The East Lansing City Council Monday night approved the appeal by the Off-Campus Anti-Tax Committee to extend the date of filing personal property statements.

The decision reversed an earlier one requiring the statements to be sent to the city assessor's office by Feb. 7. The extension was granted to fraternities, sororities and stude at cooperatives on whose behalf the committee launched the appeal.

City assessor Frank A. Warden did not grant a blanket extension of the date for filing personal property statements as requested by the Off-Campus Anti-

Tax Committee. Instead, he said arrangements could be made with the city assessor on an individual basis to request postponement of the filing date.

The committee had made a request to have the filing date

extended to March 1. City Manager John M. Patriarche said, "March I does not leave enough time before the board of review meets."



# 'Thieves' Find Library A Pushover

The University library has attempted to eliminate, or at least to reduce, book thefts by students.

Methods used to date have

Students can and do steal books.

We did it. Not only books, but magazines, newspapers, microfilm and docu-

Testing the library theft control methods, two State News staff members passed all control points, including the exit turnstiles and guards, with 24 separate pieces of library prop-

None of it was checked out.

None of it was missed, until it was returned personally to library director Richard Chapin.

The library does not have an effective theft control system.

Neither professional nor student personnel noticed the thie-

Supervision of both documents and microfilm was lax. Theft from open stacks and magazine racks offered no problem. Turnstile guards smiled meekly at proffered decoys, failing completely as preventative agents.

New methods of theft control must be found.

More adult, professional supervision must be maintained during all library hours, even at the cost of eliminating some student jobs.

peak hours are necessary. The adult male is a stronger theft deterrent than the unchallenging coed part-time employee. Additional checkout turnstiles would allow for more thorough supervision of library users. and would not slow down checkout time.

Adult supervision in microfilm, newspaper and document rooms would lessen theft opportunities and would also provide a bonus for students--professional assistance in locating needed

Newspapers currently unmarked should also be stamped as library property to provide easy identification for check-out supervisors.

Professional information centers, currently of little worth, should be maintained in all areas. A central information desk, with a qualified librarian on duty at all times, should be an integral part of daily library operation and not an intermittent service to library

Students, often frustrated in efforts to locate library materials, should receive quality assistance from the library staff. This would help to lessen student animosity toward "that" library.

Stealing out of self-protection, "beating someone else to the punch," would be reduced by a concentrated program of library assistance to students and adult supervision at major theft control points.
