## ANTIQUATED TRADITIONS SHELVED BY COUNCIL

### Pledge List Shows Increase Over Last Year Group Throws Overboard Outworn Tradition Lists; Restates Necessary Rules

#### FRATERNITY PLEDGE QUOTA REACHES ONE HUNDRED THIRTY AS EARLY LIST IS REVAMPED

Period of Probation Begins for Prospective Initiates; Slight Drop in Total of Pledges Seen But May Be Removed as Returns Continue.

The partial list of fraternity pledges in Wednesday night shows a slight increase over the number of men pledged in the same time last year. During the same period last fall there were only 125 pledged to the various fraternities which signed over 130 men this year.

The official pledging season started Sunday night at 9:40 o'clock and will last for the rest of the year. The newly pledged men will wear the pledge pin of the society that they are affiliated with until the period of probation is terminated by initiation.

# Sororities Report Pledging of Ninety-six Co-eds

## RUSHING PERIOD ON CAMPUS ENDS WITH NINETY-SIX GIRLS SIGNING PREFERENCE SLIPS

Little Confusion Occurs as Fresh Women Make Choices Among Campus Houses; One Hundred Ninety Slips Mailed; System Works Excellently With Only One Error Recorded.

Preference slips, the official acceptance of pledgeship, were returned to sororities by ninety-six women, as fall term rushing came to a close Tuesday night. Using practically the same rules as in the past year, rushing was carried on with a minimum of errors and misunderstandings both on the part of the sororities and the rushes.

This year one hundred ninety preference slips were sent out by the sororities. Financial difficulties were thought to have caused the non-return of the majority, though some believe that the shortness of the rushing period this year caused a great deal of uncertainty and hesitation among freshmen girls.

Regarding the efficiency of the pledging system, a very favorable report has been returned. A statement of one of the national sororities on the campus during the past week observed that the system worked excellently. This year the mistake common in other colleges—that of the return of unpledged preference slips—was totally avoided by the device of having slips returned to the address envelopes in which they were received. Only one mistake of this kind occurred this year. The slip to be returned to the Panhellenic association and it is probable that the same of the one will be discovered.

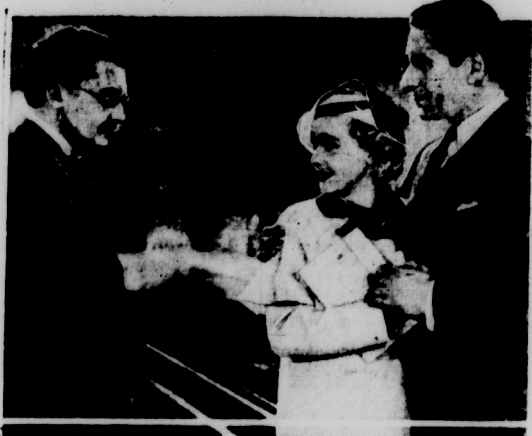
### COUNCIL CALLS SPECIAL VOTE

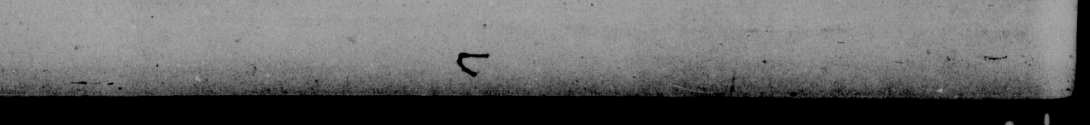
