U. S. to Lose Race Of Man in Space?

Uruguay Police Squeeze 13 Persons Believed Of Supporting Castro

MONTENIDEO, Uruguay. The campaign has been building up for months. It reached a climax Tuesday night when one man was killed and scores were injured in battles between pro-Castro and anti-Castro elements.

The aim of the leftists is to prevent the government from breaking relations with Cuba. A huge demonstration has been called for today by Communists and other Castro partisans. The army and the police were mobilized to fend off further violence.

Tuesday night 1,000 leftists marched on an anti-Castro rally of 3,000 in Independence square, in front of a government house, and tried to break up the meeting. Police chased the leftists through the downtown avenues. The fighting spread through an area of 20 blocks.

Filibuster Rules Blocked by Senate

Proposed Rule Changes Sent To Committee for Hearings

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Senate Wednesday indefinitely sidetracked a move for a change in rules to make it easier to shut off filibusters.

By a vote of 50-46, proposed rule changes, which had embroiled the Senate in controversy since it convened Jan. 3, were sent to the rules committee for hearings.

THIS SWEPT from the Senate floor an issue which could have kept it tied in knots for weeks and been an effective block to early action on any of the legislative program. President-elect Kennedy will submit after his inauguration Jan. 20.



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

Giants' Shaw Dealt To New NFL Team

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — George Shaw, a gifted passer, hurtled by the Giants as an alternate for Charlie Conerly.

In six years of pro football, Shaw hit for a 515 completion average, connecting on 310 passes in 491 throws for 4,489 yards and 33 touchdowns.

Indiana's big Walt Bellamy is third in official statistics released today with a two-game average of 23.5. Hoosier Tom Bellamy is tied for seventh with 16.0.

The conference pace-setter, after one game, is Purdue's Terry Dishinger, who scored 41 points in the Boilermakers' 79-64 opening triumph over Northwestern Monday night.

Next is Ohio State's famed Perry Lucas, like Dishinger, a 1960 Olympic cage star, with 35 points in the Buckeyes' lone conference start, a 91-65 victory over Illinois.

Other leaders who have played two league games include Iowa's Frank Allen with a 18.5 mark for fifth spot, and three Wisconsin players, Tom Hughesbanks, Dick Dutrisac and Ken Stibel, all with a 15-point average.

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

Books in Review

Box Office Failure Doesn't Hurt 'Highest Tree' as Play

"The Highest Tree"

A play by Dore Schary.
Random House, \$2.95, 130 Pages.

Dore Schary's new play, "The Highest Tree," opened in New York on November 4, 1959; seventeen days later, it closed. If its dramatic worth is measured in terms of duration or box office, his play was not a success, which means, otherwise stated, Brooks Atkinson found fault, and said so (N.Y. Times, Nov. 5, 1960).

To the less sophisticated tastes of someone who is not yet a perfectionist, however, the play's artistic flaws are negligible—especially if profundity and consequence are considered as having some relevance in judging its total worth.

Schary has taken for his theme, the tentative future of man, tentative, because when considered in terms of a nuclear war, or "peace," and the accumulation of strontium ninety from nuclear testing, the term "future" connotes precious little meaning.

In the course of his research, Aaron Cornish, a brilliant governmental scientist, has contracted leukemia. Suspect, as the cause of his fatal condition, is his work on a government nuclear project, Aaron's son, Caleb, a geneticist, and, in his own field, quite as accomplished as his father, has become intimately concerned with the effects of radioactive fallout, both as the cause of leukemia, and genetic mutation.

Aaron is influenced by his son to lend his reputation and his remaining efforts in a campaign for the immediate cessation of nuclear testing. The political logic which remains impervious even to facts, and against which Aaron and his son shall in futility align themselves, is seen in the character of Devereaux, Aaron's governmental project leader, who not only remains indifferent to the threat of total devastation or mass mutation, but also scoffs at figures which indicate, for example, an increase in the frequency of leukemia by over three hundred percent since the first Atom bomb fell.

In Devereaux, Schary has placed the embodiment of the total forces, both social and political, to which Aaron shall inevitably succumb, not the least of which are native American indifference and foolish optimism.

If we are to escape the consequences of this human dilemma, we must awaken from this immoral stupor, this oblivion, and acquaint ourselves with what is to be accomplished, then do it! Schary has attempted to diminish the shock of the awakening through the medium of his art; we must acknowledge his concern lest our sleep be eternal.

Annual Purchase Show Opens At Kresge Art
