles and applications of nuclear energy.

EIGHT COLORFUL panels graphically describe the principal components of the atom, the nature of radiation and the use of radioactive isotopes in agriculture, industry and medicine.

In addition to the panel display, a component activated by the student explains the operation of a nuclear power plant. This part of the display describes the fusion process in which atoms of light elements are combined at high temperatures to produce power.

A SCALE MODEL of the "N. S. Savannah," the nation's first nuclear propelled merchant vessel is also displayed showing a cutaway section of the ship's nuclear power plant.

"The Useful Atom" was prepared by the Museum Division of the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

ON THE THIRD floor there is a display of hunting showing, primarily, different books and publications which the library has on this subject.

Many new books and old on big game hunting and small game hunting are shown in this collection.

Guns, duck decoys, stuffed animals and other hunting materials add to the fall flavor of the display.

Bentley Airs Views

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Polls Show 17 States Can't Decide

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Presidential race may be decided in 17 states now wavering between Republican Richard Nixon and Democrat John Kennedy. These states hold 267 electoral votes—only two below the winning number.

A new Associated Press survey indicates that President Nixon and Sen. Kennedy are leading in about half the swing states. Nixon leads in 10 states and Kennedy in seven.

Senator Kennedy holds no punches when it comes to denouncing the present administration. But his campaign speeches don't seem to offer much in the way of positive thinking.

The only moment where it looked like the two candidates would at least state their position on action they would take was over the Quemoy-Matsum question.

Candidates in Miami Nixon Says Free Nations Must Quarantine Castro

ENROUTE IN FLORIDA WITH NIXON, (AP)—Vice President Richard Nixon said Tuesday the Castro regime in Cuba must be quarantined by free nations of the Western Hemisphere.

Nixon, addressing the American Legion convention in Miami Beach, said that if he is elected president he would continue to keep Red China out of the United Nations unless it proves that it adheres to standards of world law and the principles of civilized behavior.

The vice president, following Sen. John F. Kennedy—his Democratic rival—in the legion room, said the United States should never relax its insistence upon a treaty-style system of international cooperation and disarmament agreement.

Nixon spoke approximately 15 minutes before 5,000 delegates to the legion convention. He repeated a favorite campaign theme: that the free world must never abandon its efforts under the point of a Communist gun.

In remarks distributed by his aides while he was in the middle of his address, Nixon said the United States should never relax its insistence upon a treaty-style system of international cooperation and disarmament agreement.

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He added: "The goal must be to quarantine the Castro regime. When this program goes forward, it will very promptly take the strongest possible economic measures to counter the economic activity being practiced by this regime against our country and our citizens."

Russia Convicts Tourist Researching for Book

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — A young American tourist said today he was convicted of espionage in the Soviet Union after he admitted traveling through Russia to gather material for a book on the Kremlin's preparation for war.

Mark I. Kaminsky, 28, whose home is on a farm near Niles, Mich., arrived here last night from the Soviet Union, where he served a seven-year sentence for espionage charges. The Russian court convicted Kaminsky and his traveling companion, Harvey C. Bennett, 36, of Tracy, Calif.

"THEY TOLD ME it would be foolish not to plead guilty," Kaminsky told a news conference today. "They gave me a lawyer. He was not of much assistance, but he cheered me up. He advised me to confess to the charge wholeheartedly and tell the court I felt very remorseful. He stressed the part about 'remorseful' time and again."

"I did not carry out espionage," he said. "I did confess to espionage, but I did confess though that I was getting material for a book."

He explained later that under Soviet law it is considered espionage to gather the material he collected. "Such facts as that there are soldiers everywhere in Russia," he said, "the subject of the survey was 'The Soviet Union Talks Peace While Preparing for War.'"

HE ADDED that he took pictures of soldiers, radio antennas and trains but not for espionage purposes. The Russians confiscated the photographs.

Kaminsky, a big, heavyset man in a light blue suit, said Russians had treated him well although they suspected him of questioning up to eight hours a day.

He said they extracted a promise from him not to write the book, but he wasn't certain what he would do now.

"IT'S NOT THAT I think prison made under duress don't count," he said. "I simply haven't made up my mind."

The Soviet News Agency Tass said Kaminsky admitted gathering information on troop concentrations, radio and power station locations, military camps and their approach roads, and details about bridges, railway stations and industrial centers for use in a "slandorous" book about the Soviet Union.

Tass also reported that Bennett denounced Kaminsky as a spy during the trial. Bennett denied this and said:

"I explained to the Russians that Mark was writing a book and that was why he gathered information. But I had to agree that this was not the sort of activity a normal tourist would do."

BOTH SAID they made the trip under scholarships of \$2,000 each from the Northcraft Educational Fund in Philadelphia. A U.S. attorney for the fund has refused to name the group's backers or give the location of its headquarters. Tass called it a "spy organization."

Bennett and Kaminsky were the latest in a series of American tourists arrested as spies this summer after the trial of U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers on espionage charges.

The Albert T. Cordray International Student Grant will be awarded to an outstanding foreign student on campus for the first time at the end of the school year.

THE FUNDS for the annual \$200 grant were made available by an anonymous donor.

The winner will be selected on the basis of his previous record, accomplishments and need by a selection committee made up of faculty and Lions.

Foreign students must apply for the grant before Feb. 15.

APPLICATION FORMS can be obtained from the East Lansing Lions Club, P.O. Box 403, East Lansing.

The winner's name will be engraved on a plaque which will hang in the UN lounge.

Russian Club Holds Meeting

The new Russian club will hold its first meeting tonight from 7 to 8:30 in the Union Oak room.

ASSOC. PROF. Nikolai Poltoratsky, adviser to the club, said the group was formed because students asked for it and because there is now a nucleus of students taking advanced Russian courses.

ANYONE interested in Russian is invited to the organizational meeting even if they are not taking the language.

Four meetings are planned for the term. Poltoratsky said he hopes that for one of the November meetings the club can have a program commemorating the 80th anniversary of the death of the Russian writer Tolstoy.

Three other Russian instructors will help advise the club. They are Antolii Sokolov, Sergey Andriev and his mother, Mrs. Nina Andrieva, who was a professor at the University of Odessa in Russia.

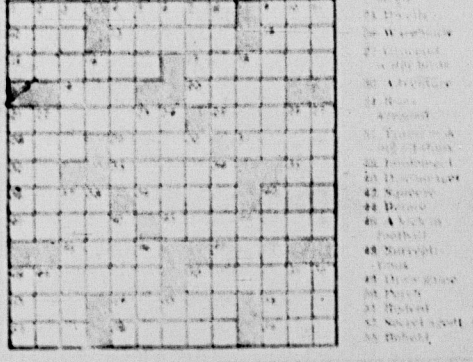

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Laos Premier Places Captain Under Arrest

BIENTIANE LAOS (AP) Premier Phouma Phouma Tuesday put paratrooper Capt. Kong Le under house arrest and denounced communist ambitions in Laos.

The premier's actions obviously were aimed at showing the United States and the rest of the western world that he is taking orders from no one.

Kong Le was the leader of the Aug. 9 military coup that toppled Laos' pro-western government and made the Prince Premier. The captain was put under technical house arrest for 15 days. Phouma said the arrest order would not necessarily be enforced, but it would go into Kong Le's record as a black mark.

The premier told newsmen he took the action to punish Kong Le for the all-out unauthorized welcome the captain staged last week on the arrival of A. N. Abramov, first Soviet ambassador to Laos.

THE ARREST order came amid mounting fears that Kong Le might have been planning another coup. He frequently has threatened to take action on his own against the right-wing rebel regime of Gen. Phoumi Nosavan.

IN HIS DENUNCIATION of Communist ambitions in Laos, the Premier pushed through the National Assembly a strong declaration of his government's policy of neutrality.

There were three chief points of the nine-point declaration approved yesterday.

One said Laos rejects and combats Communism as incompatible with "the religion, traditions and basic feelings of the Laotian people, who are attached to liberty."

THE SECOND stressed the importance of "keeping Communism and subversion" out of Laos.

The third warned that those wishing to take part in a future Laotian government of national unity would have to "declare themselves independent of Communism and other foreign influence."

Milk sold on campus may soon be packaged in plastic coated containers, according to Theodore Hedrick, professor of food science in the dairy department.

Research to develop the plastic coated containers began two years ago. Ordinary cardboard milk cartons are covered with a very thin coating of plastic. The plastic coating can not be scratched off, permits colors to stand out and is faster to process than wax coated containers.

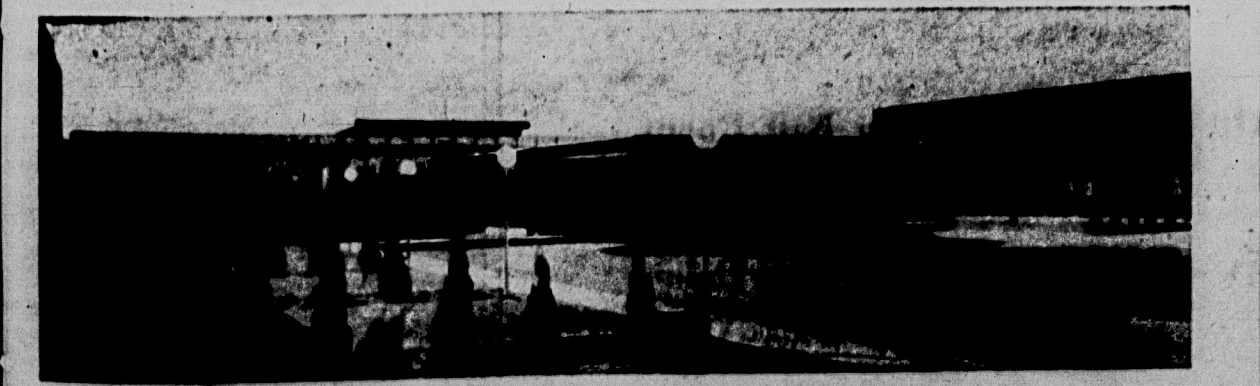
