EX-FIRE GUARD TO APPEAR TUESDAY

F. L. DuMond, Grand Rapids, Next Forestry Club Speaker.

Frank L. DuMond, director of the Kent Scientific museum of Grand Rapids, will address the M. S. C. Forestry club at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, October 16, at the forestry building on the college campus.

DuMond will speak upon the subject "Experiences of a Fire Guard in the Rockies" and will illustrate his address with lantern slides of non-technical pictures taken by himself while at work on the Lolo National forest in western Montana during the summer of 1917, when upon the completion of his freshman year at Cornell university, Mr. DuMond ventured forth to see the wild and woody west and glimpse the forest ranger in his native haunts.

Indifferent Pen Work Scored by Literary Chiefs

Collegiate Novelists Form Own Literary Publication.

Too many student writers think of writing as "some sort of clever trick" rather than as a way of life, declares Edward Anderson, editor and author in the current issue of the Literary Workshop, the only national intercollegiate magazine devoted solely to the writings of college students.

Mr. Anderson believes that too many student authors "are more anxious to be writers than to write."

"You do not really get anything out of life unless you continually give and writing is nothing but giving yourself to others, a method of channeling your feelings."

Students from 18 universities have contributed short stories, poetry, feature articles and reviews to the current number of the Literary Workshop.

Critical articles, analyzing the contents of the preceding issue of the publication, have been written by Erskine Caldwell, William Carlos Williams, Sarah Chokla, Grace Stone Coates and others.

Bachman, well satisfied with the work of the Spartans in last week's game will probably start the same

team which began the rout of the Wolverines. Colma will be the only casualty from the starting team. Klewicki and Zarza will be on the flank, Reavely and Zindel in the hot spots at the tackles, Dalhgren and Wagner at guards, Buzolitz at center, Reynolds at quarter, Warmbren and Seba at halves, and McCarty at full.

Reynolds was probably one of the outstanding men on the squad last week although his ball carrying consisted mainly of running back Michigan punts. Russ has been mentioned by several papers for his magnificent blocking during the game. As this is the primary function of a Notre Dame quarterback, aside from calling signals, Russ has shown himself to be an all-around valuable man in the backfield.
