## Instructor Challenges Complacency

# Harrison Says Students Should Revive 'Revolutionary' Vigor

Stanley Harrison is an English instructor at Michigan State University.

But if you like a man with a served, scholarly person wrapped in a book of Chaucer's works don't talk with this man.

Harrison is young, when you consider he's a college instructor.

And he's a revolutionary, a trait which is unusual when you consider his major field of study.

**BUT IF** you like a man with a probing mind, sit down and listen to him.

Michigan State, like many other universities, has become a white-collar trade school," he commented casually.

"And these are schools where the students fear to explore beyond what is safe and accepted.

"Generally, this stems from the students' inability to see their relationship with any forces that do not directly affect them; and their concern for job security, wall-to-wall carpeting and sofa-broiler 400s, completely destroys the revolutionary tendencies inherent

to the young mind," he said.

**THE TERM** revolutionary scares most people; they associate it with pointless rebellion and are not aware of its true meaning.

"Apathy is manifest in most universities of America. I think this stems from the desire to gain acceptance by being one of the mediocre masses."

Leaning forward in his chair he smiled and added: "You know any protest by students nowadays is met with shock.

**DO YOU** recall when many students in California demonstrated against the investigations of the House Un-American Activities Committee. Well, this was so unusual it shocked the nation.

And yet why should a group of students who translate their ideas into democratic action evoke shock from their elders?"

Such student action occurs all the time abroad, he pointed out.

"There's a great deal of unrest for a better world in such places as Japan, Turkey and Korea. These students are extremely vocal."

Compare this to Michigan State, he said. As an example he cited the case of a group of students here on campus who tried to organize a reading club to study socialist writers.

"For instance, President Kennedy claims we, Americans, have been lulled into a false sense of security, and are content to rest on the laurels of our past. But our past achievements are not enough to meet the challenge of the present."

"**CHANGE** and progress can only come from the impetus of our young people" said Harrison in a serious tone. "Whether in the sphere of peace, politics or religion nothing should be blindly accepted. Students should have

## Top Midwest Sprinters To Provide Excitement

(Second in a series of four stories dealing with the Michigan State Relays to be run at Jenison Field House on Saturday, Feb. 4).

The hurdles and short dashes—the quick and exciting races in track—offer crack competition in Saturday's running of the Michigan State Relays.

A fine hurdles duel looms between Kansas State's Rex Strucker and Michigan's talented Bennie McRae. An equally big contest is seen in the 33-yard dash where Michigan States Zack Ford and Don Vough are top consideration.

**STRONG** performances also are due in the 300-yard event where defending champion Dave Myers of Central Michigan is matched against Dave Miller of Purdie, Jim Baker and Liane Patterson of Missouri and the Spartan duo of Ford and Vough.

Strucker rates top favoritism in the 33-yard high-and-low hurdle events. A year ago at the Relays, he won the 300 in 6.95 and placed fifth in the

high. He went on to bigger and better things and clinched the 1960 season by winning the hurdle events in the Big Eight outdoor championships.

McRae, of Wolverine football fame, is considered one of the best hurdlers in these parts. He won the Big Ten indoor 100-yard lows in 1960 and was the top contender in the outdoor meet until sidelined by a back injury. Should Strucker or McRae falter, ready to step in is John Passmore of McMaster of Hamilton, Ont.

**FORD AND VOURHEIS** provided Michigan State with a 1-2 finishing punch in the 60 in MSU's first meet this year at Ohio State. Both are rated real powers. Patterson of Missouri from the 300, and rates highly here. Jim Baker of Purdie is another strong contender.
