## Uruguay Police Squeeze 13 Persons Believed Of Supporting Castro

MONTENIDEO, Uruguay (AP)—Police stormed headquarters of the Communist party Wednesday and seized 13 persons in a drive to check demonstrators supporting Fidel Castro.

The campaign has been building up for months. It reached a climax Tuesday night when one man was killed and scores were injured in battles between pro-Castro and anti-Castro elements.

THE AIM of the leftists is to prevent the government from breaking relations with Cuba. A huge demonstration has been called for today by Communists and other Castro partisans. The army and the police were mobilized to fend off further violence.

## Filibuster Rules Blocked by Senate Proposed Rule Changes Sent To Committee for Hearings

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Wednesday indefinitely sidetracked a move for a change in rules to make it easier to shut off filibusters.

By a vote of 50-46, proposed rule changes, which had embroiled the Senate in controversy since it convened Jan. 3, were sent to the rules committee for hearings.

On the Cuban issue the ruling government council, dominated by conservatives, has been consulting with other Latin American governments, some of which have already broken with Castro.

LONDON (AP)—Intelligence swirls around the King Ahmed in his lonely capital in Yemen and he has been the target of several bombing attacks, allied diplomats said Wednesday night.

Alternately blamed are Yemeni refugees from his iron, medieval rule, or agents of President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, who covets Yemen as well as the rest of the Arabian peninsula.

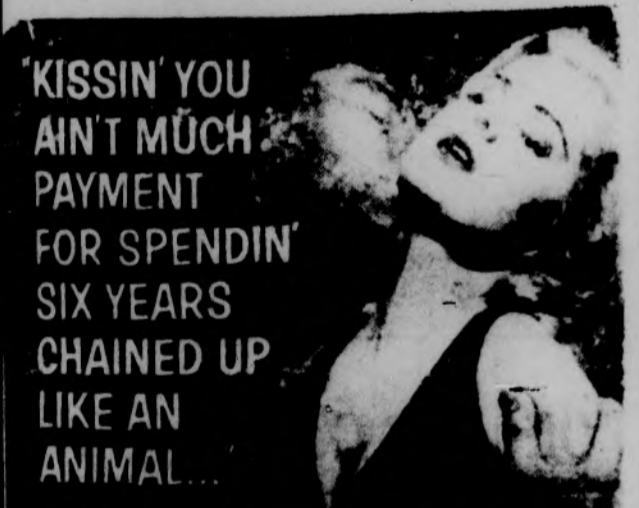

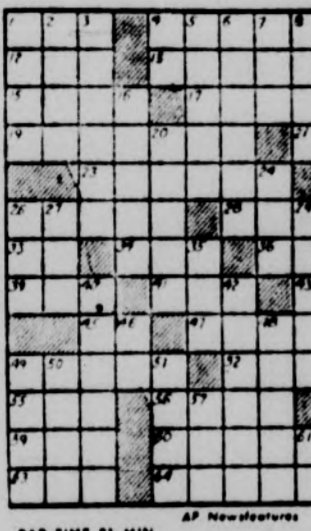

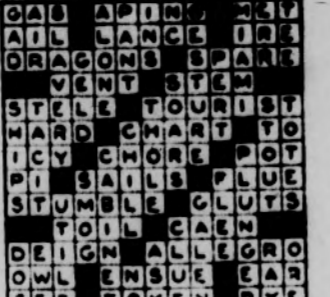

### Pre-Inaugural Work Costs \$250,000

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy's headquarters estimated Wednesday it is costing the debt-ridden Democratic national committee more than \$250,000 to finance the pre-inaugural business activities of Kennedy and his staff.

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, said in response to news conference questions that he couldn't speak for the president-elect on the matter, but that some members of his staff favor enactment of legislation authorizing the government to meet this expense in the future.

### Volume on Accounting Published

A modern "History of Public Accounting in the United States" is the latest in a series of business studies published by the MSU Bureau of Business and Economic Research.

Written by Dr. James Don Edwards, the 368-page publication covers the entire profession from its origin to the present day.

"This book, in my opinion, will be fascinating and rewarding reading," writes John L. Carey, executive director of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, in his foreword to the publication.

Edwards is professor and head of the department of accounting and financial administration at MSU. His publications in the accounting field include textbooks in elementary and intermediate accounting and professional journal articles.

### Attorneys Begin Last Fight Against Integration Decrees

MACON, Ga. (AP)—Weary attorneys for the state move back into federal court at Macon today for a last-ditch fight against decrees which have brought integration to the previously all-white University of Georgia and written new pages for the history books.

The lawyers headed by the segregationist attorney general, Eugene Cook, will plead with Judge W. A. Rouse to dissolve an injunction which kept Gov. Ernest Vandiver from closing the 175-year-old university at Athens Tuesday until a conflict between state and federal laws could be ironed out by legislative action.

Vandiver and the attorneys have been thwarted at every turn for six days in their crusade to preserve segregation or, if it must be killed, let the state do the killing.

The Governor, before issuance of Rouse's order, was prepared to close the university until next Monday. He said in the interim the legislature could repeal a section of law providing that no state funds can be used to operate an integrated college.

State officials predicted Wednesday that a decision by Rouse to make the injunction permanent would be coupled with a decision that the state law is void. That would do away with any moves to repeal it.

While the legislative, executive and judicial uproar continues, the two Negroes at whom it is directed went quietly through their schedule of classes. A few catcalls and boos greeted them on campus. But there also were friendly handshakes and greetings of "It's nice to have you."

### Ciccoli Invites AAS to National Conclave

An address by Lt. Col. (Ret.) Louis J. Ciccoli, executive secretary for Arnold Air Society from Washington, D.C., to members of the AAS Tuesday night, included an invitation to the AAS 12th Annual Conclave.

The National Conclave this year will be held at the University of Detroit, March 22 to 25. In addition to meetings and other activities, awards will be presented to several persons, including Gen. Thomas D. White, chief of staff, USAF, who will receive the "Hap" Arnold award.

### Public Safety Gains Officers

The department of Public Safety's new fire safety officer is Brian Langley, a MSU graduate of the school of police administration.

He is in charge of fire inspections and investigations. As part of his job, he will approve decorations for such events as the J-Hop before they may be used.

Langley said he is looking for volunteers to form a semi-rescue and first-aid team. Students would be trained in first aid, rescue and first-aid techniques.

### Giants' Shaw Dealt To New NFL Team

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — George Shaw, a gifted passer, hurtled by rookie quarterback Charley Conerly in 1959 and Conerly was still the No. 1 quarterback the end of the 1960 season. In six years of pro football Shaw hit for a 515 completion average, connecting on 310 passes in 491 throws for 4,489 yards and 33 touchdowns. 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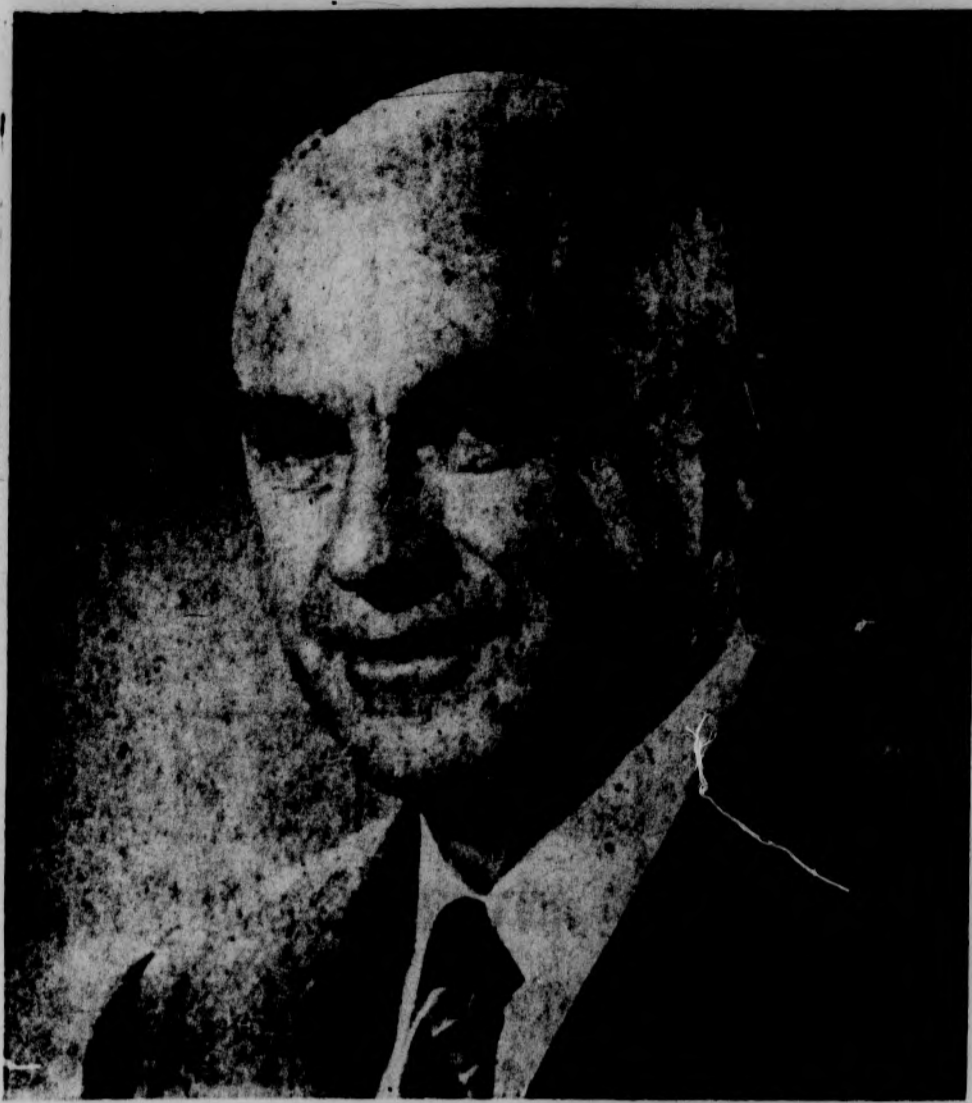

## Books in Review

### Box Office Failure Doesn't Hurt 'Highest Tree' as Play

"The Highest Tree"

A play by Dore Schary.  
Random House, \$2.95, 130 Pages.

Dore Schary's new play, "The Highest Tree," opened in New York on November 4, 1959; seventeen days later, it closed. If its dramatic worth is measured in terms of duration or box office, his play was not a success, which means, otherwise stated, Brooks Atkinson found fault, and said so (N.Y. Times, Nov. 5, 1960).

To the less sophisticated tastes of someone who is not yet a perfectionist, however, the play's artistic flaws are negligible—especially if profundity and consequence are considered as having some relevance in judging its total worth.

Schary has taken for his theme, the tentative future of man, tentative, because when considered in terms of a nuclear war, or "peace," and the accumulation of strontium ninety from nuclear testing, the term "future" connotes precious little meaning.

In the course of his research, Aaron Cornish, a brilliant governmental scientist, has contracted leukemia. Suspect, as the cause of his fatal condition, is his work on a government nuclear project, Aaron's son, Caleb, a geneticist, and, in his own field, quite as accomplished as his father, has become intimately concerned with the effects of radioactive fallout, both as the cause of leukemia, and genetic mutation.

Aaron is influenced by his son to lend his reputation and his remaining efforts in a campaign for the immediate cessation of nuclear testing. The political logic which remains impervious even to facts, and against which Aaron and his son shall in futility align themselves, is seen in the character of Devereaux, Aaron's governmental project leader, who not only remains indifferent to the threat of total devastation or mass mutation, but also scoffs at figures which indicate, for example, an increase in the frequency of leukemia by over three hundred percent since the first Atom bomb fell.

In Devereaux, Schary has placed the embodiment of the total forces, both social and political, to which Aaron shall inevitably succumb, not the least of which are native American indifference and foolish optimism.

If we are to escape the consequences of this human dilemma, we must awaken from this immoral stupor, this oblivion, and acquaint ourselves with what is to be accomplished, then do it! Schary has attempted to diminish the shock of the awakening through the medium of his art; we must acknowledge his concern lest our sleep be eternal.
