Publications Board Names Harrison and Beckwith to Fill Newsaper Positions

Business Manager Is Appointed to Take Place of Frank Noble; Beckwith Is Appointed News Associate Editor; Many Fresh Try Out for News Jobs.

The publications board yesterday afternoon appointed Harrison, Red Aye, acting business manager of the Michigan State News to take the place of Frank Noble, former News business head, who is confined to the Ingham county sanatorium. Harrison has been a member of the publications board for three years and is well qualified for the position which the publications board has delegated to him pending the return of Noble.

Beckwith, O. V. D., was appointed associate editor of the News to fill the position created when Noble's resignation did not return to him this year. Beckwith has been much service to the college paper and last year was the associate editor. He is a complete business man and has been in the office of the News for several years. The board specifically appointed Beckwith to the position because of his long experience in newspaper work.

The largest group ever to have tried out for the News positions was held in the armory last night. The candidates for the positions of business manager and news associate editor were: Harrison, Beckwith, and several others. Harrison and Beckwith were the only ones who were chosen for the positions.

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SLIGHT DROP IN FALL QUARTER REGISTRATION

Enrollment Reaches 3,067 According to Latest Figures Few Still Entering.

OFFICIALS ARE PLEASD
Expected 10 Per Cent Decrease Lowers to Three Per Cent Enrollment Proceeds.

The fear that the registration for fall term this year would fall far below the same enrollment of last year has been entirely destroyed as the total registration to date has mounted to nearly 3,100 with a few stragglers still coming to register in various classes.

A report from the registrars filed in Wednesday showed that the total enrollment for the fall term is 3,067, which covers all departments and includes the graduate students at several points. For comparison last year's registration was 3,100.

The English tests given to new students this year proved as an indicator for the ability of the students in English. The grade given in this test decided whether the student was to take a slow section in his course or the scheduled course in past years the grade in his test so work in the student had to be added to the section.

The large number of students in certain sections and courses, one class has been divided into two and the sections are being reduced and more sections being added. The history department has added more enrollments than last year because of many graduates returning to finish work on doctor's degrees.

Prof. E. B. C. has been changed from an English language section to a class in public work and other programs have been added to the staff.

With the start of the second week of the fall term the classes will be fully well organized and the amount of incoming students will be decreased to an insignificant number.

Summer Term Sees Changes in Library

The summer just past has been an exceptionally busy one in the Michigan State college library for while serving a record summer check enrollment of over 800. The summer staff members have also organized many phases of the book service for the opening of the fall term.

In comparison with the maintenance budgets of other state college libraries that at Michigan State has been reasonably adequate in recent years so it has been possible to carry out a considerable program of reorganization although far from a complete one of course, remarked Mr. Towne, the new college librarian.

The work of each department of the library has been carefully reorganized in accordance with the most recent practice in college library administration. Daily, weekly, monthly and annual functions of each of the department heads have been determined and set down on paper.

To provide for the expansion of the collection it has been necessary to shift all the books in the library from 99,500 bound volumes over 300,000 full catalogued, for more than 200,000. The stacks have been clearly re-labeled, and a check of many books taken in the following fields: general works, philosophy, religion, philology, fine arts and useful arts. Only 200 books were found missing in these fields. Next summer the book check will be completed when the social sciences, literature, the pure sciences and history are gone over. A number of new pictures have been hung in various rooms of the college library. The new reading room now boasts two sets of large portraits of presidents of the United States.

The State Board of Agriculture authorized the addition of over a hundred dollars worth of wall displays for the library. The book budget is large enough so that three or four experiments in recreational reading can be undertaken, and a portion of the new wall display has been placed in the assigned reading room. On this shelf, a special browsing collection of European travel is now displayed to remind students that the books containing their assigned readings are not the only ones available.

Dormitory libraries have been established in each wing of Mary Mayo hall. Some of the books have been chosen from new lists which have been used in the new dormitory libraries at the University of Chicago.

Prompt notification of faculty members of duplication of their orders of receipt of their books or of delays caused by out-of-stock orders, constitute some of the reforms which have been put into effect in the college library order department.

The Michigan State college library is a full depository for the documents.

FRATERNITIES ECONIMIZE

Victims of a 30 per cent reduction in fraternity support bills have brought widespread opposition to the proposal that a cooperative managers' association be instituted on this campus.

House managers have expressed their willingness to consider cooperative plans, such as are in operation at the Oregon State college at Corvallis, Stanford University and the University of Wisconsin. Most plans, however, are based on the successful managers' association at Corvallis which has been reducing fraternities and societies budgets since 1929.

The association at Oregon is owned by a graduate manager responsible to a board of house managers. All 51 organizations at that campus have joined the association and it is estimated that annual revenue that it has saved exceeds \$2,000 a year.

Dr. J. G. Dillback, dean of men at the Oregon State college, in backing the association has stated: "It not only saves money and time for fraternities and societies, it serves, but it stabilizes their finances. The association manager handles almost all business of these organizations in constant touch with the financial situation of each one, advising continually and suggesting the most business method agreed upon by the members. As a result the college administration is relieved almost entirely of this responsibility."

Dean of Men S. H. Goodnight of the University of Wisconsin replied to the "Contemporary" in a similar vein, explaining that such fraternities organizations are adapted to their own needs and operation of the plan proposed by the cooperative at Corvallis.

Such a cooperative managers' association for the purchase of supplies for California fraternities and societies as financial conditions are acute and a move to save money should meet with general acclaim. The organization demands the attention of every fraternal house manager.—Daily Californian.

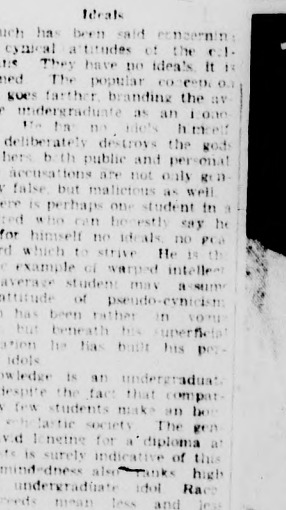

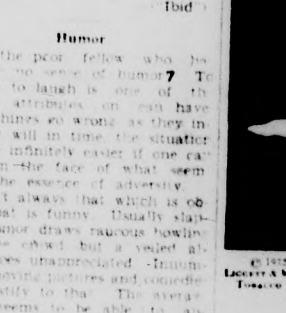

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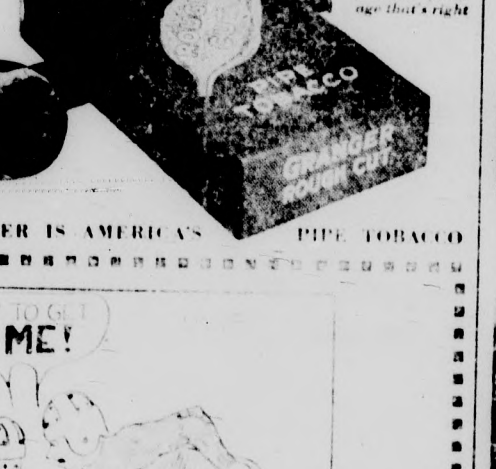
