INVITE CITIES TO ASK FORESTRY AID

State Specialists Will Help Communities in All Forest Work

Michigan communities which intend this fall or winter to employ men in reforestation, woodlot thinning or other work involving forests, as a welfare measure, are invited by the forestry department at Michigan State college to use the specialists from that department to help plan the work.

This kind of employment provided beautiful outdoor work upon projects which will return a future profit to the communities in which it is undertaken if the proper plans and methods are used. Foresters at Michigan state have had the technical training which enables them to plan work in forests or woodlots which will result in future benefits.

The mechanical equipment needed for employing crews in forestry work consists of simple expensive tools. The cost itself needs careful planning but after the plans are made the work can be directed and performed by men who have had no previous training in similar jobs.

Communities which wish to use this form of welfare employment may secure the cooperation of Michigan State college by writing to the forestry department at that institution.

Many unproductive acres available for farm purposes can be profitably reforested. Many small lots and prairie stumps, better timber, if the present stand of trees is properly thinned and a crop of fuel can be harvested during the thinning. Clearing up river banks through cities and the planting of the proper species of trees will result in the providing of recreation centers for future years.

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CHEM. DIVISION PICTURES METAL

Department Works With Only Machine of Its Kind in Middle West.

Using the only machine of its kind in the middle west, the chemical engineering department is taking pictures of metals with ultra violet light. The wave length of the ultra violet rays are only 3650 microns, shorter than that of visible light, and this gives resolutions of 33 per cent greater than is possible with ordinary light. Instead of using a standard Mazda or arc lamp the mercury vapor lamp, a powerful source of ultra violet is used. The lenses in the machine are made of quartz instead of glass and the objective in the microscope is one of the most powerful built.

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DEPRESSION HITS MIDWEST SCHOOLS

Reports from Colleges Reveal Many Interesting Facts.

The effect of the depression which has swept from the college campuses north of the mid-graduates posed his studies has adversely affected college enrollments, a survey of twenty-four colleges and universities of the country indicates.

Officials of institutions from Boston to Berkeley have estimated the chief effect of the depression on the student body and to some the attention of students on books and blackboards. The student of 1932 according to these reports has added to his books and is having second-hand books, and more than ever before is looking for a second-hand book to work his way.

Another interesting fact drawn from the statistics compiled is that the present trend is away from technical education toward cultural subjects. In general the institutions the enrollment of which were most affected by the depression seem to be those located in the western half of the Middle West. Most of the eastern colleges and universities maintained their enrollment last year and a few of these such as the University of Michigan and Cornell reported slight increases in enrollment, although the latter reported a drop of more than 100 students.

At the University of California it is reported that the chief effect of the depression is the loss of students on the part of the colleges already crowded to capacity last college period. It was also noted that students who had been attending in other larger institutions were attending here, but a majority is expected to leave this year.

From the above it would appear that students who formerly were charged from home by parents of moderate means are now continuing their studies for lack of opportunity to do so.
