

Veep Hopeful In Detroit

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey renewed the Democratic campaign issues of "peace and prosperity" in Detroit Wednesday, characterizing Republican presidential nominee Barry M. Goldwater as "a man whose recklessness in words foretells a recklessness in deeds."

Campaigning in Michigan for the second time in a week, the Democratic vice-presidential candidate told more than 600 National Guardsmen in Detroit's Cobo Hall that "the last day of the 'gun-slinger--the quick draw man' -- ended when the first atomic bomb was exploded."

Later, Humphrey addressed a partisan crowd of several thousand in Kennedy Plaza and said. "The man from the sands of Arizona (Goldwater)has no sympathy or understanding for the problems of the big cities.'

In his "non-political" speech at the National Guard Conference, Humphrey said that the President is the only person who should have control of America's nuclear striking force.

Humphrey's hard-hitting criticism was aimed at Goldwater's repeated campaign statements that NATO commanders should be given control of certain "tactical nuclear weapons."

"The average tactical nuclear bomb in Western Europe today is five times as powerful as the bomb dropped on Hiroshima," Humphrey said.

He said that small nuclear weapons kill primarily by radiation, rather than blast.

"This doesn't seem to worry my colleague in the Senate from Arizona, Barry Goldwater. But it worries our allies in Europe, where those nuclear weapons would have to be used. It worries me. This column is an effort to clear up these misunderstandings and to enable students to know what we are

Editorials are printed only on the left hand side of this page and are printed in a larger type size than other articles.

Editorial policy is decided by an editorial board consisting of Charles Wells, campus editor; Liz Hyman, managing editor; Hugh Leach, wire editor; Richard Schwartz, sports editor; myself and editorial writers, Susan Filson and Michael Kindman. All are expected to contribute editorials.

Columns are written by members of the editorial board and the staff of reporters. Regular State News columns can be identified through a title such as "Editor's Note" which appears above this column. Photos of regular staff columnists will run with their

Access to the State News editorial page is available to all reporters who wish to express an opinion on some subject. These columns are identified with the byline of the writer and a statement that he is a State News staff writer. Columns written by staffers other than regular columnists will not be titled nor include pictures.

Columns are also printed elsewhere in the paper including the sports and religion pages. They are identified with titles and pictures.

All State News columns should be interpreted solely as the writer's opinion. Columns do not reflect the official editorial policy of the State News. In fact, they may be at variance with policy and are printed as a means of exposing a viewpoint other than that held by the majority of the editorial board.

As in the past, "Point of View" columns may be contributed by any student or faculty member. The only restrictions are that the writer include a few sentences of identification, the article be typed, double-spaced and not more than three pages in length, that it be stylistically consistent with the requirements expected of students on this campus, and that the writer hold himself with in the bounds imposed on newspapers by libel laws.

Students who wish to express an opinion to the State News may write a "Letter to the Editor." Letters are published if typed, double-spaced and not more than 300 words in length.



LBJ Plans K Conference

WASHINGTON, A-President Johnson hopes to meet fairly soon-probably next year--with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to explore further steps to lessen East-West tension.

If re-elected, the President expects to go to Europe in November or December to confer with leaders and representatives of the 14 other North Atlantic Alliance (NATO) countries.

This trip, it was learned Wednesday, would involve an appearance either at the November meeting of NATO parliamentarians or the December session of the NATO Council. Both

With no firm plans yet made because of the impending election, Johnson was reported hopeful of arranging an appearance before the parliamentary group.

White House press secretary George Reedy, asked about stories on the trips, called them "purely speculative," but said he was neither discounting nor confirming them. State Department spokesman Robert J. McCloskey's only comment

was that no preparations have been made. But other informed sources gave this version of the Presi-

Johnson considers the limited nuclear test ban treaty, establishment of a Washington-Moscow "hot line," and last winter's wheat sale to the Soviets as hopeful signs and wants to explore with Khrushchev any further moves that can be made.

This summit meeting, contingent of course upon Khrushchev's willingness to meet, would be preceded by meetings with leaders of allied countries.

The President's appearance at either of the NATO conferences would not be an effort to turn either of them into a summit session bringing in the heads of member governments.

What Johnson is hoping for is a chance to address the assembled delegates and confer with them privately.





\$2 Million In Loans Foreseen

Loans to students may top \$2 million during the 1964-65 academic year, Henry C. Dykema, director of financial aids, predicted

Last year 4,677 student loans valued at over \$1,755,000 were processed.

A large portion of the expected loan rise will be met by MSU's increased share of funds from the National Defense Education Act (NDEA) loan program, Dykema said.

Last year NDEA provided \$483,108 in loans to 1,256 MSU students. So far this year over 1,800 NDEA applications totaling \$926,000 have been approved. The average loan is \$500-\$600, Dykema said.

A student may borrow up to \$1,000 in NDEA funds during a three-term academic year, or \$5,000 for an entire four-year program. Starting a year after he leaves MSU, the student has up to 10 years to repay the loan at an interest rate of 3 per cent a year.

In selecting students for NDEA loans, priority is given to those undergraduates studying elementary or secondary education, science, mathematics, engineering and foreign languages.

For recipients who become teachers, up to 50 per cent of the loans may be cancelled at the rate of 10 per cent a year for each year they teach.

The University's own loan program, which last year provided almost \$525,000 to 2,518 students, is used mainly for emergencies and short-term loans, Dykema said. Freshmen may borrow a maximum of \$150, but the maximum increases by \$150 each year.

Financial assistance is also available from the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Loans, United Student Aid Fund and various state higher education assistance programs.

"Many states, including New York, Massachusetts and New Jersey, have good loan programs," Dykema said, "but few students from these areas are aware of them."

Loans are available at any time during the year, although most applications are received at the beginning of a term.

Several applications for loans have already been received for September 1965, Dykema said.



Spartan Rookies Hold Key To '64 Chances

Following is a preview on the 1964 Spartan gridmen by Sports Editor Richard Schwartz. It was written for publication in other Big Ten dailies prior to the opening game at North Carolina.

To hear Michigan State football Coach Duffy Daugherty tell it, the 1964 Spartans--minus all-American halfback Sherman Lewis--have one chronic aching back with little hope for a speedy recovery.

To accept as gospel the wizardry of pseudo-expert magazine predictions, MSU gridmen will be lucky to salvage their girdle pads in three or four games.

To digest the basketfull of rejection notices spoonfed by glib public relations men, one or two games might seem more of a

Yet to remember the fall of 1963 and the tale of woe that soon changed to Wow! as an "also-ran" MSU outfit hustled to victory after victory for second-place in the Big Ten and ninth ranking in the nation, one can't help but question this.

So it is for the Spartan fan -- a wait-see breed too easily pawned off as a seedy, gullible, slackjawed lot wholly ignorant

of football ways and means. Chances are the average Joe well remembers the nearcatastrophic Duffyisms of last September that foretold a jour-

ney to the brink for State. If he doesn't, all he has to do is read this year's "confrontation with the facts."

Typical is Duffy's most recent exercise in pessimism, a barbershop chat with this writer:

"Seen what one of the football magazines picked us for?" Daugherty asked, as though he was ready to reveal how he had just been named benefactor of the National Football League.

"Yea, Dick, they've tagged us for seventh place!" Had it not been a crowded barber shop, Duffy might have swung the apron around his head, bounced off his chair, and performed an Irish jig to the merriment of nobody but Duffy

One could only imagine the scene if Look magazine, with its eight place pick for State, had come across Daugherty's desk. Or maybe Duffy was aware of that too, but also knew how easily a razor could slip under such circumstances.

Yes, nothing could perk up the spirits of this so-called "incurable optimist" more than to be assigned to the doghouse. Certainly then, when the many unknown sophomores and the seniors, who never played much only because they weren't seniors, come to the fore, their coach can offer polite apologies

for "underestimating" his team. Evidence of how successful this approach can be is last year. Evidence of how unsuccessful a "high-hatted" approach sometimes winds up is the season before when seven pros-to-be could barely scrouge up a 54 record.

If it's names you're interested in, try these:

Larry Lukasik, sophomore quarterback listed as a left half-

Don't be misled by the fact that State has three experienced quarterbacks in Steve Juday, Dick Proebstle and Dave McCormick. True, these boys may get first crack, but if spring practices are any indication, Lukasik has one of the finest arms to grace Spartan Stadium in a long while.

Better yet, he has a receiver not found on the '63 varsity in Eugene Washington. The evasive soph end hauls in footballs as though they were pithballs and he were a glass rod rubbed

Looking for a replacement for Lewis? You won't find one. But what you will find is a backfield with perhaps even greater

potential than the net worth of last year's--Lewis included. Dick Gordon and Harry Ammon, the two halfbacks most commonly mentioned, haven't the playing time to merit loud raves. But they have the speed--maybe not breakaway variety--but enough to chalk up first downs with.

An unknown with the markings of greatness is Clinton Jones, who some peg as the chap to replace Lewis with--given three years. Surely several touchdowns in spring scrimmages are promising credentials.

Jim Garret's another--an established broad jumper in track who beat out Lewis for the Big Ten championship last winter. Not to mention Herman Johnson, out last year because of illness, who many persons acknowledge as the number one defensive back but whom few realize is equally versed at offense. Duffy is one of the few, and he'd like it to remain that way

until a few touchdowns are scored. At fullback, Duffy would have you believe there's nobody in the way of a sensation. That's the way things were to have been last year after all-American George Saimes graduated, but

which just never were as Roger Lopes belly-spun to the largest

ground-gaining total on the squad-- 601 yards. This time around you'll want to keep your specs geared to Ed Cotton and Gary Rugg. Although Rugg is casually mentioned in pre-season press releases, the real powerhouse is Cotton,

a solid 200-pounder. While Duffy would like nothing better than to conceal rookie end Bubba Smith, his 258-pound, 6 foot-8 inch frame wouldn't

We won't say he's potential all-American material; rather we'll attribute that prediction to one of the scouts from Dallas Cowboys of the NFL, who was already keeping tabs on the

Jolly Green Giant before he ever played in a scrimmage. And so on it goes. Don Japinga, Lou Bobich, Captain Charlie Migyanka, Dick Flynn, Rahn Bentley, Jerry Rush, Ron Goovert, John Karpinski, etc.

It's almost axiomatic that if there's something worth shouting about, Duffy's going to let the crowd in Spartan Stadium do it, rather than he or his publicity men.





Six MSU Athletes Involved With 1964 Olympic Competition

Six Michigan State athletes will have competed in the 1964 Olympics when the Summer Games come to an end Oct. 25 in

Four will compete in Japan and two were contestants in Inns-

Gary Dilley, a surprise winner in the 200-meter backstroke in the Olympic Trials this summer, is Michigan State's repre-

sentative on the U.S. swimming team. The 19-year-old Huntington, Ind. sophomore finished ahead of the best backstrokers in the country, including Thompson

Mann of North Carolina and Tom Stock of Indiana. His winning time of 2:12.0 was just over a second short of Stock's world record of 2:10.9.

Former Spartan track letterman Sonny Akpata is a member of the Nigerian track and field team.

Akpata lettered for the Spartans in 1960 and 1961. During his college career he placed in two Big Ten indoor and two Big Ten outdoor meets. He is the last MSU trackman to score points in an NCAA meet, placing six in the hop, step and jump in 1960 and fifth in the broad jump in 1961.

He made the Nigerian team as a broad jumper after a recent jump of 25-41/4 in a meet in Canada. He has been in Canada continuing college studies for the last two years.

Marcia Jones, a recent MSU graduate, and Bill Smoke, a sophomore, will represent the United States in canoeing.

Miss Jones is entered in the women's 500-meter kayak singles and Smoke will compete in the 1,000-meter men's kayak pairs. The two are members of MSU's Kayak Club and trained for the Olympics all last year in the school's Women's Intramural Pool. Miss Jones had been a champion swimmer before taking up the unusual sport three years ago. Smoke has been kayaking for about two years and his winning performance in the Olympic Trials was his first major victory.

Barbara Lockhart and Jean Ashworth, both in graduate school at Michigan State, were members of the U.S. women's speedskating team in the Winter Games in Austria.

It was the second Olympiad for both, Miss Ashworth winning a bronze medal in the 1960 Games.

Two members of the MSU athletic staff are directly connected with the Games this year. Athletic Director Biggie Munn heads the NCAA Olympic Committee and former Spartan wrestling coach Fendley Collins is manager of the U.S. team in Tokyo.

Included was the previously announced \$1,250,000 grant to $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MSU}}$ from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. The funds will support the new two-year College of Human Medicine.

The Kellogg Foundation also granted \$115,000 to the College of Education for a two-year program to assist in preparing community is Dr. William V. Hicks, professor of education. college and junior college administrators.

Dr. Max Smith, professor of education, is director of the program, and Dr. John X. Jamrich, associate dean of education, is general coordinator.

The U. S. Office of Education granted \$264,431 to MSU's Audiovisual Center for a two-year study aimed at providing teachers with blind, retarded and normal children will be carried out under a

Charles F. Schuller, professor and director of the center.

Three more grants from the U.S. Office of Education will support research and training programs in the College of Education. Funds totaling \$175,800 will be used to train specialists in the education of handicapped children. Director of the training program

Dr. William Farquhar, professor of education, will direct a study of motivational factors influencing academic achievements of eleventh-graders in Puerto Rico. The study will be supported by \$74,025 from the Office of Education.

Expansion of the university's undergraduate course offerings in international studies will be provided through a \$250,000 grant from the Ford Foundation to the Office of International Programs. The funds also will support development of a new undergraduate

program in comparative cultures. The Board accepted \$182,540 from the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration of the U. S. Department of Health, Welfare and Education to support training of 51 rehabilitation counselors. Dr. J. P. Keith and Dr. Gregory A. Miller will direct the two-year program. Another grant from the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, \$74,264, will provide training of specialists in speech and hearing

The one-year teaching and training program will support 18 advanced degree students. It will be directed by Dr. Herbert J. Oyer, professor and chairman of speech.

The Board acknowledged a bequest from the will of Burr Wheeler, a 1903 graduate of MSU. The bequest provides \$100,000 or 18 per cent of the residuary, whichever is smaller. Wheeler, of New York,

died July 30. An \$81,698.13 grant from the U.S. Air Force, Wright Patterson AFB, Ohio, was accepted for support of a 13-month master's degree program in accounting. Participants in the program, now underway, are 40 captains and majors preparing for posts in the Air Force comptroller's office.

Student Engineer 'Interns'

Chia-Shing Lai, graduate student, was among 18 other graduate engineering students who participated in the Summer Engineering Practice School, sponsored by the Associated Midwest Universities and Argonne National Laboratory, near Chicago.

Lai, a sanitary engineering major, is interested in the fields of radiological health and engineering.

During their 12 weeks of "internship" the students worked on selected engineering problems directly related to the Laboratory's research and development activities.

The students carried out projects at Argonne in teams under the direction of Laboratory staff members and university faculty members. Each student in the session worked on four separate projects, each of three weeks' duration.

Academic credit for the work may be requested by the students and received.

Problems assigned to the students included heat exchange design for the Argonne advanced research reactor, hazards assotiated with a plutonium critical facility, and engineering-cost study of fast reactor fuel refabrication process.

The Practice School was established on the recommendation of the Associated Midwest Universities Nuclear Engineering Education Committee in 1963 with the cooperation of Argonne's Institute of Nuclear Science and En-


