Financial Problem Given as Reason by Dean Conrad For Present Hour Limit

Interview With Dean of Women Brings Out Idea That Students Should Avoid City Social Life; A. W. S. Fails to Take Official Action Upon Matter.

Stressing the fact that any extreme extension of the present 12:15 a. m. curfew hours would place an undue financial burden on Michigan State students, Dean Elisabeth Conrad today stated that she was not in accord with popular student opinion which has asked that later permission be granted State women students on week-end nights.

"I am not in favor of any extreme extension of curfew hours because they would impose too great a financial burden upon Michigan State students. I have every reason to be exceedingly proud of; first, our high academic rating which State students have won; and secondly, because of the friendly and cordial attitude between our men and women on this campus," the dean of women said.

ASSIGN RODNEY TO C. C. C. JOB

Former Military Head Sent to Ludington in Charge of District Work.

Col. D. H. Rodney, head of the Michigan State R. O. T. C. unit, who left East Lansing last Thursday night to report at corps headquarters in Chicago, has been sent to Ludington to be in charge of the Civil Conservation Corps in that district for an indefinite length of time.

A telegram was received by President R. S. Shaw Tuesday from Colonel Rodney, commanding officer of the sixth corps area, expressing regret that Colonel Rodney had to be sent away from East Lansing, but stated that this was necessary because of an emergency in the C. C. C. work at Ludington.

The dean holds that if later hours were granted each date would become much more expensive. Parties would be more costly and the male students would be more likely to be out late at night. An extension would destroy the present democratic social life of the campus. "We don't want to develop any extreme social life," she said.

Council on the Student Council resolution presented Tuesday night which would grant the granting of later hours.

It has been decided that only 80 per cent attendance of the active and pledges of each sorority will be required. However, they are not limited to this number. Price of the banquet will be 50 cents.

PLAN EMPLOYMENT IN COLLEGE PROGRAM

Plans are being made by Prof. P. A. Herbert of the forestry department for the employment of men from the newly organized civilian works administration on the college campus and college owned enterprises throughout the state.

Crews of 25 to 30 men will be employed at the campus woodlot, at a potato station at Lake City, and at timber tracts at Augusta and Bath.

The CWA has been created by the recent release of federal funds. Of the 4,000,000 it plans to put to work 10,000 to 20,000 will be employed in Michigan woods, according to Mr. Herbert.

TO CELEBRATE 'SPARTAN DAY' NEXT TUESDAY

Will Excuse All Afternoon Classes for Festivities in Gymnasium.

OFFER FREE SHOW

Event to Recognize Achievements of Football and Cross-Country Teams.

The third annual Spartan Day will be held next Tuesday, November 28, it was announced at the meeting of the Student Council this week. The celebration will take place entirely in the gym this year and will begin at 1:15 with all classes excused for the afternoon.

Spartan Day, which was originally instituted as a day for recognizing the achievements of the football team during the past season, will this year feature both the football and cross-country teams. The cross-country team has just returned from New York where the Michigan State aggregation won first place in the National I. C. 4-A contest.

All arrangements for the afternoon are in the hands of the Student Council, assisted by various campus organizations such as Blue Key, the band, and the cheerleading squad.

Free Show Offered

Highlights of the celebration include a free show at the State theater, an all-college dance, a pep meeting, speeches by several prominent men of the college and Lansing. Merchants of East Lansing have been asked to have State flags out for the occasion.

Beginning at 1 o'clock with the playing of several college tunes on the chimes of Beaumont Tower, by Russell Daubert, the afternoon program will proceed with an all-college dance with music by Raber's orchestra in the gymnasium at 1:15. The dance will be interrupted by a pep meeting.

Following in Charge

Speakers for the pep-meeting for which I. E. Frimodt will be master of ceremonies, include Ralph H. Young, director of athletics, Charles Backman, head coach, Tom King, end coach, Miles Casteel, chief scout and backfield coach, Lauren P. Brown, cross-country coach, Lee Bernhardt, Lansing alumnus, and Mayor Max Thompson of Lansing. All members of the football and cross-country teams will also be present.

"All students are requested to either memorize the college songs or bring a copy of them to the pep meeting in order to join in the singing. The college band will play before and during the pep meeting."

Following the pep meeting, students may either continue dancing in the gym or attend the free show which will be given at the State theater through the courtesy of Howard Sweet, manager. Blue Key members will be stationed at the doors of the theater to check coupon books and students are asked not to crowd while entering the theater. Dancing in the gym will continue until 5 o'clock at which time Spartan Day will be officially ended.

A special picture for Spartan Day afternoon only is announced by the State theater management. They are attempting to secure "Beauty for Sale" featuring Alice Brady, Maude Evans, Otto Kruger, Philip Holmes. This is a very modern, snappy comedy drama. At the time of going to press there has been no definite confirmation received on this picture but it is expected this will be forthcoming.

Evolution of Wolverine Marked by Many Changes

In 1896 there was published at Michigan Agricultural College by the senior class, a book called the Heliosat. It was a small volume, in appearance a real deal like the typical family album which it is said once graced the parlor tables of our forefathers. The contents consisted of some pictures and a large amount of writing. It is from a source that the Wolverine, Michigan State's annual has grown.

The pictures in this old book seem literally to rise out of a mist of time, for in those days photographs weren't possessed of the technique they now display. The bulk of the material in the book was writing, contrasting strangely with the pictorial books of modern times. Students of English might find it interesting to observe the slang and the style of the writings.

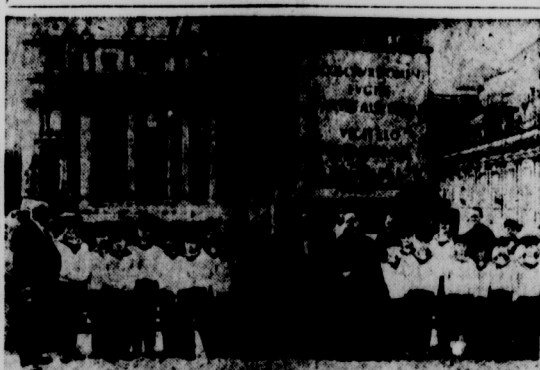
The development of the annual as it now is was a very gradual process and would be difficult to describe. The findings went through a trial and error sort of change each type usually being tried at least twice, until the present kind was achieved. The pictures became clearer in succeeding issues and eventually colored prints were introduced. The first books were rather staid volumes but as the student body increased in numbers the annual increased in thickness. In 1929 the size now in use was adopted.

The volumes of 1917-19 are striking representations of a tragic period in history. In the latter there is a black-bordered list of the State men who made the supreme sacrifice in overseas service.

The Wolverine of 29 was very appropriately jacketed in red. And the next book had a cover decorated with trees, perhaps commemorating the back-to-nature movement so popular at the time.

Between the Heliosat and the last Wolverine there is as much difference as between the first automobile and the last.

TO GIVE PRIZES IN FINAL DRIVE

Sales Contest for Subscriptions to Yearbook to Begin December 4.

The final Wolverine drive toward the 800 subscription goal will start next week with a sales contest for prizes being offered as an incentive for further buying. This innovation in sales technique characteristic of the Kline-Rogers management will be conducted by the sororities on the campus starting Monday, Dec. 4.

Two prizes—one for the individual and one for the group—will be offered to the person and sorority selling the most Wolverines. The individual prize will be a watch and the sorority prize will be a \$15 reduction in the annual fee which is charged to sororities for their page in the Wolverine.

A member from each sorority will be appointed some time in the near future to conduct the campaign of her respective sorority. It is expected that the sororities will secure the cooperation of the fraternities and independents. Fraternities were not chosen to help sponsor the drive because to date they have not shown the amount of interest the sororities have. However, it is hoped that they will put their shoulder to the wheel by subscribing for the yearbook.

Display Gives Ratings

A display is being planned with a miniature race track and cars which will represent the ratings of the sororities from day to day. The sorority getting the largest number of subscriptions will be placed first and the rest of the sororities will follow in order according to the number of subscriptions sold. The display will be shown in the Wolverine case in the library.

At the end of a two weeks' period of selling the sorority selling the largest number of Wolverines will be awarded the \$15 reduction. Sororities are reminded that the subscriptions for credit toward this prize may be obtained from any person on the campus.

The individual selling contest is open to any person who wishes to try for the prize.

SEVEN ARTS WILL PRESENT CINEMA

Club is Planning to Bring Various Shows to Lansing.

According to William Munger, president of Seven Arts club, the organization is planning to show in East Lansing the famous film "Ten Days That Shook the World," by Sergei Eisenstein, author of the widely discussed "Thunder Over Mexico." This picture, which is a portrayal of the Russian revolution, was shown at the University of Michigan last year and attracted most favorable comment. There are no leads and one of the outstanding characteristics of the film is its remarkably effective use of crowds and mob scenes. Present plans call for its being shown sometime early in December.

The Seven Arts club is also making plans for the production of George Bernard Shaw's "The Great Catherine" shortly after the opening of the winter term, and it may be possible to secure either Eva Le Gallienne or Katherine Cornell to play in Lansing in December or January.

Boys Organization Founded By Austrian Emperor Over 500 Years Ago

The Vienna Choir Boys, who will sing a program of operatic, choral works and songs tomorrow evening at the gymnasium are as interesting as the music they sing.

This organization is known as the Vienna Saengerknecht and is supported by the State of Austria. It was founded nearly 500 years ago by imperial decree of Emperor Maximilian who ordered a group of boysingers to sing a daily mass under the auspices of the court orchestra of Vienna.

The members of the Saengerknecht live today, as always, in the ancient imperial castle, the Vienna Hofburg, once a home of the Hapsburgs. Here the boys work, study, eat, and sleep. They are paid nothing, but have dedicated their boyhood to music. It is the dream of countless thousands of Austrian boys to be invited to join the Saengerknecht. But few are called. Only 40 of them are housed in the castle and then only after rigid examination. Twenty-two of these are in the company that will perform here under the direction of Gustav Knecht, tutor, and musical director.

When they appear tomorrow night, the Saengerknecht will appear in full costume in all three parts of their program.

Captain Hicks Completes Over Eight Years Service

Veteran Union Sleuth Has Mailed 164,782 Letters for College.

Herewith is a story which has oft been told. It involves Fred Hicks, night-watchman, Union custodian and friend of the people. Fred's pet indulgence is the compilation of data concerning his varied duties, and since that data is forever changing, the story of our favorite policeman does likewise. Moreover, each year sees the arrival of scores of freshmen who have not as yet become acquainted with Fred, hence the introduction.

Beginning service as night-watchman with the opening of the Union on June 19, 1925, he is today the only one in the building who has worked there continuously since its inauguration. In those eight and one-half years, there have been exactly 547 dances held, and Fred, while performing his official duties, has attended all but six. The smallest number he has ever seen at a dance was fifteen couples on Thanksgiving, 1929; the largest crowd was to the Soph Prom of last year, when Maurice Sherman's orchestra attracted 267 pairs.

Ottey Leads Teammates to Tape as Spartans Win First National Laurels

Pongrace, Bechtold, Hammer and Hertzler Finish in That Order to Bring Title West of the Alleghenies for First Time in Track History; Manhattan Places Second, Yale Third.

The National I. C. A. A. A. title moved west of the Alleghenies for the first time in track history when the Michigan State cross-country squad, led by the brilliant pace-setting of Captain Thomas Ottey, annexed both the individual and team championships of the United States last Monday. The run was held over the tough VanCourtland Park course in New York city.

Tom Ottey, blond-haired Spartan distance ace who has showered himself with laurels in his sparkling track career, led to the tape a field of 124 contestants, the cream of the East's cross-country talent, representing some 17 colleges and universities. His time was 50:00, five seconds ahead of Joe Mangan of Cornell.

The State team shares the glory with Ottey, captain, by winning the team trophy with 34 points, placing first seventh (twelfth) and eighth. It was the first time in the history of the meet that a mid-west squad has captured the crown.

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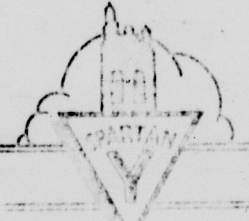

FORESTRY DEPT GETS NEW MAP

To Show Dispersion of Alumni Throughout Country in Display.

A large map of the United States has been placed in the hall of the forestry building showing the dispersion of the foresters who have graduated from that department. Each state is represented by a different color of the map denoting the kind of work he is engaged in.

There are exactly 325 pins, half of which are in Michigan. The other half are scattered throughout the United States and Canada, the distribution of the department being located in all but ten of the states. Michigan State foresters are in all the important timber states of the west, the lake states, and the northeast.

Half of the pins on the map have green heads representing men in forest administration. Thirty-six yellow pins represent men in municipal forestry. Thirty-three black and red pins represent foresters in teaching, research and extension, and 21 red pins represent foresters in forest products work. There are also 84 white pins representing approximately 25 per cent of the total, referring to men who are not in forestry work.

The department points out that its graduates are filling a local need to the taxpayers of Michigan and half of the graduates remain in the state. The general recognition of the school throughout the country is attested to by the wide dispersion of the graduates who have sought their future elsewhere.

GIVE STUDENTS HOLIDAY PASSES

Special Round Trip Fares Offered by Railroad Companies.

Notices have recently been received from the passenger representatives of the three railroads serving Lansing to the effect that unusually low round-trip rates will exist on their respective roads during the coming holiday season. The Pere Marquette, Michigan Central and Grand Trunk will all offer a round-trip rate equal to two-fifths of the regular one-way fare. Mother's companies have announced no reduction.

On the Pere Marquette, the two-way rates will be \$3.00 to Grand Rapids, \$2.00 to Detroit, and \$2.00 to Chicago, respectively. On the Michigan Central, the two-way rates will be \$2.00 to Detroit, \$2.00 to Chicago, and \$2.00 to St. Louis. On the Grand Trunk, the two-way rates will be \$2.00 to Detroit, \$2.00 to Chicago, and \$2.00 to St. Louis.

On the Michigan Central and Grand Trunk, the same rates are in existence. Michigan Central trains for Saginaw and the South leave Lansing at 6:15 a. m. and 8:15 p. m. in Jackson, they depart at 1:15 p. m. and 12:45 p. m. The Grand Trunk leave for Chicago at 8:05 a. m. and 8:40 p. m. The Michigan Central to Detroit remain at \$3.00 round trip.

Drama to Have Novel Setting

Replica of Original Scenery to be Used in Production of Thespian Play.

Radio Station W8SH Is Heard in Many Countries

Valuable Experience Gained in Operation of Short Wave Broadcast.

Through the darkness of 111, the big engineering assembly room, we peered the other night and up to the door of a midge office in the corner. From beneath its portal came a blur of light from behind it, a stream of clicking and clacking. A barely visible sign on the door indicated that station W8SH might be found within. A knock brought no response, a harder knock was more successful and produced a couple of radio men in shirt sleeves. We were taken in. Inside the cubbyhole an operator hunched over his table, by the door and tapped a key, dot-dot-dash-dot-dot-dash, on and on, monotonously. Suddenly he stuck out his left hand, twisted a dial on the control box for the high voltage supply, resumed his tapping.

Along one side of the room was a bench cluttered with various radio parts, along the other was a display of items from other amateur stations over the world. About this time the operator's table was the transmuting mechanism, a black steel cabinet-like affair about six feet high. On its plain face were dials, behind it were coils and wires and tubes—all very simple as the operator explained it, but meaningful in the reporter. About this time the operator, a young man, dressed in a series of squeaks in his capricious, and on the pad before him copied a message from Washington D. C. "Moi tux for rept es ft 300—no sign sur came thru wd a wallop—what hapnd to U? HHHH!"

Is Purely Experimental

W8SH, S. W. Stewart, secretary of the State College Radio club, explained during the interlude, is merely an experimental system to afford college radio fans, especially electrical engineers, chance to become acquainted with broadcasting. Using a 2500 volt generator, the station operates on 150 watts power. A recent development is the new aerial run by the club from Olds hall to the tower on the shop. In connection with radio, television has been attempted, but without success, and parts of a dismantled set only add to the confusion on the station bench. As for history, W8SH was founded in January, 1927, by the club, led by John Rasikas, who now aids a government radio inspector in Detroit. John's brother, William, also founded the electronic station, later using his experience to secure a position as radio operator on a yacht.

Still, W8SH is nothing new, says R. K. Osborn, engineering professor.

RADIO CLUB OFFERS NEW SERVICE FOR STUDENTS

Students who wish to send brief messages to friends and relatives by radio may file their communications at the Union desk. Messages will be picked up there and sent out by the M. S. C. Radio club station W8SH. The operators are at present establishing schedules with reliable stations in every direction so that traffic may be handled as speedily as possible.

Since this is not a commercial enterprise, delivery of messages cannot be guaranteed by every effort will be made to send them the same day they are received at the station. Arrangements have already been made with Mr. Riggs and message blanks are available at the Union desk.

In connection with the article on W8SH, the meeting dates of the Radio club were changed at the last meeting to the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 8 p. m. in room 111, Olds hall.

and faculty advisor of the club. In 1929 Prof. R. D. Wyckoff instituted station WKAR and under an experimental license sent out weather reports, never knowing whether he was heard or not in those days when radio was few and far between. After experimenting with W8SH, which resulted in the present station, he was again shortly after, and in 1923 the State College Radio club organized and directed its operation. A prominent leader on the W8SHU staff, Stewart Seelye, son of D. A. Seelye of the weather bureau, was affiliated with the Spartan Radio company in Jackson.

Heard Foreign Station

Seated at this instrument, operators of W8SH have often thrilled to a faint whistle in their phones announcing a foreign station. The first of these events occurred two weeks after the station was founded when an operator, toying with his key at noon, received an answer from a lieutenant of the French Foreign Legion in Morocco, Africa. Later contacts were made with amateurs in England, Germany, Mexico, Canada, Australia, and South America. In many European countries, Stewart explained, communication is made more difficult by government limitation of messages to comments on the weather and other banalities. Then, too, to call stations operating on the same band or frequency, the amateur must often avoid interference from other stations by dispatching his signals at odd hours of the night.

Cards from the amateurs or "ham" correspondents, each attested to the truth of the station's claims. The majority carry friendly greetings and perhaps a remark on local conditions. Many from foreigners are humorous in their grammatical weaknesses.

Club Plans Recruits

And the plans of the club? Their aim, Stewart declared, is to recruit as many students as possible for instruction in the Morse code and radio fundamentals, preparatory to taking the federal radio commission examination at Detroit for an amateur license. At present the club has seven licensed operators. Five of them, students and one lecturer, by using the microphone, an automatic signal sender, present operators are able to improve their speed over the ten word per minute receiving requirement set by the commission.

Then the operator crinkled and we turned to him. His remarks were squeaking again. California, this time we decided, or the northwest, just for diversion. But no, it was New York. Oh, well, all in the day's work.

During the fresh schedule just past, Sebo was the outstanding player in each game. He ran wild in each succeeding fray and was a constant source of worry to State's opponents. A game wasn't a game unless Sebo broke loose for a couple of 50 or 60 yard runs. Out of a total of 51 points scored by State during the season, Sebo chalked up 10, 4, 20, 38 of them and gave the crowd a thrill doing it.

HARRIERS WILL DEFEND TITLE

Thirty five X-Country Teams to Take Part in Meet Here Friday.

The Spartan cross country men will defend their Central Intercollegiate title against a field of 35 in the outstanding collegiate cross-country meet of the middle west Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the stadium. We know they are very strong as they have won meets from Earlham, DePauw, Miami Butler and two other Indiana schools this year. They have everything to gain and nothing to lose by trying to win the Spartans who have just won the national title for the first time.

State will enter its regular team of Otter, Donaghy, Richmond, Hammett, Butler and Gardner in this race. Complete teams from Notre Dame, Michigan Normal, Western State Teachers, Butler University, and Ball State Teachers will be entered.

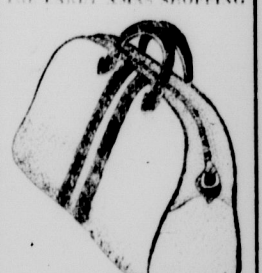

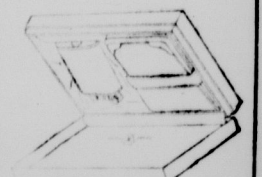
