U.S. Reserve Board Hikes Interest Rates

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Reserve Board on Sunday night ordered a substantial increase in interest rates.

Effective Monday, the Federal Reserve discount rate will be raised from 4 to 4.5 per cent. This is the rate banks pay when they borrow funds from the Federal Reserve.

The board also raised from 4.5 to 5.5 per cent the maximum rate banks may pay on time deposits and certificates of deposits of more than 30 days maturity. This is money which is deposited for a specified length of time. There was no increase in the rate which banks may pay on savings deposits. This rate is 4 per cent.

The board said it has no intention of reducing the present pace of credit expansion but that the actions are designed to dampen the demand on banks for still further extensions "which might

add to inflationary pressures."

A raise in the discount rate usually means higher interest rates for businessmen who borrow money and consumers who purchase houses, automobiles and other goods on the installment plan.

The board usually hikes interest rates when it believes there is a danger of inflation. Many economists recently have said they were concerned about the threat of rising prices because of greatly increased government spending as a result of the expanded military effort in Viet Nam and the momentum built up by almost five years of steadily increasing production and income.

However, President Johnson and other high administration officials have expressed the belief that there is little danger of "overheating" the economy.

A Federal Reserve Board spokesman declined to comment on a story in Sunday's Washington Post which said Federal Reserve Board Chairman William McChesney Martin had declined an invitation to meet with President Johnson shortly before the board voted the increase.

Over the past several years the board has cooperated with the Kennedy and Johnson administrations in coordinating its money and credit policies with

the government's fiscal policies.

The discount rate has been raised twice in the past two years—from 3 to 3.5 per cent in late 1963 and again to 4 per cent in November 1964—but in both instances the board said the action was taken to bring the U.S. rate closer to the higher rates charged abroad.

The White House had no comment on the news of an increase.

President Lacks 50 Per Cent Vote

PARIS (AP)—French voters Sunday sharply rejected President Charles de Gaulle's campaign plea for massive support. Returns built up toward a stunning blow to the pride and prestige of the 75-year-old chief of state.

As results poured in early Monday all indications pointed to a humiliating runoff election for the French presidency. De Gaulle was well below the 50 per cent majority needed to win on the first round. His showing was holding at 45 per cent.

Jean Lecanuet, 45, a middle-of-the-roader who styled himself the "French Kennedy," was cutting into De Gaulle's support, although running behind leftist Francois Mitterrand.

Official returns for 11,231,403 votes out of a total of 28,848,889 registered voters gave:

Charles de Gaulle—5,091,390 for 45 per cent.
Francois Mitterrand—3,513,613 for 31 per cent.
Jean Lecanuet—1,856,349 for 16 per cent.
Jean-Louis Tixier-Vignancour—530,926 for 5 per cent.
Pierre Macilhacy—194,975 for 2 per cent.
Marcel Barbu—126,150 for 1 per cent.

Despite rainy, stormy fall weather, some 85 per cent of the electorate turned out for the first popular election of a French president since 1848. The 15 per cent abstention rate was the lowest in postwar French elections.

Mitterrand, the man in second place, is supported by Communists and Socialists plus a fraction of the Radical Socialist party.

The French election system calls for a second ballot on Dec. 19 if no candidate gets a majority on the first round. Only the two top candidates remain in the race for the runoff.

The five opposition candidates knew they had no chance of winning on the first try, and their effort was concentrated on forcing a runoff.

Mitterrand jubilantly watched the returns roll in and said "a runoff election seems to be certain. These results are an indication that our cause was right."

Waldeck Rochet, secretary-general of the Communist party, called the returns "a defeat for personal power."

Jacques Chaban-Delmas, an ardent Gaullist and president of the National Assembly, conceded the need for a runoff election when he said, "It appears at the end of the first round that Gen. de Gaulle remains the central force around whom, there is no doubt, a strong majority will group itself Dec. 19."

There had been some early talk by De Gaulle's ministers that he would retire if he did not get a heavy majority. Others in his entourage said, however, that he would participate in a runoff.

Fee Fires Checked For Arson

Police are investigating the possibility of arson in two of the four campus fires last Wednesday and Thursday, said Richard O. Bernitt, public safety director.

An unexplained fire which did \$200 worth of damage to the room of a resident adviser in the men's side of Fee Hall broke out early Thursday, a day after a fire during a bomb scare caused an estimated \$5,000 worth of damage to a suite in the women's side of the building.

Minor fires caused by dropped cigarettes occurred in West Yakeley and the Library Thursday.

Thomas Taylor, East Lansing sophomore and fourth floor resident adviser in West Fee Hall, said he discovered the fire after leaving his room briefly to go to the candy and soft drink machines around 11 a.m.

He said he returned five minutes later to get a glass because the coke machine was out of cups and discovered his drapes and wastebasket burning.

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Discount Cards To Lower Prices

Students who have complained about the high cost of shopping in East Lansing are in line for substantial discounts under the new Varsity International Sales Assn. (VISA) plan, recently endorsed by ASMSU.

Under the new plan, students may purchase VISA discount cards which entitle them to up to 40 per cent discounts on all items purchased from participating merchants.

The VISA organization operates on college campuses throughout the country and receives a percentage of each discount card sold.

According to Arthur Langer, State News advertising manager and VISA representative, the cards will sell for \$2.50 for the school year. \$1.70 will go to the national organization, 50 cents to their local representative as commission, and the remaining 30 cents to ASMSU to cover the cost of advertising and promotion.

ASMSU's Student Board voted unanimously to accept the discount cards on consignment from the VISA organization.

"Student government is not making any profit on this plan," said Chuck Stoddard, East Lansing junior and off campus housing chairman, who brought the plan to the attention of the board.

"We felt that because of students' complaints on the price situation in East Lansing, something of this nature to benefit MSU students should be undertaken by ASMSU," he said.

Langer said that the cards will go on sale at the beginning of winter term, and are valid through summer term, 1966. ASMSU will have the option of renewing the service at the end of summer term.

"The cards will be sold at registration, in the dormitories, the Union, and at various other points on campus," Langer said.

"I have already signed up 15 merchants in the East Lansing area," he said. "We have a good cross section of stores contracted—a cleaners, bookstore, drive-in movie, gas station, beauty shop and a sporting goods

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Africans Agree On War Plans

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP)—The African states have agreed in principle to declare war on Rhodesia if Britain fails to put down that white-ruled colony's revolt in 10 days. A five-nation action committee has been charged with the military planning.

Nigeria's minister of state for foreign affairs, Nuhu Bamali, reported Sunday no declaration of war would come until after Dec. 15. A weekend conference of African defense and foreign ministers decided that unless Britain crushed the rebellion by then all 36 members of the Organization of African Unity, including nine members of the British Commonwealth, would sever diplomatic relations with London.

"If Britain has not responded to our resolutions by then we feel she will have abdicated her responsibility and we can attack Rhodesia without this being an attack on Britain itself," Bamali declared in an interview.

Top officials in London felt the threat was serious, but should not be taken as the final word. They pointed to economic aid and trade privileges Britain grants the African Commonwealth members. These would be lost if the OAU goes ahead with its plans. The Commonwealth countries also receive almost all their military equipment and training from Britain. So did Rhodesia.

This aspect of the situation was pointed up by Zambia's Foreign Minister Simon Kapwepwe when he returned to his capital, Lusaka, on Sunday.

Arriving at the airport there as Royal Air Force planes roared in and out, he told newsmen: "The planes they have given us, these Javelins, are out of date. They are absolutely no match for Rhodesia's Hawker Hunters. It is absolutely shameful that

Housing Plans Made For Tour

Hotels for the official student Rose Bowl tour were announced Sunday, including hotel arrangements for the various transportation packages.

Students on the bus tours will be housed in the Long Beach Satellite, John Winkelman, manager of the MSU official tours for International Travel, Inc., said.

The complex headquarters will be the Lafayette Hotel. The complex includes the Lafayette, At Ocean, Capri, Imperial 400, and City Center hotels.

Students on rail tours will be in the downtown Los Angeles satellite complex with headquarters at the Biltmore Hotel. Other hotels housing students in the downtown area will be the Mayfair, Blair House, Doric Dinkler and Kent.

Prop and jet packages will be housed in all three complexes, according to Winkelman, depending on spaces available.

A special schedule for final payment for students on prop and jet packages will be announced in Thursday's State News.

"Students should come to make final payment prepared to sign-up for the departure time they want with the people with whom they plan to travel," Winkelman said. Only those students who have signed up for the same type of transportation during the reservation process will be able to travel together.

"At the same time students sign-up to travel together," he said, "they should plan to sign a 3x5 card to be roommates at the hotel."

Students will be housed in two, three and four-person rooms, he said, with a great deal of available space in three and four-person rooms.

"Students going by air may be housed in the same satellite with others on bus or rail packages."

will have a choice of satellite complexes on a first-come-first-serve basis.

Arrangements for students making final payments will be

outlined in the State News later this week.

Winkelman said present plans for final payments for rail packages will be Friday from 1 to 6 p.m.

Bus payments will be Saturday from 1 to 6 p.m., while students taking air packages will make final payment Dec. 12 or 13 from 1 to 8 p.m.

All final payments will be made on the second floor concourse of the Union.

Winkelman said students should be prepared to make separate payment for their game ticket at the beginning of the final payment line. Tickets will cost \$6.50 with a \$3 refund when claimed on the coast. Identification will be necessary before the ticket will be sold.

Soccer: Spartans Still Second

ST. LOUIS—Michigan State's soccer team failed again in its bid for the National Collegiate

Athletic Association title, as it lost to the arch-rival St. Louis Billikens, 1-0, here Saturday.

The Spartans won their semi-final game, 3-1, over Army Thursday night to earn a final berth with the Billikens who beat Navy by the same score.

St. Louis eliminated State from the national tourney twice before, and last year the booters bowed to Navy in the championship game. A disputed penalty shot call doomed the Spartans in this year's game.

The penalty shot was awarded to the Billikens at 9:17 of the third quarter. Pat McBride and Carl Gentile carried the ball into the Spartan zone as defensemen Nick Krat and Manny Ruschewski collided with them and

four had fallen.

The referee called tripping and holding against State, and St. Louis was awarded a penalty shot. Gentile took the shot and

it went by goalie George Janes into the lower left of the nets.

St. Louis was awarded another penalty shot about nine minutes later when Krat was called for tripping in the penalty area, a call disputed even more than the first. But Gentile's shot went wide this time.

The game was mostly a defensive effort, as the score indicates. Krat, Ruschewski, Terry Bidiak and Bert Jacobsen were effective in bottling up Olympians Gentile and McBride. Krat didn't allow top scorer Jack Kinealy a good shot throughout the entire game.

The Billikens had an edge in play in the first half as the Spartans, jittery at the outset, didn't really set moving until the second half.

on, play was evenly balanced. Both teams had several good scoring opportunities, but shot high or wide. State's Gary McBrady and Guy Busch both hit

the crossbar, and Busch just missed another time when his shot hooked away from the corner of the net at the last second.

All Systems 'Go' For Astronauts

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Astronauts Frank Borman and James Lovell Jr., were given a "go" Sunday to fly Gemini 7 at least 30 orbits in their two-week mission.

The space agency said "everything progresses very satisfactorily."

The signal to continue was flashed to the spaceship on its 15th orbit as the two rookie astronauts swept into the second day of a 206-orbit trip that would break every space record in the books.

At Cape Kennedy, meanwhile, technicians working several hours ahead of schedule mounted the Gemini 6 spaceship in preparation for the difficult attempt to have the two Gemini ships rendezvous a week from Monday.

Pad 19 at the Cape was left in better shape than expected in the aftermath of Gemini 7's fiery takeoff at 2:30 p.m. EST Saturday. Around-the-clock work is under way at the Cape to get the second mission off on time.

After placement atop its 10-story Titan rocket, the Gemini 6 spaceship passed an airtightness test, and service lines connecting it with the reactor complex were pronounced in satisfactory condition.

Borman and Lovell were reported settling down quite nicely from the strain of their first day in space and were in fine shape for the longest orbital voyage in history.

The astronauts' first night was a quiet one, and each of the 37-year-olds got four to six hours of somewhat restless sleep.

Earlier, they asked for the score of the Houston Oilers-Buffalo Bills football game—and showed a little loss of a sense of earth time. The game hadn't been played yet.

Dr. Charles Berry asked Bor-

man—who is wired with small electrodes to sense how deep he sleeps—about the sleep period. "It appeared to us on the ground that you were sort of in and out most all of the time," Berry said.

"Affirmative," Borman answered. "It was rather a light sleep."

Borman told Berry that they were preparing their third meal in space, had eaten almost everything in earlier meals.

"We're both saving our gingerbread for dessert," Borman said.

Alabama Surprises Nation With Legitimate Justice

LAST THURSDAY, a white Alabama jury did something that no other jury had done in the modern history of the South. It convicted a white man of murdering a Negro.

All this precedent setting took place in the small town of Anniston, Ala., where 25-year-old Hubert Strange allegedly killed a Negro, Willie Brewster, on the night of July 15. The jury, which took nine hours to deliberate, came to a verdict shocking almost everyone in the courtroom—guilty of second degree murder, as charged.

DURING THE TRIAL, convincing testimony was given by a former friend of the defendant, who testified that Strange had admitted the killing to him. But in previous trials in the state of Alabama, all white juries have completely ignored relevant testimony when Negroes or civil rights workers were involved.

Then Friday in Montgomery, Ala., another all white jury found three Ku Klux Klan members guilty of interfering with the civil rights of the late Mrs. Viola Liuzzo. Among the three was Collier Wilkins, acquitted earlier this year in another Alabama court for Mrs. Liuzzo's murder. The three men were then sentenced to 10 years in prison, the maximum for the offense.

WHAT PROMPTED THESE juries to convict a white man of killing a Negro and three Klansmen of violating a civil rights worker's civil rights when for a century other Southern juries had not? It is possible that these two juries did indeed seek to do justice in an objective manner.

It is also possible that they considered what additional notoriety would be brought to Alabama if they freed the defendant Strange, and the three accused Klansmen, after the loud national protests registered after the farcical happenings in sister Hayneville, Ala., earlier this year.

And it is even more possible that they considered the consequences of what might occur if they freed the white men, in light of the fact that Congress will consider new legislation in its next session to further protect Negroes and civil rights workers in the South from "Southern justice."

WHETHER THESE WERE mistakes or isolated incidents, no one knows. It is our hope that they mark the beginning of a new trend in the South towards equal justice for all, both black and white, from this time forward.

It may be asking too much too soon from the traditional southern judicial system. But we can still hope.

Social Science Series Airs Good Discussion

LAST THURSDAY the Social Science Department held the third in a series of programs covering issues of interest to students. Subjects of these informative talks have been student demonstrations, birth control and alcohol.

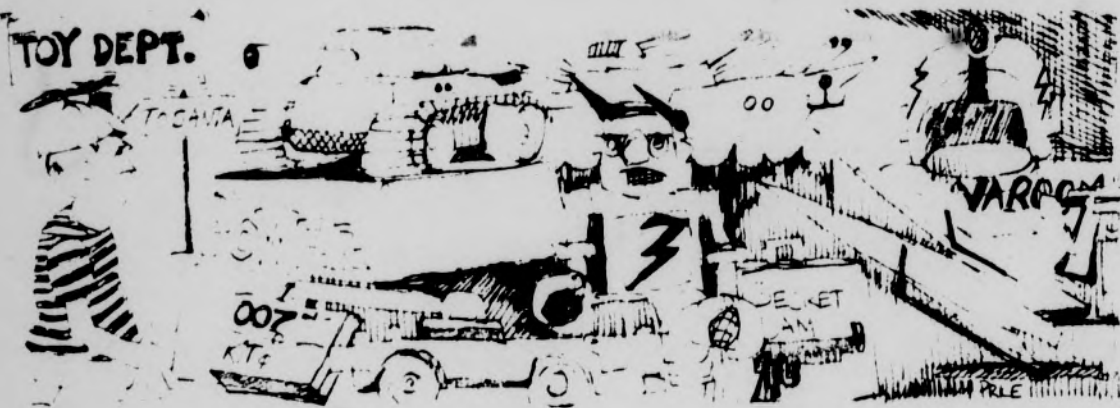
At all the programs, a panel of faculty members led the discussion. However, as the various sides of the issues were brought out, both the students and the faculty entered into vigorous debate.

This series has been most successful. Attendance has been high;

the panel, well versed; and the discussion, enlightening.

MORE IMPORTANT THOUGH, the students have been able to communicate with the faculty on topics not covered in the classroom. These discussions give the individual student the opportunity to see that a wide gulf does not exist between him and the faculty. It has not been a case of faculty versus students, but one of individuals airing personal views.

While our nation continues to fight a real war in Viet Nam the toy industry this Christmas is attempting to militarily equip the nation's children.

A stroll through any toy or department store reveals an arsenal of weapons matching that of the Defense Department.

That today's children need such a realistic array of weapons is doubtful, and the taste of adults in choosing such "toys" for children is even more questionable.

Not only are toy-makers creating graphic weapons but they

also fashion war-games like "Battle Cry", for ground strategy; "Broadside" for sea strategy; "Afrika Korps World War II Invasion." Tactics-wise they amount to a Command and General Staff College in miniature.

The weapons range in size from the potent "Johnny Seven, OMA," to the electric battery-powered "M-14 U.S. Infantry Rifle" with recoiling barrel.

The more diminutive arms like hand-grenades, German leaguers and "Night Fighter Sub-Machine Gun" are available for

the guerrilla-type youngsters. Toy-makers also provide gear for the outdoor enthusiasts—elephant guns, canteens and mess kits.

For those meeker children who are also interested in the military there is the "GI Joe Combat Medic Kit." Included in the kit is a "GI Joe" doll which "really bleeds" when wounded.

Fascist-minded kids are not forgotten either. Such spy devices as "Snooper Snooper", walkie-talkies, and an "OOT At the Case" with secret coding and decoding apparatus will give any boy the opportunity to be the first in his block to turn in his parents.

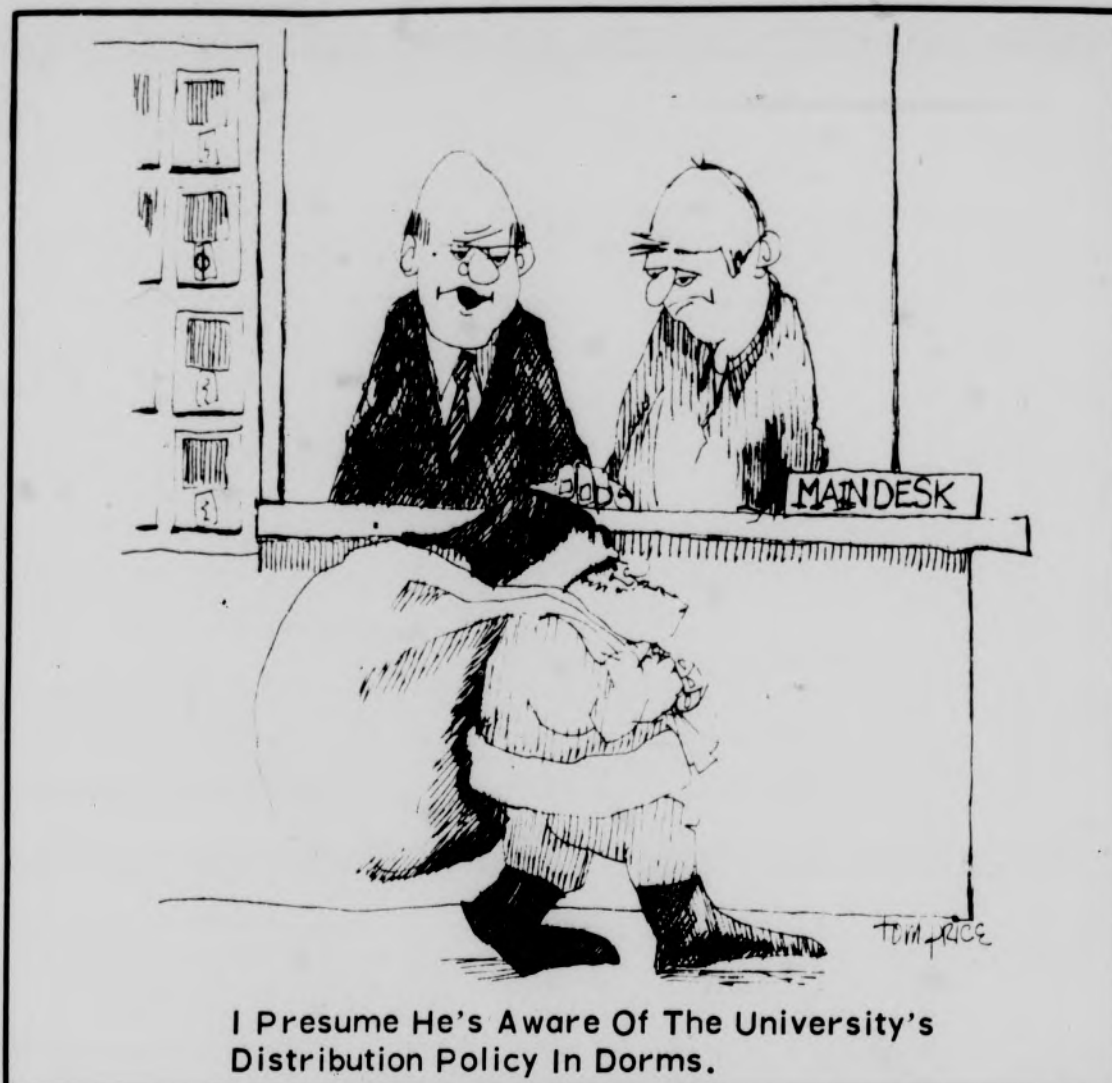
The more sedate boys will have to be content with battlefield games utilizing only model soldiers and tanks.

The idea of youngsters playing with weapons is not new. Most every student can remember playing cowboys and Indians or cops 'n robbers.

But the frightening realism of the so-called toys created today is a product of the '60's. TV advertising can take credit for this.

Kids once content with cap-guns or homemade bow 'n arrows have yielded to a new generation of youth, satisfied only with weapons that fire, spark and smoke and chauvinistic war-games where "conquerors take

Double-Think On Viet War

To the Editor:

Now I've seen the ultimate in double-think! The American revolution compared NOT to the Vietnamese revolution, but to the American COUNTER-revolution!

Dan Swatosh compares, implicitly, His Majesty the King not to Diem...Ky, those right wing dictators, but to Ho Chi Minh, who saved Viet Nam from the Japanese and the French, and from whom the U.S. is now trying to wrest control of half of Viet Nam. (The U.S. offered

the French the atomic bomb to use on Viet Nam, but was told no thanks.)

Too many people view Viet Nam as a football game, where all other things are equal, and one automatically roots for his team. But the team has changed from the 1776 visionaries of freedom and reform, to the Pentagon and State Department.

The game is suppression of revolution and reform; we arrived early and want the late-comers to freedom to stay "down in front."

The appropriateness of different reform for different countries is not easily comprehended by military strategists. When there's a fight, they want to know whom our enemy supports. The other one is the bad guy.

The enemy supports civil rights in Selma, and George Wallace receives our second thoughts. The American Nazi Party supports what we do in Viet Nam, and some people actually think twice, not of what we're doing, but of the Nazi's image.

The argument which the supporters cannot and will not discuss, and which if pressed evokes the most vicious clenched-fist accusations, is that our tight-lipped intelligence shows united Vietnamese support of Ming; world law and precedent, in letter and spirit, consider divided Viet Nam a crime, and the Saigon-controlled South is a creation maintained by U.S. force. One must know about Viet Nam's culture and government before its division, in order to judge what a U.S. about face would revert Viet Nam back to.

As for talk of keeping commitments, in 1954 our government made a commitment to the Geneva Agreements, which made three things explicit: a military separation of French and Vietnamese troops at the 17th parallel, a politically and territorially unified Viet Nam, and popular sovereignty of Viet Nam.

That peasant in the rich fields knows only two things; under Ho Chi Minh he and his rice were not given over to any Chinese spectre, and the people dropping bombs, propaganda and presents are Americans who feel that the future will be otherwise.

University Made Wrong Decision

A momentous event is taking place on this campus. A student is being denied readmission for defying the University.

In general, the expulsion of a student for breaking University rules arouses little interest. In this case, however, the student involved and the rules he has broken seem very important to a large number of MSU students.

Paul Schiff was denied readmission for what amounts to doing what many present and former students of this University would like to have done and wish they had.

Somehow, I think each of us feels guilty for not having said loudly, defiantly and "illegally", if necessary, "in loco parentis is wrong." The University has no right to interfere with students' pursuit of knowledge and the expression of academic freedom. Every student should not only be free to say and write what he believes, but also to criticize the injustices he sees in his society and existing authorities and institutions.

Although I can't claim to know Schiff well, I have met and talked to him in the course of reporting for the State News. He impressed me as a normal guy, with problems and fears just like the rest of us. And I think he realized that in organizing demonstrations for civil rights and helping to publish and distribute Logos, he was putting himself in danger. He knew he had a lot to lose.

I feel guilty because I read my "illegally" distributed copies of Logos eagerly and in the privacy and safety of my dormitory room, secretly agreed with much of what it said and wished CSR well. I know many others who did the same. But most of us didn't have the courage to go out and join—to stand up and be

counted as among the dissatisfied.

And so now Paul Schiff is being punished for doing what we wish we had had the courage to do. Is he a trouble-maker? Most assuredly. Is this University a better place to get an education because of him and people like him? YES!

This is the element in his case that is being overlooked by the administration. Paul Schiff did many of us a favor by making us think, for once in our college careers. He and others like him gave us a cause, a number of causes. And if this is not a desirable aim of a college education, if this University cannot recognize this, then perhaps it is time MSU re-evaluated its aims as an educational institution.

The outcome of Paul Schiff's case will have a very profound effect on me. If he is denied the opportunity of continuing his education because of his civil disobedience, I think I will always be a little bit afraid to say what I think and do what I believe is right, not only here but after I leave the University.

One thing my education will have brought me—the knowledge that standing up for one's beliefs is a risky business and that if I want to get anywhere, it's best to keep my mouth shut.

Freed Soldiers In Custody

BANGKOK (UPI)--Two U.S. soldiers freed from Viet Cong imprisonment were released into the custody of American officers here Sunday and immediately whisked away to a military hospital for medical examinations.

Lt. Gen. Richard Stilwell, commander of the U.S. Advisory Command in Thailand, was at the airport when the two former Special Forces guerrilla fighters arrived aboard an Air Force plane from Phnom Penh, Cambodia. But he remained inside the passenger terminal along with a group of military policemen and did not talk with the soldiers.

They hopped immediately into a waiting ambulance, were driven to a nearby military plane and flown to the 31st U.S. Army field hospital at Korat, about 135 miles northeast of Bangkok.

Whites May Blow Dam

LONDON (AP)--Commonwealth Secretary Arthur Bottomley said Sunday he has reason to believe the white settler government of Rhodesia has mined the Kariba power dam to keep that key to the Central African economy from falling into the hands of its foes.

Bottomley spoke to newsmen after returning from African talks on Rhodesia. He visited Britain's Commonwealth partners in the area and was the chief negotiator with Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda in working out conditions for the stationing of British planes in Zambia to patrol the dam area on the Rhodesia-Zambia frontier.

Bottomley said he "had reason to believe the dam could be blown up, in which case the very thing that Mr. Kaunda fears--the turning off of the switch--would be achieved, nottemporarily, but for all time."

He confirmed that Kaunda had been pressing for British troops to cross into Rhodesia from the Zambian border. He made it equally clear that Britain was not ready to go so far at this moment for fear of touching off civil war--and destroying the vital dam in the struggle.

Two Foreign Ships Collide

SWANSEA, Wales (P)--The 11,500-ton Panamanian tanker Springwater collided Sunday night with the Greek vessel Eretria in the Bristol Channel.

The Eretria, 7,199 tons, reported damage amidships but a call for help was cancelled.

No casualties were reported, and neither ship was said to be in danger of sinking.

AFL-CIO Executive Shakeup

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)--The AFL-CIO, now 10 years old and claiming 15 million members, may replace a third of its Executive Council at its national convention in San Francisco this week.

Labor sources here say the changes are favored by President George Meany himself, who was due to arrive in neighboring Oakland on Sunday. The biennial convention begins next Thursday.

Meany, now 71, is considered certain to be re-elected for a two-year term, sources say. Less certain of election by the convention's 2,000 delegates are a number of council leaders in their 70s and even 80s, or those ousted by their own union groups.

The last group includes David J. McDonald, who lost re-election as United Steelworkers president, and James B. Carey, resigned head of the International Union of Electrical Workers.

Chemical Explosion
Rocks Derailed Train

CAMDEN, Ark. (P)--More than 1,000 persons fled their homes before Sunday when a freight train derailment set off a fire and an explosion among tank cars containing deadly chemicals.

No injuries were reported. Firemen moved in late Sunday in an attempt to end the threat of more explosions.

Authorities evacuated a wide area of the city after one of the cars blew up.

The fire set a nearby section of woods ablaze and Forest Service personnel moved in to fight that fire.

Meanwhile, evacuees gathered in the city's bus station, churches and a park, where some camped out during the night.

The actual threat was from the chemicals in two cars shipped by the Ethyl Corp.

Sheriff Grover Linebarrier said a tank car containing tetraethyl lead--a colorless, poisonous antiknock agent in gasoline for automobile engines--was in a heap of battered cars where the fire centered.

Linebarrier said he could not

determine whether this car was on fire, or whether the fire was confined to the cars near it.

An oil company spokesman at El Dorado, 32 miles south of here, said vapor and particles of tetraethyl lead, also sometimes called liquid lead, could be deadly.

A rupture in the tank would release the fumes, he said, and an explosion would scatter fiery particles into the air, burning everyone they touched.

Billowing clouds of bluish-purple smoke wafted into Camden, a southern Arkansas city of 15,800.

An explosion about 1 a.m. shot a column of flame about 300 feet in the air, Linebarrier said.

The blast came moments after Fire Chief Jake Mahan, at the request of railroad officials, withdrew his men after a two-hour fight against the fire.

"It felt like the earth was quivering," said Mrs. Allie Cunningham at the downtown Camden Hotel, about four miles from the wreckage. "People must have thought it was a bomb."

GT 7 Shot Better
In Person--Wells

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla.--If you watched Saturday's Gemini launch over nationwide television, you may have seen more of it than I did, but you missed some of the excitement.

Television viewers see the launch from about a half-mile away while National Aeronautics and Space Administration guests are located a mile from Pad 19.

The excitement began when we arrived Friday night. We met several of the astronauts at a cocktail party Friday night, including Walter M. Schirra, Gus Grissom and Deke Slayton.

Slayton was patient with my ignorance about space and answered questions. That out of the way, he then wanted to talk about "Spartan football" and our chances at the Rose Bowl. But somehow the discussion always seemed to revert to Saturday's launch.

Saturday's weather added to the tenseness. The light Florida rain Saturday morning was the primary barrier to the launch. Speculation ran from the shot being called off, to being only delayed to hopes the weather would clear up. Eventually it did the latter.

After a NASA briefing on the Gemini 7 flight we went by bus to our viewing station. It consisted of a set of bleachers in a parking lot. We had an excellent but distant view of the launch site.

We were among 700 guests including ambassadors and diplomats from 67 foreign lands who had come to Cape Kennedy to witness the blastoff. Several were from Iron Curtain countries.

Actress Shirley MacLaine, several congressmen, and the Florida Citrus Queen were also there. Frank Borman's parents sat about two seats away from me and were much calmer than I.

Tension really began to mount at "T-minus five minutes." People began to fidget in their seats, smoke cigarettes nervously, and adjust binoculars to get just the right view of the pad.

Then at "T-minus 10 seconds" we automatically began to stand up. No one talked--you could hear only the count down.

Then a burst of smoke and fire from Pad 19.

Several newcomers like myself murmured disappointment upon seeing the smoke and flame because we thought the rocket was going to fizzle out.

This was because the rocket pauses for a split second before being released from the pad. After the rocket started upward, we all knew everything was "A-OK" with the "bird," space terminology for a rocket.

At about three seconds after liftoff, we could hear the deafening roar of the rocket engines. This continued for about a minute.

The rocket was visible for about 30 seconds. At about 25,000 feet, which was straight over our heads, it disappeared into the cloud cover. Many sat stunned for a moment and then began to crowd around the rocket control loudspeaker to hear how the flight was progressing.

Then they began to disperse.

In about 25 minutes, the viewing station was deserted.

But Pad 19 was buzzing with activity. Space personnel began immediately after the liftoff to ready the pad for Gemini 6, scheduled for Dec. 13.

Later that afternoon we drove past Pad 19 and were fortunate enough to see the two stages of the Titan 6 booster being brought in for assembly. This rocket will lift the Gemini 6 space capsule into orbit for its meeting with Gemini 7.

Marines Attack From Sea
To Shatter Viet War Lull

SAIGON (UPI)--American Marines hit the beaches Sunday and U.S. infantrymen pushed into the jungle in two-front attacks on the Viet Cong that broke a long lull in Viet Nam fighting by American ground forces.

The Marines swarmed ashore from landing craft and helicopters at Phu Thu Village, 300 miles north of Saigon, in a dawn raid on a Viet Cong hideout.

The landing, named "Operation Dagger Thrust," was carried out by the amphibious ready force of the U.S. 7th fleet.

The first troops came ashore from the landing ship dock (LSD) which blasted a path in front of them. Air strikes also were called in from the aircraft carriers USS Kitty Hawk and Bon Homme Richard.

The Marines moved inland through a chain of coastal sand dunes along with lumbering m38 tanks. More leathernecks landed behind the dunes by helicopters from the amphibious assault carrier USS Valley Forge.

Other waves of Marines hit the beaches from the attack transport USS Montrose.

A spokesman said the raiding force was still ashore at nightfall Sunday. He said the Marines had killed 14 Viet Cong and air strikes had put 11 other Communists out of action. Marine casualties were described as light.

ONLY FOUR DEAD

Pilots Skill Praised
In Dual Plane Crash

NORTH SALEM, N.Y. (P)--Shaken survivors and seasoned crash investigators credited two heroic pilots Sunday for the miraculously low death toll of four in a collision of two commercial airliners near New York City.

The four killed were aboard an Eastern Air Lines shuttle flight from Boston to Newark, N.J. The pilot, Charles J. White, lost his life as he fought his four-engine Constellation with 54 persons aboard to a fiery pancake crash against a rural Connecticut hillside 50 miles from Manhattan Saturday.

The other pilot, Thomas H. Carroll, guided his crippled TWA Boeing 707 jetliner with 58 persons aboard, to an emergency landing at Kennedy Airport with 30 feet of left wingtip sheared off. The flight was a non-stop jet flight from San Francisco to New York City.

Standing in a soft snowfall beside the charred wreckage of White's plane, Oscar Bakke, regional director of the Federal Aviation agency remarked: "All I can say is it is fantastic that

people walked away. The pilot must have done a wonderful job."

The only injured person aboard Carroll's plane was a stewardess whose nose was bloodied when she was slammed to the floor by the collision two miles up in a dusky sky.

"I think we certainly can give the captain credit for a magnificent job of landing the plane with that much wing gone," said George A. Van Epps, Civil Aeronautics Board inspector.

Passengers echoed these sentiments: "Thank God, our pilots were expert and brought it safely in," said New York Schools Supt. Bernard Donovan. "I can tell you everybody in that plane applauded as we landed."

The planes came together with a combined speed of perhaps 1,000 miles per hour on crossing paths of crowded metropolitan air lanes which handles hundreds of flights each day.

CAB investigator William L. Lamb said Sunday it was "far too early" to make any statement of the cause, but expressed "great admiration for both crews."

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Gymnast Thor Ties Olympic Champ At Chicago Collegiate Midwest Open

CHICAGO--Even math majors make mistakes. Luckily for Dave Thor, he fell subject to personal error.

Saturday was "Thor's Day" here at the Navy Pier, as the sophomore Spartan gymnast clearly asserted himself as a top contender for Big Ten and national honors through his excellent performances in the Midwest Open.

Bert Jacobsen, Spartan left fullback, injured his back in the

store are among the merchants already contracted."

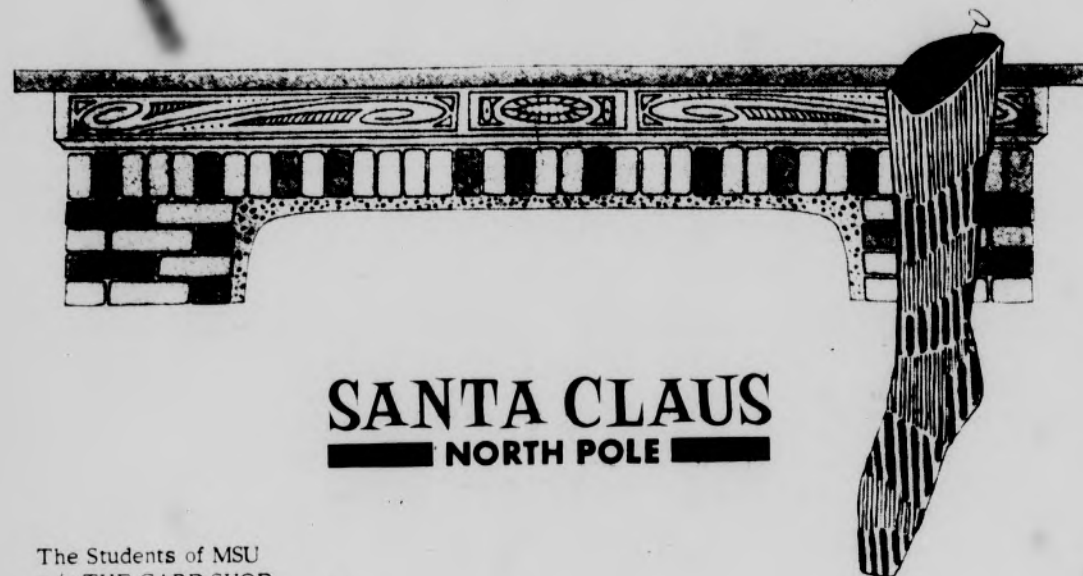
Student discounts will range from 5 per cent to 40 per cent, with the average discount at most participating stores running 10 per cent, Langer said.

"The VISA plan works on the assumption that both the students and the merchants will benefit," he said. "The student saves by reduced costs, and the merchants by increased business volume."

"The average student can realize his \$3 investment in discounts at the end of one month," he said. "From then on, every item the student purchases at participating stores represents a cash profit."

Langer said that as of September, 1966, a free \$500 casualty insurance policy will be issued with each card.

"This discount plan was begun last year at Dartmouth College," he said. "There were only 10 participating merchants, and more than 3,000 cards were sold."

Tankers Swamp OU, Pittsburgh, In First Tests

State's swimming team successfully began its '64-65 season with dual meet wins over Ohio University last Friday, 72-33, and the University of Pittsburgh, 90-33, Saturday.

"It was a pretty good start," said Head Coach Charles McCaffree. "However, we have a lot of work to do. The season lasts until March and we are now, just building."

Gary Dilley, the Spartans' all-around performer, paced his team in the Ohio meet. He won both the 50-yard freestyle and the 200-yard backstroke, tying the pool record in the former, and setting a new dual-meet mark in the backstroke, his specialty.

Sophomore Pete Williams established a new pool record in coping the 200-yard individual medley, and Dennis Hill won like honors with his 500-yard freestyle victory.

Other Spartan individual first place performances were turned

in by John Musulin in the 200-yard butterfly, Ken Walsh in the 100-yard freestyle, Lee Driver in the 200-yard backstroke, and Ken Genova in the springboard diving competition.

The 400-yard medley relay team of Driver, Musulin, Dan Pangborn and Bob Wolf finished first.

Ohio's only wins came in the 200-yard freestyle and the 400-yard freestyle relay.

"We coaches are reasonably happy with the performances in this meet. However, we did not get all of our questions answered," McCaffree said in reference to the victory over OU.

A particularly heartening note was the performances turned in by State's divers, Ken Genova and Fred Whiteford, coached by new diving mentor John Naricy. Genova won with 205.05 points and was followed by Whiteford with 203.55.

"We swam better on Saturday than on Friday," McCaffree said about MSU's 90-33 swamping of the University of Pittsburgh.

McCaffree used his swimmers sparingly against an outclassed Pitt tank crew. Freestyler Walsh was forced to sit out the dual match with a case of airsickness.

The host team's long 55-yard pool was a change for State's swimmers. The pool size didn't hurt the Spartans' effectiveness as they were near-perfect, losing just one first place to their opponents.

Pitt's win came in the one-meter diving. Don Hahnfelot was impressive in edging Genova, but State's fast-improving boardman came back to win the three-meter competition.

Williams, a sophomore from Pittsburgh, put on a show for his home-town fans. The versatile tanker was State's lone double-winner. He paced the 220-yard individual medley and backstroke events.

In freestyle events, Dennis Hill won the 880; Rolfe Groseth, 220; Darryle Kifer, 55; Gary Dilley, 110, and Dan Pangborn, the 440 freestyle.

Musulin won the 220-yard butterfly and Dennis Manrique finished first in the 220-yard breaststroke.

Dan Harner, Bill Scott, Manrique and Wolf teamed up to win the 440 medley relay, and Harner, Scott, Wolf and Ed Glick were victorious in the 440-yard freestyle relay.

"Again our divers did a good job, but there were no outstanding swimming times," McCaffree said.

"We still have a long way to go," he said with an eye on the Big Ten Swimming Relays, Jan. 8, which will be the first conference action of the new season.

Skaters Settle For Split With North Dakota

Elephants aren't the only ones who don't forget. Hockey goal-tenders don't, either.

Michigan State's skaters found more truth than fiction in the proverb this weekend as they watched their hopes for successive victories in State's first two-game home series come to a skidding halt.

The Spartans were dealt a decisive 5-3 blow by Western Collegiate Hockey Assn. foe North Dakota and Sioux goalie Mike Curran Saturday night, after they'd swamped the nettender with a barrage of goals the night before for an 11-5 victory.

Feeling the pressure from Friday night's contest that saw every conceivable Spartan shot make it into the nets, Curran caught onto State's tactics and, practically single-handedly, led his team to victory.

When the going got tough, Curran got tougher. Lagging, 4-2, as the third period got under way, the Spartans came on strong in a vain effort to gain their third win of the season.

They fired 18 shots at the Sioux nets, but Curran caught, deflected and generally stopped all but one of them. He had 25 saves of 28 Spartan attempts for his night's work.

"He killed us," said Spartan coach Amo Bessone, following the game. "We had plenty of opportunities, but we just didn't have the luck against him."

Curran's heroics weren't the only thrills that stirred some 3000 State partisans at the Ice Arena. The Spartans fought valiantly, although somewhat hopelessly, and only a few breaks here or there could have pulled the game out of the fire.

After a scoreless first period that featured rough checking and saving on the part of both goalies,

State got on the scoreboard at 12:20 of the second segment on a Wayne Duffet scoring power play. It tied things up, 1-1, following a Sioux score by wing Roy Davidson at 5:45.

The Spartans took the lead at 16:44 as senior Matt Mulchy riddled the nets on an assist by Doug Volmar. North Dakota came back with two quick goals late in the second period that

literally broke the backs of the MSU skaters.

The Sioux added another goal in the final period, giving them a comfortable 5-2 lead. Duffet put State one goal closer with a tally at 15:01 on assists by Volmar and Sandy McAndrew, but after that Curran buckled down and never relinquished another score.

Friday's 11-5 Spartan win was by far their best performance of

Bears Beat Colts, 13-0; Unitas Out For Year

BALTIMORE (UPI)--The Baltimore Colts' hopes for a second straight Western Division championship suffered a double setback Sunday when the Colts dropped a 13-0 decision to the Chicago Bears and lost the services of ace quarterback Johnny Unitas for the rest of the season.

Unitas suffered torn ligaments in his right knee late in the second quarter when he was hit by a swarm of Bear tacklers on a pass attempt to John Mackey.

Gary Cuozzo, immediately substituted for Unitas, never could get the Colts' offense untracked as the Bears clicked off their fourth straight win since a 26-21 loss to the Colts earlier this year.

The victory kept the Bears' hopes for the Western title alive with an 8-4 mark. Baltimore must defeat Green Bay and Los Angeles to win the crown.

Gayle Sayers ripped off a 61-yard touchdown run and Roger Leclerc kicked two field goals to spark the Bears' triumph. Leclerc's first field goal, a 12-yard boot, came with seconds remaining in the first half. He kicked a 21-yard field goal early in the third period.

Chicago sprang to a 10-0 lead in a fierce first half marked by the injury to Unitas and two brawls, one second before the end of the second period, that resulted in the ejection of Colt defensive end Alex Hawkins and Bears' end Charley Blivins.

Britain has given us these instead of modern weapons with which we could defend ourselves. We have been bluffed, we have been cheated.

"People are becoming anti-Britain because nothing has been done to bring about the downfall of the illegal government in Rhodesia."

A terse end-of-conference communiqué said the meeting in Addis Ababa decided on "concrete measures" to combat Rhodesia's unilateral declaration of independence.

A committee comprising Nigeria, Egypt, Tanzania, Kenya and Zambia was set up to make plans to use "all possible means including force."

"We agreed in principle to use military means to crush the rebels although we realize we have not yet got the soldiers to fight," said Bamali.

Conference sources reported the five-nation action committee's first task would be to work out how many troops would be needed for a military operation against Rhodesia. Then it would seek pledges of support from OAU members to meet the target figure.

Passing, Shooting: 'The Same Old Song'

The new Spartan cager "look" was displayed here against Western Michigan University last Saturday night, but there was nothing new about the outcome. State lost, 85-82, at Jensen Field House and spoiled John Bennington's debut as head coach. No old myths were broken or new images created by the Spartans as they displayed erratic shooting and wild passing throughout the game.

"We were beaten by our own errors," said Bennington, rather dejectedly, following the game. "We just gave them too many easy ones. It's a tough way to start."

"The players and I feel especially bad because of the real fine turnout for the game," he said. "The student support was terrific."

Western generated a veritable heat wave against the Spartans, grabbing an 11-point lead at intermission, and enjoying a 15-point margin midway through the final period.

A near capacity crowd of 12,033 saw State make a strong bid to pull this one out, as it

rallied to within one point of the Broncos in the final minute of the game. But State couldn't capitalize on Western errors, or stop a crucial basket with seconds remaining, and lost the show.

Reggie Laceyfield, a 6-4 sophomore, spearheaded Western's scoring attack with 28 points. He tallied for 17 in the second half and was instrumental in staving off the Spartans' last-ditch onslaught.

Ajac Triplett was the Broncos No. 2 man, as he pumped in 17 points.

Capt. Bill Curtis and Matthew Aitch were State's top point producers, scoring 20 points apiece. Senior forward Stan Washington and sophomore guard John Bailey each had 17.

State's offense got off 75 shots and hit on 34 baskets. Western was on target with 27 of 57 shots for a 49 per cent.

The Broncos were deadly at the foul line, connecting on 29 of 38 shots. They missed only 3 of 20 in the first half.

Western jumped to a quick 17-7 lead before the Spartans realized what was happening and closed the gap 17-15. Western

then applied pressure and took a commanding 10-point lead.

The Spartans finally made their move in the second half while the Broncos held a 62-50 lead. State quickly chopped the lead to 64-60, and soon made it only a three-point difference, 71-68. With only three minutes remaining on the clock, Western was clutching a slim 80-78 lead.

State blew a chance to tie the game up and settled for a one-point deficit, 81-80, on a jumper by Aitch, with only two minutes left.

Spartan fouls then took their toll, as Bailey fouled Bronco Phil White, who responded by sinking both shots. State lost the ball before a shot and then Spartan Shannon Reading fouled out.

Western, in a generous mood, gave State another chance as Bob Blohm, who was eight for eight at the line in the first half, missed his shot.

Aitch racked up his fifth foul the next time down the floor. Triplett missed his foul shot and State's sophomore guard, Steve Rymal, pumped in his only basket, to narrow the gap to 83-82 with 26 seconds left.

Western held on to the ball at that point and Laceyfield iced it with a score as the gun went off.

U-M Cagers Smash 'Green' B.G., 108-70

ANN ARBOR (U.P.)--Three players scored more than 20 points each for Michigan Saturday as the second-ranked Wolverines scored an easy 108-70 basketball victory over inexperienced Bowling Green.

John Clawson and Cazzie Russell paced Michigan with 22 points and Craig Dill scored 21 for the Wolverines.

Bowling Green, with three sophomores in the starting lineup scored but six field goals in the first 16 minutes and Michigan went on to post a 58-32 half-time lead.

Dill scored 16 of his points to pace the first-half attack.

Walt Piatkowski topped the Falcons with 24 points, while teammates Sam Mims added 12.

The Wolverines, now 2-0, cleared the bench with a little more than four minutes remaining in the first half and again with about six minutes to go in the contest. Bowling Green is now 1-1.

Michigan Coach Dave Strack singled out Dill as having shown the most improvement after the close triumph over Tennessee last Wednesday night. Dill scored but two points against the Volunteers.

Drinking Learned, Prof Says

"Young people don't discover drinking, they learn it," Ralph F. Turner, professor of police administration, told about 70 students Thursday night at a discussion entitled "Booze 'n Books."

Turner, Eldon R. Nonnamaker, associate dean of students, and James R. Hooker, associate professor of history, spoke and answered questions at the discussion, third in a series sponsored by the College of Social Science and the Fee Hall advisory staff.

Social controls are more effective than legal controls on the use of alcoholic beverages, said Turner, who teaches a course on alcoholism.

"Alcohol serves a useful purpose for many people," he said. "Moderate use has enabled many people to withstand an otherwise unbearable marital situation. It also serves as a social lubricant."

"But if someone is susceptible to alcoholism, he shouldn't drink," Turner added.

Nonnamaker, representing the administration's viewpoint, answered a number of questions concerning the University regulations on drinking and possession of alcohol in residence halls.

"I am not opposed to booze, so to speak," he said in his opening statement. "But I am concerned about its unauthorized use."

"Alcohol doesn't lend itself to study—in fact, it is often used to escape study and college pressures," he continued. "Students who consistently use alcohol to escape reality usually don't make the grade as students."

Lowering or abolishing the drinking age altogether would solve a number of drinking problems, Hooker said.

"The age of 21 for alcohol might possibly be outmoded today," Hooker said. "As it is, the University and the police are put in an invidious position. They're required to enforce the

maker explained that students 21 or over may not possess alcohol in residence halls because of the difficulty of controlling drinking where large numbers of people live close together.

"Society takes a different view of drinking in small apartments," he said.

"If you're over 21, no one forces you to live in a residence hall. You're free to live in unsupervised housing where you can do anything a citizen is

allowed to do."

"If a student comes in drunk, we don't expell him," Nonnamaker said. "There's displeasure when they do prosecute someone for drinking."

"In most areas of the world, there is not a drinking age," he said. "Anyone who wants to can buy beer, as long as he behaves himself. They don't seem to have the problems we do," he said.

In answer to questions, Nonnamaker continued.

"Usually his adviser puts him or her to bed."

"If the case should come to my office, we don't have an arbitrary policy. We consider what he did before he got into this situation, what he did to get into it, and what he did to get out of it."

"We do not go around looking for a student who might be violating the laws," he explained. "We assume a student is obeying state and local laws until someone tells us he's not."

"But we are concerned in cases where a freshman goes to an apartment party and gets plastered and stays there all night."

Drinkers Need Privacy

A person's drinking is as personal as his sex life, said George Stewart, a representative of the Michigan Department of Education, who spoke to the Michigan Association of Constables at Kellogg Center Saturday.

Stewart told 75 constables from across Michigan that they should consider their own feelings about drinking before passing judgment on the drinking habits of others, especially teen-agers.

Both teenagers and adults drink to achieve status, to relax or to conform to their culture or religious practice, he said.

People don't drink because of the cost, because they don't like the taste, because they want to remain efficient or because their background or religious beliefs prohibit it, he said.

Stewart also criticized people who force others to drink with them. Some men feel a man can't be trusted if he refuses the offer of a drink, he said.

glass, the fire might have been much worse," Taylor said.

Taylor said he lost all of his term notes and approximately \$100 in records and drapes. The fire also caused another \$100 of damage to the room.

The fire could not have been caused by a neglected cigarette, Taylor said, because he does not smoke.

A dropped match in one of the rooms on the terrace floor of West Yakeley Hall destroyed a mattress and some bedding between 6:30 and 7 p.m. Thursday.

Marian E. Phillips, West Yakeley housemother, said there was

little personal property damage other than the bedding.

She declined to name the occupants of the room.

The other Thursday fire destroyed a couch in one of the third floor smoking areas of the Library.

Library Director Richard E. Chapin said the fire was apparently the result of a dropped cigarette.

"The couch was so dilapidated that it couldn't have been damaged greatly," Chapin said. He added that new fireproof fiberglass couches have been ordered for the Library.

The first fire last week de-

stroyed about \$4,000 worth of clothes and other personal property in 478 Fee Hall.

The dormitory had been evacuated because of a phony bomb threat when the fire broke out in the closets near the door of the room.

Police discovered the fire while searching for the alleged bomb and called in the East Lansing fire department.

Speculation was that one of the coeds had brushed a cigarette into the closet when leaving the room during the scare, but Campus Police are investigating the possibility of a tie-in between the bomb threat and the fire.

Colleges Must Set Sex Code

EDITOR'S NOTE: Headlines suggest a sexual revolution on American campuses and the prospect perplexes parents, students and college officials. The group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, a nationwide organization of psychiatrists, has just completed a study that proposes guidelines for college officials. This dispatch explores the study's conclusion.

NEW YORK (UPI)—A group of psychiatrists says American college administrators must face the fact that sex on campus won't disappear if it is never officially mentioned.

Colleges have a responsibility to tell their students in no uncertain terms just what sort of sexual conduct will be tolerated, the psychiatrists say.

The recommendation is the central theme of a report called "Sex and the College Student," the work of the psychiatrists who have all worked with college students, and three consultants, also familiar with today's campus.

Students are questioning what is right, says Dr. Harrison Eddy, editor of the report, and the colleges have a duty to give the students their opinion. Eddy and his colleagues point out that many of the traditional controls against pre-marital sex have weakened.

The Kinsey Report, increased information about contraceptives, popularization of psychoanalytic theory and the lessening influence of religion have worked to put today's student on the spot.

College rule books, which never come right out and say what the college thinks about sexual conduct, further confuse the student, the report finds.

"The absence of direct confrontation on the sex issue invites students to disregard, interpret, misinterpret and make what they will of college regulations," it says.

Eddy explains, "If a college allows men to entertain women in their rooms until midnight without specifically saying that the rule is not meant to approve sexual relations, then lots of students may feally doubt what the college thinks."

"They may truly think that the college is tacitly telling them that they are supposed to be all grown up and free to behave as they wish sexually."

The fact is, says Eddy, college students are far from all grown up.

"A college coed may be a complete Puritan one moment and the next moment she may talk or act like a sophisticate," he says. In her search for a mature identity, she may actually want someone to tell her what she can and what she cannot do.

A clear code of conduct issued by the college, says Eddy, can provide a useful guide to a coed who wants to say no but feels, because of pressure, that saying no is prudish.

The psychiatrists also think it is time for colleges to make contraceptive information available to their students through the campus health service or through sex education courses. But they agree with the existing policy of most colleges that schools should not make it their business to provide contraceptives.

"Many students will interpret the dispensation of contraceptive devices as sanction for their use," the report finds.

Sexual behavior that is private, that does not disturb others, should not be the college's business, the psychiatrists argue.

They also think students need an opportunity to discuss their sexual questions privately, without fear that what they tell the

college psychiatrist will automatically be forwarded to the dean's office. Too many students on too many campuses, the report says, distrust the health centers and hesitate to talk to any health service official.

When the students don't trust the health center, the college loses, says the psychiatrists. A wall of silence is erected and college administrators find

themselves in a position of knowing little or nothing of the sexual climate on campus.

Eddy and his colleagues addressed their report specifically to college administrators, but Eddy hopes that the report will be read by students and parents. And they hope it will promote discussion that will make it easier for everyone to survive the pressures of sex on campus.

And she is the funniest woman alive.

Miss Rutherford's current film is "Murder Most Foul", the latest in a series of Agatha Christie-based stories of Miss

Marple, an octogenarian detective who solves complicated mysteries while making idiots out of the local police force.

Like the three previous Marple films, this movie would be lost without Miss Rutherford's awesome presence. The plot is like most English mysteries—complicated and inane, and the script and supporting actors are barely passable.

But the film does have Margaret Rutherford, and she makes the whole movie enjoyable. As Miss Marple, she joins a third-rate touring drama company in order to investigate a murder.

Two more murders occur before she can come up with the killer. Her audition scene for the company is the high point of the film. "A bunch of the boys were whooping it up at the Malemute Saloon..." she begins, and the director winces in pain. But when she adds that she's wealthy, he welcomes her with open arms.

From then on, Miss Marple goes after the murderer with the subtlety and finesse of the Allied invasion of Normandy. She is always in complete control of the situation, working with the type of British courage and firm resolve that makes you wonder why they lost India.

"Murder Most Foul" is not an exceptional film, but Margaret Rutherford is an exceptional actress who could make any dreary film a delight.

"Laurel and Hardy's Laughing 20's" is a pseudo-nostalgic documentary that exhumes some old footage that is its own best excuse for being forgotten.

The narrator moans about the good old days of Laurel and Hardy and Charlie Chase and laments that such hilarious things as pie fights, chases and people stepping on each other's hands are no longer in the public favor.

The film that the writers have selected are poor examples of silent film humor, mostly trite clichés that are associated with that period.

Aside from being poorly written and edited, the film's basic fault is that most of the scenes have been shown on television so many times that they are not memories but simply old hat.

Laurel and Hardy deserve a better tribute.

But what Abrams does do is show thoughtfully and entertainingly how science can work with religion.

The visitor to Abrams should not expect a technical, boring lecture with a lot of important polysyllabic nomenclature.

What he should expect is a calm, comfortable, clear explanation of what has been said about the Star of Bethlehem.

For clarity, the new show uses many of the complex tricks of which Abrams is capable.

All three axes of the main projector are turned, so that the audience has a minimum amount of neck-craneing to do. The perforated projection dome is used to good advantage with a variety of special lights rigged on its far side to shine through.

The various special projectors, both at the central machine and in the side projection room, are used to illustrate practically everything the narrator discusses.

This is different. Mainly because it's good. "Caresse" does not leave you happy. The important thing is that it leaves you thinking.

It is a simple and universal theme of a young man's yearning for an introduction to sex. Immaturity is transformed into realization of reality by all too familiar means: pregnancy.

But Tom Knight rejects that reality, to leave the viewer saying "Oh you fool." Apart from the exclusion of obscenity, this dialogue is completely honest. Adolescence is characterized in lines such as "We're a couple of pretty hip guys and we've got a bottle of scotch." (To a prospective blind date over the phone.)

Honest also is the depiction of Tom's sexual encounter: --Vicarious, through reading the chapter "The Women" in "From Here To Eternity."

--Together with three of his friends and a girl who is willing. But he is "saved" by the arrival of the girl's father.

--By hiring a prostitute, but not being able to go through with the act.

When Tom finally does get the sex he wants, it comes spontaneously, with the girl with whom he usually drank coffee. He doesn't get the girl for whom he lusted until later.

After he gets it, a transforma-

tion takes place. With his sexual frustration gone, he becomes a new man. He changes his shirt (a clever trick that) and is happy. Robert Howay looks too old for the part of high school senior Tom Knight, although he makes up for it with a youthful approach to the part.

Some scenes are included as "ars gratia ars." There is a "window of life" bus ride scene which simply bubbles with joy.

Technically the film is good, but the camera work is far outstripped by the brilliant sound production. Voices are successfully faded and fuzzed for dramatic effect. The background Jazz is always right.

Staccato percussion is the "sex" theme. It is often played.

Notable companion to the film is Salvador Dali's 1929 short "Un Chien Andalou." It's good too-- if you like to see eyeballs sliced with a straight razor.

Meats Team Compiles Best Record

Two MSU judging teams recently won awards at International Livestock Expositions in Chicago and Madison, Wis.

The Meats Judging Team completed its best record in history last week by placing second at the Madison exposition.

The team has also won two first and two second places in regional contests held throughout the nation this year.

The MSU judges trailed the winning team, Texas A & M, by 17 points out of a possible 5,000.

Michigan State ranked fourth in sheep, fourth in cattle, and fifth in swine. Individually, Martha DeWees, Taunton, Mass., junior, was fourth in cattle judging; Kathy Yaros, Wharton, N.J., sophomore, was eighth in sheep; and Wayne Oxender, Constantine senior, was fifth in swine.

Miss DeWees and Miss Yaros placed sixth and tenth, respectively, in the entire contest.

In previous contests this fall, the MSU team had been first at Baltimore, fourth at Harrisburg, Pa., and ninth at Kansas City, Mo.

Major Criminals Start At Bottom

About 80 per cent of the persons who commit major crimes first appear for misdemeanors in lower courts.

If these persons can be corrected at this lower level, obviously, they will not commit more serious crimes, a Royal Oak municipal judge said here Saturday.

Judge Keith J. Leenhouts urged East Lansing and other cities to start a program similar to Royal Oak's to aid young offenders.

The University has tremendous possibilities for aiding the youthful offender, he said. Students

interested in working with offenders would be a great help because young offenders would identify more closely with them.

Royal Oak gets best results with volunteers under 35 years of age, he said.

Judge Leenhouts stressed that community resources are a great untapped supply of help to young offenders.

Under the Royal Oak program, a pre-sentence investigation is made to determine the youth's background and attitude in the community. "We try to find out his needs and then try to fill these needs," Judge Leenhouts said.

The judge can fine and/or sentence offenders to jail to supplement a probation period of up to two years. During probation the offender is brought into close, regular contact with qualified specialists and volunteers. Psychologists and employment personnel are part of the staff.

The program is financed by the city and by contributions from business and industry.

Royal Oak's program would cost more than \$125,000, but volunteers cut the actual cost to about \$18,000, Judge Leenhouts said.

About 95 per cent of those put on probation in Royal Oak do not violate the terms of their probation, he said. "We find that about 10-15 per cent really undergo a change of attitude."

Sell \$500 Million In Pornography

If \$5 bills were laid end to end from New York to California five times, it would approximate the money taken in each year by dealers in obscene material.

Edward Marks of the Detroit Police Obscenity Enforcement Bureau used this illustration to describe the big business in pornography at a constable's workshop Saturday.

It was sponsored by the Michigan Constable Assn. and the MSU School of Police Administration and Public Safety at Kellogg Center.

"One of the biggest markets for this \$500 million a year pornography business are juveniles from 10 to 18 years of age," Marks said.

"This year, 1,700,000 children will receive some type of smut through the mails," he said.

"There isn't a town, city or hamlet that will be infested."

Dealers go straight to the school grounds to sell playing cards with obscene pictures on the backs for 25¢ apiece, he said.

"During the same year, one juvenile will be inflicted with syphilis or gonorrhea every 10

minutes, and a sex criminal will be arrested every six minutes," Marks said. "Research has shown a strong correlation between these sex crimes and the distribution of obscene literature."

Marks said that California is one of the biggest producers and distributors of obscene literature.

In San Francisco the instances of syphilis rose 591 per cent between the ages of 10-18, while there was a 291 per cent rise in Los Angeles, he said.

"In Detroit, an officer purchased a bushel basket and a tomato basket full of obscene material for \$300," Marks said.

"This investment could have been sold in less than a week for \$6,000."

Marks said that pornography dealers feel that they are protected by the first amendment. However, although authors have the right to freedom of expression, after that expression has been given, he is under the law of the land, he said.

"There is a need for law enforcement officers to exercise their authority by learning the procedure for preventing distribution of obscenity," Marks said.

Marks warned the officers that they could become involved in lawsuits if they did not follow an exact legal procedure.

Law Phases Interlocked

The three phases of law enforcement—the policeman, the judge and the reaction of the public—cannot exist without each other, Michigan State Police Sgt. Wayne Buddemeier said Sunday morning in Kellogg Center.

Buddemeier, head of the intelligence security division in charge of the youth program, spoke on the juvenile code during a Constables' Workshop.

He said that according to a survey, gangs and groups play a major part in juvenile delinquency.

"Police leadership and salesmanship are important in dealing with gangs," he said.

"The policeman must talk to young people on their terms to get them to understand that police represent law and order."

Juvenile courts are instruments of control, judgment, inquiry, determination, authority and leadership, he said.

Courts operate as a unit of business, he said. They often pattern a child's life through their decisions.

"Juvenile courts are harassed as much, if not more, than any other courts," he said. "They are really fine institutions though."

In dealing with juveniles, Buddemeier told the constables to remember they were teenagers once.

Teenagers must be directed to positive and constructive behavior, he said. The policeman must be a public relations man too.

The workshop for Michigan constables was sponsored by the department of police administration and public safety.

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MSU DEMS URGE REFORM

State Income Tax Supported

A committee of MSU faculty Democrats has voted to cross party lines and side with Republican Gov. George Romney in demanding immediate fiscal reform, including a flat-rate state income tax.

"We support Romney's proposal. We feel it is necessary that a state the size of Michigan should have an income tax," Chitra Smith, lecturer in social science and chairman of the MSU chapter of the Democratic Academic Resource Committee, said Sunday.

Mrs. Smith said the committee believes a graduated income tax is the most equitable taxing system although a flat rate tax with exemptions is much fairer and more productive than the present state property and sales taxes.

In addition, Mrs. Smith said Michigan could be headed for renewed financial trouble unless fiscal reform is passed quickly.

"Sales taxes and property taxes do not grow in proportion to the growth of the population," Mrs. Smith said.

"The growth of Michigan's population will require increased expenditures simply to maintain state services at their present level," she explained.

The property tax rate, which is based on the assessed value of a person's real property, is fairly constant from year to year, she said.

The sales tax, according to Mrs. Smith, taxes only that part

of a person's income which is spent.

In times of prosperity, she said, large portions of income may be saved or invested, and therefore not taxed at all.

Mrs. Smith added that the faculty committee of Democrats believes the sales tax is unfair because it places a greater burden on poor families who must spend nearly all of their income for necessities.

Wealthier families, she said, who are not forced to spend as large a proportion of their incomes, are not taxed as high a rate.

Under a graduated income tax, Mrs. Smith said, wealthy persons are taxed a larger proportion of their income than are poorer families who need the money for food, clothing and shelter.

The new state constitution allows only a flat-rate income tax in Michigan, she said.

The committee believes that an income tax should be enacted immediately.

A group in the state Legislature's Democratic caucus, headed by House Speaker Joseph K. Kowalski, is demanding a graduated income tax—or no income tax at all.

"We believe in certain areas of the state the public has been educated to the need for state fiscal reform and that there is a demand for an income tax," Mrs. Smith said.

Mrs. Smith predicted that inaction by certain Democratic lawmakers could hurt the party

at the polls next November.

"Immediate action on a flat-rate income tax does not preclude future action on a graduated tax," Mrs. Smith said.

However, Mrs. Smith issued a gloomy forecast on the prospects of passing a constitutional amendment allowing a graduated tax.

Mrs. Smith said that passage of a flat-rate income tax would not affect chances for eventually passing a graduated tax because "... prospects for a graduated tax written in the foreseeable future are so remote, we are not losing anything."

The faculty committee does not agree with Speaker Kowalski.

"We feel that our commitment to progressive social reforms is just as strong as his (Kowalski's)," she said, "but we feel we would be better off to take the flat rate with exemptions than nothing."

The MSU chapter of the Democratic Academic Resource Committee is one of four chapters at the U of M, Grand Valley State College, Wayne State and MSU, Mrs. Smith said.

The purpose of the organization, Mrs. Smith said, is to "provide the state Democratic organization with progressive ideas and proposals for incorporation into its platform."

Jazz Band Show At 7:15 Tonight

Stout, along with Carl Hall, chairman of the Agricultural Engineering department, and Karl Wright, agricultural economist, prepared a report on the feasibility of improved agricultural engineering practices in Southeast Asia.

The conference is being held as part of the United Nations 20th anniversary.

D. Gordon Rohman, dean of Justin S. Morrill College, discussed "Smallness within Bigness" at Indiana's statewide conference on higher education last weekend at Indiana University.

Representatives from about 35 colleges and universities in Indiana attended the sessions.

Summer Jobs Tips Given

A national employment service and a federal government agency are providing assistance to students seeking summer jobs.

A 1966 Summer Employment Guide, listing more than 50,000

summer job openings, has recently been published by the National Employment Services Institute (NESI).

The NESI Guide lists employment opportunities in more than 450 U.S. resorts, 20 Federal agencies, and in private companies.

The guides may be obtained from B. J. Smith, Circulation Manager, National Employment Services Institute, 1750 Pennsylvania Ave., Washington, D.C.

Students will be eligible for summer jobs in the federal government as office or science assistants by taking a nationwide competitive examination early next year, the Civil Service Commission announced recently.

Students living outside the District of Columbia, Virginia, and Maryland will be given first preference for available jobs in Washington, D.C. The purpose is to give highly qualified people from all over the nation the opportunity to gain the experience of working for a headquarters agency in Washington, officials said.

The examination is designed to measure clerical skills, vocabulary, reading comprehension, abstract reading, and table and chart interpretation. The test, which will be given only once, will enable candidates, on the basis of their scores, to file applications with as many as six Federal agencies.

Interested students should obtain Civil Service Form 5000-AB, which is available at post offices and Civil Service offices and boards. These forms should be completely filled out and mailed to the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C., before Jan. 3.

Applicants who pass the test and send their notices of eligibility to federal agencies will also be entered on agency rosters in various categories determined by test scores. First consideration will be given to those in the highest category.

Further information about federal summer employment can be found in the Civil Service Commission's pamphlet entitled, "Summer Vacation Jobs in Federal Agencies," which will be available soon.

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Union Going Danish

The new look coming to the Union main lounge is Danish modern, with wall to wall carpeting, softer overhead lighting and furniture in subdued earth colors.

used only as a lounge. It will not be used for blood drives, registration and Career Carnival as it was in the past, manager Dmochowski said.

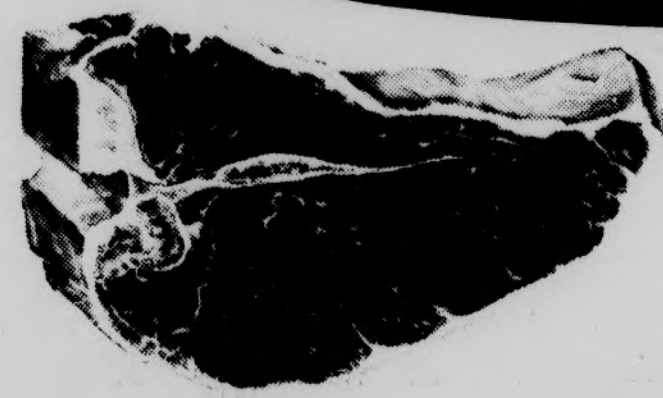
Cong Says 200 Pilots Dead In Hotel Raid

TOKYO (P)—The Viet Cong claimed Sunday it killed or wounded more than 200 U.S. jet pilots in Saturday's predawn raid on the Metropole Hotel in Saigon and warned of "punishing new blows" it has scheduled to hit the South Vietnamese capital in the days to come.

A communique broadcast by Hanoi radio urged South Vietnamese to keep away from "places frequented by the U.S. aggressors and their cruel agents" to avoid the danger.

U.S. figures show one American, one New Zealander and six Vietnamese were killed in the machine-gun and bomb attack on the Metropole, an enlisted man's barracks near the Saigon central market and railway station.

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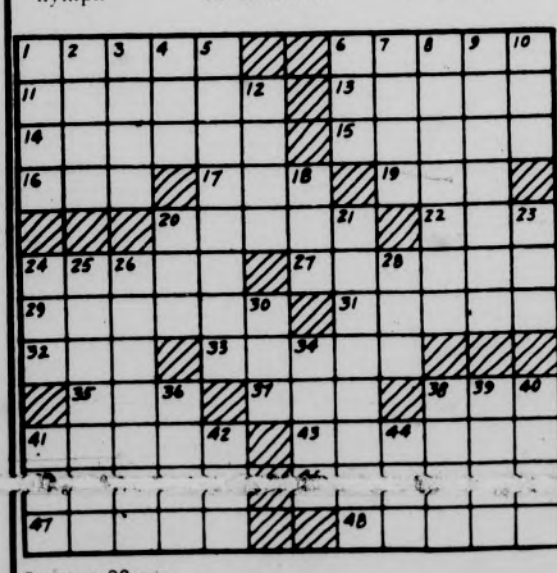

HELP FOR POST-KOREA G.I.'S

Cold War G.I. Bill May Aid MSU Veterans

College men who have been in the armed services since the Korean War may soon qualify for financial benefits under a proposed Cold War G.I. bill, awaiting approval by the U.S. House of Representatives.

The Cold War Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1965, sponsored by Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Texas, would provide financial assistance to veterans who have served at least 180 days of active duty since Jan. 31, 1955, or who will serve until the termination of the present draft law.

Veterans who would qualify for the assistance would receive 1-1/2 days of educational assistance for each day of service, not to exceed 36 months of schooling. The payments would take the form of monthly allowances of \$110 for single veterans, \$135 for married veterans with one child, and \$160 for veterans with more than one child.

The cold war veteran on campus has different problems from the average student. He is usually older, ranging in age from 21 to 30, and is often married with several children.

After two to four years of all-

enation from civilian life, he may tend to become lost in a circle of inadequate skills for the labor market and inadequate funds for higher education.

Henry Dykema, director of financial aids, said that he expects an increase in applications for student loans if the bill should pass.

"This bill might stimulate more to go to school, and the compensation may not be enough for married students," Dykema said. "Some might still need financial aid."

An added feature of the bill would be a retroactive payment to veterans who have been in school since Sept. 1, 1965.

James Morse, chief of veterans association, said that the number of veterans at MSU who could be affected by the bill will not be known until the bill is passed and applications come in. There are 225 members of the Veterans Assn.

Typical of those who will benefit from the bill is Ernie Stryjak, Grosse Pointe junior, and army veteran who works as a janitor for the Lansing School system and has applied for a university loan.

"I'm planning on being married in June and this will create a financial hardship," Stryjak said.

"Obviously I'm in favor of the bill, he said. "It will tend to have the same effect it had on the Korean War veterans—a fantastic number of graduates. This will extend to a greater number of people the opportunity to go to college."

Michigan Senator Philip Hart has supported the bill since it was introduced three Congresses ago.

Hart said, "The daily crisis in Viet Nam accentuates the need for the bill. The obligation we have to those who serve us at risk of life and limb cannot be ignored. We owe it to them and we

owe it to ourselves," he said. Sen. Yarborough reported that since 1955 more than 2-1/2 million men had been discharged from the services completely untrained, unemployable and unable to compete for scarce jobs. In 1963 alone, more than 210,000 veterans received unemployment compensation in excess of \$96 million.

The proposed GI Cold War bill would provide assistance to over five million veterans by 1970, Yarborough said.

The main objection to the Cold War Bill, its \$289 million annual cost, come from the Pentagon. The Pentagon argues that a GI bill of rights would lure men from the service who might make the military a career.

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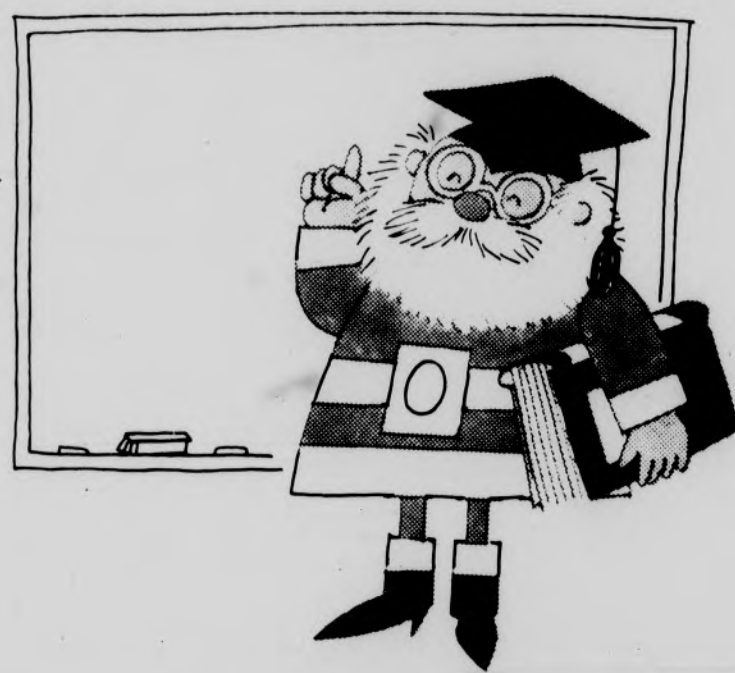
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
