Cuba 'Tainted' Ships Barred From Trade

WASHINGTON P - President Kennedy forbade Wednesday the shipment of U.S. governmentfinanced goods aboard any foreign vessel which has been to Cuba since last Jan. 1.

But if the offending shipowner promises not to sail his company's vessels-to Cuba again, he nors, Chicago junior; and Judith Stelter, will be allowed to share in the U.S. government trade.

Presidential press secretary Pierre Salinger announced the long-swaited Kennedy order, which White House sources freely conceded falls far short of a tougher four-point plan first proposed by the administration before last October's Cuban missile

These sources said the new order was limited because free world shipping to Cuba has already dropped off sharply because of U.S. diplomatic influence. Stiffer penalties can still



Bereiter said that personality psychology has to work out its own axioms and use them.

"In other sciences, it is believed that one thing leads to another and in doing so sometimes ends up down a blind alley. When they are in that blind alley they can compare their own results with others and see their mistakes.

"For us, mistakes don't show the way. The only things we can depend on are intuition and common sense," he said.
