M. S. C. ACCREDITED BY A. A. U. W.

CLASSES CAST HEAVY VOTE IN ELIMINATION BALLOTING; FINALS SET FOR WEDNESDAY

Class Offices Closely Contested as Candidates for Next Year are Picked; Head Cheerleader and Athletic Board Representative Will Also Be Chosen Next Week.

Interest ran high in the eliminations for class officers held yesterday in the Union with close to a record vote cast. Highest number of votes was cast by the freshmen, followed by the sophomores and the juniors, in that order. Candidates voted upon were selected at the nominations Monday night.

Final elections will be held next Wednesday in the Union with polling all day. All who survived the eliminations will be on the ballot for the finals. In the case of only two nominees, both are automatically placed in the finals. In all other cases, with the exception of the junior treasurer, where two men tied, the two candidates having the highest number of votes in the elimination will be voted upon.

No eliminations were required in leader. Kenneth Priestly will be the all-college elections. For cheerleader, the contest for representative to the athletic board, Otto Pongracz will oppose Arthur Huss. These names will appear on the ballot next Wednesday.

In the balloting for senior president for next year, Gerald Muscott with 112 votes and Edwin Rolfe with 51 votes remain for the finals. The defeated candidate was Don Hovey with 35. For vice-president, Elizabeth Boyce, 74, and Colla Anderson, 66, survived with Bevelve Merhan being eliminated with 53 votes. Winifred Lee and Betty Hunt with 77 and 38, respectively, will contest the office of secretary. Defeated candidates were Claudine Burkhardt, 48, and Margaret Buhai, 21.

David Falconer with 102 and Ralph Dickie with 57 votes will vie for the treasurer's position. Leonard Montgomery ran third with 41.

For the junior class of next year, Avery Paxson, 116, and Charles Kelly, 86, will run for the presidency. Clarence Bae was defeated having 28 votes. There was no elimination vote for vice-president, since Helen Sutton and Elizabeth Jerome were the only two nominees. For secretary, Mary Sue Kautz with 87 votes and Marjorie Ward, 53, will run, having defeated Margaret Miller, 44, and Lucile German, 43. In the contest for an unusual situation, rescheduled with Paul Kindig and Donald Montgomery tying for second with 68 votes each. Harry Walker placed first with 93 votes. All three.

COUNSELORS TO USE NEW PLAN

Big Sisters of Next Year's Fresh
Also Have a New
Leader.

Next year the freshmen counselor system will continue under a new leader, Mary Elizabeth Boyce, appointed by a W. S. C. council and under a new plan borrowed from the plans of Big Sister organizations on other campuses as elaborated at the recent national A. W. S. convention at Ithaca, N. Y.

Tuesday, May 16, at the 5 o'clock compulsory convocation for freshmen women in the lecture room of the Horticulture building, Miss Boyce outlined the plan as worked out by representatives of the women student body. Freshmen girls were urged to sign up as prospective counselors, indicating their division and their special interests.

The new plan schedules approximately eight freshmen girls to a counselor instead of two as has been the procedure to date. Controlling these counselors will be a committee of five, representing respectively East Lansing, Lansing, West Mary Mayo, East Mary Mayo and the Women's building, chosen from the sophomore class for next year and headed by the chairman, Mary Elizabeth Boyce.

The counselors will be chosen from those girls of the sophomore class who have signed up, indicating their interest. In order that the prospective counselors may be better equipped for their position next fall, a series of lectures will be given during the spring term. The first of these lectures will be given by Professor Linton of the education department at the hour of the freshmen lecture in the Horticulture building Tuesday, May 23. The next lecture will be by Professor O'Leary of the psychology department, and the third will be a round table discussion with Dean Conrad and representatives of the various women's organizations.

The committee in charge will be chosen from those freshmen who indicate sufficient time and interest to devote to the work. The counselors will be chosen from the same group who show an interest by attending all three of the lectures. The resulting group found to have interest and ability in orientation of freshmen women will be publicly announced on Monday night.

ASMUS NAMED PRESIDENT OF STUDENT BODY

Student Council Elects Officers

BEGIN DUTIES AT ONCE

Peasley and Armstrong to Fill

Annual election of Student Council officers, which came as a regular order of business at this week's meeting of the governing body, resulted in the naming of Louis Asmus, Detroit, as president, Milton Peasley, Detroit, vice-president, and Robert Armstrong, Benton Harbor, as secretary-treasurer.

Those men take office at once succeeding the old council officers in their duties for the remainder of spring term and for all three terms of next year.

Asmus takes over the position of council president after having actively served on that body for the past year as junior class president. He is a member of Phi Kappa Tau and Blue Key fraternities and is captain of Scabbard and Blade.

Peasley and Armstrong also succeed to the offices of vice-president and secretary after having served for the past year as active members of the council. Peasley in the capacity of junior representative and Armstrong as sophomore class representative. The former is a member of the Epsilon chapter and the latter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Both are members of Blue Key.

The officers retiring from the Student Council at this time are: Milton Dickman, president; Don Pick, vice-president; and Clifford McKibbin, secretary-treasurer. Pick and Dickman have each seen two years of council service and have held offices for the past year. McKibbin succeeded Edward Farley in the office of council secretary at the close of winter term.

Other items of business transacted by the governing body at this week's meeting pertained mainly to details connected with the annual spring term eliminations and elections for class officers. First official duties of the newly elected council officers are being taken in this connection. Approval was given at this meeting for the newly drafted list of student election rules which will be used for the first time at next week's class elections.

Plans were also approved by the student council for support of the Associated Women Students in their project to entertain high school students here. The possibility of sending issues of the State News each week to high schools of Michigan was discussed as a project for next year in building up interest among prospective students for Michigan State. Indications were given that such a plan will materialize if the council receives support for it through the college or other student organizations.

Work of College Police Includes Various Duties

Range From Aiding Dairymen
to Extinguishing Waste
Basket Fires

The majority of the 3,000 students on Michigan State's campus have probably seen the three members of the private police force employed by the college going about their daily work on the campus, or perhaps assisting visitors on the campus or handling cars for various athletic events. Strange as it may seem, these three officers know an amazing large percentage of the students themselves, some not intimately, but merely from seeing them on the campus from day to day.

Don Bremer heads the force and Dick Rogers and Tom Higgins are the other members. Both Bremer and Rogers are alumni of Michigan State, while Higgins can point to an active career in the army air corps, and Near-Eastern Relief service under ex-President Hoover. All three are young enough to appreciate the needs of college students, and a more sympathetic trio could not be found on the campus. The force has a reputation of being tolerant in matters of discipline and its policy is very liberal in consideration of the large amount of work to be done. On the other hand, students should not get the idea that the force is careless in the performance of its duties.

Seek Student Cooperation
When serious problems of student discipline face them, the boys handle the situation as quietly as possible. No horrible examples are made of the offenders. In a recent case it was found that a certain student had been ignoring traffic warnings issued by the campus police for the violation of the student parking laws. The boy was summoned to the office. Nothing untoward was asked of him by the force; only his cooperation was solicited. The boy refused to grant this request, and was sent to the higher authorities of the school. After again refusing to give his cooperation, he was given indefinite leave of absence from the college.

Very seldom does a case of this kind occur. The force really appreciates the fine cooperation shown by the majority of the student body. When it is pointed out that no less than 575 student parking permits have been issued, and including the cars driven daily by the professors and instructors as well as visitors to the campus, over 1,000 cars are handled on the campus every day, the need for a cooperative spirit on the part of all is needed to avoid undue congestion. As many as 10,000 cars have been handled at one time during Farmers' week.

Perhaps it will be surprising to note that the parking problem is (Continued on page 5)

SET UP SCHOOL
NEWS BUREAU

Press Club to Keep High Schools
Informed of Graduates
Who Shine Here.

At the meeting of the Michigan State College Press club held last Thursday evening a plan was announced whereby the high school newspapers of the state will receive news service from this college concerning students from the various high schools who distinguish themselves in some way. Up to the limited amount of time remaining in this term the plan will not be adopted in its entirety until next fall.

Present arrangements call for a director who will assign stories on the various people involved in campus activities to members of the Press club. These stories will be handled through the Publications office and sent out to the high schools concerned. Jane McGallan was named by the executive board to fill this position. The first persons to be written up will be those winning class officers in next week's elections.

The feature of the program given by this newly organized group last Thursday was an address by Verne Brown, publisher of the Ingham County News and state representative from this district. He spoke of his experiences in the newspaper field and gave some general principles that he has evolved for the successful operation of a publishing business.

It was announced at this meeting that Lee White would talk to the group here June 8. White is one of the leading journalists of the country. He has served in many capacities, not only in connection with journalism but in governmental investigations and on committees. He is at present feature and editorial writer for the Detroit News.

COLLEGE ELECTION RULES

As Approved by the Student Council

- Any student who violates or causes the following provisions to be violated shall be subject to such discipline by the Student Council and the Faculty as the situation warrants.
- No agency or person shall circulate or distribute printed matter of any sort which bears any partial reference to any candidate or prospective candidate for office.
- Nominations shall be made in class meetings by members of the class in which the election is to take place or by petition having the signatures of at least one hundred (100) members of the class. These petitions must be presented to the Student Council at least 24 hours before the elimination vote.
- Nominations can be opened or closed by majority vote of those present at the meeting.
- Nominees found eligible by the Student Council activity system and the official college eligibility rules will be placed on the elimination ballot.
- Eliminations shall be limited to two (2) nominees for each office, except in the event of a tie for the second place at this vote. In the final vote, not more than twice the number listed for election to any office shall appear as candidates on the ballot except when a nominee has been mistakenly ineligible at the time of elimination or in the event of the above mentioned tie.
- No "sticker candidates" will be recognized on any ballot.
- A list of the names of the students in each class eligible to vote in student elections shall be posted from the office of the registrar one week before each election in which they are to be used.
- Students shall be allowed to vote only in the class in which they are listed by the registrar.
- Any student found guilty of the violation of any of the above rules will be subject automatically to have his name published in the "black list" which will appear in the State News.
- Published advertising for students who are up for elections will be restricted to either the State News or any other local paper.
- Candidate names which will appear on the ballot are to be previously arranged alphabetically and every third one then selected by rotation to determine the order of their appearance.
- Nominations, eliminations, and final elections shall be under the direction of the Student Council with faculty supervision at all main balloting.
- The Student Council's decision shall be considered as final in the interpretation of the above rules.

National Women's Association Recognizes Michigan State College for Membership With Class "A" Rating; Emmons Explains Significance of Move.

Michigan State college has been formally accepted for membership in the American Association of University Women with class "A" rating.

Action taken yesterday by official vote of the A. A. U. W. group in annual convention at Minneapolis, Minnesota, terminates a campaign started seven years ago by this college in an effort to bring this coveted recognition to the campus. Together with the accrediting of Michigan State by the Association of American Universities in November, 1931, this event marks a conclusion in the concerted efforts of college officials to bring this institution to the front for nationwide recognition.

The following telegram reached the president's office early this morning giving first official word of the action taken by yesterday's convention in Minneapolis:

HONORARY TO OFFER PLAQUES

To Present Prizes to High
Schools Whose Grads Receive
High Grades.

Phi Kappa Phi honorary scholar society on this campus announces a new plan which is to aid the colleges present advertising campaign a great deal. Prof. C. E. Linton of the economics department is at present the president of the local chapter.

At a recent meeting of the campus organization it was resolved to award three plaques to high schools with representatives at Michigan State college having the highest average marks during their freshman year here. There is to be a permanent possession of the plaques with one to five students in the freshman class, the second, with five to 10 in the freshman class, and the last, of those schools having more than 10 representatives in last year's freshman class. The first award will be made in the fall from the records of the freshman class this year.

The plaques are to be a bronze seal of Michigan State college on a walnut background. The Phi Kappa Phi seal will be underneath with a place for the name of the high school receiving the award. Each of the three plaques will be the same except for the name of the high school. These awards will be a permanent possession of the school receiving them. The first presentation will take place next fall at the high schools receiving the plaques.

The Michigan State college chapter of Phi Kappa Phi consists of 41 members including both faculty and graduate members. The members are picked from their scholastic averages during their four years at the college. Seniors having an average of 2.3 are the likely candidates for membership.

Another question decided by the local chapter at the meeting was a biennial election instead of an annual election. The elections for the coming year will take place in the near future.

SOCIETIES AT M. S. C.

Ero Alphan

The Ero Alphan society, which is one of the oldest and best organized societies on the campus, is probably the outstanding standard-bearer of the local women's groups on the campus. The majority of meetings on the campus have petitioned national societies and have been granted charters, but the Ero Alphas have remained "local" and offer a ranking society to girls who do not care to become involved in the obligations of a national society.

Ero Alphan was first conceived by a group of 14 girls who had become intimate friends and had decided to perpetuate their ties of friendship and better meet their social needs by uniting in the bonds of a society which would hold them together for all time.

These active pioneers met, drew up a constitution, and called themselves the Ero Alphan literary society. The name was derived by the combining of the Greek word "ero" meaning love and "alphan" signifying the highest and best. Thus the complete phrase means love of the highest and best.

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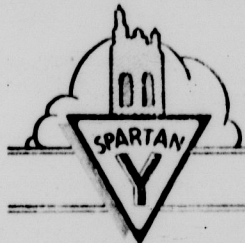
