PRE-REGISTRATION SCHEDULE FOR WINTER TERM ANNOUNCED AS SIMILAR TO LAST YEAR'S

Prof. L. C. Emmons Issues Statement Giving Program for Pre-Enrollment Activities Plan Which Proved Great Success. Will Again be Utilized; Iron Out Details.

Students are to take advantage of vacant periods in meeting all appointments. No absences will be excused because of conflict of appointments with classes.

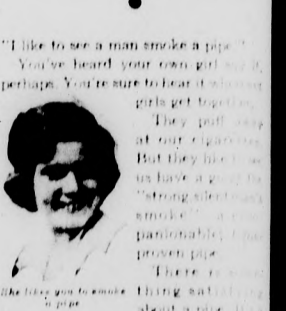
CLUB ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR YEAR

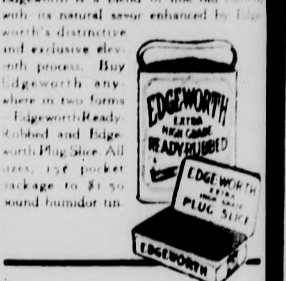
