Izvestia Hits U.S. on Berlin Talks

MOSCOW—Izvestia charged Sunday the United States is trying to sidetrack preliminary talks on Germany "from the path of a search for sensible solutions into the bog of plain nonsense." A few western diplomats—but not many—had thought Saturday's release of U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers might presage an era of good feeling between Moscow and Washington. They saw a possibility of easier negotiations on Berlin. But the article in the government newspaper, which also accused the United States of stirring up international tension, was a strong indication that nothing like that is in sight.

Franco, Salazar Plan To Unite

MADRID—Two aging giants in the world's dwindling ranks of dictators—Francisco Franco of Spain and Portugal's Antonio De Oliveira Salazar—were reported planning to meet Monday to discuss possible integration of their countries into a federation of the Iberian Peninsula. Informants said the scheduled meeting in the Western Spanish Town of Ciudad Rodrigo, 15 miles from Portugal's border, was urgently requested by premier Salazar.

Paris Leftists Call on Strike

PARIS—Leftist leaders refused Sunday to back down in the face of a government order banning mass demonstrations called for Monday at historic Place De La Republique. And a one-hour general strike also is planned. The strikes and demonstrations were called to protest against "fascism" and the European secret army's campaign of terror. Both socialists and communists declared the demonstration will go on.

10,000 Move To Fight Dutch

JAKARTA, Indonesia—About 10,000 trained volunteers moved into Eastern Indonesia Sunday, probably for infiltration into disputed West New Guinea. Some were believed to be Indonesians from Sumatra who once fought President Sukarno in an uprising in the outer islands against the strict economic controls imposed from Jakarta. Skilled in the type of jungle warfare required in the wilds of Dutch-held New Guinea, about 10,000 of these erstwhile rebels have asked to be sent to the East to fight the Dutch. An army announcement said the volunteers sailed from Jakarta Saturday.

Peace Seekers Urge Ban-on-Love

LONDON—A leader of a ban-the-bomb movement in Britain is trying to enlist support by a ban on love. The idea is to urge wives who favor disarmament to "withdraw their love" until their husbands agree to work for the abolition of nuclear weapons. John R. Boyden, 45-year-old industrialist and prominent member of the Petersfield, Hampshire, branch of the movement said: "I am going to talk to them about Lysistrata." Lysistrata was the heroine of an ancient Greek play who led a women's conspiracy for peace. She persuaded the Athenian women to withhold their affections from their husbands until peace was made with Sparta.

Campus Blood Drive Gets Started Monday

All students and faculty are entitled to blood in case of sickness or emergency if they have previously donated.

"There is no charge for the blood itself, but only for the administration of it," said Athletic Director Clarence "Biggie" Munn, Ingham County blood program chairman.

"We urge all students and faculty members to participate in the drive if at all possible," he said.

One faculty member who had donated in a recent drive had shipments of blood sent to his ailing mother in New Orleans. Thus, the blood service is nationwide.

Blood drive hours are as follows:

Monday and Tuesday: 10 a.m.-12 p.m., 1-5 p.m.

Wednesday and Thursday: 2-8 p.m.

Friday: 9 a.m.-3 p.m.

The winter term blood drive opens Monday at 10 a.m. on the 4th floor of the Union.

A goal of 1,250 pints has been

set for the drive, according to the Associated Women Students organization, sponsor.

Trophies will be awarded to the living units with the highest percentage of blood donated. Last term's overall winner was Farmhouse fraternity.

"The whole area is depending upon this University blood drive," said Mrs. Idabelle Borgman, American Red Cross county recruitment chairman.

Over 800 pints of blood are delivered to local hospitals each month, much of which comes from MSU drives.

18-Nation Summit Meeting Proposed by N. Khrushchchev

ANN ARBOR — Frederick Pryor, 23, self-described bonus in the deal which swapped U-2 pilot Gary Powers for Soviet spy Rudolf Able, spent Sunday night resting at home. Pryor's father, Millard, said, "My son is exhausted, but is physically in better shape than I had hoped for." The parents learned Friday at 11 p.m. that their son might be released early Saturday and greeted him at a West Berlin border crossing with a State Department official. Pryor was still wearing the same dark suit he had worn for five and one-half months in prison. He said he wasn't sure

where he had been imprisoned because he was blindfolded and moved several times. Pryor felt that this was routine treatment and said he thought he was in East Berlin or nearby East Germany the whole time. He was picked up last August while attending a speech in East Berlin, and held for investigation of possible espionage activities, but no charges were ever pressed. A graduate of Oberlin College, Pryor was doing research for his doctoral work at Yale when he was taken prisoner. Pryor, who is now in the market for a job as an economist, expects to receive his PhD in economics from Yale this June.

The elder Pryor said his son felt that the East German prison diet wasn't bad and wasn't good, but he had "had worse in some college dormitories." His parents said they were overjoyed at his return and felt he would be in "great shape after a good long rest." Pryor had known nothing of his connection with the Powers-Able swap until he was greeted at the border crossing by his parents and U.S. officials. He said he didn't enjoy being in the public eye and hoped the incident would die down quickly. His mother said he would probably be busy for several days answering letters from See STUDENT page 3

Spartans Improve Last Year's Finish

Western Broncos, Spartans Are Tops In MSU Relays

Two mishaps dampened State's chances for a better showing at the colorful MSU Relays in Jenison Saturday. The most crucial disappointment came in the final event, Sophomore John Parker, running the anchor leg in the university mile relay, got the baton a quarter lap behind the leaders, and with his graceful strides he gained some ground but noticeably started limping coming off his next to last turn. He made it to the tape to finish fourth, but fell with a severely sprained ankle that will keep him out for possibly two weeks. Parker had a chance to make the race close with Purdue's Dave Mills, the defending Big Ten indoor quarter-mile champ, who ran a fast :46.1 last leg to win the crowd rousing race. The second disappointing incident came at the beginning of the evening session in the 240-yard shuttle hurdles relay. The Spartan's newest hurdle

in addition, Bill Cole, and veteran Tom Peckham had picked up ground for MSU, and now it was Bill Mana's turn. Mana, as he attempted to jump his first hurdle collided with an MSU freshman track team member who was setting up a knocked down hurdle in the next lane. "I saw the guy all the way," Mana said. "Everything would have been alright if he hadn't stepped into my lane. I had no chance to avoid him, although I did try to go into the next lane." Mana had a yard and a half lead before the accident, and State had a good chance to win the race as they ran the fastest preliminary in the afternoon. Some 3,200 track fans, the most to attend the famed meet in recent years packed into the end sections of the field house to watch 275 performers from 18 colleges and universities. As expected the big three of Michigan—Western Michigan, State and Michigan—dominated the 19 events.

Western's Broncos, one of the rising track powers in the nation, won the unofficial team title for the second year in a row as they scored 53 points. The Spartans were not far behind with 48 points, to finish an unofficial second, a big improvement over last year's 28-point fourth place performance. Before Parker injured himself, he leaped 27'11" to win the broad jump final in the afternoon. His best personal mark was 23'6". He hopes to reach 24 feet this year. Parker also ran his usually fast quarter-mile lap in the sprint medley relay which was won by Loyola, anchored by 19-year-old Tom O'Hara. O'Hara, who ran away from everyone, ran his 880-yard leg in a fast 1:50.8. The rest of State's relay, which was about two seconds behind the winner, was made up of Zach Ford, 220 yards; Don Voorhes, 220 yards; and Capt. Jerry Young, 880 yards. Among the outstanding individuals for the Spartans was See SPARTAN page 4

Oriental Theme Featured at J-Hop

More than 1500 couples danced to the music of Count Basie and his orchestra in an Oriental setting at the 1962 J-Hop Saturday night. At the beginning of the evening, each coed was presented with a program, a green wrist booklet with Jade, the dance theme, imprinted on the cover. As the couples entered the Auditorium they were greeted with the sight of a starry sky in place of the ceiling. Clusters of lights gave the effect of an outdoor dance pavilion.

Carrying out this effect was a miniature pond, complete with water trickling over rocks and a blossoming cherry tree. The stage appeared to be an Oriental home or courtyard, with bamboo fences and lanterns at either end, and a large gold gong suspended from the middle of the curtain. And on the stage sat Count Basie and his orchestra. The group played from 8 to 12 p.m., with a short break only for intermission. Music from the slow and moody to the hottest jazz kept couples dancing every minute.

Perhaps the highest point in the evening was reached when the band played "Old Man River." For more than five minutes, drummer Sonny Payne demanded the attention of all as he threw sticks in the air, wound them around his neck, and even flipped one under his leg - without missing a beat.

Another high spot of the dance was the announcement that Sandra McNeal, Bay Village, Ohio, sophomore and Kappa Alpha Theta, has been chosen Miss MSU of 1962.

Following the formal crowning of Miss McNeal by last year's queen, Arlyn Greifen-dorf, favors - tiny tea pots, in keeping with the Oriental theme - were given to the coeds, and the dancing continued. Breakfast at the Albert Pick Motor Hotel completed the evening, and coeds returned to their dorms at 3 a.m.

General chairman of the J-Hop committee, Rich Reisberg, Long Beach, N.Y., junior, said Sunday, "Everything went off as planned, and our committees are happy with the results."

To JFK, Others In Letter

WASHINGTON (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchchev was reported Sunday night to have proposed an 18-nation summit meeting to open the March 14 disarmament conference at Geneva.

The proposal is understood to have been made in a letter Khrushchchev sent to President Kennedy and apparently was sending also to heads of the other nations involved.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk met at the State Department late Sunday afternoon with ambassadors of Britain, France, Canada and Italy.

Those are the other NATO allies which would be involved in the Geneva conference.

Rusk is understood to have given the ambassadors a full account of the seven-page Khrushchchev message to Kennedy. So far as could be learned none of the other western governments had at that time received the Khrushchchev proposal.

Khrushchchev sent the letter in response to a proposal made to him last Wednesday by Kennedy, and by British Prime Minister Harold MacMillan for foreign ministers to open the disarmament conference.

Khrushchchev is understood to have objected that the issues involved in trying to end the nuclear arms race are far too serious to turn over to bureaucrats—by which he made clear he meant the foreign ministers.

There was no immediate comment from the state department or White House on the new Khrushchchev maneuver, which in effect may be mainly an effort to over-top or outbid the Western powers in building up the disarmament meeting.

The known attitude of the Kennedy administration, as well as of the previous Eisenhower government, has been to oppose full-scale summit meetings unless advance negotiations give some assurance of success when the heads of government get together.

One reason often advanced for this opposition is that a failure at the summit on any of the great war and peace issues, such as disarmament, would inevitably create grave new tensions and perhaps increase instead of lessen the danger of war.

Nevertheless, the logic of the U.S. position would leave the way clear for a later summit conference on disarmament if the first stages of negotiations at Geneva opened up serious possibility of agreement between East and West. Thus it can be said authoritatively that if the Geneva meeting makes progress a summit meeting later in the spring is possible.

The 18 nations which are to meet at Geneva are the United States, Britain, France, Italy and Canada on the Western side, Russia, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Romania on the Communist side and eight nonaligned nations: Brazil, Burma, Ethiopia, India, Mexico, Nigeria, Sweden and the United Arab Republic.

The tone of Khrushchchev's letter, which Moscow reportedly intends to make public soon, is understood to be civil and free of the propaganda criticism which has usually characterized Soviet documents in the past.

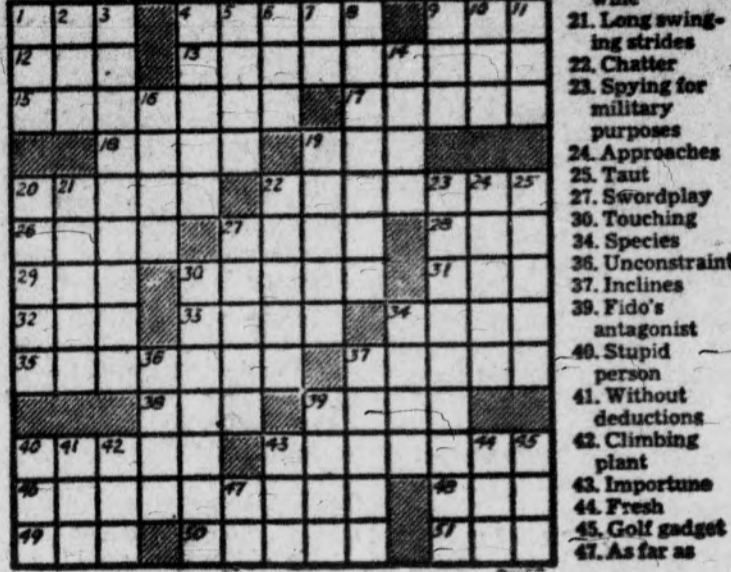

The Army team compiled 1406 points from a possible 1500 in competition with the MSU Air Force, University of Toledo, Army, and Central Michigan Army teams. The top five scorers for MSU Powers' reconnaissance plane fell 1,200 miles inside Russia on May 1, 1960. The pilot was seized, accused of espionage, pleaded guilty at a trial in Moscow and was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

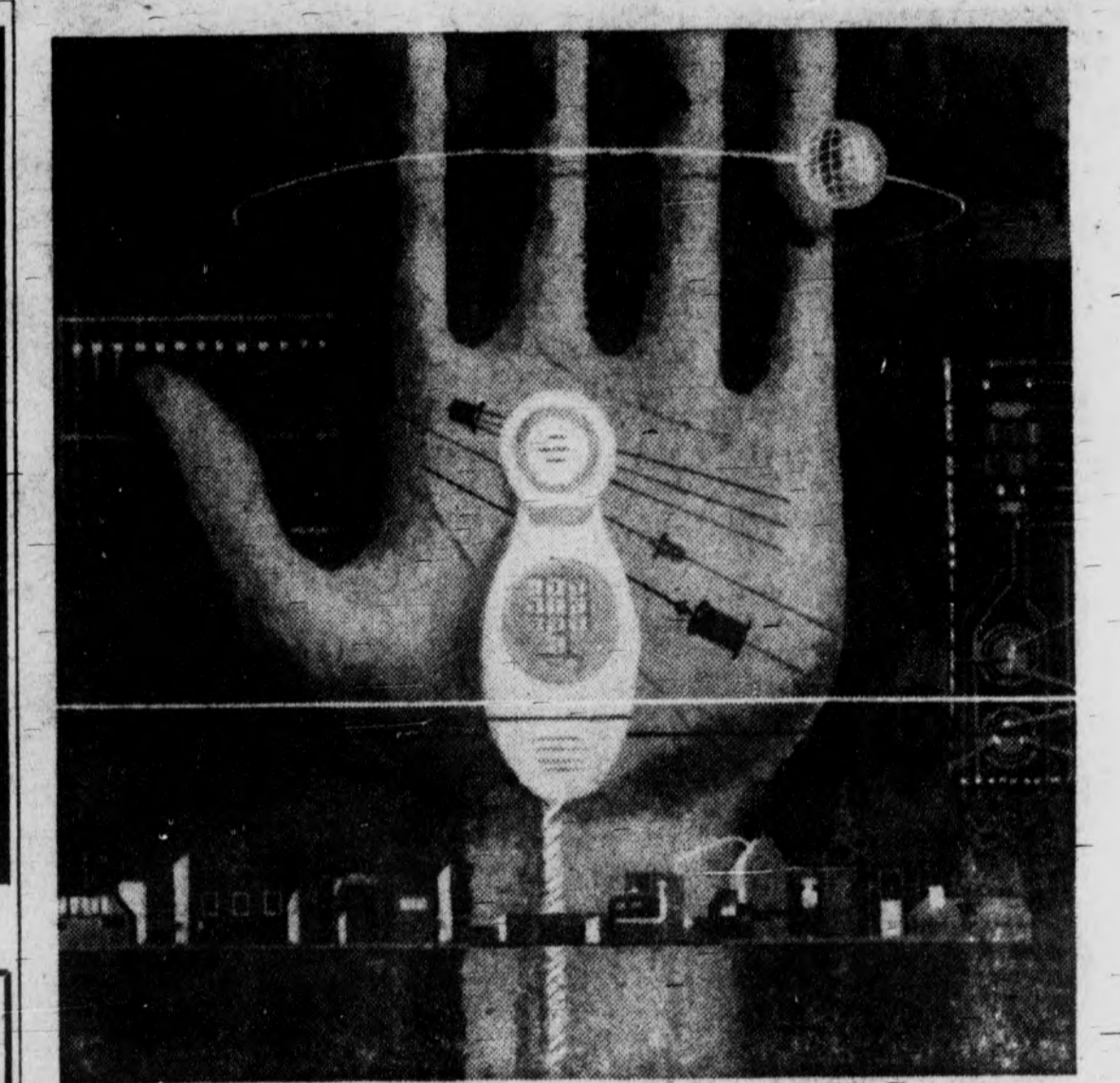

Gymnasts Demolish Opposition, 71-40

U. of Illinois Next After Tune-up Win

Tuning up for the toughest part of the schedule the Spartan Gymnastic team raised their season record to 6-1 by winning a one-sided victory over University of Illinois Chicago Branch.

The score was 71 to 40 for the tune-up.

Next week the Spartans face Southern Illinois, a very strong team which last year was second in the NCAA Gymnastic Championships. The next day they go against the University of Illinois which is the only team this year to beat Big Ten

Champion University of Michigan. The Spartans placed first in every event to win the meet this weekend.

Scoring the highest number of points for the team in this meet were senior Larry Bassett and sophomore Jerry George. Both scored 14 points to lead the Spartans.

Bassett won his points by taking a first on the parallel bars and seconds in free exercise and tumbling. George won on the side horse and placed third in parallel bars and still rings. He also got a fourth on the high bar.

Sophomore Dick Gilberto had one of his best days in winning the tumbling event and placing third in trampoline and free exercise.

With Gilberto taking the third in the free exercise event the Spartans made a sweep of the first three places.

Taking first in the event was Gani Brown. He just nosed out teammate Larry Bassett by one-half a point in the sweep. Coach Szypula said this was the best event for the team.

Dale Cooper had another tremendous performance on the still rings to win the

event and beat his personal record for high scores. The judges at the meet gave him a 97.5 average to beat his record 96.5 that he scored against the University of Michigan. He has achieved the highest average score for the Spartans in the 15 year history of gymnastics at State.

Team Captain Jim Durkee had a nice performance to win the horizontal bar event for the team.

Steve Johnson showed that he is slowly returning to championship form on the trampoline to win the event. He is still recovering from an injury that kept him from performing in the tumbling event but should be ready to go this coming weekend.

A surprise in the meet was a fourth place on the trampoline by Paul Johnson. Paul is a brother of State's great Trampolinist, Steve. Paul has been working the trampoline this past week in an effort to strengthen the trampoline team. He has been diving on the Spartan swimming team and received permission from swimming coach McCaffree to perform for the Gymnastic team. He is the number two diver for the swimming team.

Another scorer for the Spartans was Wayne Bergstrom who took a third on the side horse.

Next week will be a big one for the Spartans. Both teams they face will have several national champions performing for them. Southern Illinois has two champions and a past Olympic team member. Illinois has a championship side horse team.

In the 300, Lewis tied the varsity record of :31.2 in an all-out effort. He had the lead on the last turn, but Missouri's Jim Baker took a slight lead down the stretch and Lewis had to pour it on winning by one-tenth of a second.

Purdue's sophomore great Nate Adams, first, and Western Michigan's Joel Johnson, second, placed ahead of Lewis in the dash. State's surprising Ron Watkins took fifth.

One of the biggest personal battles was settled in the high and low hurdles. Michigan's Bennie McRae leaned into the tape to defeat the Spartans' Herm Johnson by two inches. In doing so, McRae, who is just getting into shape, tied the meet and field house record of :08.9 set by Ohio State's Glenn Davis in 1956.

Johnson came off the blocks slow and built up amazing speed, but did not have enough left to beat McRae as he did the Saturday before at Ann Arbor.

In the lows, Johnson got off to another slow start, came up fast as usual, but lost again this time by less than a foot.

The high jump produced a new record as Western's top jumper Alonzo Littlejohn cleared 6'7 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". He was two-eighths of an inch of the field house mark.

State placed three men in the high jump event. The Spartan's best high jumper, Wilmer "Bubba" Johnson cleared the bar at 6'3" and Peckham and Jim Roe were among six others that tied for fourth place at 6'2".

For the first time a five way tie for first prevailed in the pole vault. State's Jerry Dehenau was among those that cleared the low height of 13'3". Most of the vaulters were using the controversial fiber glass poles.

MSU's two-mile relay team of Bill Stewart, Ron Hornung, Warren Ochs and Bob Fulcher took a fourth place

behind top teams from Michigan, Western and Drake.

Two-miler Morgan Ward stayed near the front of the pack most of the race and was in second position with two laps to go, but did not have enough to take the lead. Frank Carver of Notre Dame was first in 9:18.4.

Ochs managed to take a fifth for the Spartans in the 1,000-yard run. Ohio State's Bill Huckaba won the event.

One of the nation's best shot putters, Missouri's Don Smith, won the put with a throw of 58 $\frac{1}{2}$ " to win the championship two consecutive years. State did not place any men in the top five.

Other events that the Spartans did not run in or place are: the mile run, won by Missouri's Jerry McFadden in 4:15.6; the 600-yard run, won by Purdue's Mills; the college mile relay, won by Loyola with O'Hara as anchor; the distance medley, won by Michigan.

"We did pretty good", said Coach Fran Dittich. "We seem to have just as good balance as Michigan and Western Michigan."

Foilmen Win Two

Michigan State's Fencing team boosted its record to 4-3 Saturday by defeating Wisconsin, 14-13, and Iowa, 16-11, in a triangular meet at Iowa.

Foil fencer Bob Brooks was the man of the hour for the Spartans in the close Wisconsin meet. With the score tied at 13-all, Brooks defeated Badger Charles Ringrose 5-4 to give MSU the victory.

State lost the foil event to the Badgers 5-4 but the Spartans won the epee and sabre events by 5-4 scores. Dick Schloemer placed the epee team against Wisconsin by winning all three of his bouts. Joe Antonetti lead the sabre team with three wins.

Against Iowa the Spartans lost the foil and sabre events by 5-4 scores but they trounced the Hawkeyes 8-1 in sabre to win the meet.

Louis Salamone and Phil Slavton led the Spartans route of the Iowa sabre team with 3 wins each. Antonetti won two against Iowa to give him the best individual record for the day at 5-0.

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Wrestlers Tie Ohio State, 14-14

The Spartan wrestling team came from behind to tie Ohio State 14-14 Saturday at the IM building in what turned out to be the most exciting meet thus far at home.

Three out of four State's wins were scored by former Lansing wrestlers including a 10-4 decision by Alex Valcanoff and the match tying pin by John Baum.

Ohio State took an early lead by winning the first two weight classes. Okla Johnson was decided by the Buckeyes Don Green 4-6 and Bill Gucciardo was decided by Gary Joseph 3-1.

State's first win came in the following match when Tom Mulder, another Lansing product, decided Joe Piccioni 4-1 making the score 6-3 in favor of Ohio State. Mulder was the team captain for the day, substituting for senior George Hobbs, who is in the process of switching from the 130 pound class to 123.

Hobbs wrestled 123 last year and moved up to 130 because the Big Ten dropped the 115-

pound class. Coach Findley Collins is in the process of building a team for the coming Big Ten meet and feels Hobbs could do a better job at 123.

The Buckeyes' Carl Miller decided Monty Byington, 4-6, to take the 147-pound class and make the score 9-3.

Hap Fry countered with a 5-0 shutout over Bob Burton to make the score 9-6. Fry scored two points in the first and third periods with a takedown and a reversal respectively and earned one point for acquiring riding time.

Senior Bob Schluter, making his first appearance for the squad this year, was pinned by Ohio's Cliff Perrine in 1:27 of the first period. Schluter, who wrestled in 157 class last year, has been out with an injured shoulder. Collins said he substituted Schluter for regular John McCray (167) to give Schluter a chance to see action before the year was out. McCray was pinned and decided last weekend by Southern Illinois and Illinois.

The pin gave Ohio State a lead of 14-6, leaving the job up

to Valcanoff and Baum.

Valcanoff decided Bill Armstrong, 10-4, in a match that had the pin-hungry crowd on the edge of their seats. Twice he almost succeeded, but Armstrong managed to get away. Had he been successful, State would have won the meet.

In the final match, heavy-weight Baum picked up Tom Kilroy and slammed him to the mat, scoring the fall in 1:37 of the first period and tying the meet 14-14.

After the meet, Collins said the match definitely didn't go as he had expected.

"We had our let down," he said. "I hope we got it out of our systems."

Collins attributed the tie to the loss of Hobbs and the expectation of a toss-up meet.

"We made a mistake in the 167 class, but I wanted to give the boy a chance," he said.

The squad still has an undefeated record with five wins and two ties. The over-all Big

Ten record is three wins and one tie.

In other Big Ten action this weekend, Michigan lost to Iowa, 15-12. Purdue lost to Wisconsin, 14-12, and Wisconsin defeated Wheaton, 20-6 and Superior, 19-9. Purdue also defeated the same two teams, 17-8 and 23-8 respectively.

Next Saturday, arch-rival Michigan will be here. The meet will be held in the IM Sports Arena at 3 p.m.

Hockey Team Drops Two; Slips to Fourth Place

Michigan State's hockey team skidded to fourth place in the Western Collegiate Hockey League by losing twice to the Michigan Tech Huskies, 3-2 and 3-2 at Houghton Friday and Saturday.

The double win enabled Tech to take first place in the WCHL as Michigan lost twice at Denver and dropped to second place.

Gene Rebellato led the Huskies' eight goal attack Friday with a three-goal hat trick.

The score was tied 1-1 at the end of the first period. Gary Begg gave Tech a 1-0 lead and State's Claude Fournel tied the score at 17:47.

The Huskies upped their lead to 3-1 in the second period with goals by Dou Angotti and Rebellato.

John Ivanitz gave Tech a 4-1 lead at 51 seconds of the third period and 30 seconds later Tom Lackey scored his 13th goal of the season for the Spartans.

Trailing 4-2 with only 12 minutes left in the game the Spartans played a wide open game which backfired as Tech scored four more times in the final minutes.

In Saturday's game, played in the afternoon as a featured part of Tech's Winter Carnival, the Spartan defense came to life and did an excellent job of

containing the Huskies' fast-skating forwards. But the Tech defensemen took over the scoring as they accounted for all of the Huskies' goals.

State jumped off to a 2-0 first period lead on goals by Jim Jacobson and Dickie Johnstone. Henry Akervall scored for Tech and the first period ended with the Spartans ahead 2-1.

Akervall's goal came with the Spartans a man short. There was a mix-up in changing defensemen and the Spartans picked up a two minute penalty for too many men on the ice.

Elov Seger tied the game at 2:31 for Tech when he scored the first of his two goals at 13:23 of the second period.

The third period was scoreless mainly because of sensational work by both goal tenders.

With less than two minutes left, State's Bob Doyle picked up a two minute penalty. Doyle's penalty carried over into the sudden-death overtime, and three seconds before he was to step back on the ice, Seger scored his second goal to give Michigan Tech a 3-2 win.

The Denver Pioneers invaded the MSU Ice Arena for a two game series with the Spartans Thursday and Friday. The Pioneers boosted their record to 7-5 by a double win over Michigan last week. State is a half game behind Denver with a 6-5-1 mark.

Tankers Lose to OSU, 59-46

Ohio State's swimmers rolled on to their fifth win of the season taking in its wake the Spartans tankers, 59-46. Although not victorious, the Spartans recorded some of their best times of the year to date.

The Buckeye's first winning event was the 400-yd medley relay. Ohio State took it in 3:49.9 to break the standing NCAA championship, Big Ten and the dual meet records. Dan

Jamieson, Bill Driver, Carl Shaar and Dick Blazewski swam for State.

Mike Wood scored the first victory for the Spartans in the 220-yd freestyle, timed at 2:03. Wood tied the varsity, IM pool records and broke the dual meet record. Doug Rowe placed second.

Ohio State's John Plain beat Jeff Mattson by one tenth of a second in the 50-yd freestyle. Plain's time was :22.1. Jack Foster of Ohio State was third and State's Jim White placed fourth. Plain broke the varsity, IM pool record and tied the dual meet record. Mattson also broke the varsity and IM pool records.

The 200-yd individual medley was taken by Buckeye Marty Mull in 2:03.6. This time broke the Big Ten, varsity, IM pool and dual meet records. Bill Wood placed second and Joe Kolbe, fourth.

Lou Vitucci, national spring-board diving champ, took the diving competition with fellow teammate Juan Botella holding down the second position. Van Lowe placed third.

Spartan captain Carl Shaar took the 200-yd butterfly event in 2:03.7. Chuck Strong came in third.

The Buckeye's John Plain

broke the standing dual meet record of :49.3 in the 100-yd freestyle. Mike Wood was just a fraction behind to place second and Jeff Mattson, third.

L. B. Schaefer broke the IM pool and dual meet records in the 200-yd backstroke to place first. Dan Jamieson took third and Neil Watts took fourth.

The 400-yd freestyle was taken by Orrin Nordstrom with Dick Brackett placing second and Dick Blazewski, third.

Fuckey Tom Kovacs, in 2:15.1, took the 200-yd breaststroke. Bill Driver placed second and Dennis Ruppert, fourth. Kovacs broke the IM pool, varsity and dual meet record.

Jeff Mattson, Doug Rowe, Bill Wood and Mike Wood joined forces to take the 400-yd freestyle relay in 3:17.6. This time again broke the NCAA championship record and the Big Ten record. State went two seconds better against Indiana a few weeks ago to break the American record.

Michigan State next faces Michigan, Friday night at Ann Arbor. The Spartans have previously beaten the Wolverines in the Big Ten relays early this year and should do it again Friday.

Cold Cage Shooting Causes State's Third Straight Loss

Frigid shooting caused Michigan State's third basketball loss in a row Saturday afternoon as the Spartans bowed 77-72 to second-place Wisconsin at Madison.

State, hitting on less than 30 per cent of its shots for the second straight game, managed but 24 field goals in 81 attempts against the Badgers.

"We just couldn't put the ball through the hoop," coach Fordy Anderson said. "The kids played hard and worked the ball in for good shots — and then couldn't make them."

"There's no explanation for a poor shooting performance like we suffered through today."

Sophomore guard Bill Schwarz continued his fine work since becoming a starter, leading State scorers with 21 points. Schwarz connected on eight of 13 attempts from the field and sank five of eight free throws.

MSU Capt. Art Schwarm had 14 points, and Bill Berry 12.

Wisconsin was topped by Ken Siebel's 23 points, and 14-point performances by Tom Gwyn and Mike O'Melia. Tom Hughes finished with 10.

The Badgers led 38-31 at halftime and State managed to pull within six, 47-41 early in the second half. But when the Spartans fell victim to numerous ball-handling and traveling violations, Wisconsin surged to a 64-42 margin with nine minutes left.

The Spartans began creeping up but when State pulled within nine points with three minutes to go, the Badgers stalled and capitalized on MSU fouls.

Coach Anderson was puzzled by the contest.

"It's all the harder to understand," he said, "because this week's practice sessions were the best of the year, and Thursday's workout was the sharpest individual practice of the entire season."

Michigan State is now 2-7 in the Big Ten and 7-10 overall. Wisconsin is 6-1 in the conference and 13-4 on the season.

State now begins preparations for the Ohio State invasion next Saturday night at

Jenison Fieldhouse. The Buckeyes, first in the nation and undefeated, smothered Minnesota Saturday, 91-66, as Jerry Lucas hit on 14 of 15 field goal attempts and finished with 34 points.

Ohio State matched the Big Ten win-streak record with the Minnesota victory, as the Bucks won their 23rd straight conference game. OSU has now won 13 without a loss this year, and will seek their 19th tonight against Michigan at Ann Arbor.

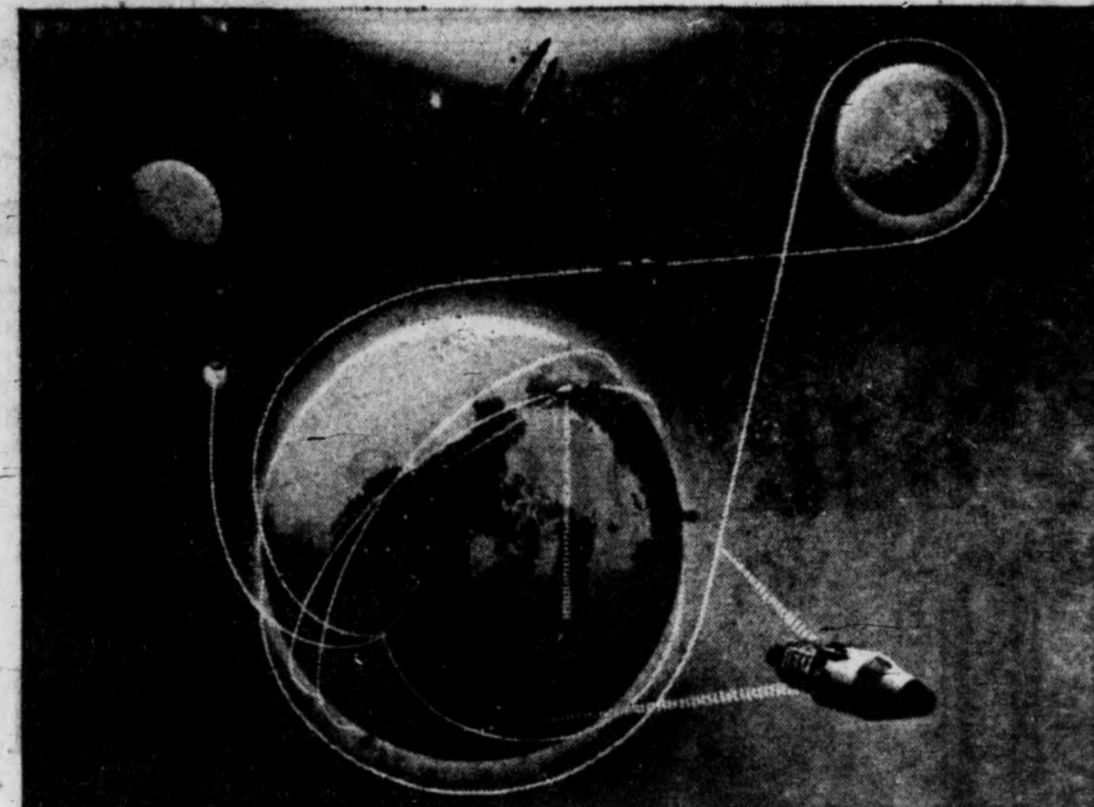

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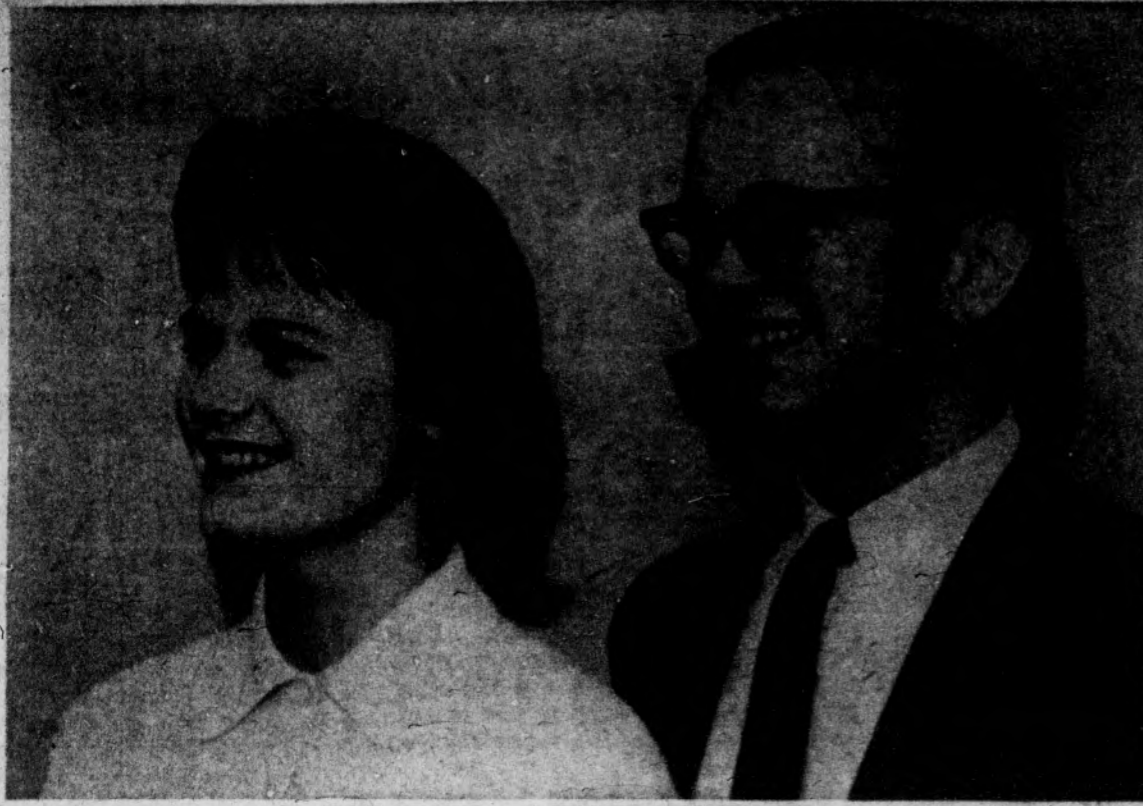

pervasive interest in the University of Nigeria for many years—indeed, since long before its formal establishment. Many members of our faculty are serving there, and many Nigerian students are now on our campus.

"It is my observation that the people of West Africa thirst for knowledge and education above all things. Anything we can do to satisfy that thirst will be in the best interest of our own university, the University of Nigeria, and indeed, for all mankind."

Michigan State's International Programs and the Delta Sigma Theta sorority are sponsoring the book drive.

Lord Snowdown Claims Seat in House of Lords

LONDON (AP)—Lord Snowdown, Princess Margaret's husband, will don the ermine-trimmed robes and coronet of an earl on Feb. 23 and claim his seat in the House of Lords.

It will be the first time he has worn the ceremonial robes since his sister-in-law, Queen Elizabeth-II, conferred a peerage on him last October, a

court spokesman said Wednesday.

A former society photographer and man-about-town will be introduced to his fellow peers by two sponsors.

They are the 53-year-old Earl of Leicester, extra equerry to Queen Elizabeth since 1952, and 37-year-old Earl of Westmorland, Lord-in-waiting to the Queen since 1955.

A court spokesman said it was not known whether Snowdown would take his seat immediately after his introduction or if he planned to attend future debates in the upper house.
