Rats Subject Of Chem Tests

Hopper and Canniff Conduct Biological Experiments.

Dr. C. A. Hopper and T. L. Canniff of the chemistry department have been carrying on some experiments in the rat room of the chemistry building. Among these activities there are two which may be of general interest.

One concerns the biological assay of certain so-called vitamin D milk, which are being distributed in Detroit and other cities in the state. These assays are made monthly and are required of the dairies by either the health department of certain cities as a means of control, or by the increase of the method by which the vitamin D content of ordinary milk may be increased. In the course of slightly over a year nearly one thousand rats have been used in making these assays. Studies in the seasonal variation in the vitamin D content of the milk from the dairies dairy herd are involving the use of additional hundreds of rats.

Still cooped up in their quarters in Demonstration hall—the Spartans' "spring training camp"—all of the State baseball men are busily getting down to intensive workouts for the coming schedule. The chilling northern blasts and a frozen Old College field have made it impossible for the Kobsmen to get out-of-doors for a simple workout. But that is nothing new, and indoor practice is going on unhampered, though rather cramped.

Prop Tankmen to Meet Saturday in State Pool
