Committee Will Render Decision
on Later Hours After One
Consideration

TO BE EXPERIMENTAL
Coed Rules for Examination
Week Announced With Only
Slight Changes.

Details of the petition for later coed hours are scheduled for next week by A. W. S. Council to the campus social committee. The petition was taken to L. C. Emmons, chairman of this committee, early Monday by members of the council and the plan was read and discussed. Mr. Emmons says that the social committee will consider the petition sometime in the next future and the results will be reported at that time.

The petition of L. C. Emmons, chairman of the social committee, was as follows:

Dear Mr. Emmons:

In view of the agitation made by the college press, which has stirred up a lot of feeling on the part of the coed students, that they would like to have later hours and to view of the result obtained from discussion of a committee appointed representing women from the fraternities, societies and religious groups, the A. W. S. Council has decided to petition the social committee of Michigan State University to the following changes in hours to be up for trial only.

We propose to make a study of the resulting grades, health records and conduct problems during the trial period. In view of the fact that the social committee has agreed to consider the petition, we hope that these trial hours may have been in effect for a sufficient length of time for us to judge of their merits fairly when the vote is called for.

State's Hopes Fade For '35 Big Ten Membership

Hopes ran high on the Michigan State campus early this week that the Spartan institution might be elevated to a position in the Western Conference, more commonly known as the Big Ten in event that the proposed merger between the University of Chicago and Northwestern university became a reality.

The pending combination of Chicago and Northwestern would leave a vacancy in the Big Ten which might have resulted in the naming of Michigan State to the position in 1935. Newspaper reports connected State, Notre Dame, and Nebraska as potential candidates for the vacancy in the Spartan. However, receiving much support from many quarters.

Latest reports from Chicago, however, reveal that the merger of the two Western Conference schools is still very much in the early stages with no official confirmation of the merger yet announced. A move to combine the two universities is at present, nevertheless, President Robert Hutchins, youthful head of the Chicago institution in a statement to the press on Tuesday, indicated that a merger would take place shortly, but that each university would remain intact for the most part and still continue their athletic relations as before.

This announcement indicates that though the merger may take place, the chances are very slim that either school will withdraw from the Big Ten, leaving State's chances to become a member of the Western Conference completely blasted.

Earlier in the week Michigan State was buoyed by many sports writers in the Big Ten as the school's chances to be into the Big Ten. They pointed to the fact that for two years the Spartans held Michigan conference winners to score less in football. The Spartans were also considered very "tough" and would enter the league as full-blooded competitors.

Local college officials were quick to inquire into the possibilities of sending a delegation to Chicago to ascertain the present standing. The matter is at present pending upon the official announcement of the merger. Though it appears that State's chances to receive a bid for membership are rather slim.
