Science PhD's of 1970 to Study Here

Students from all over the country are attending the third annual high school Honors Science Institute here.

Only 100 students are admitted and the six-week course, sponsored jointly by MSU and the National Science Foundation, attracts students from as far away as California, Texas and Tennessee.

The students, who have completed their junior year of high school, attend classes six hours a day. They concentrate in the fields of physics, mathematics, chemistry and biology. Each one also has a special individual project to work on.

The students come here

simply for learning, according to Dr. Isobel Blyth of the science and math teaching center. They receive no credit or grades for their work.

"We get the cream of the crop here," she said. "No one volunteers to study without credit unless they really want to learn."

To qualify for the course, students must be in the top 10 per cent of their class and be recommended by their teachers.

"Most of the students have straight-A records and are number one or two in their class," said Dr. Blyth. "These are the PhD's of the 1970's."

Museum Program Aired 300th Time

The 300th program — the first was broadcast in the fall of 1955 — dedicated to the activities of the campus museum was heard Monday over WKAR radio.

Dr. Lawrence Frymire, who has been the commentator of the program — "Exploring the Museum," for six years reminisced during the 15-minute program about past programs and past activities of the museum.

The program, according to Rollin H. Baker, director of the museum, has been a great success in helping acquire things for the museum, and in getting people to come and view the exhibits.

"IT HAS been very helpful to the museum," Baker said of the program. "We have obtained many gifts and have had a great deal of favorable public reaction because of it. It has helped us gain many friends."

Baker said that because of the program, the museum gets fan mail in which the writers offer things which they have heard the museum needs.

The programs, in general, have been concerned with new exhibits that have been constructed; expeditions that members have gone on, and the educational and research programs of the museum.

Many of the programs consisted of discussions with various staff members on some of the things they were doing. Other broadcasts discussed how an exhibit was built and the various techniques involved.

STUDENTS INVOLVED in advanced research and in

building exhibits have also been featured on the program.

Faculty staff members, of other departments, who have co-operated with the museum in their activities have appeared on the program from time to time.

The program was heard at 10:30 a.m. on AM and 9:30 p.m. on FM radio. It was sent out to twelve other stations in Michigan for re-broadcast during the week.

"Exploring the Museum," is a 15-minute broadcast heard weekly on Mondays.

Landscape Design Course Slated

The Department of Urban Planning and Landscape Architecture is offering a session in advanced Landscape Design this summer conducted by professional landscape architects and teachers serving as visiting critics.

Opening the series with a three day lecture was Brian Hackett.

Hackett is Senior Lecturer in Landscape Architecture in the Department of Town and Country Planning at the University of Durham, England.

HE HAS served as a visiting professor at the University of Illinois for the past two years.

Returning for a second year to teach the advanced course June 26-30, is William Johnson, associate professor at the University of Michigan.

An MSU Landscape Architecture graduate, Johnson received his masters degree from

the Harvard Graduate School of Design.

After spending several months in Europe with a scholarship, Johnson became a partner in Johnson and Roy, a landscape architecture firm in Ann Arbor.

NORMAN CARVER, JR., Kalamazoo architect and Fulbright scholar, will be guest lecturer July 3-7. Carver, who studied in Japan for three years, will speak on Japanese architecture.

Scheduled to instruct students July 10 to 14 is Hideo Sasaki, chairman of the Department of Landscape Architecture of the Graduate School of Design at Harvard University.

Sasaki is a partner in Sasaki and Walker Landscape Architects, with offices in Boston and San Francisco.

William Carnes, director of the Mission 66 program of the

National Park Service, Washington, D.C., will lecture July 17 to 25.

MISSION 66 is a program designed to bring the national parks to a more modern uniform standard. Under the program to be completed by 1966, major improvements will include the opening of new areas

and construction of new buildings and facilities.

The program is currently working in 181 park areas of the United States. Yellowstone National Park alone will receive \$55 million for improvements.

The advanced Landscape Design course offers organized field trips to such near-by developments as the General Mo-

tors Technical Center, Northland and Eastland Shopping Centers, and the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Park District.

According to D. Newton Glick, Chairman of Landscape Studies, the advanced program is the only one in existence. Enrollment for the course consists of 24 students. It will be offered during the first five week session only.



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Dr. Toussi to Assist Iran Government

Dr. Mohammed Toussi, the campus UN, former Secretary General, has been called to his home in Iran to assist the Minister of Education.

The call cancelled Toussi's planned trip to South America and Africa. He will leave on July 1.

Toussi said that recent politi-

cal developments made his trip to Iran more important than to the two continents. He said that the change in Iran's government has resulted in a

new anti-corruption group.

"Its policies are significantly directed for the improvement of the social services for the people," he said.

"And it is my hope that I can cooperately fit into the system to render my own part."

Toussi is in agreement with the stated policies of the present government under Premier Ali Amini which succeeded the government dismissed two months ago by King Reza Pahlavi.

Emphasizing the need for immediate social reforms in his country, Dr. Toussi said that there are three capacities in which he would be able to serve his country.

"My first alternative is to work with the administration through education," he said. "Working as a professor at the University of Teheran is another capacity in which I can serve my country."

"And the third alternative is a career in politics, which I will consider carefully."

The reason for carefully considering a political career, he explained, is mainly decided by the fact that all the social services contemplated and originated in any society would be affected by the kind of political direction the society adopts.

However, out of all these alternatives, he noted that he will chose the one which would give the best possibilities for expressing his social ideas.

Dr. Toussi who has been Secretary-General of the student UN since 1959, evaluated the organization as one that provides political and social experiences for the participating students.

Its impact, he said, is multi-dimensional.

One aspect of the international organization he noted, is that "it complements the comprehensive educational experience which a student should have."

"Another dimension is that it serves as an instrument which provides different phases of organizational practices. The ideas are originated, implemented, and evaluated.



Boros Predicts Tiger Pennant

Steve Boros, rookie third baseman for the league-leading Detroit Tigers, was in Lansing Monday afternoon. He was here for a medley of public appearances which took him to Frandor and four area Kroger stores.

Taking the afternoon "off," the 24-year-old slugger who bails from nearby Flint, signed over a thousand autographs, and delighted hysterical mobs of children who waited hours to greet him.

EVERYWHERE BOROS went he was virtually stampeded by eager fans.

At one of the four Kroger stores he visited, deputy sheriffs had to be called to disperse a mob which was determined to hold Boros captive until he gave everyone an autograph.

Under police protection he rushed from the Kroger Grand River establishment. Boros graciously etched his name on a watermelon for one woman and continued on his way to safety.

FOUR HOURS LATER, his public junket complete, Boros was driven to Capitol City airport.

"That Piersall business in Cleveland last Sunday was a minor incident compared to this," commented Boros in regard to the crowds which screamed and shoved for a token of recognition.

Boros, who needs one more term at the University of Michigan for a history degree stated: "Sometimes I wish I were in psychology instead of history. It's amazing what extremes people will go to for a name on a piece of paper."

BOROS' LANSING sojourn had furnished him with material that would make a master's degree in psychology a relatively easy matter.

Boros, a strong contender for "rookie of the year" honors, answered questions freely and nonchalantly as he enjoyed a coffee break at the airport.

When asked whether or not the Tigers would win the American League pennant, Boros replied:

"SURE THEY WILL."
"If Norm Cash and the rest of us keep up our hitting and

if Regan, Lary and the whole bullpen continue their winning ways—yes, then we'll win the pennant.

"Injuries can ruin our chances," he added frankly. "Morale couldn't be better than it is now. We're in good shape all across the board and we're hoping it stays that way."

Reporting on Sunday's highly publicized fracas between Cleveland's Jim Piersall and Detroit pitcher Jim Bunning, Boros said:

"FOR SOME REASON they both hate each others guts. It's been that way for years. Piersall's dandruff was really up on Sunday.

"We don't like to mess with Piersall," Boros continued. "He's usually at his best when he's mad."

Apparently, Piersall has been plenty "mad" this year. He's crowding Norm Cash for league leadership in the hitting department with a batting average of .351.

"Any pitcher knows that the only way to pitch him is high and inside," Boros said. "Jim (Bunning) was doing just that when on one pitch Piersall ducked. The ball hit his wrist."

INSTEAD OF TAKING first base, Piersall took first punch. He ran out to the pitcher's mound and clobbered Bunning with his fists and feet. He had to be restrained by fellow teammates and Tigers in a hassle which entertained 35,000 fans at Cleveland, and a regional TV audience.

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


