

Not The Only Threat

Republican presidential candidate Barry Goldwater has made the comforting but ostrich-like discovery that Communism is "the only real threat to peace in the world today."

Goldwater made his startling statement to a crowd of 30,000 at Wheaton College in Illinois last weekend and hammered at the same theme throughout a threeday tour of the Midwest.

Now no one is denying that Communism, particularly the war-like brand of the Red Chinese, is a threat to world serenity.

But does Mr. Goldwater really mean that Communism is the only threat to peace on earth?

To regard Communism as the big-bad-wolf behind all of the world's problems is a soothing but unrealistic theory.

Racial prejudice is responsible for violence and strife in our own land as well as in other nations. Unreasoning ignorance which shackles men because of the color of their skin, national origin or form of worshipping God is as great an enemy to world peace as Communism.

With the start of classes this term, many students have been required to adopt a pioneering spirit toward their schedules. Something like, I'll get to class no matter what happens, even if I have to climb over four tractors and a construction crew to do it. In some cases, things aren't far from this.

The new, \$6 million chemistry building is in use now, even though it is not yet completed, even on the two lower floors where classes are already being held. The chemistry department, previously confined to outdated facilities in KedzieChem Laband in several quonset huts, appears relieved to get some of its classes into a partially-

Andrew Timnick, associate professor of chemistry, said, "There was a little confusion, we'll admit that," when general and organic chemistry classes were rescheduled at the last minute. The first and second floors of the building--where "a few things like window sills have to be put in" are still better, Timnick said, than remaining in the old facilities. "It's not perfect and I think we who are teaching have to realize

that," Timnick said. The new biochemistry building, across a mudfletfrom the chem-

istry building, is no more complete than its neighbor, but is being used less, due to the lighter teaching load in biochem. One floor and several lecture rooms, the areas needed for teach-

ing, are complete and in use, according to N. Edward Tolbert, pro-, Biochemistry is primarily a research department, Tolbert said.

The large research areas of the building will not be completed until December, in time for winter term, and cannot be used for research until they are entirely complete. "We would like to be in our new building," he said, "but we can't

complain any, because they just can't get it done any faster." Fee and Akers Halls, the new east campus dormitories housing more than 2,400 students, and the nearby Conrad Hall libraryauditorium annex, could not be quite so patient. They were set to be used fall term, and nothing was going to stop students, classes and books from moving in.

Harry H. Kimber, director of residence instruction, expressed great satisfaction with the success of the teaching program in Akers Hall, which is considered a classroom and office annex of the Col-

Some 27 separate classes are being held in the down, is rooms lacking only a few finishing touches. "Our classes have developed over here better than we thought they would," Kimber said. "We had expected a rather lean term or two.'

Kimber said that both he and Dean Paul Varg of Arts and Letters are extremely satisfied with what he termed the "amazing" reception of the teaching program in the far-off dorm. Fee Hall, which is a College of Social Science annex as well as a

1,200-person dormitory, has met with similar success, despite the transportation problems of getting out to the far eastern end of campus for classes.

Conrad Hall, according to Peter J. Eckel Jr., manager of Fee Halls, will be completed perhaps by the middle of this month. Its auditorium wing was readied with temporary facilities in time for the start of classes. Its library wing will be one of the last facilities in the entire three-building complex to be completed.

Eckel said that only finishing touches are required on some facilities in the two large dorms, and that most of the work will be done within a week or two. The completion of all sidewalks and landscaping will follow within the year.

Peronists break up DeGaulle Motorcade

CORDOBA -- A mob of 3,000 Peonist demonstrators broke up a motorcade carrying President Charles DeGaule of France and Arturo Illia of Argentina through this industrial city Tuesday. Bullets, tear gas, clubs and rocks wounded 12 persons around the car as police fought back the demonstrators. The mob apparently sought DeGaulle's support for the return of ex-dictator Juan Peron,

Russians Charge Attaches Were Spying

MOSCOW--The Russians charged that three U.S. military attaches and a British attache searched by Russian authorities in the Khabarovsk incident were spying. It was officially hinted they may be barred from the Soviet Union.

Nixon Says NATO Has Nuclear Okay

APPLETON, Wis .-- Former Vice-President Richard M. Nixon said both President Eisenhower and President Kennedy gave NATO commanders the right to use tactical nuclear weapons, and "if President Johnson has changed this policy he should inform the American people."



State's Duffy Tabbed By UPI As Coach Of Week

Spartan Head Coach Duffy Daugherty was named United Press International's Coach of the Week Tuesday for his team's startling 17-7 upset of Southern California. But that's not enough to satisfy Duffy.

He wants to be Coach of the Week next week too because that -- at least in Michigan -- would also make him Coach of the Year. For MSU, the one-time stepchild of big time

University of Michigan. This grudge battle, with the exception of two. war years in the 1940s, has been going on annually since 1910 and according to Daugherty, "when we win that one we feel we've gone a long way towards 'making' our season."

This year, once again, the big game will draw a capacity crowd of at least 76,000 at Spartan

103,234 in 1959 at Ann Arbor. This not only is Michigan's all-time record gathering but it's the best in the Big Ten.

Last week's victory against the Trojans, then ranked the No. 2 team in the nation, was good evidence of Daugherty's coaching ability. In preseason ratings, MSU had been picked to go nowhere and the evaluation seemed valid when in their opening game the Spartans were beaten 22-15 by North Carolina.

But now MSU is rated No. 12 in the nation and a victory over Michigan would almost certainly

vault the Spartans into the Top Ten. A year ago Daugherty also had a team no one regarded too highly before the season began. But a band of seniors who had shown little in preceding years suddenly blossomed forth as steady, high-grade players and MSU was in the running for the Big Ten title until the final game of the season, which they lost 13-0 to Illinois.
