## Cameras Focus On Coach

It's remarkable what television can do for a football coach, especially if he's a manlike Hugh Duffy Daugherty.

Extremely popular with the press and public, Duffy has found success in another media—television. Twice a week, on Wednesday and Sunday nights, sports fans focus their attention to Channel 6, WJIM-TV, when Duffy plays host to the viewers.

"This is my 11th year with the show," he reflected, "and I enjoy it immensely. Through these programs I come in direct contact with the public. This helps to arouse greater interest in Spartan football."

The Sunday night show, "Spartan Football Highlights," presents films of the previous Saturday's game, as well as comments by Daugherty on both the Spartans and their opponents. The latter part of the 30-minute program is devoted to next week's opponent.

Wednesday evening is "off the cuff" night. Duffy holds an impromptu discussion with former

State players and leading sports authorities. There is also a feature on the area's "high school" player of the week.

Duffy said that he preferred doing the Wednesday night show.

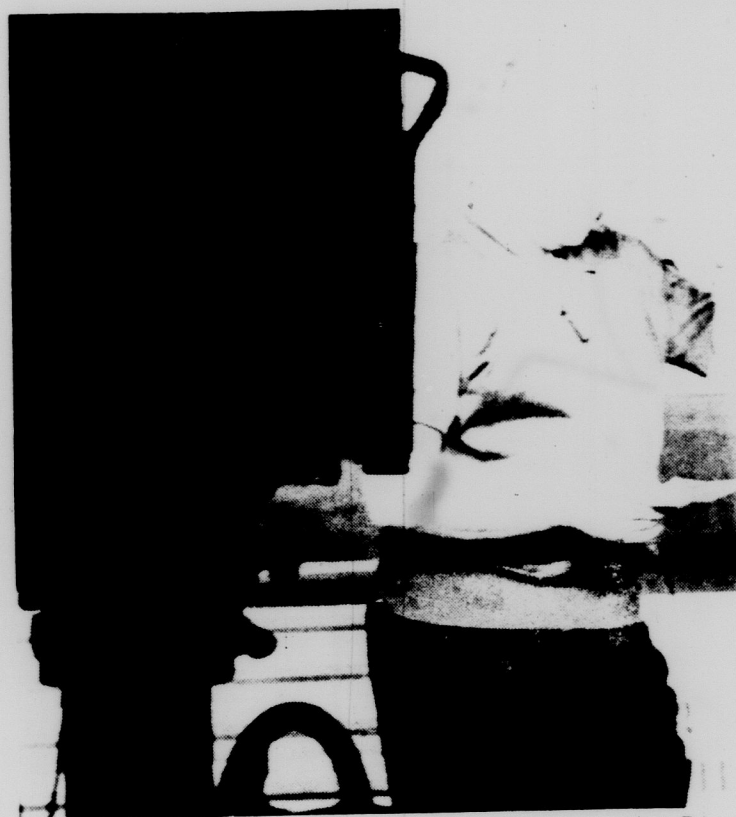
"I can be more natural and more myself," he said. "The discussion is informal and I don't feel like I'm talking to a TV camera. Besides, I get a chance to meet with outstanding football players. This is what I enjoy doing most—being with kids."

Duffy mused on his future in television.

"Oh, I don't think I'll ever make a career out of TV," said Daugherty, hoping that the inevitable question of "Why not?" would not come. But it did.

"Why?" said the Spartan skipper. "Because I just don't have that much appeal for TV. Doing these programs is part of my job as football coach. Practically all Big Ten coaches have similar shows."

"Besides, in professional TV, I'd have to put on makeup. And in my case, you can't make a silk person out of a sow's ear," Duffy quipped.

## Olympic Basketball Rules To Highlight Clinic Game

The Olympics are coming to Michigan State.

Tokyo's games have been over for about two weeks now but Olympic basketball will live a little longer this year as the result of the annual varsity-fresh-

man cage tilt next year.

The contest, a feature of the yearly high-school basketball clinic at State, is scheduled for Nov. 3 and will be played under Olympic rules.

Perhaps the most noticeable difference will be the use of a 30-second rule calling for the offensive team to shoot within half a minute or lose the ball. Two clocks on the gym floor will be used to measure the time a team has to shoot.

In an attempt to give "the little man" a break, the foul lines will move out diagonally from the basket—thus keeping bigger men from playing under the basket.

No free throws will be allowed, unless a man taking a shot is fouled and misses the shot. If a person not having the ball is fouled or the shooter makes his shot, his team takes the ball out of bounds.

"The main purpose of this is to show the fans and coaches how

olympic rules differ from our own," said Fordy Anderson, Spartan basketball coach.

"In addition, the game will give the fans a look at the 1964 varsity basketball team and their only chance to see them in action against the freshman," he said.

It will also give Anderson and his staff a chance to view the teams under actual game conditions and demonstrate to the high school coaches what has been discussed throughout the clinic.

Anderson said the probable starting line-up for the varsity would include 6-4 Bill Curtis at center, Marcus Sanders (6-3) at a forward post and Stan Washington, a 6-3 junior, at guard.

Either 6-4 Dick Holmes or Ted Crary (6-5) will man the other forward spot and Jim Kupper (6-0) battles 6-2 John Schick for the remaining guard position.

For the freshman, 6-6 Heyward Edwards is expected to start at forward along with Art Baylor also 6-6.

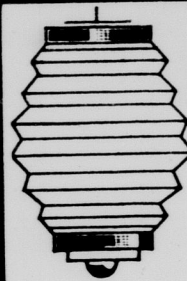
Either Jack Wynn (6-7) or 6-8 Jerry Geistler will be at the pivot post. Steve Rymal, 6-0, is at guard with Jim O'Brien or John Bailey as his counterpart.

Game time is 8 p.m. at the Men's IM.

# Dittrich Confident Of Harrier Victory

## Spartan Squad In Top Form To Capture Conference Crown

Michigan State's cross-country team took a final run around the Old College Field Thursday. The harriers leave this afternoon for Champaign, Ill., where they will defend their Big Ten title.

The Spartans will be seeking their third consecutive championship and 12th Big Ten crown in 15 years.

Judging on past performances this season and recent clockings, State should definitely be the meet favorite.

MSU wound up the season with a 4-1 mark, losing only to a tough Notre Dame team. Victories were scored over Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana and Northern Illinois. State will try to repeat those first three wins when championship play begins.

Coach Fran Dittrich is confident that any of his top five men can win.

"There's been a noticeable improvement in clockings," he said. "Not only are they running better than their times in season meets, but they have also improved greatly on last year's Big Ten results."

Seniors Jack Amie, Jan Bowen and Mike Kaines; juniors Tony Hunt, Paul McCallum and Eric Zemper; and sophomore George

Balthrop compose the seven-man team that will be competing for Big Ten honors.

McCallum, winner of the meet last week with Northern Illinois, was clocked at 20:24.9, his best mark to date. This is a marked improvement that can be found straight down the time sheet.

Zemper's time of 20:10, the winning time against Minnesota, is the best among Spartan harriers. His clocking of 20:24.9 on October 30 is an improvement on past timings, and he should be considered among the top contenders.

Jan Bowen, senior co-captain from Alma, turned an ankle in the contest with Minnesota and had been one of the big question marks for Dittrich. Happily for State as well as its coach, now Bowen is once again in top form.

Bowen set a course record at Forest Akers when he posted a 20:30.2 finish in the triangular meet with Wisconsin and Indiana.

Mike Kaines, running fifth against Northern Illinois, was clocked at 20:54.5, shaving 1.9 seconds off his Big Ten time of last year.

George Balthrop, the lone sophomore on the trip, took the fourth spot in the final meet. His time of 20:46.5 is a steady improvement over past clockings, giving him a shot at a place in the top five.

# Soccer Win Saturday Passport To Nationals

One wouldn't be too surprised to discover a group of green and white-clad athletes, covered with adhesive tape, wrestling in a tagteam match at Cobo Hall or Madison Square Gardens. This description, however, might better fit MSU's soccer team, as it battles St. Louis for the Midwest Collegiate Soccer Conference title this Saturday.

Many of the players will be sent into the starting line-up covered with braces and tape, in hope of protecting vulnerable knees and ankles.

"We're taking practically all our players along on the trip to St. Louis," explained Coach Gene Kenney, "and we'll try to get as much use out of them as we can."

Turgud Enustan and Manny Ruschinski will start for MSU at the fullback positions. Denny Checkett will be at the center halfback slot.

Clare DeBoer, still not fully recovered from a knee injury, will probably play the outside right position, while George Janes, with an injured ankle, will be at inside right.

Van Dimitriou, Spartan center forward, has shown improvement throughout practice this week, after sitting out the last game with a knee injury, and might start.

Sidney Alozie will replace the injured Nick Krat at inside left, while Payton Fuller will assume the outside left position.

Last year, MSU defeated St. Louis 4-3 at home to win the Midwest championship. St. Louis then defeated State in the NCAA Midwest playoffs and went on to win the NCAA title.





# Spartans Gird For Battle

Fans attending Saturday's MSU-Purdue football game had better be prepared for anything.

The visitors will go into the contest playing the role of the favorite but such things have meant little in a series that has been marked with upsets.

If there is any upset tomorrow, the Spartans will have to be the team to do it.

Purdue is tied for the Big Ten lead with Ohio State and the Boilermakers seem determined that this is their year to go to Pasadena.

The Spartans will enter the contest with a 3-3 season record

and a 2-2 conference slate. A win could give MSU fans good reason to hope for a high position in the final conference standings.

The Boilermakers have stopped four Big Ten opponents this season and stand 5-1 overall.

Notre Dame handed Purdue its only setback of the campaign and the Black and Gold earned a non-loop win over Ohio University.

Much of the Boilermaker success has been due to the fine play of sophomore quarterback Bob Griese who appears destined to follow a Purdue tradition of great quarterbacks.

His favorite target has been end Bob Hadrick who has hauled in 30 passes for three touchdowns

and is considered to be one of the best flankers in the nation.

Other Purdue offensive threats include halfback Gordon Teter and fullback Randy Minniear who have rushed for about four yards a try.

Up front, the Boilermakers have the services of tackles Jim Garcia (239) and Karl Singer (231), center Ed Flanagan (235) and defensive end Harold Wells (214) who appear to be Purdue defensive stalwarts.

Win or lose, it will be a sad day for some Spartan players and fans.

Six probable offensive starters are seniors who will be playing their last home game for MSU. They are end Tom Krzemienksi, tackle Jerry Rush, center Don Ross, tackle Dick Flynn and halfback Dick Gordon.

Other Spartan standouts making their last Stadium appearance

include captain Charlie Migyanka, Lou Bobich, Rahn Bentley, Herman Johnson, Ed Macuga, Steve Mellinger, John Tinnick, John Walsh and Harry Ammon.

Although the contest will mark their final home showing, the Spartan seniors will still be facing some of the toughest football of their careers after the Purdue game.

Next week, MSU will play nationally top-ranked Notre Dame and will tangle with Illinois at Champaign in the season finale.

While aiming at defeating Purdue, several Spartans will be aiming at season offensive records that they could establish by good performances in the final three games of the year.

Junior quarterback Steve Juday is heading for a season's mark in pass completions with 52 in the Spartans' first six games. The record is 64 by Al Dorow in 1951.

End Gene Washington, with 23 receptions this year, also has a good chance to equal or better the season record of 31 established by Steve Conos in 1945.

Speaking of records, Spartan fans can help establish an all-time season attendance mark if they turn out as expected for tomorrow's clash.

In 1961, MSU averaged 69,150 fans a game but a crowd of 61,953 for the Purdue game will assure a new average attendance record this season.

The Spartans will be unable to set an overall gate record since there are only four home games this year instead of the usual five.

Purdue will arrive at East Lansing early this afternoon and will undergo a light workout on the Spartan Stadium turf.

## Spartans Rise Among Big 10 Statistical Stars

East Lansing, Mich.--The latest Big Ten football statistics show that several Michigan State Spartans have come out of nowhere in the last two weeks to rank as the best in several categories.

The Spartan leaders are these: Dick Gordon in rushing with 396 yards; average per rush, 8.6 yards; longest run from scrimmage, 74 yards; and yards rushing in a single game 199 yards. His 199 yards constitute the fifth highest single-game mark in Big Ten history.

Steve Juday leads in average per pass attempt with 7.2 yards, and in low percentage of interceptions with .015, and he's tied for first with six touchdown passes. Juday also has thrown the most scoring passes in a single game -- three -- and completed the most consecutive passes in a single game -- seven.

Lou Bobich is No. 1 among the league's punters with an average of 40.1 on 13 kicks.

Don Japinga is tops in punt returns with an average of 10.1 yards on 11 returned.

Other Spartans have impressive rankings though not leading their categories. End Eugene Washington ranks sixth in pass receiving with 17 receptions for 286 yards and two scores. End Tom Krezmienski stands eighth among scorers with three touchdowns for 18 points.

## Trainer's Skill Recorded On Tape

Bumps, bruises, sprains, and muscle pulls are all part of an average day's work for Gayle Robinson, head trainer of Varsity Athletics, here at MSU.

Robinson and his two new aids, Clint Thompson and Clide Stretch, are responsible for treating all of the Spartan injuries through out the year.

"Most people think a trainer's job starts only after the injury has occurred," Robinson said. "It is surprising to them to learn that our main service to the players is attempting to prevent the injury from ever occurring."

"One classic example of our effort to prevent common injuries is the taping of a football player's ankles," Robinson said. "We spend over \$2,000 each year for tape to try and

prevent the most common football injury, the sprained ankle."

Of course a trainer's job is much more complex than just taping ankles.

There are four training rooms spread out on campus. Two of them are in the Stadium, one is in the Intramural Building, and the other is in Jenison Fieldhouse.

These rooms are equipped with whirlpools, infra-red heat lamps, Micro-therm machines, rubbing tables, and various medical instruments.

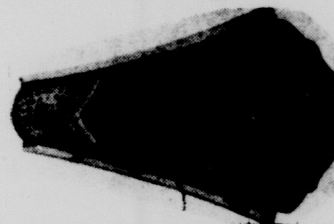

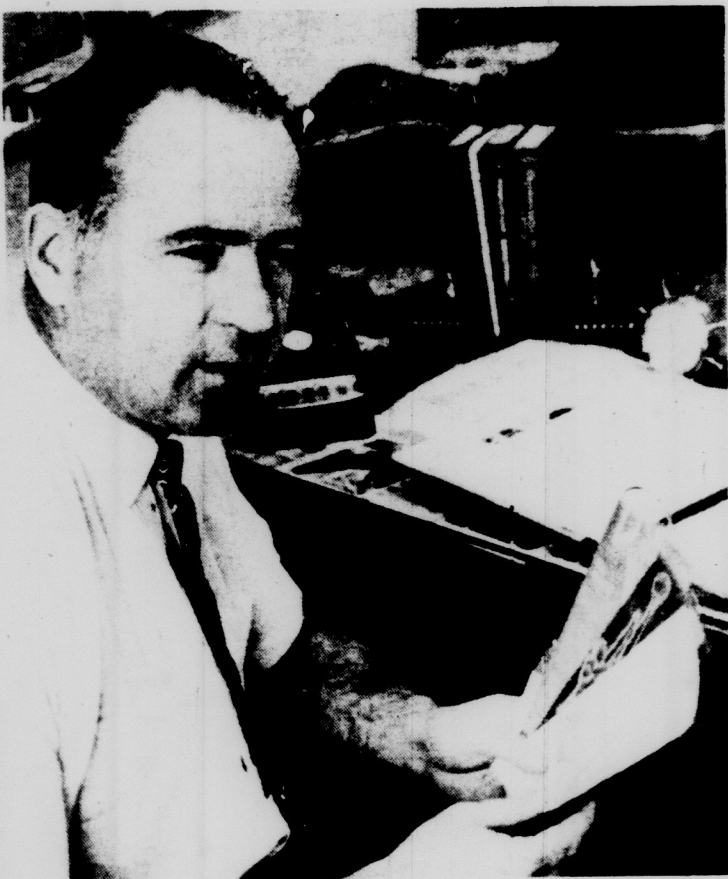
There was once a program on television entitled "I Led Three Lives" but the athletic coaches at Michigan State could certainly top that.

Spartan coaches can rightfully call themselves recruiters, authors, advisors, finance managers, film-makers, statisticians, banquet-speakers and schedule-planners as well as many, many other unofficial labels.

One even included baby-sitting among his functions of coaching a Spartan athletic team.

There are also a great number of high-school clinics conducted throughout the year by Michigan State mentors.

Baseball Coach, Danny Litwhiler and Charles Schmitter,

fencing coach, lead perhaps the most diversified lives of the athletic staff members.

Litwhiler, whose team practices all through October and begins spring training in late February, still finds time to write books and invent gadgets, several of which are used in the major leagues today.

Litwhiler is best known for his "Diamond Grit", an absorbing type substance used to make extremely wet fields playable. He has also invented a shatter-proof mirror so that pitchers can study their own form, a pocket-less catcher's mitt designed to help catchers field bunts and a long

list of other devices used to improve the basics of baseball.

The inventive coach has also written a book titled "Baseball Coaches Guide to Skills and Drills" published by Prentice-Hall and is revising the textbook for a baseball class he teaches.

He also writes magazine articles and is on a book-reviewing staff as well as a committee concerned with baseball equipment.

Schmitter teaches physical classes and is an academic advisor to 40 or 50 students in addition to his coaching duties. But he still takes the time to audit

at least one language every two years.

"Coaching takes about 35 per cent of my time," he said, "and with the extra duties, I keep pretty busy."

All of the coaches said they had classes to instruct and were in charge of lining up transportation and accommodations when the teams are on the road.

Fran Dittrich, the only dual coach at MSU, is head of the track and cross-country teams and has to do recruiting for both teams at the same time.

He is also in charge of the NCAA cross-country meet held every year at Michigan State for the past 25 years and the MSU Relays in their 40th year at State. MSU also is the site for the state high school track finals.

Forddy Anderson, whose eag-ers are preparing for their sea-

son opener Dec. 3, is perhaps the most traveled member of the staff.

Anderson estimates that he travels more than 12,000 miles a year in recruiting alone. He said he talks to at least 75 high-school coaches a year and conducts six basketball clinics.

Anderson has also written a book and made an instructive film on basketball available to high school coaches.

Grady Penninger, wrestling coach, has been home only one week since Christmas. He is in the wrestling room from 3:30-6 p.m. six days a week and ad-

vises many high school coaches on equipment.

Penninger also teaches a class on gun safety and conducts several high school clinics.

"There is certainly more trouble in this than being a high school coach," he said.

Hockey Coach Amo Bessone is on the Board of Directors of the Lansing Hockey Association and is an instructor, besides handling the finances and travel of the ice squad and conducting freshman hockey practices.

"Other than a few things, we don't do much," one coach said, grinningly.

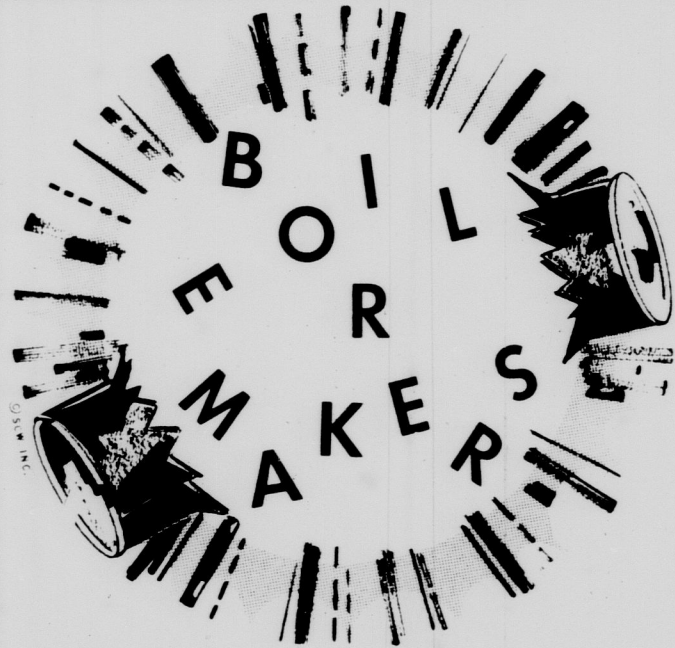

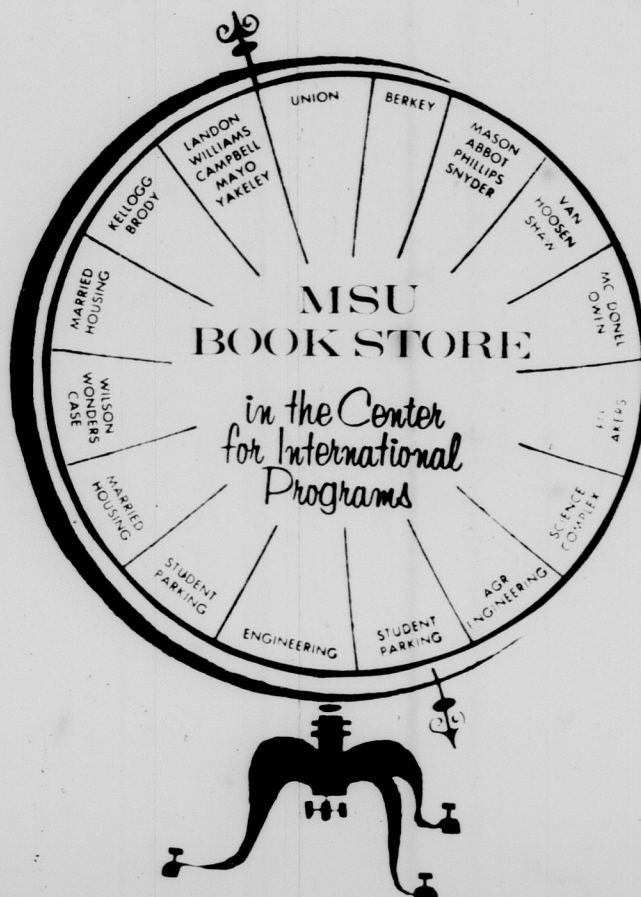
