

## Student Congress Resolution To Abolish All Class Officers

Two weeks ago a resolution was introed in Student Congress to abolish class of-

The resolution stated that the size of MSU has made class government ineffective, and that the function of class officers can be as successfully carried out by persons selected through appointment or petition.

As in most cases, there are arguments for and against the resolution.

OPPONENTS TO the resolution base their arguments on the fact that class officers give persons a "social education" by exposing them to leadership opportunities and the university ropes. This undoubtedly is true. By directing a committee, a student learns to lead, to know the proper persons to go to for action and just where authority lies

Secondly, these people claim officers of perform valuable services for their classmates and the university at large, Frosh-Soph council last year underwent a face change and came up with new vigor. AND THAT IS where we present our argument. We concede all the above points but we believe the very fact that class officers have turned into service groups calls for their elimination.

Class offices were founded years ago when MSU was an infant university. They were representative bodies, formed to advance the desires of a given class. But in the MSU of 1960, crowded with 22,710 separate students. there no longer is such a thing as a sophomore class or a junior class. People are between terms, off-campus or just plain disinterested. There is no class unity

This, then, refutes the basic reasons for a class office. Today's officers do not repre-

THE SECONDARY REASON for officers. which has sprung up over the years, is service. But couldn't some other organization (say AUSG) perform these services more efficiently? We think they could. AUSG with its money and power is capable of putting into action the unfulfilled plans of class coun-

Junior council, for instance, is constantly restrained from any servicable project by one simple question; how much will they make off J-Hop? Enough to pay the bills? We don't think this type of service is as efficent as it might be where a definite fund ould be allotted for projects.

And leadership training can be learned just is easily through service in AUSG as in class councils. Students might petition to Student Congress for posts now appointed by two or three class officers. This, we feel, would eliminate the "spoils system" now apparent in

SENIOR OFFICERS we would exempt from this change. Seniors tend to have more lass spirit. They are united by a common immediate goal-graduation. Projects such s Swingout week. Commencement teas and Development fund give seniors a bond no other class has.

But the bonds are missing in other classes. It boils down to the fact that Frosh-Soph council and Junior council are existing on an extinct tradition and performing duties which could be better executed by another agency.

At Ohio State recently, a candidate for a class president ran on the following platform: If I am elected, I will do my best to eliminate class offices. He was elected, and he fulfilled his promise According to reports, Ohio State has suffered no loss from the elimination of

The resolution to abolish class offices will come out of committee within a week or two. We would like to see it amended to exclude senior offices from the proposal.

With this amendment, we urge Congress to vote "yes" on this resolution which, we feel, will result in the more efficient functioning of All University Student Govern-

## Cumberland **Discusses** Cuban Break

Rejects Accusations Against Dr. Shapiro

Q. Dr. Cumberland, what is your opinion of the recent accusations that Shapiro has communist

A. It is entirely wrong, nonsense, as far as I'm concerned. He has never shown any sympathy with the communist cause; just with social reform for the Cuban people

Yesterday in a State Journal interview, Shapiro publicly admitted that his former views were wrong. At least he implied this by his statement, "Either I'm wrong or Castro's changed."

He then took the view that I originally tookthat the reform had been transformed into a dangerous situation, a police state-that Castro has been using the U.S. as a whipping bov.

Q. Do you think that this whole erisis might he an attempt on the part of the USSR to pave the way for good relations with Kennedy; that the present clash with the Republican administration will give Kennedy's administration a chance to right things with Cube and the Kremlin?

A. I think this is an unsophisticated view. That the Kremlin can be so diabolically clever and so naively open does not seem a possibility to me. I see no imminent return of relations with Cuba, nor do I see how the present situation could possibly lead to a reconciliation with Kennedy.

Q. Do you think that the communists are direct behind all of Castro's moves?

A All evidence points to the fact that the USSR is behind Castro. Yet their motives are different than sometimes imagined. Their actual success or power in Cuba is not so important to them as their desires to cause difficulty for the U.S. We've lost friends throughout the whole situation; because the USSR can use Cuba as an agitator, they will not abandon their interest in

I can't see the Russians giving them kind of economic aid on a continuing basis. Those are the very goods that the Soviets are

Q. As nearly as I could tell from your fall debate, you and Shapiro were both originally in favor of the revolution, but you feel that it has just



the future of the revolution. I feel that the original purpose of the revolution has been perverted by the Castro camp. The immediate economic advantages have been outweighed by the disadvantages of the police state now in existence. Shapiro feels that the social and political change will come: I feel that they are overdue.

It seems to me that what changes have been made have no firm base; they are just temporary, and the result will be heartache for the Cuban

As I said before, the Cubans need continuing economic aid: they have lost the support of the U.S. and Russia is not capable of giving them this aid on a continuing basis. Of course they means much when you consider how many of those employed are employed in the army
